## Schools open with busy schedules

Coke County's two schools, Robert Lee and Bronte, opened on Tuesday with busy schedules following the long Labor Day weekend. Both personnel rosters were completed several weeks ago and were on hand to begin work.

At Bronte new staff members are Shirley Coleman, new elementary principal; Kay Coffman, English/Spanish teacher; Chris Miller, Vo-Ag teacher; Cheryl Schmidt, Science; Marla Francis, Special Ed; and Larry Willard, teacher/coach.

Staff members new to the Robert Lee School System are: Carolyn Davis and Christi Bagwell, kindergarten; Forrest Perry, band director; Betty Kinnard, special education; Ruth Pape, Spanish and English; Pat Stephens, aide; Abel Torres, custodian. Mrs. Wilma Carwile, longtime Robert Lee High School librarian, recently announced her retirement. Her position had not been filled at presstime Wednesday. Mrs. Carwile will remain on the job until October 1.

Although most of the county elementary students seemed excited to be back in school, they and their teachers looked hot in full attire and shoes.

The Longhorn Marching Band and the Stompin' Steer Band have been working on music and routines for some time now. The Bronte group is headed by veteran band director Homer Stewart while the Robert Lee band is under the direction of Forrest Perry who is new at the school this year. They squads are looking forward to entertaining the fans.

Despite the sizzling temperatures, football has become the main focus of interest. Players from both teams have been working out in the record heat since August 12 and appear to be in good physical shape.

After two scrimmages with Sands and Roby, the Steers will get serious on Friday night (tonight) when the season opener with the Reagan County Owls is scheduled to take place on

the home field at 8:00.

Coach Coulter, his assistants Ed Poebls, Max Anthony, Bobby Bolding, and Wayne Alexander, are anxious to see how the team will come together. Only six lettermen will be returning to the squad following the Steers' dash in 1984 to the State Quarterfinals. Many had to assume unfamiliar slots when workouts started. Coulter expects this team to play with enthusiasm and dedication but the group will be giving up depth in several positions and some size overall. He hopes they will be able to compensate with quickness and good execution.

The Steers have been picked in an area Coaches' Poll to finish third behind Irion County and Santa Anna, but the new Steers hope to prove them wrong.

The Bronte Longhorns will operate under the helm of Coach Gerald Sandusky, assisted by Rocky Rawls and Larry Willard. The 'Horns return about half of their 1984 lettermen. Coach Sandusky hopes to improve on last year's finish in the zone and will be helped tremendously by a number of strong players from the good 1984 JV group. The Longhorns will host the Forsan Buffaloes in Bronte tonight when the '85 season is off and running.

It's business as usual in Coke County schools. Let's support them any way possible and drive carefully, watching for youngsters walking and getting off the buses.

# September 30 is final date for crop insurance

September 30 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for barley, oats, and wheat in Coke County, Texas, according to Dottie Sampley, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Sampley.

A new crop insurance plan, called actual production history (APH), is available this year to producers of

wheat, barley, and oats in addition to corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, rice and other crops, Producers of these crops may now qualify for higher yield guarantees by proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with above-average yields. "With the increased cost of producing a crop, it makes good sense to take a look at this new concept," says Sampley.

To find out more about the APH plan, producers should contact a local, authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office. September 30 is the final deadline for applications.

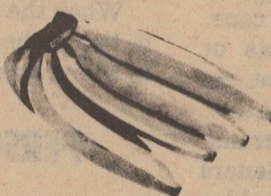

### Hot Weather Tips For Fall Gardens

The Texas mid-summer heat can be threatening to early fall vegetable gardeners. However, for a successful fall garden, many vegetables must be planted during high temperature conditions to mature during late fall or early winter.

To avoid this problem, set out your own transplants. Finding good healthy transplants can be done by purchasing your fall vegetable seeds and growing your own plants.

Vegetable seed may be planted in flats, coffee cans, milk cartons, peat pots or peat pellets in areas that can protect them from the heat.

However, to avoid transplanting, most gardeners prefer seeding vegetables directly in the garden.

