The April birthday party for the West Coke County Nursing Home residents was held April 7 and was hosted by the Robert Lee Eastern Star Chapter No. 187.

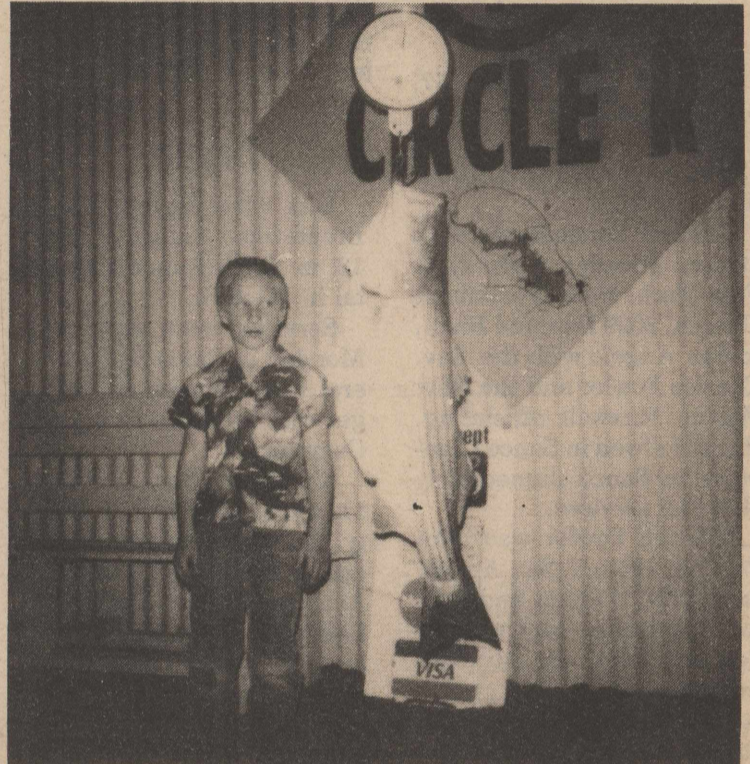

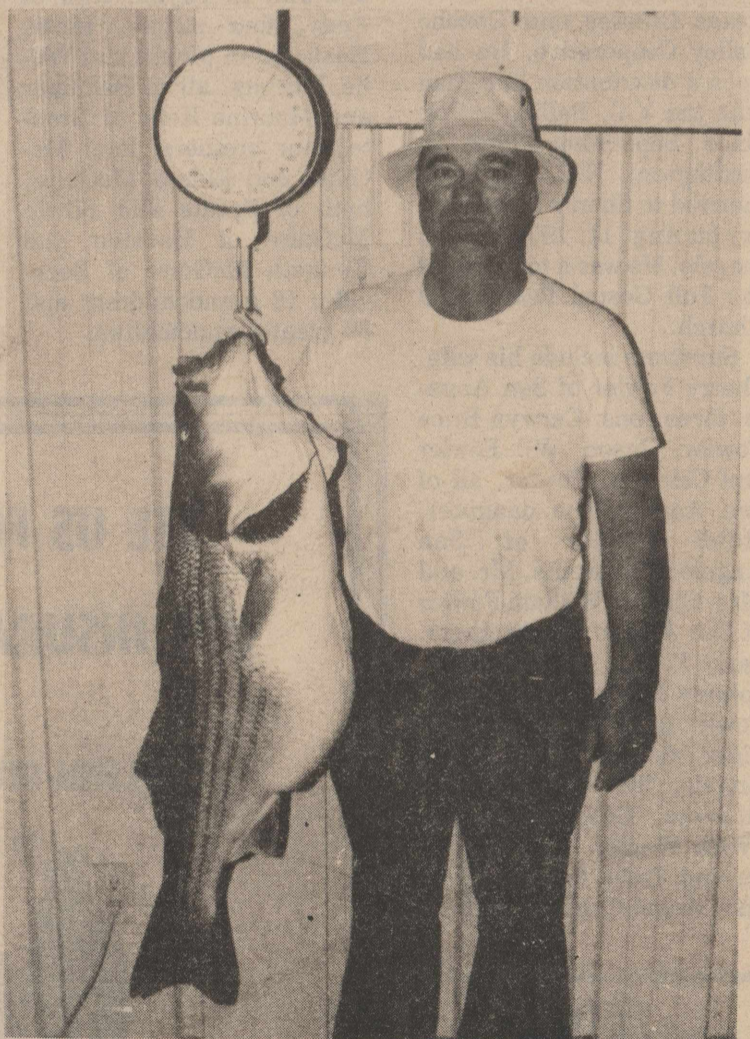

## Social Security facts

A person or family cannot receive Social Security payments unless an application for them is filed, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

There are certain special times when a person should get in touch with the Social Security Office. For example, people should contact Social Security if they are unable to work because of an injury or illness that is expected to last, or has lasted, for at least 1 year; if someone in the family dies; or, if the worker, spouse, or a dependent child has permanent kidney failure.

In addition, a person should contact a Social Security office if he or she is at least 62 and plans to retire or is within 3 months of 65 even if there are no plans to retire, to arrange Medicare health insurance protection.

Persons needing to contact Social Security should remember that their business can be conducted by telephone. A contact by telephone can save time and money.

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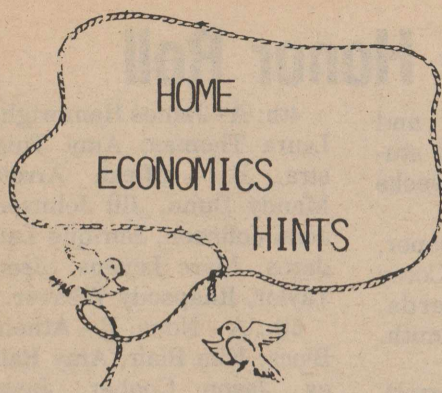
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## Exercise increases energy

Between a job, family and household chores, most of us consider ourselves too busy to take the time to exercise. We ride instead of walk, gulp down our food and spend leisure time in sedentary activities.

We also like to believe that exercising would simply add to our fatigue at the end of the day. However, exercise has been shown to increase energy and help people cope with their stress.

The truth is, we do not need to find extra time and space for fitness. But we do need to use our time and space a little differently. Here are some ideas:

