## UTEP demands apology from Montford

### UTEP president says Tech chancellor insulted El Paso, school with remarks

The president of the University of Texas at El Paso is demanding an apology from Texas Tech Chancellor John Montford.

UTEP President Diana Natalicio stated in a letter that Montford insulted UTEP and the

city's intentions on spending funds for the Border Health Institute.

Natalicio stated that during a telephone conversation with Montford in early November, Montford said El Pasoans are only interested in spending the funds on welfare and Ballet Folklorico.

"I regret that our recent telephone conver-

sation concerning the Border Health Institute was not more productive," Natalicio said in her letter.

On Nov. 5, Montford spoke to Natalicio in a conversation, which he said was in effort to open the communication between the two universities.

"I was excited that she had called," Montford said. "I thought it was a break between us."

Monday, Montford released a statement responding to the letter saying he thought the

Montford went on to say he thought the conversation went so well, that they were even planning to have a meeting to further the

telephone conversation he and Natalicio had was a pleasant one.

"At no time did I criticize her personally, criticize the university or criticize El Paso," Montford said.

In the statement, Montford went on to say he thought the conversation went so well, that they were even planning to have a meeting to further the

communication between the universities. Montford said there must be a misunderstanding between the two officials of what was said during the telephone conversation.

"I think it is just an honest disagreement of what was said," Montford said.

Natalicio was not available for comment, but UTEP did send a copy of her statement. Montford said he just doesn't understand the whole situation.

"Frankly, I am puzzled," Montford said.

## Day to leave position in deans office

### Assistant dean of students accepts job in North Carolina

Patrick Day, assistant dean of students at Texas Tech, announced this week he will leave his position at the end of the semester.

He will take over as the assistant vice president of student affairs/dean of students at Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C.

"This is a super opportunity for me to move forward," Day said.

In his five years at Tech, Day served as assistant dean of students and taught an educational psychology course.

He will finish out the semester in his duties at Tech, before beginning his new job in January.

Day said he was not aware of any efforts made to fill the position.

"This has all just happened so fast," Day said.

Dean of Students Michael Shonrock said they will fill the position but does not know if Day can be replaced.

"Day has been an asset to this university, I wish him the best," Shonrock said. "It's been really tough on all of us."

Shonrock said they will conduct a local and regional search, and then if necessary a national search.

"We had a national search when we hired Patrick," Shonrock said. "It will be difficult right before the holidays and in the middle of the year to hire someone. In higher education, it is more common to hire in May or in the summer months."

Vice President for Student Affairs Robert Ewalt said Day will be missed at Tech.

"We will certainly miss his educational contacts, the relationships that he has built with the students, his background and experience and the energy that he brings to the job," Ewalt said.

Students also expressed concerns about Day's leaving.

"There's really no accurate description that I can use to describe what he's done for Tech. He's done so much for the dean of students office, and the students in general," said Blythe Clayton, president of the Student Government Association. "It's a great shame that Tech couldn't keep him here."

Day said he would miss the students at Tech above all else.

"I will definitely miss the students and the opportunity that I've had to work with them. The absolute best thing about Texas Tech University is the wonderful student body," Day said.

## Exxon buys Mobil for \$77.2 billion

NEW YORK (AP) — Exxon agreed to buy Mobil for \$77.2 billion Tuesday in a deal that would create the largest corporation in the world and put back together two of the biggest pieces from the 1911 breakup of John D. Rockefeller's Standard Oil.

Roughly 9,000 jobs will be eliminated worldwide as a result of the takeover, or about 7 percent of the companies' combined work force of 123,000, Exxon chairman Lee Raymond said.

Despite the new company's vast reach, a world oil glut is expected to keep pump prices at rock-bottom levels for now. Analysts also expect the companies will have to sell off numerous gas stations and refineries to satisfy antitrust regulators.

The deal is the latest example of rapid consolidation in an industry whose profits have been cut by worldwide overproduction, weak demand and slumping prices.

"We need to face some facts. The world has changed," Mobil chairman Lucio Noto said. "The easy things are behind us."

The company will be known as Exxon Mobil Corp. There will continue to be Mobil and Exxon gas stations, as well as the Exxon tiger and Mobil's red Pegasus logo.

Together, Exxon and Mobil accounted for about 20 percent of U.S. gasoline sales last year, but just 4 percent of global oil production capacity. Exxon Mobil will have about 48,500 gas stations around the globe.

### MTV rocks onto campus with road tour stop

They stood outside one of the five MTV Campus Invasion tents in the warm Texas sun on the playing fields at 18th Street and Boston Avenue, Tuesday.

The piece of paper in their hand divulged such information about themselves as "describe your most embarrassing moment in life" and "why would you be an interesting roommate/travelmate?"

After this, they gave a one-minute monologue about themselves, their families and school.

