Contestants are famous (or infamous) for showmanship campsites and horseplay. Both of these events will add lots of fun to the annual Extravaganza.

Holdovers from past years are the Beach Volleyball Tournament, Washer Pitching, and the Miss and Little Miss WCCCD Contest. The arts and crafts booths will be inside the air-conditioned

Whether by accident or design, the area of the Texas map, centering Coke County on the Coke ad, is shown in the September issue of Texas Monthly magazine.

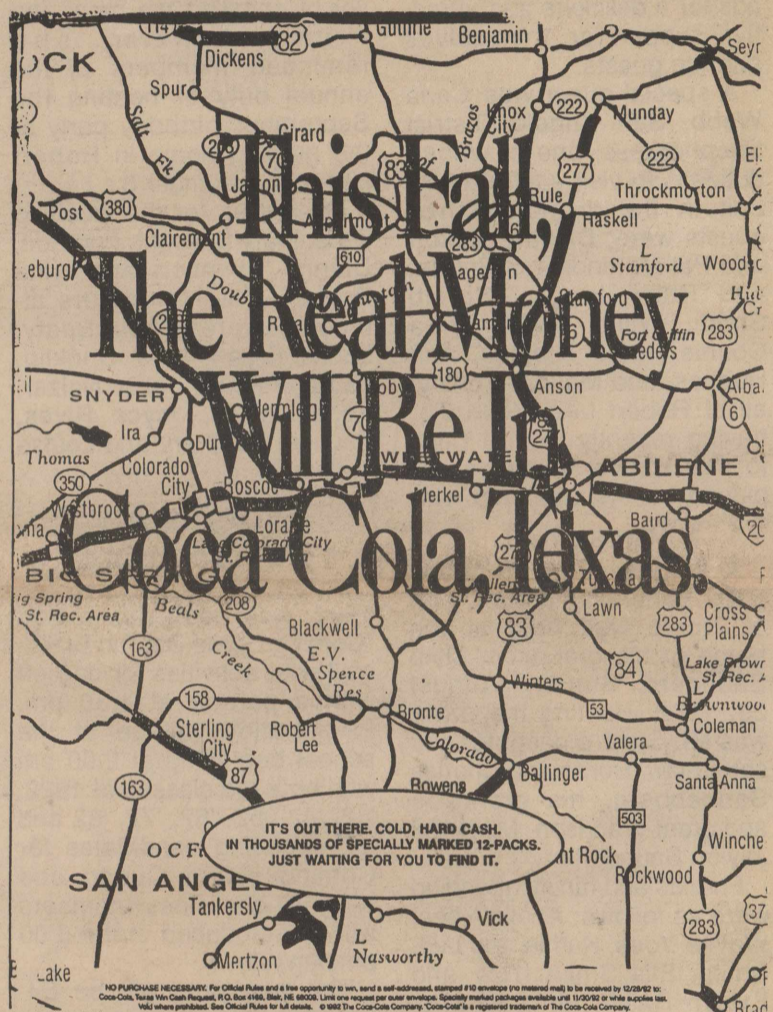

Injured Amarillo student meets Brooks

The following article was written by Amarillo Globe-News Staff writer Ben Tinsley. Miss Alford is the granddaughter of Bobbie Forman Glenn of Amarillo and formerly of Bronte.

Allison Alford has been a fan of country music superstar Garth Brooks since his first album. But after an accident deprived her of most of her muscle control, she didn't expect to ever meet him.

And she certainly didn't expect him to show up at her hospital bed late last Thursday with his entire band in tow.

"I'm Garth," said Brooks, kissing Alford, 18, on the cheek. "Nice to see you."

Brooks introduced his band to Allison and her family and praised Allison as "a girl with lots of courage."

Formerly a senior at Amarillo's Cornerstone Christian School, Allison received a severe head injury in a motor-vehicle accident April 21. Both of her lungs collapsed. Her spleen was removed, and doctors had to sew up her liver and part of her stomach cavity. She also had a tracheotomy.

She spent eight weeks in Northwest Hospital in a vegetative, unresponsive state. On June 22, she was considered medically stable for transfer to Amarillo's Bivins Center for Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Abnormal muscle responses kept Allison from straightening her arms as she lay in her hospital bed. Special therapists worked with her to communicate and swallow. She only recently began to eat orally, and although she has regained the muscle responses necessary for speech, she currently lacks the breath control required for more than a few words of speech.