Substitute moving time for waiting time. Don't wait for elevators, parking spaces or bus rides less than a mile. Wear your walking shoes and walk whenever possible.

Try an exercise break instead of a coffee break. Take a quick walk even if it's only around the office, or do some

exercises right at your work station. The office is no place to do pushups, but you can do neck and shoulder rotations, flex your arms and legs, stretch your fingers and toes.

Get some midday relief from back aches by sitting in a chair, bending from the waist, letting your head dangle between your knees and then slowly rolling your spine back up into position.

Once you start exercising throughout the work day, you may decide you want more. Consider getting up earlier for stretching exercises or a brisk walk. Join a lunch time aerobics class or take a brisk walk over the noon break. Take an exercise class after work or use an exercise audio or video cassette at home.

When you put your body in motion, you may be surprised at how much fitness fits in a busy day.

### Individuals highlight district track

Bronte's boys did not win the district track meet but had some outstanding individual performances. As a team, Bronte scored 81 pts. to place 2nd behind Irion County who won the meet with 158 points. Third was Robert Lee with 69 points followed by Menard with 48, Miles with 37, Christoval 32, Garden City 28, Water Valley and Eden each had 25, Sterling City had 24.

Irion County inched out a win over Bronte in the 1600 meter relay while Bronte won the 400 meters. Bronte's team of Pete Puentez,

Stephen Lee, Randy Draper and Todd Brooks ran a 44.30 sec. 400 meters for first place and a 3:29.51 in the 1600 meter for 2nd place.

In the discus Stephen Lee threw 139'3" for 3rd place. Pete Puentez came in 2nd in the 800 meters in a time of 2:05.29 losing to Robert Lee's Randy Gartman by .21 of a second while 3rd place Rex Bunnell of Water Valley was 3rd with 2:05.93.