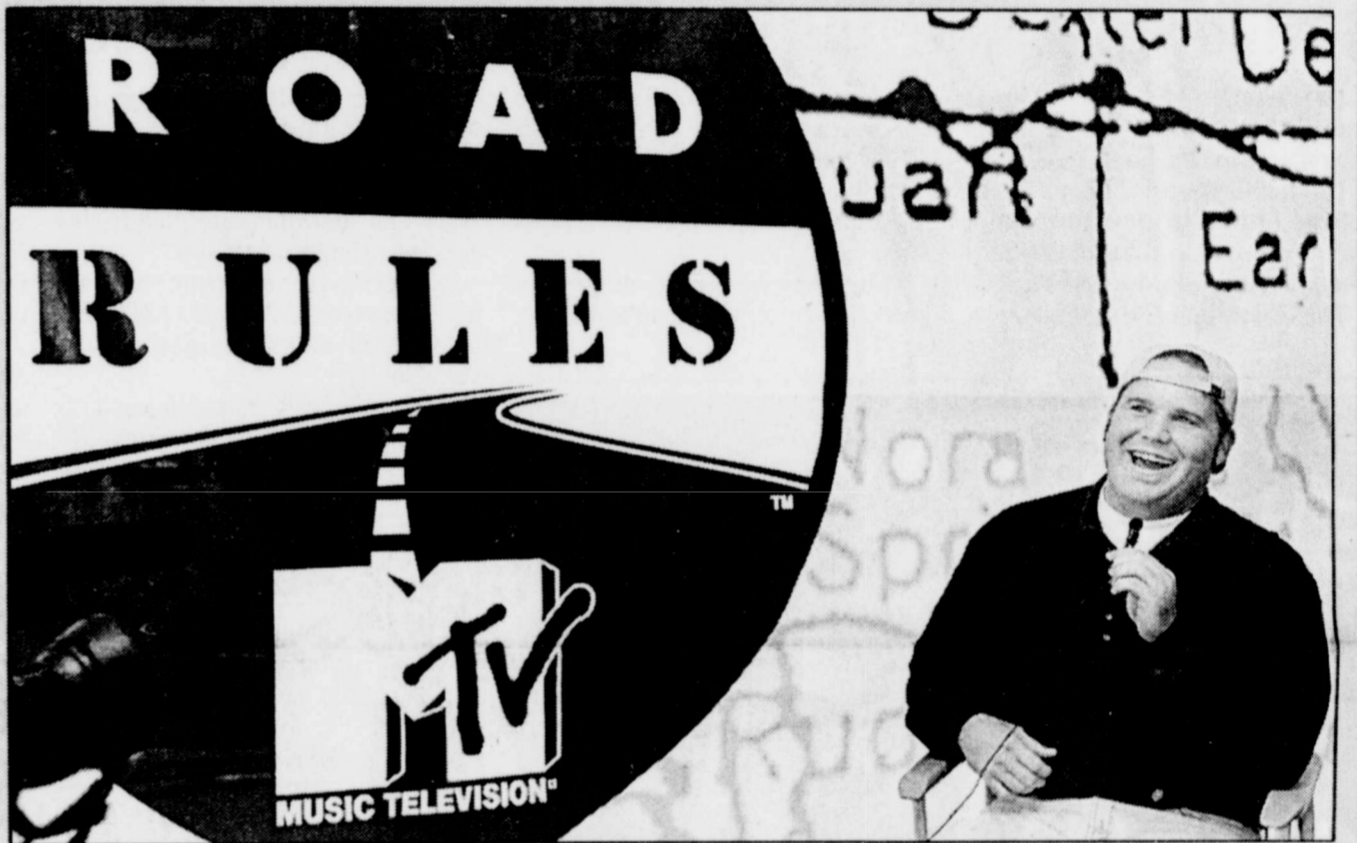
Their goal — to become part of the dynasty of people who have had their lives taped for "The Real World" and "Road Rules," MTV's slice-of-life programs.

McCarty said this was the first of seven rounds for the casting process of both shows. She said more than 300 Texas Tech students filled out applications and 20,000 people try out for the show each season. Of those people, she said six will be chosen for "Road Rules"

and seven for "The Real World."

McCarty said this eighth season of the "The Real World" will be filmed at a coffee shop in Honolulu, Hawaii. "Road Rules" will take place on a cruise ship that teaches college courses and visits exotic ports of call like Hong Kong and Vietnam.

She said Lubbock and El Paso were the only places in Texas they have auditioned. The casting associates for the Campus Invasion have screened people from the Midwest, the East Coast and the South and is making its way to the West Coast.

KTXT Station Manager Jim Hall, a senior management information systems major from Jackson, Miss., said he heard about the tour from a contact at 462-CONCERTS in Dallas, and arranged for the Campus Invasion to come to Tech.

"It's a whole lot of work, but it's a lot of fun to see it come together when it's done," Hall said.

"Everything has gone surprisingly smooth. We were commenting there's really an excellent blend of people here — from Greeks, to punks with died hair, to athletes and all

sorts of different nationalities."

Janae White, a sophomore pre-occupational therapy major from San Angelo, said she had stood in line for half an hour before she auditioned. She said she liked watching "The Real World" on TV and wanted to get on that show.

"It was pretty fun seeing everyone was really excited about it," White said.

"I just think it would be so exciting just to go and meet all sorts of different people. I think it would be fun."

## UPD, LPD team to help campus traffic

For more than 10 years, the Lubbock Police Department and Texas Tech University Police Department have worked together to keep campus traffic running smoothly and pedestrians safe from harm.

They do this during large Tech events by blocking city streets and the majority of campus.

"We help get traffic out," said Lt. Gordon Hoffman, LPD traffic supervisor. "We try to get people out as fast as we can."

Hoffman said LPD officers help at the intersections and at the stadium. He said 40 to 50 officers assist the UPD at all home football games. LPD officers also help at other sporting events or any event requiring traffic help.

UPD patrols the stadium, parking lots and works the streets that give access to certain parking lots. The UPD places barricades at certain campus entrances during events because there are reserved parking lots for different people, said Sgt. Dan Hale of the UPD.

"We have to or there would be an influx of traffic, which could be detrimental to pedestrians," Hale said.

Hale said it is important the city and campus police work together.

"We do our best to try to be cordial and to keep the traffic smooth," Hale said.

Hale said he understands people getting upset after games, but he will not apologize for doing his job.

He said after games most of the confusion or stress is related to the thousands of people all trying to leave the stadium.

Hale said the UPD uses the same officers at the same position during every football game. He said they know what is supposed to happen because they are familiar with what is going on.

Hale said LPD does not have the same

luxury, and they have to rotate officers for overtime.

Hoffman said LPD is not trying to inconvenience anyone, they are just trying to accommodate everyone.

"Our relationship with the LPD is very important," Hale said. "We work well together."

Hale said the UPD will be working with LPD on Friday for the Carol of Lights.

Both Hoffman and Hale said the officers are paid overtime for their work. LPD officers are paid by the city. UPD officers are paid overtime by the Tech athletic department.

## Impeachment expansion unlikely to affect inquiry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Just weeks before their self-imposed impeachment deadline, Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee approved subpoenas Tuesday seeking fund-raising evidence against President Clinton. But several said they didn't expect the move to alter the course or timing of their inquiry.

Democrats from House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt on down ridiculed the move, approved on a 20-15 party-line vote, as an attempt to appease the president's most conservative critics.

After the vote, Republican committee lawyers went to court for a second time in an effort to persuade a federal judge to seek internal Justice Department memos in which top law enforcement

officials laid out fund-raising evidence against Clinton in arguing for the appointment of a special prosecutor.

U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson on Friday had issued a sealed ruling that the committee had not demonstrated a sufficient need for the memos, which include secret grand jury material.