To coordinate breathing with speech, Allison mouths words to Garth Brooks songs with her therapists. She occasionally whispers out loud a single word in a string of mouthed dialogue.

One of Allison's speech language pathologists wrote Brooks via the president of Western Merchandisers, an Amarillo record merchandising company, and asked him to come visit her after his Thursday concert.

And he did - in record time. The concert ended around 10:25, and Brooks was there by 10:45 pm.

Allison's grandfather Vernon Glenn, said that Allison hadn't uttered a single word until last Friday.

At that point, she is able to utter short sentences, such as "how are you," which Glenn said is a miracle compared to her lack of speech during the first weeks after her accident.

Unfortunately, Allison's short-term memory is extremely short, and she has already forgotten Brook's visit, her mother, Elaine, said. To help Allison remember, her family taped the Kodak moment so they can play it back to her any time she wishes.

Mrs. Alford describes her daughter as a fighter who at first prognosis did not seem to

stand a chance of survival.

"We hope for 100 percent recovery of course," she said, "but we think she's going to be close to normal."

During the past month, Mrs. Alford said, Allison has made tremendous progress in her recovery. Her mother predicts she will recover enough to finish high school and start college - she had less than two months to finish when the accident happened.

Allison's daily routine is extremely rigid and diverse. She begins with simple exercises that reteach her to use her limbs, to brush her teeth and groom. These activities also include horse riding, through which Allison is trying to retrain her brain to move her hips.

When Allison first started to ride the horse, she couldn't even raise her head, her mother said. Allison can brush her teeth right now, but still has problems raising her arms.

Mrs. Alford thinks Allison will recover by Christmas.

"She'll continue to be a fan of (Brooks) from now on, I'm sure," said Elaine.

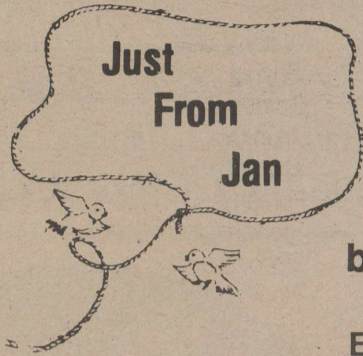

Using Color Responses

Color is used to create images in dress and moods in homes. It is an important part of the entertainment world and is used to create desired effects in advertising and marketing. It has long been known that color can attract or distract and that men and women often respond to colors differently. The general responses of people to color are fairly predictable.

Red causes the body to pump adrenaline, making the heart beat faster. People eat more and longer when red is present. Infants choose to look at red more than any other color. Women prefer blue-red, while men prefer orange-red. People in lower socioeconomic groups prefer lighter shades of red.

Orange has favorable associations with autumn, Halloween and Thanksgiving. It gives the impression of strength when placed next to blue. Orange is seldom used for formal attire because it creates a feeling of accessibility. In advertising, orange draws people and makes them feel welcome.

Yellow calls attention to itself and is processed by the eye fastest. It is used in nature and by humans with black to signify the possibility of dan-

ger (as in wasps and road signs). Babies in yellow rooms cry more than in any other color room.

Blue is a favorite color of 80 percent of people questioned. Strong sky blue causes the brain to secrete at least eleven tranquilizing hormones. Very pale blue encourages fantasies and imagination. People have inherent rejection of blue in foods and respond poorly to blue interiors when buying a house.

Green is nature's favorite color. People with physical disorders associated with travel to a new environment (digestive problems, etc.)

suffer less in green interiors. Green makes most foods look more appetizing. It is associated with recreational clothing rather than with business clothes. Green should be avoided when soliciting donations because it has non-professional connotation.

Gray environments stimulate creative people. Artistic, highly educated people and those who are attracted to them are drawn to gray. Gray is perceived as moving things upward on the socioeconomic ladder, the opposite of orange. Gray is recognized as a serious color, symbolizing success and power.

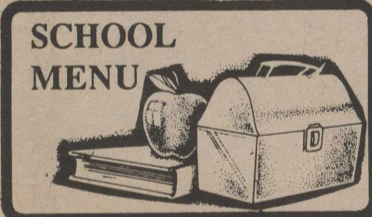

Asthma is a chronic illness which affects more than 10 million Americans - three million under the age of eighteen. The incidence of asthma in this country is on the rise - in the last decade the number of people with the disease has increased by 33 percent.