Todd Brooks was 2nd in the 400 meters in a time of 51.90 behind John Garcia of Menard who ran a 51.36. Stephen Lee placed 2nd in the 300 meter Intermediate

Hurdles in a time of 41.96 behind Robert McGee of Irion County with a 40.93.

Randy Draper was 3rd in the 200 meters in a time of 22.87 behind 1st place Jason Hanes of I.C. with a 22.68 and Claudia Fonsera of Christoval with a 22.78.

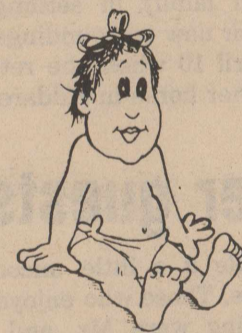

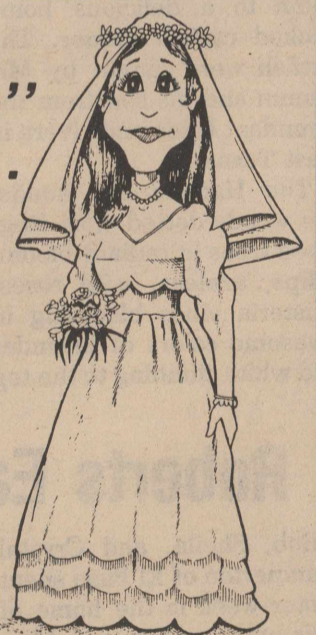

Every summer, over 300 young people between the ages of six and eighteen attend a very exclusive camp near Gainesville. The entrance requirements are strict: the child must have diabetes.

But Camp Sweeney, organized over 35 years ago, is a place for the diabetic to learn while having fun. All of the activities of a regular summer camp are offered: horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, arts and crafts, riflery and many more spots, plus movies, dances and carnivals in the evenings. Sandwiched between the fun things are interesting sessions on medical and dietary information to help the campers take care of themselves and learn to live productive lives with their affliction under control.

Diets are formulated according to each individual's needs, giving the diabetic valuable examples of how to exchange foods to include an occasional "treat" so he won't feel left out around his friends at home.

Located on rolling wooded acreage 10 miles northeast of

Gainesville, the site is bordered on the south by a 34-acre lake. Three, three-week sessions are held every summer, with the opening session scheduled for June 7. Others begin on June 28 and July 19. A medical staff and experienced counselors are always present and keep a close eye on the campers in a one-to-four ratio, many of them former campers themselves.

The camps is a United Way agency, and scholarships are available for any child whose family is unable to pay the full session's fee. No child is turned away because of race, religion, or national origin.

Established in 1950, Camp Sweeney was the first educational and recreational training center in the South for children with diabetes mellitus. Thousands of youngsters are living a self-sufficient, healthy life due to their training at Camp Sweeney.

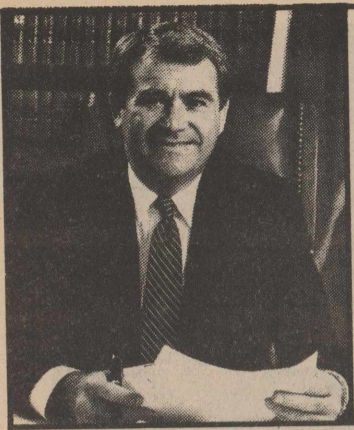

### OVERSEAS JOB LOCATING SERVICES

If you are looking for a job, you have probably seen advertisements in your local newspaper promising overseas employment. And if you'd like to work in a foreign country, you may have considered using a job locating service.

But before you spend any of your hard-earned money, you should investigate the company thoroughly.

If you are having problems with, or questions about, an overseas employment service, or any other consumer issue, call the Consumer Protection office nearest you. Offices are in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, McAllen, Lubbock and El Paso. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.

#### PHONY PLACEMENT AGENCIES

My Consumer Protection Division has received numerous complaints recently concerning phony job placement agencies, especially those which claim to specialize in overseas employment.