The biggest problem with this is poor seed germination due to summer heat. This can be cured simply by modifying the garden seeding area.

In Texas, bedding the soil prior to seeding or planting is important. After bedding the garden and marking off rows, take a hoe or stick and make seed furrows.

Apply water directly in the seed furrow and allow it to soak in, then scatter seed evenly along the furrow.

After seed are sown, cover

them with a material such as compost, potting soil, peat moss or vermiculite. These materials will provide a better environment to help the seed germinate and grow.

Light colored material will help keep the seeding area cooler. It's important during germination not to allow soil around young seedlings to dry out.

Once plants have emerged, a protective shade or cover made of board, cardboard or shade cloth, on the west side of the row, can help protect plants from the afternoon summer sun.

When the plants reach one to two inches tall, thin them to the proper stand.

## Teaching safety habits

TEACH CHILDREN SAFETY AT HOME -- "Once parents have decided their child is mature enough to stay alone, it's their responsibility to teach safety habits," says Dorothy Taylor, a family life specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. She advises parents to have a home fire drill and review phone procedures, including use of emergency

numbers. Children should be instructed to keep doors locked and not admit anyone. Parents should also establish and communicate basic home safety rules about using the stove, microwave or other appliances, climbing on furniture or

ladders and not using knives, matches or other sharp objects when home alone.

## Consider wildlife in brush control

Brush is an important habitat component for many wildlife species in Texas. Total brush removal will harm more wildlife species than it will benefit. But excessive brush reduces the valuable habitat components such as forbs and grasses. Brush also competes for moisture that would nurture nesting habitat and winter food. Properly designed brush patterns coupled with proper grazing by livestock will provide excellent habitat for many wildlife species.

Many people buy land with trees and brush to enjoy the wildlife, either by hunting or observation. For these potential buyers, landowners can reduce the market value of their real estate by total removal of trees and brush.

Other landowners want their properties to have a

clean, manicured appearance. Taller trees are trimmed, smaller brush is removed, fence rows are cleaned, weed control herbicides are applied, and pastures are frequently shredded. Ironically, the wildlife habitat value, which may have been the reason these places were purchased, is reduced by these activities if they are not properly planned and applied.

Soil Conservation Service personnel at Robert Lee assist landowners and operators through the local Soil and Water Conservation District in designing brush patterns, grazing systems, and weed control programs that will benefit wildlife. Technical guidance biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department also help design brush patterns and develop wildlife management plans.