Committee Republicans believe the subpoena will strengthen their argument, said panel spokesman Paul McNulty.

The committee also subpoenaed material from Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr on John Huang, a former Democratic fund-raiser whose ex-employer paid money to presidential friend

Webster Hubbell. Starr is investigating whether that payment and other consulting fees represented "hush money" to keep Hubbell quiet about any wrongdoing by the president.

With the committee set to debate articles of impeachment next week, Rep. Asa Hutchinson, R-Ark., said, "The extraordinary odds are that this will not impact our timetable. It would be difficult to reconstitute this inquiry without some significant reason to do it."

Rep. George Gekas, a Republican committee member from Pennsylvania, said there wasn't enough time for campaign fund raising to have an impact on the inquiry this year.

"I don't want it to end this year,"

Gekas said, but he admitted that he hadn't found other GOP members who shared his view. Incoming Speaker Bob Livingston has said he wants the inquiry to end this year.

Meanwhile, Gephardt asserted that "chaos is reigning" in the impeachment inquiry and suggested that outgoing Speaker Newt Gingrich or Livingston — who takes over next month — "needs to be given the responsibility, needs to take" control.

Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., a member of the committee, said the expansion represents "desperate face-saving" by committee Republicans "to show the right wing they tried in every way to win" impeachment in the House.

# Day 5: Escapee remains at large

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — The work program that provided more freedom for condemned killer Martin Gurule was suspended Tuesday as prison officials spent a fifth day unsuccessfully searching for the escaped death row inmate.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Chairman Allan Polunsky announced that the program, for which one-third of 454 death-row inmates are eligible, will remain suspended pending an evaluation.

"We will examine the entire program," promised a visibly frustrated Polunsky, who vowed Gurule will be returned to prison "dead or alive."

A hunt involving 500 searchers has turned up no sign of Gurule, who

bolted from the Ellis Unit, home to death row, late Thanksgiving night. Six other death row inmates failed in their attempt to flee with him.

"I want to assure the people of Texas that we will bring back this fugitive," Polunsky said.

"We will bring him back dead or alive and it really doesn't make any difference in my opinion which that might be."

The search, focused since Friday on an area near the prison, was eased somewhat Tuesday.

The ease was used to give Gurule a chance to make a move, said Wayne Scott, executive director of the prison system.

Gurule, 29, scaled a pair of 10-foot

chainlink fences topped with razor wire and fled into the foggy night, avoiding gunfire from guards in towers 200 feet away.

There was no indication he or six accomplices had any elaborate escape plan.

Officials say they used hacksaw blade to cut an 8-x-10-inch hole in a recreation yard fence.

Prison records show one of the seven — inmate Howard Guidry, 22, of Harris County — received a visitor five days before the escape.

Prison authorities, citing policy, refused to release the visitor's name, but they said they didn't believe the visitor was involved in the break.

Since the escape, the first from

Texas death row since 1934, officials have said they thought Gurule was hiding in the marshy, wooded area around the prison.

That didn't change Tuesday, and Scott said he believes Gurule is still alive.

"I think we have to assume that," he said.

"We do not have any information that would cause us to believe he has left the area."

Regarding the work program, Polunsky said a special committee will evaluate it and report to prison board member Mac Stringfellow, who expects to finish his review in time for the January prison board meeting in Houston.

# Congress vows to reintroduce anti-crime bills

JERUSALEM (AP) — Texas Gov. George Bush and three Republican colleagues on Tuesday were shown the Arrow, an anti-missile missile being developed by Israel with heavy U.S. funding.

The tour of Israel Aircraft Industries near Tel Aviv was closed to media coverage.

Israeli Defense Minister Yitzhak Mordechai told Bush, a potential presidential candidate in 2000, in a meeting Monday that Israel was accelerating development of the missile system because of growing threats from Iran.

Mordechai said Iran is working on

the development of the Shihab-3 missile which in the future will be able to strike Israel.

Mordechai praised Bush's father, former U.S. President George Bush, with just a hint of criticism mixed in.

Israel is grateful to the former president for attacking Iraq in the 1991 Gulf War, Mordechai said. "But Saddam Hussein is still president and this, more than anything, symbolizes the absurdity of the region in which we live," Mordechai said in a reference to the failure of the Bush administration to bring down the Iraqi leader during the war.

Mordechai's remarks were con-

tained in a statement by his office.

Bush is visiting Israel along with governors Marc Racicot from Montana, Paul Cellucci from Massachusetts and Mike Leavitt.

The trip is organized by the National Jewish Coalition, a group of American Jews whose right-wing sentiments mirror the policies of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government.

The NCJ and Israel's Foreign Ministry declined to publish Tuesday's itinerary, apparently to discourage coverage.

On Monday, the group abruptly canceled a planned stop Tuesday in

the Jewish West Bank settlement of Alfei Menashe.

It was not clear what led to the cancellation, which apparently saved Bush from a premature entanglement in one of the thorniest foreign policy issues confronting the United States.

An Israeli Foreign Ministry official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said U.S. officials feared a settlement visit could trigger a backlash from the Palestinians and asked that the delegation not be taken to the West Bank. Larry Schwartz, spokesman for the U.S. embassy in Israel, had no comment.

# Judge rules she has jurisdiction over law school affiliation

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas A&M University is one step closer to getting a law school in Houston.

Lawyers for the private South Texas College of Law in Houston won a round Monday in their court fight over affiliation with Texas A&M.

The Texas Higher Education Coor-

ordinating Board, which was sued by the South Texas College of Law, had urged state District Judge Suzanne Covington in Austin to dismiss the lawsuit, contending the court had no jurisdiction.

"It is a very significant ruling by the court," said attorney Roland Garcia Jr.,

who represented the law school at Monday's hearing. "It confirms our belief that the lawsuit brought by South Texas warranted a full review by the court and that the issues before the court were important issues."

Earlier this year, the state Coordinating Board voted 15-2 to reject A&M's bid to offer legal studies through the South Texas college.

The institutions affiliated in January, when the downtown Houston law school received the A&M name while

remaining a \$14,000-a-year private school.

Some educators in Houston and elsewhere had complained the agreement was reached without getting permission from legislators or the Coordinating Board, which oversees state-supported colleges.

But the academic agreement gave A&M a long-awaited association with a law school. Both institutions said the deal would not cost taxpayers any money.