The Middle East and Far East are favorite locations and quite often these operations advertise oil field jobs. And they often target oil industry workers because they know that the Texas petroleum industry is in a slump and many workers are displaced.

If you, or someone you know, is an unemployed oil industry worker, or is interested in other kinds of work overseas, you should be extremely skeptical about any claims these job placement companies might make.

#### WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Texas law does not allow permit personnel employment agencies to charge an *up front* fee, that is, to take any money before the agency actually finds the applicant a job.

It is also illegal for personnel services to make any *false statements* to job applicants or to refer job-

seekers to companies where no job vacancy exists.

#### YOU CAN LOSE MORE THAN MONEY

Unfortunately, many overseas job placement companies advertise in Texas today have little respect for the law.

It is quite common for such companies to charge exorbitant up front fees—\$300, \$500, or more per applicant. They habitually misrepresent job vacancies and usually string applicants along for months with promises of future employment. They sometimes even charge additional up front fees.

We had one instance where the charlatan job placement company took not only the applicants money but also their passports. In this case, they were promised jobs in China.

Passports are valuable documents much in demand by smugglers or illegal immigrants.

Do not turn your passport over to anyone except an employee of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

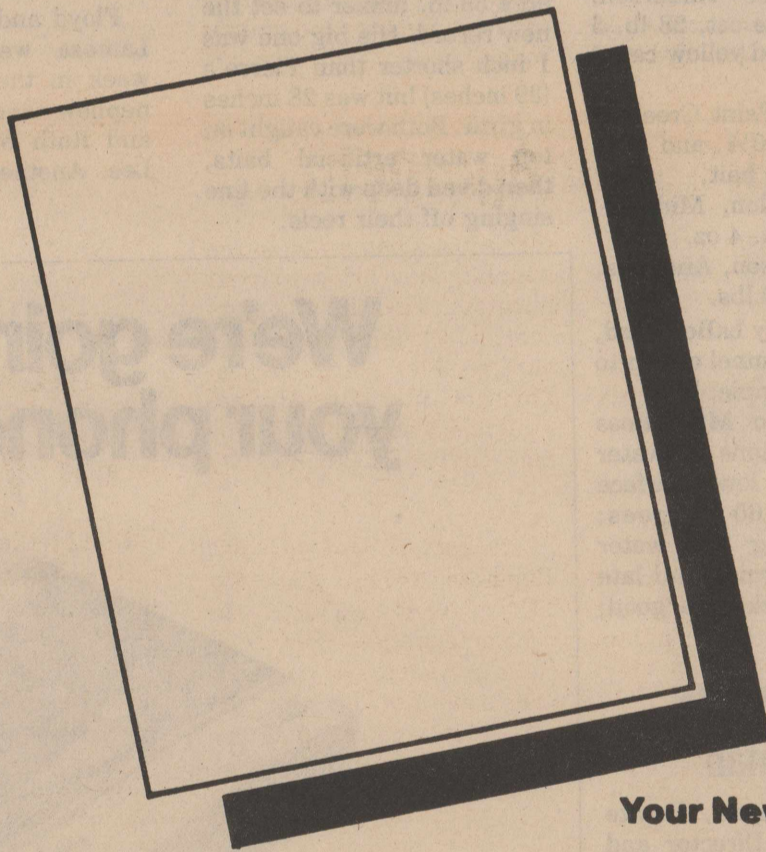

# Oak Creek Fishing News

**SADDLE UP**, it's time to go fishing. If you are looking for a pretty lake where the fish are biting, you would do well to consider visiting Oak Creek in the near future. The water is so clear it could be coming from a mountain stream and when it's calm it hinders the fishing during the daylight hours. Fishing a light colored lure, you can see it coming through the water thirty feet away. Because the water is so clear, it is warming much faster than other area lakes according to reports we have. The sand bass are moving into the shallow water to spawn and these ain't nothing, but fun fish to catch. The better sandies are going near two pounds. Some good size crappie are being taken in shallow water on small jigs, but they don't seem to be

concentrated in large numbers in that kind of water yet. At the rate the water is warming they will be along with the black bass before you read this report.

