The Saint Augustine Falcons of North Carolina finished the NCAA meet with 107 1/2 points to ASU's 84. California State - Los Angeles had 39 points for a 3rd. ACU in Abilene was 4th at 37, well out of their usual first place finish (7 times). Last year Saint Augustine stood second behind ACU, and ASU was 3rd.

# Sims commercial receives Telly award

Hollywood has its Oscars, Broadway has its Tonys, the recording industry has its Grammys, and television has its Emmys and Tellys.

Yes Tellys -- an Oscar lookalike statuette that has been awarded nationally for the past 10 years to honor non-network, local and regional television commercials.

Usually, Tellys are awarded to major advertising agencies and big budget film production companies from metropolitan areas that produce outstanding local/regional television commercials.

Sometimes -- not often -- a small advertising agency from a small city manages to win a Telly Award. Dick Sims Advertising Inc. of Lufkin did just that last week, and no one was more surprised than the company's president, Richard D. Sims.

"This is the first state or national competition my agency has entered, and I had second thoughts about submitting our entry from the moment I mailed off a video tape of the commercial," said Sims. "I figured a small agency from a small East Texas city probably couldn't compete against the giants of the advertising industry. Boy, was I wrong."

Dick Sims Advertising Inc. won its Telly Award in the competition's new automobile promotion category for a 30second commercial featuring 1989 Cadillacs for Angelina

Chevrolet-Cadillac Company. The winning commercial was carried by two East Texas television stations: KTRE-TV of Lufkin and KETK-TV of Jacksonville.

According to Telly Awards officials in Cincinnati, the Sims agency entry was only one of more than 3,200 submitted from 47 states, and one of only 120 categorical winners.

Tellys are awarded for top TV commercials featuring everything from banking to bakeries, sporting goods to soft drinks, etc. Among this year's honorees were Gannett Advertising, The Bloom Agency of Dallas, Young & Rubicam of Chicago and San Francisco, McCann Erickson of Seattle, and numerous other major advertising agencies.

"This was hardly a one-person accomplishment," said Sims. "Much credit should go to Angelina Chevrolet-Cadillac advertising director Richard Presley who I consider a creative genius. Also, to the Otis Conner Companies of Dallas, which supplied vocalists and orchestration for the commercial jingle; to Julie Tullis and Mike Wiggins of KTRE-TV's production staff; and to General Motors for video-tape footage."

Sims wrote the musical jingle lyrics and did the voiceover for the winner commeri-

commercials so many automobile dealers use," said Sims. Automobile television commercials are often too loud and too cluttered with pitchmen wearing cowboy suits or with a large barking dog or something else equally

Those commercial sales guys who pound on the hoods and fenders of vehicles which have huge pricing posters across windshields are, I think, irritating. We wanted to avoid that type hucksterism. This was a clean, lowkey, dignified message, which a Cadillac commercial should be.'

Duplicate Telly Awards, manufactured by the R. S. Owens Company which also custom crafts Oscar, Emmy and Clio statuettes for the entertainment industry, were presented to brothers, Bob and Richard Presley of Angelina Chevrolet-Cadillac.

"This is the first and only advertising award our company has won," said Bob Presley, president of the local auto dealership. "We've been with the Sims agency only one year but are very pleased with the quality of our ads. I had no idea, though, one would be worthy of a nationwide award."

Said Richard Presley: "It's a tremendous honor to receive a prestigious award like this, especially when you realize you're up against the quality and creative talent from megabuck advertising corporations that pay people hundreds of thousands of dollars a year to come up with a bright copy."



# Consider wildlife when spraying brush

by Bruce Deere

The time is fast approaching for aerially treating mesquite and associated brush with herbicides. As soon as soil temperatures warm up to 75 degrees at the 12-18 inch depth, many landowners will be spraying pastures to fight the tenacious brush.

Even though mesquite control has shown to be a worthwhile practice for growing more grass, it can hurt wildlife habitat when done improperly. Unfortunately, the herbicides used to kill or damage mesquite, also harm or kill many of the best plants used by wildlife for food or cover.

Forbs, the broadleaf flowering plants that are so important to most kinds of wildlife are hurt by these herbicides. The damage done will last for 2-5 years and will reduce the food supply for deer, turkey, quail as well as sheep. These forbs produce the highest quality food of any class of range plants.

Desirable browse plants are also hurt by mesquite spraying. Deer, goats and sheep all eat considerable amounts of brush and a diversity of desirable browse plants is an asset

## RICE is code for treating injuries

R.I.C.E. is not just for dinner anymore! Keep R.I.C.E. in mind as a code word for treatment of sprains or injuries to bones or muscles. R=Rest: Stop exercising. I=Ice: Apply ice, or if ice is not available, anything cold, to reduce swelling and prevent possible internal bleeding. C=Compression: To reduce swelling and pain, wrap injured area in an elastic bandage or strips of cloth. E=Elevation: Unless a lower back sprain, elevate the injured area above the heart.

to a ranch. Futhermore such wildlife as deer, turkey and quail need certain kinds of brushy cover for hiding, nesting, or roosting.

Some of the common browse plants that are most seriously harmed or killed by mesquite spraying include littleleaf sumac, hackberry, and old man's beard. Other plants that are usually moderately damaged, but not killed include bumelia, acacias, lotebush, and liveoak. Brush that is only slightly damaged includes algerita, persimmon and cedar.

When aerial spraying is done in large block over 200 acers in size, some habitat damage can be expected to occur. Habitat damage can be reduced considerably by treating brush in strips and leaving alternating strips untreated. Treatment of 40 to 60% of a pasture in strips usually results in an acceptable compromise between wildlife and livestock needs. Sprayed and unsprayed strips should normally be 500 to 800 feet wide.

Control of drift becomes very important when treating brush in strips. Adequate herbicide must be deposited on the treated strip and as little as possible on the untreated strip. The use of a drift control agent is strongly recommended, and wind speeds should never exceed 10 mph, and preferably 2-6 mph.

The pattern of treated and untreated brush in strips will generally leave adequate cover for wildlife, and areas left untreated will supply enough forbs and browse for wildlife to stay in an area, although possibly at lower numbers.

# Washam honored for academics

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60-inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants. Eggs laid on the underside of leaves hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year.


Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on heavily infested plants. They feed by inserting their mouth-parts into plant tissue and sucking juices. While feeding, they inject toxic substances into the plant.

Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on plant leaves. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant. Heavy infestations cause plants to shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires two to four applications of insecticide at five to seven-day intervals. Check plants frequently for spider mites since the pest can build up rapidly.

Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazion, kelthane, malathion and sulfur. However, do not use sulfur on curcurbits (cucumbers, squash or melons) as severe plant change could occur.

As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides.