"Asthma results from blockage of the bronchial tubes which are airways in the lungs that makes breathing possible," said Robert Mamlock, MD., allergist at Methodist Hospital. "Asthma attacks occur when these airways become obstructed and do not function properly."

Asthmatic episodes can range from mild shortness of breath to potentially lifethreatening attacks which require emergency medical treatment.

According to Dr. Mamlock, many environmental "triggers" can provoke an asthma attack: allergens such as pollen, mold, dust or animal dander; cigarette smoke; perfume and other irritants in the air; emotional stress; respiratory tract infections; cold windy weather and medications such as aspirin and some drugs for high blood pressure and glaucoma. "Avoiding these irritants can help minimize the impact of asthma," said Dr. Mamlock.

Several medications are also currently on the market which help in the management of asthma:

* Broncodilators - these medications open the bronchial tubes by relaxing muscle spasms in the wall of the tubes.

* Corticosteroids - these drugs reduce inflammation of the airways. In the pill form they are only recommended for those with asthma that does not respond to other measures. In the aerosol form, corticosteroids are relatively safe medications that are effective for many patients with moderate asthma.

* Cromolyn - this medication helps to prevent asthma attacks from occurring, but does not help during an acute episode.

* Desensitization - Immunotherapy can help adjust the way a person's immune system reacts to allergens. Allergies to pollens and dust mites respond best to this therapy.

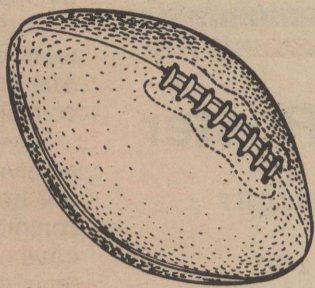

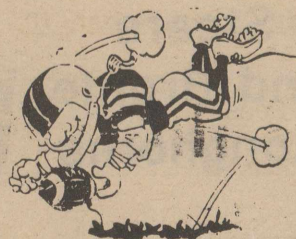
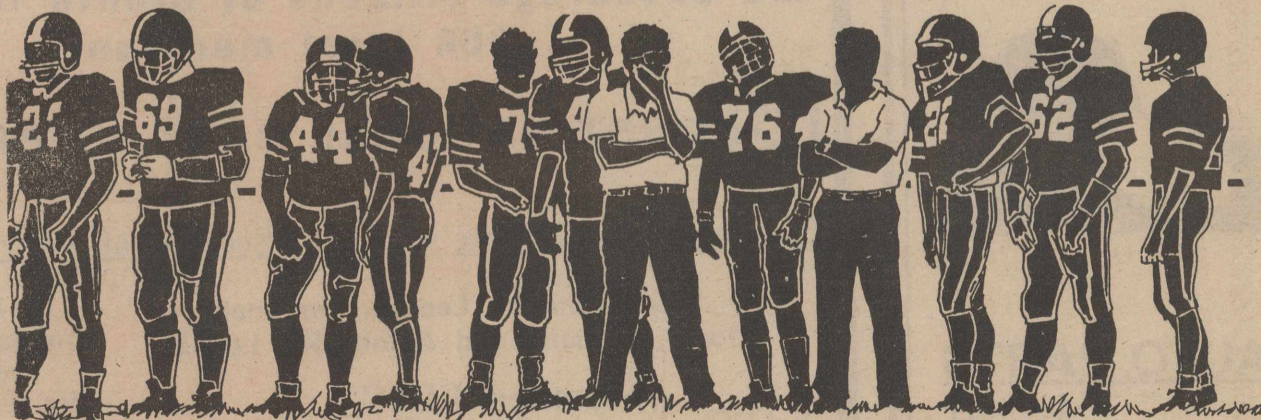

TRASER reduces costs of drunk driving

Colleges and universities are helping get drunk drivers off the streets and highways and otherwise working with law enforcement agencies to reduce traffic accidents.

The programs, cooperative efforts with the Texas Department of transportation, already are paying for their costs many times over in lives saved and reduced injuries and property damage.

The effort to reduce drunk driving is especially effective. It accomplishes this by providing 65 state law enforcement officers with instant computer information as to where intoxicated drivers are likely to be cruising. It is attracting attention across the nation.

The device is known as TRASER, short for Traffic

Services Microcomputer System. It was developed by Martin Crouse, principal programmer for the Texas Transportation Institute at Texas A&M University.