Terry Day of Winters got a real nice black bass going 7 lbs. 1 oz. Jane Tucket of Midland, using a spinner bait, landed a real beauty of a black bass going 6 lbs. 12 ozs. F.D. Fletcher of Plainview got six blacks ranging from 3 to 6 lbs. 3 ozs. Two families from Lubbock fished from the dock and caught a basket full of crappie, sand bass and catfish. The best catfish was a blue cat going four pounds.

Here is a bit of information that will be helpful to the bass fisherman. At sundown one the 19th, the water temperature at three feet was 63 degrees and just after daybreak on the 20th it was 61. This is spawning temperature and with no more over-night change than two or three degrees, it will be in full swing here in the next few days.

Unless we get rain, the lake will drop to spillway level in the next two to three weeks. It's time, for it has been running over almost eight months now.

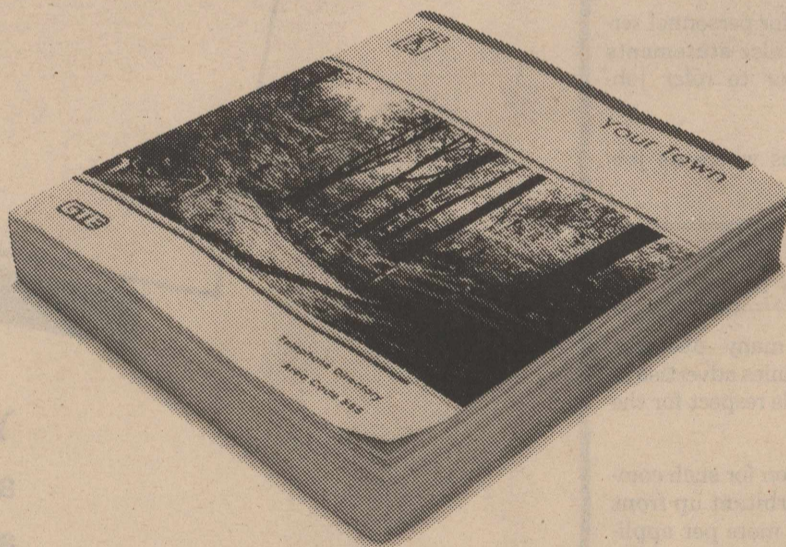
Mrs. Miller has already received letters from both of these legislators thanking the Robert Lee group for their interest and assuring them of their support against the bill.