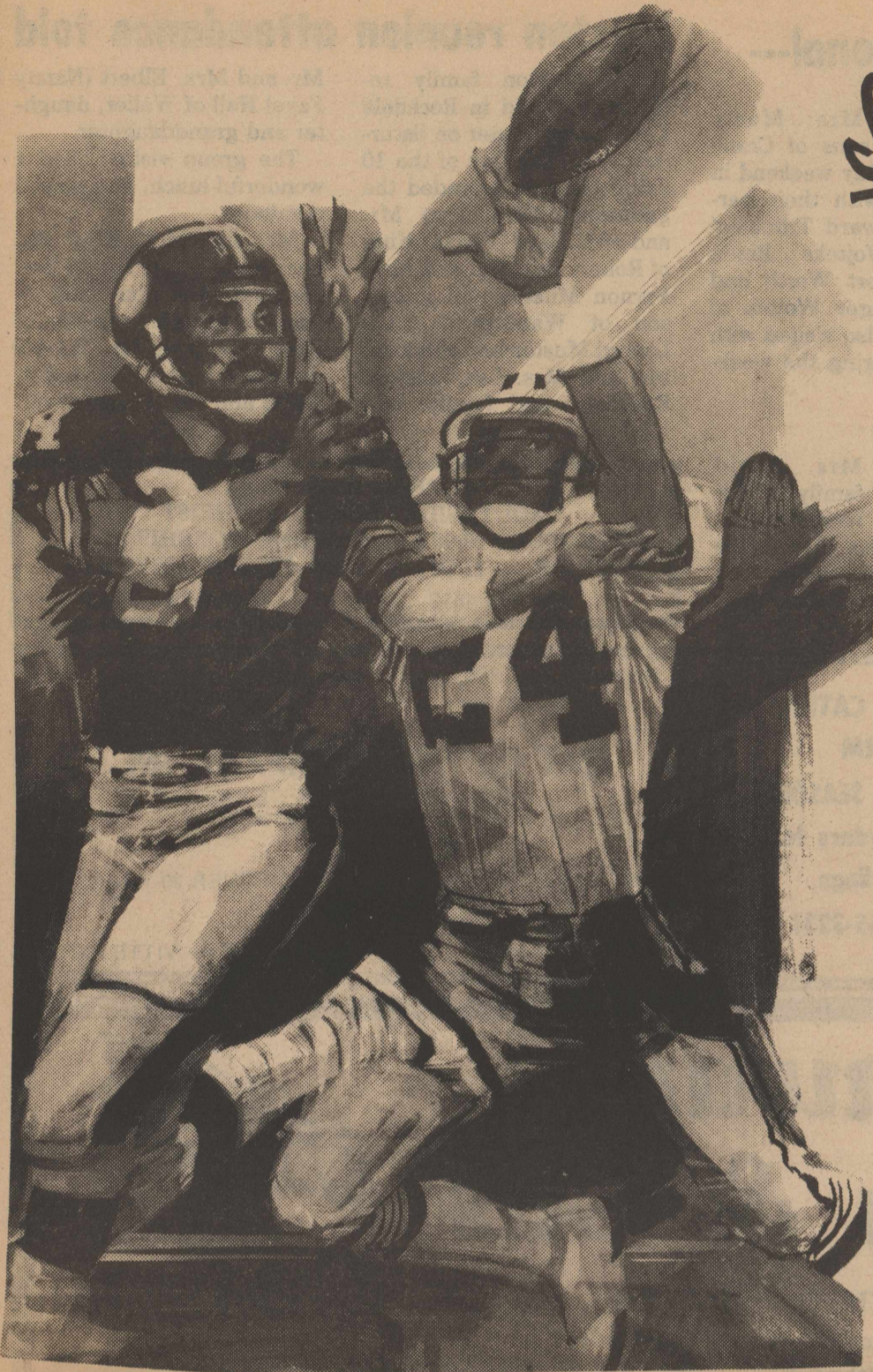

Many Texas franchised new car and truck dealers will be offering repair and replacement of safety belts at cost during September and October and most can supply oversize motorists with belt extensions at no cost.

"Texas will be the second largest state to have a mandatory safety belt law in effect," said Gene Fondren, president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association. "It is important that we make it as easy as possible for Texans to comply with the law, so we have joined with the manufacturers in offering this program."

The cost of parts and labor varies from dealer to dealer and manufacturer to manufacturer, but Fondren said an example of the commitment by the factories is the cost reduction made by Volkswagen, which cut its cost for replacement belts almost 75 percent. Meanwhile, the General Motors Corp., which has accumulated over the years about 6400 part numbers for safety belts, designed a "universal" lap belt, lap-shoulder belt and retracable lap-shoulder belt, and the cost is relatively low.

"While most dealers do not normally stock safety belt replacement units, the manufacturers have assured

us that in most cases the part can be shipped to the dealerships in 24 to 72 hours," Fondren said. "We want to make this as simple and as inexpensive as possible."

Also, to help those motorists who might be too large for a safety belt, most manufacturers provide safety belt extenders either at a low cost or at no charge.

Some dealers may have safety belt extenders in stock while others may need to order the part because of the varying policies of the different manufacturers, Fondren said. In those cases where the part must be ordered, the extender can be shipped in a day to a week, he said.

"We believe strongly in the life-saving aspects of safety belts and we want to see the law succeed in Texas. That is why we are doing all that we can to encourage drivers and passenger to comply with the law," Fondren said. "Wearing a safety belt is a habit we can all get into, and it's a habit that could save our lives some day."

Fondren urged car and truck owners to check the condition of their belts.