Since San Antonio began using the system in 1989, traffic fatalities there have been reduced almost 50 percent a year, and arrests for DWI have soared.

Before the Aggies developed TRASER, statewide traffic deaths averaged 3,840 annually. In the last two years, the average has dropped to 3,161, a decline of 17.1 percent, and is still falling.

Since the National Safety Council estimates that each traffic death represents an economic loss of \$410,000, TRASER is credited with saving Texas \$278,390,000 each year. The software works by having law enforcement agencies feed into the central computer statistics on all DWI arrests. The system then details days, times and streets where officers are likely to find drunk drivers.

Special mobile units are assigned to patrol at specific times and places. If they spot a car being driven erratically, they stop it and test the driver for intoxication. They have found that almost one-third of all DWI arrests occur in the areas and during the times that TRASER has indicated.

The effort has been so successful that it won a national biennial award from the Federal Highway Department for outstanding highway safety improvement. Because of its results in saving lives in Texas, TRASER has been adopted in 40 other states.

Devising such computer programs, however, is only one example of the cooperation between the Texas Department of Transportation and the state's colleges and universities. The "Kid Safe" program developed at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio is another.

U.T. Health Science Center

at San Antonio, recognized for its efforts to educate parents on the proper use of infant and child care car seats, now will devise materials to teach children under age nine to be aware of dangers to pedestrians. The Texas Department of Transportation is providing \$12,500 grant for first year funding.

The "Kid Safe" staff at the San Antonio medical complex already is preparing printed lessons that will identify and discuss many dangers to children pedestrians such as darting into traffic from parked cars or school busses. These will be distributed throughout the state.

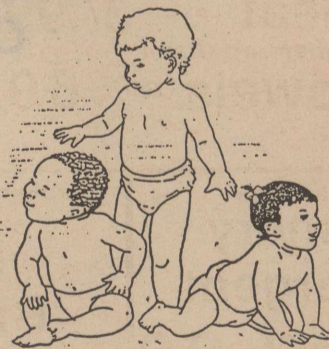

Heart and Blood Vessel Diseases Still No. 1

While you read this, another American will die of a peril that plagues this country.

It could be cancer. Or an accident. Or AIDS.

But chances are it'll be heart and blood vessel diseases — the nation's No. 1 killer.

Every 34 seconds someone dies of a heart attack, stroke or other forms of cardiovascular disease, according to federal studies. Cardiovascular diseases kill almost 1 million Americans each year. That's almost half of all U.S. deaths, including cancer (497,000), accidents (95,000) and AIDS (26,000).

But you can fight heart and blood vessel diseases. And win.

The American Heart Association has fought on the front line to provide over \$1 billion for research since 1949. Some of that research has helped scientists to learn more about risk factors for heart disease and stroke.

Three of the major risk factors for heart disease can't be changed. These are:

- **Age** — The older you get, the more likely you are to develop heart disease.
- **Sex** — More men have heart disease and develop it earlier than women, but women narrow the gap after menopause.
- **Heredity** — You're more likely to develop heart disease if your close blood relatives had it. Race is also a consideration. Blacks have high blood pressure more often than whites. Consequently, African-Americans have a greater risk of heart disease.

You can control these major risk factors:

- **Smoking** — It's the most preventable cause of death from heart attack. And it's

never too late to stop smoking. Your risk of heart disease rapidly drops when you quit.

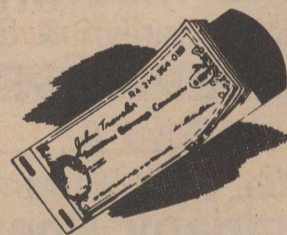
- **High blood pressure** — The cause is unknown in most cases, but you can often control it by eating a healthful diet, exercising regularly and limiting how much sodium you use. Your doctor may also suggest that you take medicine.
- **High blood cholesterol** — The fat-like substance is a normal part of your body's cells. The higher your blood cholesterol level, the more likely that fats and cholesterol will build up in your artery walls. You can help lower your level by reducing cholesterol, total fat and saturated fatty acids in your diet. You may also need to lose weight and take cholesterol-lowering drugs.

Diabetes, obesity, physical inactivity and perhaps stress are also factors that contribute to heart disease.

