Farm Bureau Head Stresses Farm Safety

The need for encouraging safety-consciousness among farmers and ranchers to reduce the tremendous farm accident toll was pointed out recently by Hilton Tarrant, president of Callahan County Farm Bureau.

"The urgency of the matter is attested by the fact that both President Eisenhower and Governor Daniel have proclaimed the week of July 19-25 as Farm Safety Week, to focus attention on this, on our gravest social problems," Mr. Tarrant said.

"Farming leads all other occupations in work-accident casualties, taking nearly 13,000 lives and injuring over a million people in one year's time," he said.

"This is needless sacrifice of human life and a flagrant waste of money - not to mention the untold grief, suffering, time loss and worry attendant upon accident victims and their loved ones. Each individual in Callahan County can do a great deal to help alleviate this condition. Civic organizations and social groups can take an active part in emphasizing the need for accident - prevention education. And each man, woman, boy and girl can serve as his own and others' bodyguard by remaining constantly alert to the prevention of accidents."

The farm leader called upon other organizations in the county including churches, civic clubs and "just neighborhood groups of friends" to spend some time studying this serious matter during the special safety week observance, either by devoting a portion of their regular meeting time to it or calling a special meeting to study the problem.

Mr. Tarrant said that in areas where active safety programs have been conducted at local level, rural accidents and deaths have been greatly reduced.

Spiritual Life Crusade At Clyde Church

Rev. John W. He has secured the services of Dr. Frank L. Jurner, General Evangelist of Ft. Worth, who will bring the messages and direct the visitation evangelistic effort.

Dr. Turner was for some years a pastor in Central Texas where he held some of the leading pastorates including Cisco, Ballinger and church in Ft. Worth. During his pastorate at Ballinger, he was chosen president of McMurry College, which position he held for four years. These crusades have resulted in more than 3,100 conversions and additions to the church while other thousands have reconsecrated their lives to Christ at the altar of His church. Where he has labored there has been a distinct spiritual uplift to the church and community.

The first four days of the revival will see a Youth Activities program, beginning at 5 p. m. and ending with evening worship. On Wednesday evening, the WSCS are tendering the young people a banquet as a closing event. At that time a King and Queen of the MYF will be crowned.

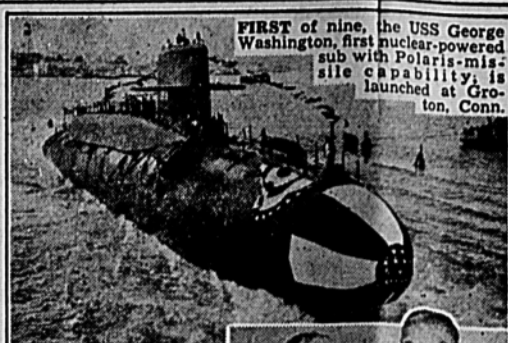

Accident Prevention Urged by TSA

Austin, July 16 — Inoculation of farm animals is considered a sound practice among modern farmers and ranchers, because it has been proven time and again that it is easier to prevent disease than to cure it.

Another sound, modern and proven phase of farming and ranching, but not quite so widely accepted, is inoculation against accidents by eliminating hazards.

J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, says "The average medical care for farm and ranch injuries will run \$105 per accident. This excludes the costs of hiring extra labor for replacement and lost production."

"In Texas, farm machinery poses the greatest hazard and the severity of such accidents reaches its peak during June, July and August, which is all the more reason why farmers and ranchers throughout the state should observe National Farm Safety Week, July 19-25, by eliminating as many hazards as possible."

Musick listed the following do's and don'ts that every farmer or rancher should observe in setting up his own accident prevention program:

1. Keep ladders and steps in good repair. Provide hand and guard rails where they are needed.
2. Avoid storing loose materials overhead.
3. Keep loose wires, boards and scrap metal picked up.
4. Don't allow nails or hangers to protrude unnecessarily.
5. Keep hand tools in safe racks. Urge your employees to always use the right tools for the job at hand — improvising can be expensive.
6. Keep guards in place on power shafts, belts and chains.
7. Keep pens and corrals in good repair.
8. Do not step on or under moving belts.
9. Do not use foot to push a running belt from a pulley.
10. Cut off power equipment before unclogging or adjusting it.