# Gun lobby sues over background checks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Accusing the government of illegal snooping, the National Rifle Association sued in federal court Tuesday to bar the FBI from keeping lists of law-abiding people who buy guns under a newly revised law.

The Justice Department says FBI records on new gun buyers will be kept only for six months or less. It says the time is needed to permit audits to assure that all gun purchases are truly legitimate and that weapons do not end up in the

hands of criminals or mentally unstable people.

The NRA lawsuit, which named Attorney General Janet Reno as a defendant, said lists should be kept only of people barred by law from owning guns because of felonies or other problems uncovered in a new computerized system of instant background checks.

NRA lawyers said at a news conference that keeping government lists of people found fully eligible to own a firearm represents an illegal bid to establish a national gun registry of new gun buyers.

"Lists on law abiding people have never been a good idea," said NRA executive vice president Wayne LaPierre. "This is about privacy and freedom from government snooping into our lives."

"Now, instead of creating a database of criminals, the federal government is bent on establishing a list of lawful citizens," said James J. Baker, executive director of the NRA's Legislative Institute. He joined LaPierre at a news confer-

ence to announce filing of the law suit with the U.S. District Court here.

The new FBI instant-check system, which governs the purchase of handguns, shotguns and rifles, took effect on Monday. The system it replaced applied to handguns only, was conducted by local and state law enforcement authorities, and involved a five-day waiting period.

The NRA suit contends that the Brady Act, the law that requires a background check before a gun can

be legitimately sold, forbids establishing a registry of gun buyers and directs the Justice Department to "destroy all records."

Justice Department officials said there is no intent to create a permanent gun registry.

"We are confident that our policy of retaining records of approved purchases for a very limited period is consistent with federal law," said department spokesman Gregory King.

"This process will allow us to protect the system's security and the gun owners' privacy," King said in a formal response to the suit which will be filed next week.

Justice Department officials, speaking on grounds of anonymity, said the FBI had originally intended to keep all computer-search records for 18 months to permit surveys to assure that guns purchased legally did not stray into illegal channels.

But that said that after objections by some members of Congress, a compromise six-month period was agreed to.

## Ms. magazine sold to group including co-founder Steinem

NEW YORK (AP) — Ms. magazine's new owners, who include co-founder Gloria Steinem, hope to resume publication of the feminist publication next spring with a more spirited approach aimed at appealing to younger women.

MacDonald Communications Corp., which owned Ms. for about 2 1/2 years, agreed Monday to sell the bimonthly magazine to Liberty Media for Women, which is backed by more than a dozen women investors.

"We will be reaching out to younger women, and we hope to be funnier, livelier, surprising. We want to make it very clear that Ms., like feminism, is something that is moving into the future," Marcia Ann Gillespie, the editor in chief of Ms. since 1993 and part of the new ownership group, said Tuesday.

MacDonald suspended publication after the September-October issue.

Gillespie said the new owners hope to resume with an April-May issue in 1999.

Terms of the sale were not disclosed, but *The Wall Street Journal* said Tuesday it was roughly \$3 mil-

lion to \$4 million.

Gillespie told the *Journal* the new magazine would be "a lot raunchier" but said in an interview Tuesday with

*The Associated Press* that she used that phrase to suggest it would be "livelier, earthier" but not cruder than it had been.

Steinem was a founding editor of the magazine in 1972.

She said the magazine was never consistently profitable, however, because it was unable to attract enough advertising.

It was sold to an Australian media firm in 1987 and later was acquired by Lang Communications, which also owned *Working Woman* and *Working Mother* magazines.

In 1990, Ms. took the unusual step of banning advertising and raised the cover and subscription prices as it relied on circulation revenue.

Steinem said the magazine was profitable for about five years.

But Jay MacDonald, chief executive of MacDonald Communications, said the magazine's subscriber list had shrunk to under 100,000 when his company acquired Ms., *Working Woman* and *Working Mother* in mid-1996. He said Ms. circulation has since grown to just below 200,000, but declined to be specific.

MacDonald said he decided to sell Ms. because the magazine appealed to a wider audience than affluent women executives that his company tries to reach with its other publications and conferences. MacDonald Communications still owns *Working Woman* and *Working Mother*.

## White House tree delivered

WASHINGTON (AP) — The kids singing "Jingle Bells" on the White House steps wore furry red caps and short-sleeve shirts. Santa Claus broke a sweat over his thick white beard. And for Hillary Rodham Clinton, it just didn't feel like the Christmas season.

An improbably warm, summer-like sun greeted the 18 1/2-foot White House Christmas tree Tuesday as it rolled up to the South Portico on a horse-drawn

carriage.

"When you think about this weather, it's a little hard to get into the Christmas spirit. Except that I think it'll start building here at the White House," Mrs. Clinton said.

The first lady was joined by James and Diane Chapman — who grew the winning balsam fir at their Silent Night Evergreens Farm in Endeavor, Wisc. — as well as two dozen local schoolchildren in the Mann-Murch Chorus, and a fully costumed Santa.

The White House will be shuttered this weekend, Mrs. Clinton said, as teams of volunteers "with a Santa's-workshop feeling" scurry to finish the mansion's elaborate holiday decorations by midnight Saturday, including the main tree in the Blue Oval Room.

It will take much longer for the Clinton family to dress the tree in the Yellow Oval Room of their personal living quarters.

The talent show will be Feb. 20 in the University Center Allen Theatre

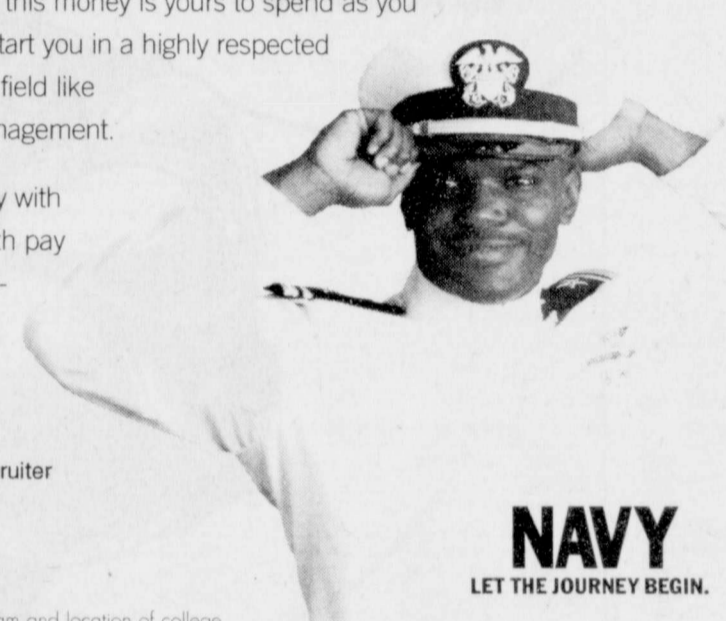

## Hampton lawsuit against city frivolous

**H**EEEEERRRRREEEE's Johnnie, no not the king of funny, but the king of controversy and one who could make a racial issue of a white domino with too few black dots.