Most of the risk factors for stroke are the same as those for heart disease. Prior stroke and asymptomatic carotid bruit (an abnormal sound heard when a doctor listens to arteries in the neck) are other risk factors for stroke that can't be changed. And blacks have a much greater risk than whites of disability and death from stroke. Risk factors that you may be able to change include heart disease, high red blood cell count and transient ischemic attacks (TIAs), which occur when blood supply to the brain is blocked temporarily.

Remember, somebody died of heart and blood vessel diseases in the last few seconds. But it doesn't have to be this way. Fight back with education and prevention.

Classic heart attack signs

Heart disease is the number
one cause of death in the
United States. Each year,
countless Americans suffer
heart attacks, more than half
of such victims die before
reaching the hospital, most
within two hours of their first
symptoms.

"The pain of a heart attack is
not the same for every per-
son," said Carla Frye, R.N.,
C.C.R.N., Cardiac Rehab
nurse at Methodist Hospital's
Lifestyle Center. "It might be
quite intense for one person
and so mild for another that it's
mistaken for indigestion."

However, when a person is
suffering a heart attack, every
second counts. Heart attack
victims have a better chance
of survival if they seek medical
attention immediately.

The following is a list of the
classic signs of a heart attack;

*Uncomfortable pressure,
squeezing, fullness, tight-
ness, burning, or aching un-
der the breastbone that lasts
two minutes or more and is
not relieved by nitroglycerine
tablets.

*Other commons places for
pain are neck and jaw, inside
arm and shoulder (more fre-
quently the left side than the
right), upper abdomen, (often
mistaken for indigestion) and
between the shoulder blades.

*The pain may be continu-
ous or may come and go.

*Often there is shortness of
breath, dizziness, weakness,
clamminess, sweating, nau-
sea, vomiting and/or anxiety.

Other signs of a heart attack
include:

*A feeling of apprehension
or restlessness or sense of
foreboding may be recog-
nized, rather than an actual
feeling of "pain."

*Some heart attack victims
don't really look very sick or
have all of the "classic" sym-
ptoms. Many patients deny that
they are having a heart attack.

When any of the above
symptoms are present, the
victim should lie down and
rest. If after a two-minute wait
the pain persists, EMS should
be called, or the victim should
be taken to the nearest emer-
gency room which offers 24
hour cardiac care.

Stents prevent collapse

Scaffolding-like devices
called stents may prevent an
emergency trip to the operat-
ing room to repair arteries that
collapse during angioplasty,
say DeBakey Heart Center re-
searchers in Houston.

Up to 10 percent of patients
undergoing angioplasty, a
non-surgical procedure to
open blocked arteries, suffer
a sudden collapse of an
artery, either during the treat-
ment or immediately after.

Stents reduced emergency
bypass surgeries required to
restore blood flow to the heart
by about 50 percent during
clinical trials at the Methodist
Hospital, said Dr. Albert E.
Raizner, associate professor
of medicine at Baylor College
of Medicine.

"Without the stent, these
patients have to be rushed to
surgery. With the stent, the
crisis was resolved, either
permanently or long enough
to allow planned surgery later,"
Raizner said.

"Patients benefit in either
case," he said. "Avoiding
surgery saves money and re-
duces disability and recovery
time. Planning bypass surgery
reduces the risk of emergen-
cy surgery."

Data from the DeBakey
Heart Center trials was report-
ed to a U.S. Food and Drug
Administration advisory panel
that has recommended the
stent be approved for general
use as an alternative to emer-
gency bypass surgery.

DeBakey Heart Center re-
searchers began studying the
stent several years ago to de-
termine if it would prevent ar-
teries successfully cleared by
angioplasty from becoming
blocked again by a build-up of
fatty deposits. Some 25 to 30
percent of angioplasty pa-
tients experience recurring
blockage within six months.

"It does not appear the
stent is a way to avoid recur-
ring blockages," Raizner said.
"However, we think we have

identified some specific situa-
tions, in addition to sudden
artery collapse, when the
stent might be useful."

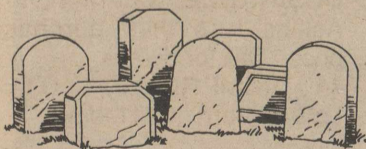
Researchers believe that
using a stent during angio-
plasty on bypass surgery pa-
tients whose replaced veins
are narrowing may be more
effective than angioplasty
alone in opening the block-
ages.