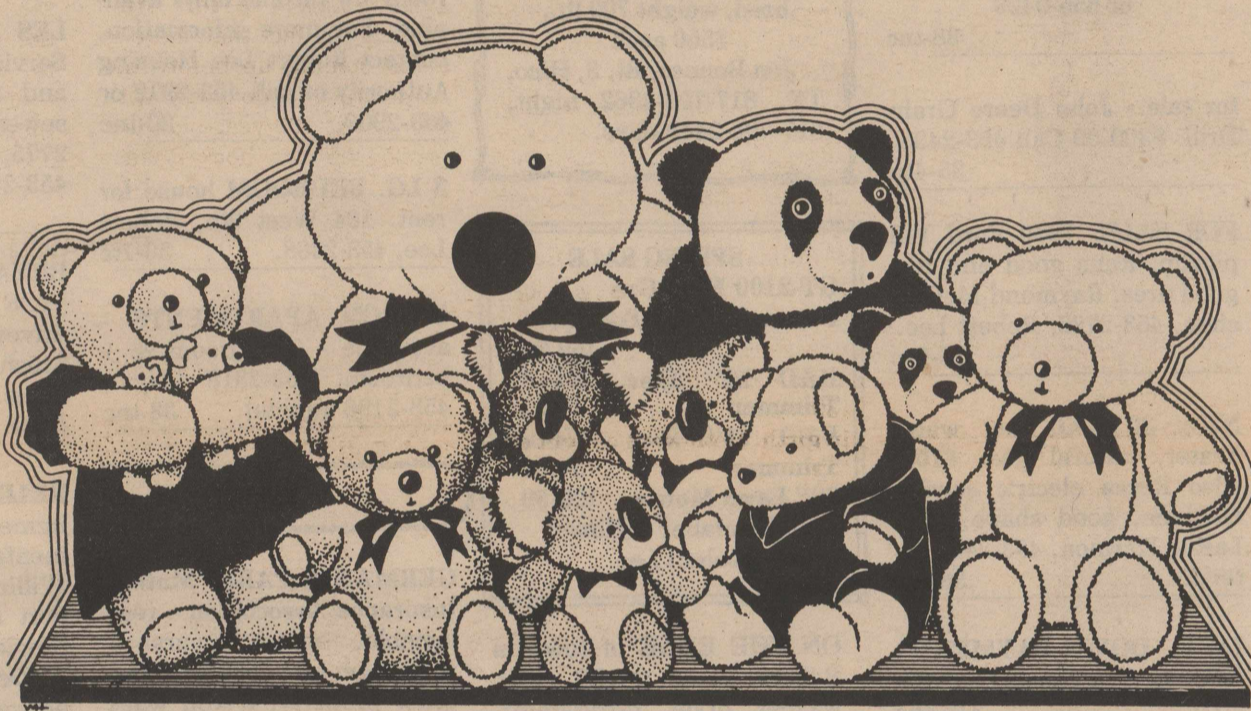

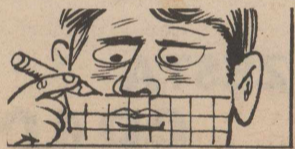

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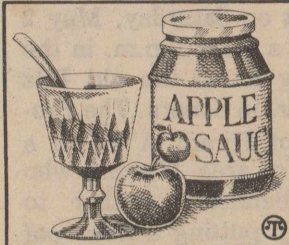
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**FRENCH VANILLA ICE CREAM**  
3 egg whites  
1 cup sugar  
3 egg yolks  
4 cups light cream or half and half  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Beat egg whites in a large mixing bowl until foamy; gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and continue beating until stiff peaks form. Beat egg yolks in small mixing bowl until thick and lemon colored. Add remaining 1/2 cup sugar and beat until sugar is dissolved. Fold egg yolks into egg whites; gradually stir in cream. Place mixture in a large saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened, about 12 minutes. Do not boil. Stir in vanilla. Chill thoroughly. Freeze in ice cream freezer according to manufacturer's directions.

Here are 10 ways to sauce up some old favorites:

- **Saucy pancakes:** Warm up a mixture of applesauce and maple syrup; sprinkle with cinnamon for pancake topping.
- **Moister muffins:** Add applesauce to any muffin batter for a denser, moister consistency and great tangy flavor.
- **Gourmet butter:** Whip together applesauce and butter to serve with any type of muffin, bread, or roll.

- **Applesauce acorn squash:** Fill scooped-out halves of acorn squash with applesauce mixed with broken cashew nuts and brown sugar or maple syrup. Dot with butter and bake in 1/2-inch water or apple cider for 45 minutes.

- **Guilt-free dessert:** Prepare one package of low-calorie gelatin (red flavors work best), substituting natural applesauce for the cold half of the water. Fold in an additional one-half to one cup of applesauce; top with non-dairy whipped topping when set. Only 50 calories per serving!

- **Cake in no time:** Mix the following into one package (20 oz.) white cake mix: Cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, cloves, 1 cup chunky applesauce, 2 unbeaten egg whites, one cup chopped nutmeats. Bake 5 to 15 minutes longer than directed. When cool, glaze with any confectioner's sugar-based icing.

In addition, applesauce is a great budget-stretcher: add it to meat loaf or even tuna casserole to make these meals go a long way at a small price.

If you think you don't have time to prepare epicurean feasts, think again. That jar of applesauce in your refrigerator might get your creative juices flowing.