11. Cut off electric current when working with a conductor.

12. Remain alert to the possibilities of falls — they are one of the greatest hazards around a farm or ranch.

13. Allow gasoline motors to cool off before refilling them.

14. Do not wear loose fitting or torn clothing around machinery.

15. Don't forget the home when planning an accident prevention program. During 1958, 1,202 lives were accidentally lost in Texas home accidents and more than 72,000 persons injured.

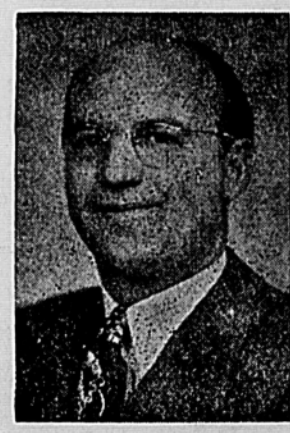

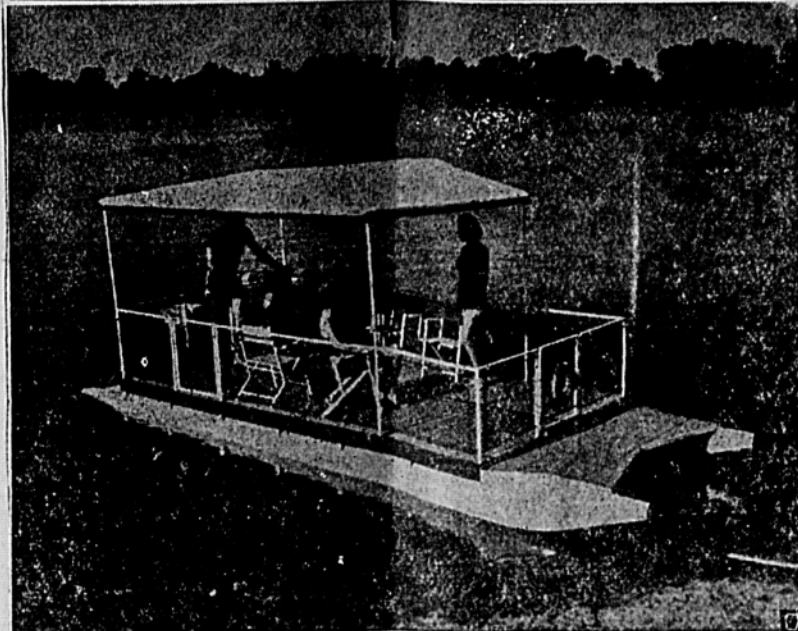

About Your Health . .

Six years ago, more than 230,000 new Texans were born and they will be entering school for the first time in both public and private schools in September.

The right preparation for those first school days is vital to the future satisfaction and adjustment of your child in his new environment.

If he has an older brother or sister the task will be easier, but still there are many steps of getting - ready - for - school that should be taken before September 1.

Some effort should be made to make it clear to the child that he will be on his own, without Mom and Dad watching over

him all the time, a good before that first day of school.

Clothing should be given much thought. Check the habits of your local school and find out what is the predominant mode of dress. If all the boys wear long pants, by all means make sure your son has them too.

Make sure everything is large enough, but not baggy or his classmates will make fun of him.

Proper nutrition is very important. When school starts allow enough time in the morning for a wholesome breakfast. A good breakfast includes citrus fruit or juice, milk, whole grain cereal or bread, eggs, or bacon or both.

Lunch and dinner should be leisurely and pleasant, too. The new adventure of school is pretty fast paced, but mealtime offers an opportunity for the family to pause and enjoy being together.

Now is the time to check up on your school's requirements regarding vaccinations or other health measures and take care of them well in advance.

Also nearly every school in Texas requires proof-of-age for first year students in the form of a certified birth certificate.

You may obtain a copy by sending one dollar to the Registrar of Vital Statistics where your child was born or to the Division of Vital Statistics, Texas State Health Department, 418 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

Be certain to include the name of the child, date of birth, place of birth, father's name, and mother's name.

It would be a good idea to do it now to avoid the August rush.