Research also shows that
the stent may help open and
prevent recurring blockages
in large arteries that have nar-
rowed several times.

The stent also enables a
cardiologist to "tackle more
complex problems with an-
gioplasty because the device
is there to provide immediate
back-up in case the artery
collapses," Raizner said.

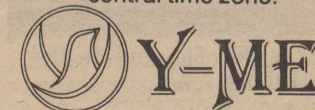

Chocoholic Frenzies

A lot of us joke about our love of chocolates, even to
the point of referring to ourselves as chocoholics. Some
people have similar cravings for ice cream, and maybe
researchers at the University of Michigan have come up
with an explanation. Dr. Adam Drewnowski and his col-
leagues say it appears compulsive binge eaters with crav-
ings for chocolate and ice cream may have abnormal
opioid peptide systems.

Opioid peptides are pleasure-enhancing molecules
manufactured naturally by the human brain. Professor
Drewnowski says these substances seem more powerful
in overweight binge eaters than in normal weight people.
The opioid blocking drug, naloxone, appears to reduce
taste preferences for very sweet foods. It's not a magic cure,
however.

As of now naloxone is available only by intravenous
infusion, so it's not practical for daily use.

New EIN number will not help credit

The Social Security Administration reports that at least one California-based company has been advertising that financially-strapped clients can contact the IRS to get an employer identification number (EIN). Clients - - who have paid fees as high as \$1,500 - - are told that they can then use

this number instead of their Social Security number to "decouple" from bad credit histories and to re-establish new credit.

"It's bad advice...and it's illegal," says Trish Butler, Social Security Associate Commissioner for Public Affairs. Ms.

Butler noted that one such company participating in this scam is Credit One Services of California. The owners of this firm have been arrested on charges of criminal violations of state credit services laws, and also face civil actions by the Federal Trade Commission.

The scam is called credit file segregation and is not limited to California. Complaints have been received by the Better Business Bureaus in Florida, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Iowa and Washington.

Ms. Butler explained that the firms "are offering advice on how to get employer identification numbers, which contain nine digits, just like an individual's Social Security number. But the EIN's are designed to be used by businesses for banking and for employment and business tax filings with the IRS."

"People who would use any number other than their Social Security number for employee tax purposes may cause retirement credits to be misdirected or lost."

Individuals who use an EIN in this manner could also be criminally liable for falsifying tax records and could be subject to prosecution for participating in a scheme to defraud the government.

Anyone who has participated in credit file segregation scams should contact the IRS and Social Security Administration immediately to straighten out their records. The local number for the Social Security office is 915-949-4608.

SS benefits for divorcees

Many people know that wives and widows can get Social Security benefits when their husbands retire, become disabled, or die. And, men have these same benefit rights on their spouse's Social Security earnings. What may be less well known, however is what happens if the marriage ends -- what rights do divorced spouses have to Social Security benefits on their ex-spouse's Social Security earnings?

A divorced spouse can get benefits on a former husband's or wife's Social Security record if the marriage lasted ten years. The divorced spouse must be 62 or older and unmarried. The worker also must be at least 62. If they have been divorced two years or more, he or she can get benefits even if the worker is not retired.

People often ask if the amount of benefits paid to their ex-spouse will reduce the amount of benefits paid to their current wife or husband. The answer is "NO." Social Security figures benefits for an ex-spouse without regard to the amount paid to the current spouse.

A change in the Social Security law that went into effect in January 1991 eliminated the two-year wait for people who are already getting spouse's benefits at the time of the divorce. Another new provision of the Social Security law affects women and men who married in good faith and later found out that their marriage was invalid. As of January 1, 1991, these people can qualify for benefits on the workers Social Security record on the same basis as a legal spouse. Previously, these women and men were considered wives and husbands for the purpose of

getting Social Security benefits only if no legal spouse received benefits.

A person cannot receive spouse's benefits if he or she qualifies for a higher benefit on his or her own work under Social Security, nor can he or she receive both benefits. He or she will get the higher of the two. This is one of the reasons why men, with their generally higher earnings and thus higher benefits, are less likely than women to receive spouse's benefits.

The full amount of the Social Security benefit for a spouse is 50 percent of the worker's benefit. If a spouse's benefit is taken before age 65, the benefit amount is reduced for each month before age 65 benefits--to a low of 37.5 percent of the worker's benefit at age 62.