Buzzing rumors keep circling of Hampton University, in Virginia, using Johnnie Cochran to file a lawsuit against the city of Lubbock. The lawsuit threat comes after Hampton's head lady basketball coach, her husband and assistant lady basketball coach, all who are black, were detained by Lubbock police for questioning. This after they were identified as money scam artists by a Lubbock resident.

Their detention, which lasted for several hours, led to the cancellation of the women's basketball game between

Hampton and Texas Tech for that day.

That same day, Lubbock police released the three, and they were free to return home to defend their reputations.

No doubt these fine folks have a right to be upset they were identified as criminals, but the fact they are black should not be an issue.

The day after the incident, the Hampton coaches held a tearful press conference and Hampton officials released statements threatening a lawsuit against the city of Lubbock. This prompted Lubbock officials to immediate actions of apology efforts, including a trip to Virginia, but I guess this was not enough.

Now, the Hampton has called on Johnnie, who has already been putting wheels into motion with a couple other

Texas lawyers. So my question is this: is this a charity case for Johnnie or will Hampton University have to start a capital campaign to support attorney payments? And we thought our administration wasted money.

If Hampton actually goes through with the lawsuit then this could be added to the "Fleeing of America" list.

I cannot imagine the university spending money on a lawsuit, that has little to do with the reputation of the university.

Yes, the ladies are coaches there, but the Lubbock police were questioning them — not the university. If there is any lawsuit, it should be made by the individuals involved — not the university.

With all that said, I still do not think

there is even reason for a lawsuit. Lubbock police were just performing their duties. If someone reported a supposed crime and identified who they thought were the suspects, what would you do?

About the fact that there were 15 to 20 white police officers on the scene, as Hampton coaches said, should not be reason to make a racial case. It is not Lubbock's fault we have fewer black people in West Texas than other areas, and it would be ridiculous and unfair to try to make every police investigation politically correct as far as race goes.

With all that said, I still do not think there is even reason for a lawsuit.

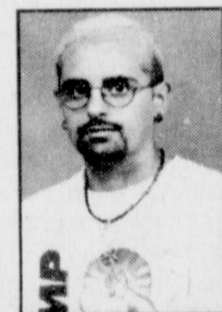

**I** am a female who has gained about 9 pounds over the last year. I cannot seem to get rid of it.

I eat about 20 grams of fat or less a day and exercise at least an hour a day. But I have not lost any weight.

My clothes are getting a little tight. What would you suggest I do? Is there something wrong with me?

First off, you get a big cheer from me for your dedication and determination in meeting your wellness goals.

I would suggest that you increase your calorie intake.

In today's fat-free, low-cal society it would seem the goal is to eat the fewest amount of calories

and zero fat.

But, fat is essential because it protects your vital organs, regulates your body temperature, allows you to menstruate and provides energy needed to make it through your busy day.

Women need a minimum of 1200 calories a day. Thirty percent of those calories should come from fat.

That figures to 40 grams of fat a day, rather than the 20 you have been eating. Restrictive eating (not consuming enough calories) can lower your metabolism.

Also, please keep in mind muscle weighs more than fat. In constantly working out, you are increasing the amount of lean body mass (muscle) in your

body. Keep this in mind when the scale doesn't seem to reflect the progress and efforts you have made in reaching your goal. If you're concerned something might be wrong, set up an appointment with a health care provider or you can get more information on nutrition and exercise from a Lifestyle Weight Management Consultant.

Both of these can be taken care of at Student Health Services in Thompson Hall.

**I** masturbate quite a lot. Should I worry about getting a low sperm count?

You should not suffer from a low sperm count due to mastur-

bation.

It can be compared to a mother nursing a baby.

A breast is full of milk, drained and then within a little while refills.

The same system works in the male body with sperm. After draining, it refills again in a little while.

Sometimes, if a couple is trying to get pregnant, the man will abstain from intercourse for a short period of time before the attempt to conceive in order to have a higher sperm count than normal.

Are there any special things I should do for safety when decorating? I had a friend whose bedroom caught on fire from a little tree.

She had heavy smoke damage to everything in the place.

All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward.

## Lady Raiders set for road running

Riding high from a 2-1 holiday road trip, the No. 14 Texas Tech Lady Raiders will battle Texas-San Antonio at 7 p.m. today in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

After wins over Stanford and SMU, along with a loss to Old Dominion on the three game stint, Lady Raider forward Keitha Dickerson said Tech (3-1 overall, 0-0 Big 12) is beginning to come together as a cohesive unit and team.

"I think we are," Dickerson said of the Lady Raiders beginning to form an identity as a team.

"We've had a long hard road trip there. Getting a win there in Stanford really meant a lot to this team."

Lady Raider coach Marsha Sharp said the squad improved its play during the road trip.

"I think we grew up a little bit while we were gone," Sharp said.

"I think we made some adjustments in the Stanford game that we didn't in the Old Dominion game, and that probably points to some progress during that week-long period of time."

But there still are some things that need to be worked on, Sharp said.

"I think there still are some things that we've got to straighten out," Sharp said.

"Part of that is to really adjust to the new points of emphasis in officiating and try to stay out of foul trouble a little more than we did on the road."

Fouls were one of the major problems for the Lady Raiders during the road trip.

All of Tech's three main inside players fouled out of at least one game on the crucial three-game road trip.

"I think most of it happened in the post area," Sharp said.

"I felt like we tried to use our hands to much and tried to block some things that we're going to have to let go for awhile and stay on the floor a little longer. (Angie) Brazziel's averaging about 15 points and play-

ing about 17 minutes per game. I'd really like her to play closer to 40 (minutes)."

