The difference is that unlike the usual menu of solutions proposed here in the United States, the Australians have come up with some diffe ent suggestions worth taking a look at. Teachers in Australia were involved in ne
salary negotiations in salary negotiations in late 1998 because their
previous pay agreement was set to expire at the end of 1998.
Teachers in the Australian Education Union demanded a 14 percent pay increase and some
additional resources valued at about $\$ 300$ mil additional r
lion.
The government did not plan to ope
vaults so wide to the teachers' demands. It came back with a proposed 13 percent pay
increase and some additional resources valued ncrease and some additional resources value

Both sides held their line and refused to budge much. That's when some member ustralian Education Union got creative Ing for only a 10 percent pay increase instead 13 percent pay increase, provided that all the additional money they agreed to sacrifice be pent on resources for schools. This is quite a novel proposal but one tha quality of education.
The $\$ 30$ million the teachers would be sacr ficing would go towards hiring additional teachers, creating smaller classes, provingresourc or disadvantaged schoos ial education teachers.
The next time teachers in the United State have a salary dispute, they might find it worth
while to follow the lead of the Australian teach ers.
Teachers aren't the only ones who should be watching what the Australians are doing opic of conversation for people in many developed nations.
In November 1998, the Australian Medical Association was urging patients to sign a petition urging the appro
ance legislation.