The Roadrunners (1-3 overall) come into today's battle with more than a week-long hiatus with their last game being an 80-40 loss to Oklahoma Nov. 23.

The only win for Texas-San Antonio on the season came in a 69-63 defeat of Tulsa Nov. 21. The Roadrunners have also garnered losses to UNLV and Texas-Pan American.

Sophomore guard Rosie Smith and junior forward Keelah Wilson both lead the squad with 12.3 points-per-game. Junior post Donelle Jones leads the team with 6.5 rebounds-per-game as the Roadrunners head to Lubbock.

Only two starters return from last season's 18-10 campaign. Tech defeated Texas-San Antonio 57-44 last season behind a 27-point effort from Alicia Thompson.

"They're (Texas-San Antonio) fairly young, and they have a pretty much a different group than when we played against them last year," Sharp said.

"I think that they have struggled to find some consistency. But one thing you know that need to be worked on, Sharp said.

about their basketball team, they're always going to play hard and get right in the middle of you. I expect them to do that (Wednesday)."

While most of the players may be new, an assistant coach is a familiar face for Lady Raider fans.

Roadrunner assistant coach Krista Gerlich, formerly Krista Kirkland, helped lead the Lady Raiders to their first national championship in 1993.

"We're always excited to see her, and that's always a fun thing particularly when she comes here," Sharp said.

Dickerson said she didn't expect a letdown against Texas-San Antonio after the win against the Cardinal last Friday.

"I think we'll approach this game just like we do every other game," Dickerson said. "We'll come play hard and really get after them because I know they'll get after us."

## Webber trial in full swing, end in sight

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (AP) — A jury on Monday heard a judge outline charges against Sacramento Kings forward Chris Webber of assaulting a police officer, resisting arrest, marijuana possession and several other traffic-related offenses stemming from an arrest earlier this year in January.

Seeking to negate Webber's celebrity status, prosecutor Shaem Spencer appealed to the jury that professional athletes are not above the law.

The jury will begin hearing evidence Tuesday. The trial is expected to last two or three days.

Webber, who then played for the Wizards, was arrested in his sports utility vehicle after being stopped for speeding near the Washington beltway while on the way to a practice Jan. 20.

Police say that when Webber refused to get out of his car after failing to produce a license or registration, he struck the officer on the hand, resisted arrest and was

sprayed with pepper spray. The vehicle was impounded and police say they found the stub of a marijuana cigarette and other traces of marijuana inside the vehicle.

In addition to the January arrest, Webber was accused — though never charged — of sexual assault after a party at Wizards teammate Juwan Howard's house in April.

In August, Webber paid a fine after admitting possession of marijuana found in a carryon bag at an airport in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Later that month, Fila canceled its multimillion-dollar endorsement contract with Webber, saying he had violated a good-conduct clause and was no longer abiding by that stipulation.

After Webber failed to lead Washington to the playoffs in the spring, the Wizards cited his off-the-court problems as one of the main reasons for trading him to the Sacramento Kings late in the season.

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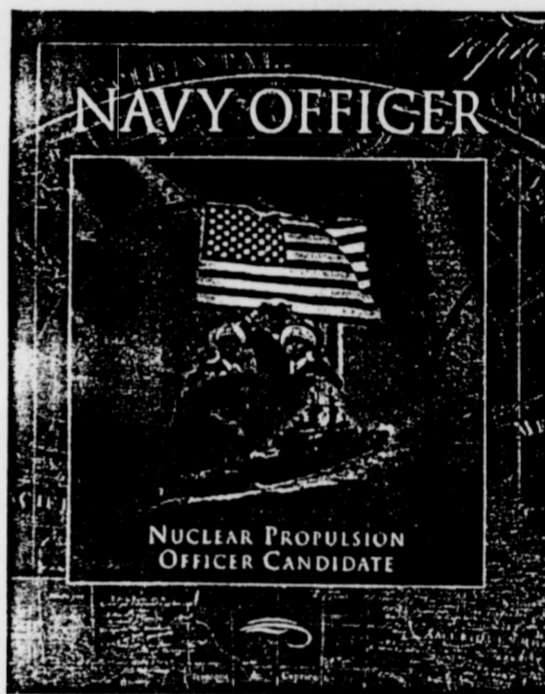

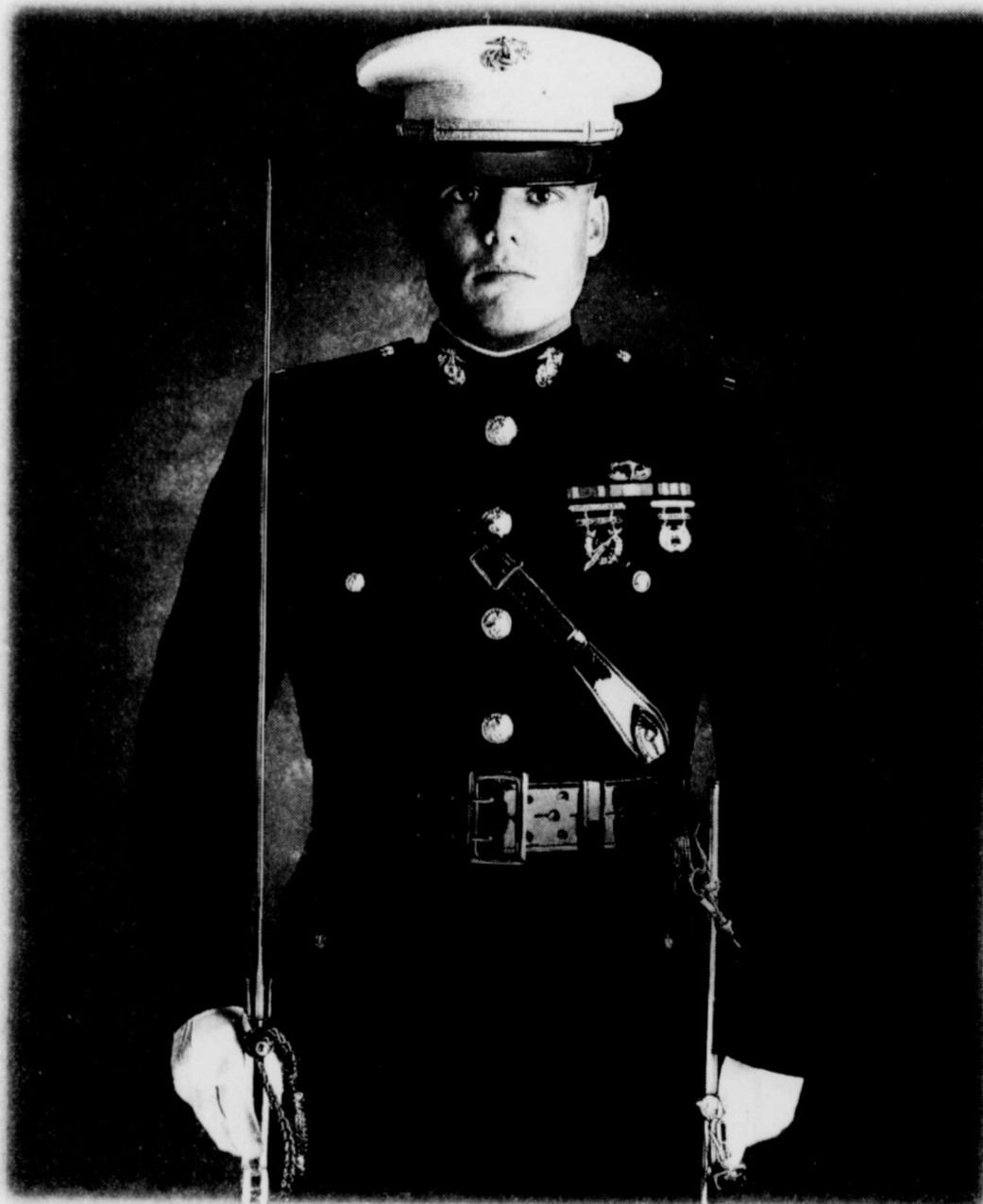

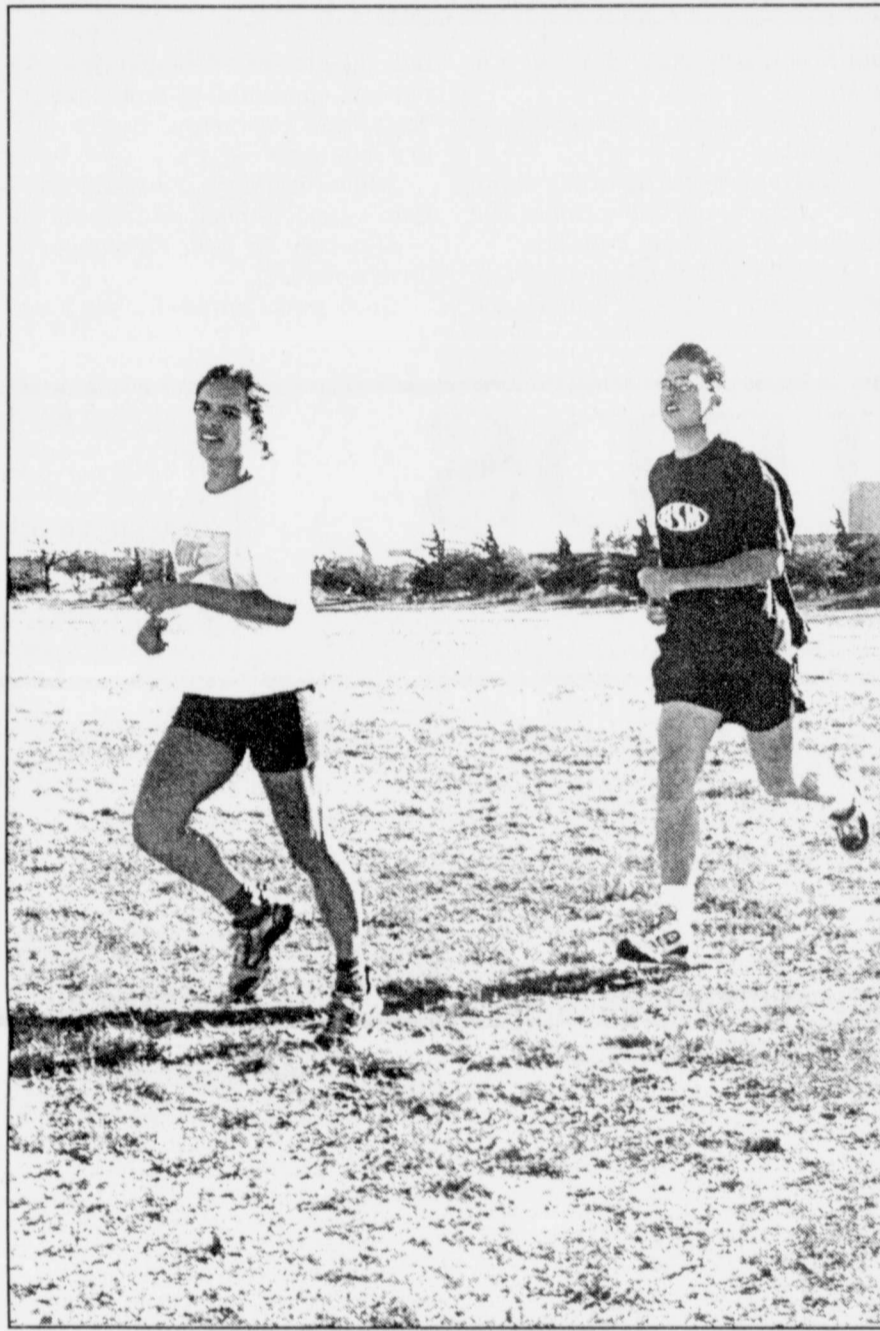

The next intramural volleyball action will be in April when three on three play will begin.

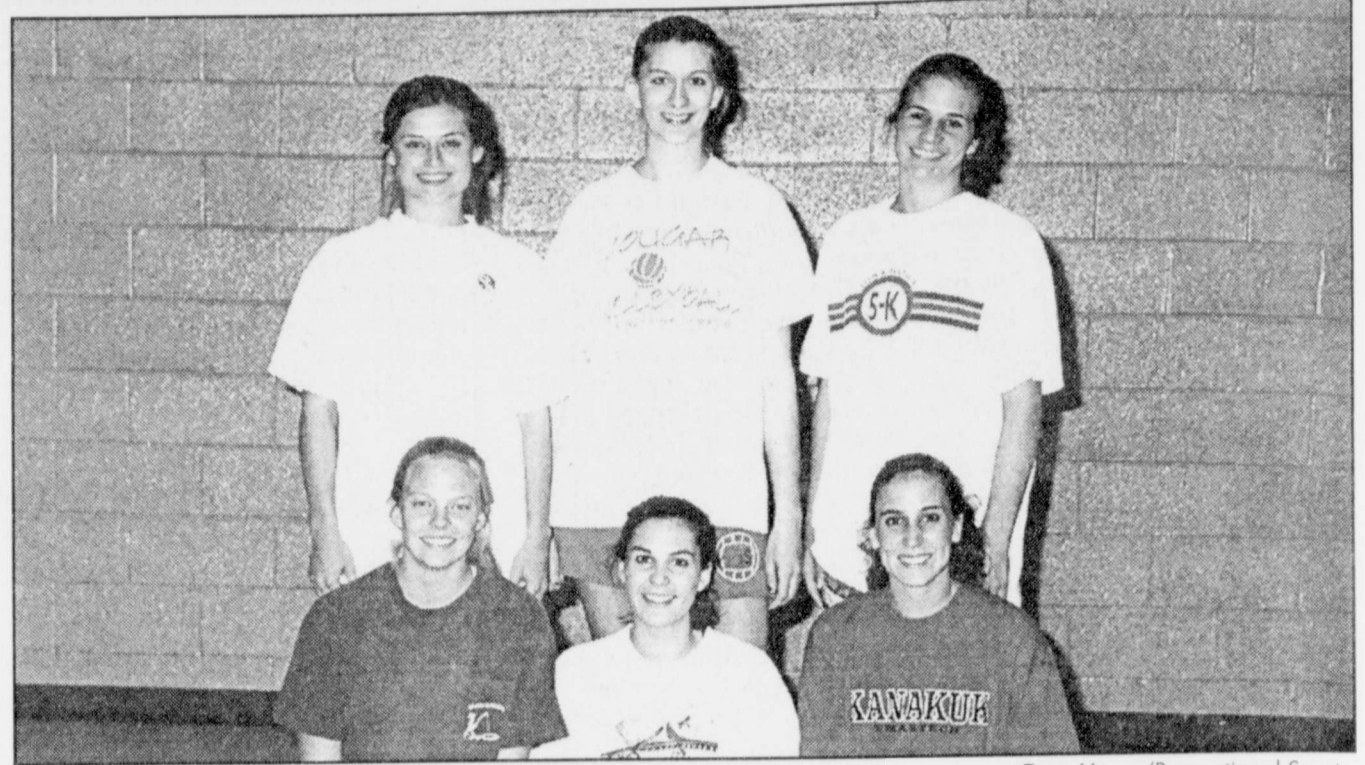

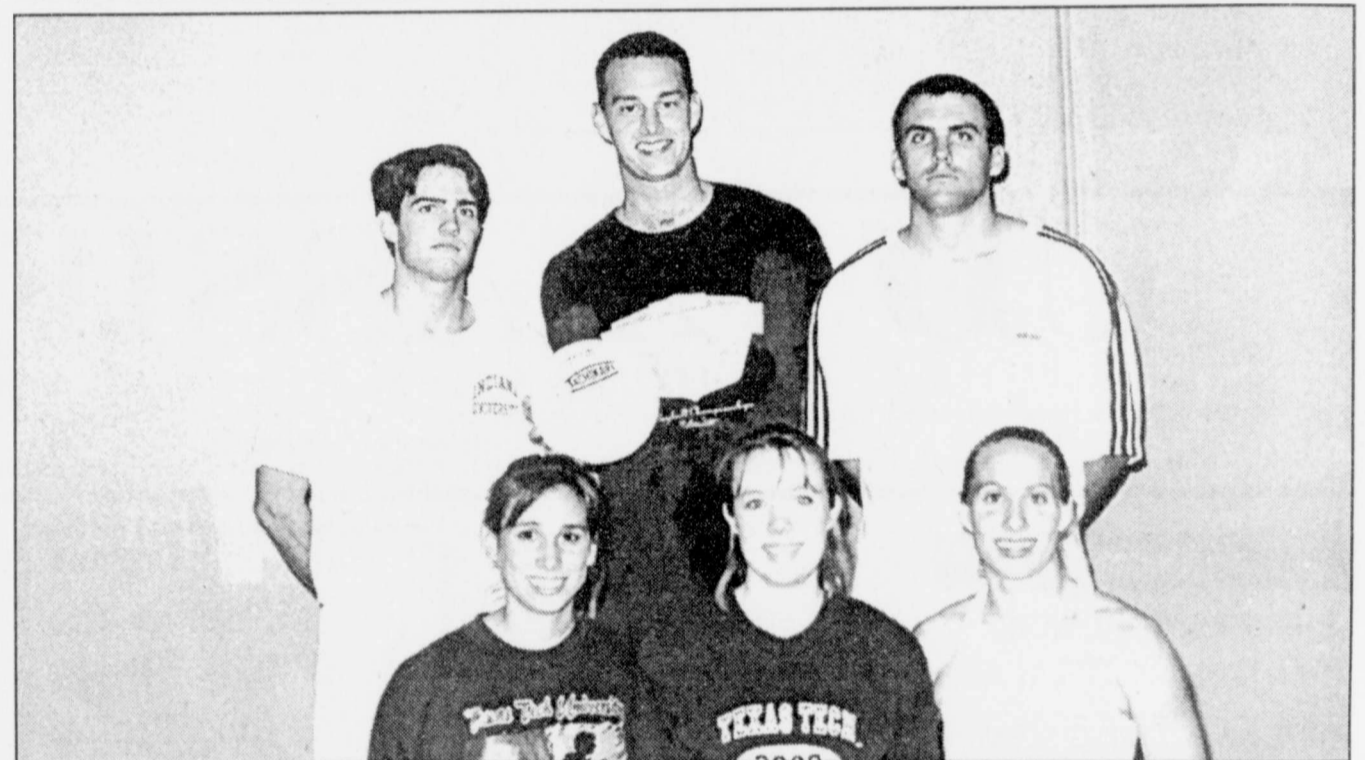
