## Possible candidates step forward to fill seat

FILL IN THE BLANK: Local politicians, citizens vie for House seat being vacated by Rep. Larry Combest.

Two weeks ago U.S. Rep. Larry Combest was re-elected in a landslide election. One week ago he announced his resignation, and today possible replacements for him are still up in the air.

State Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, who was considered a strong candidate for the position, decided not to seek election but to stay where he was. Lubbock Mayor Marc McDougal said his name was mentioned as a County Judge Don McBeath and Lubbock in the release.

possible candidate, but he was not interested in the job. Former Lubbock Mayor Windy Sitton and Speaker of the House Pete Laney declined as well.

However, several local politicians are Rep. Carl Isett, R-Lubbock, formed an excision. ploratory committee Monday to contemplate a run for the seat. Former Lubbock Mayor David Langston is looking into the possibility of running, as are Lubbock

businessman Randy Neugebauer.

Isett, who is serving a month-long stint in Southeast Asia as a logistics officer in the U.S. Naval Reserves, has not decided he will run, but he wants to investigate the idea.

Isett has received overwhelming support encouraging him to run for Congress, according to a news release from Isett's office. He will consult further with his family and do a considering the position with interest. State little praying before he comes to his final de-

> "Serving my country has always been an important part of my life, whether it's in the Naval Reserves, the Texas Legislature or possibly the United States Congress," Isett said

Isett has served as the District 84 representative since 1996 and was just elected to his fourth term. He currently serves on the House Committee on Public Safety and the House Committee on Corrections, according to the release. In addition to his congressional appointments, Gov. Rick Perry appointed him to the Governor's Task Force on Homeland

Langston, who is currently a Democrat but will run as a Republican if he does enter the race, said he has not decided yet if he will run. He will not run under the Democratic ticket, he said, because the National Democratic Party is increasingly shifting to the left, and to properly represent this area

He has talked to people from every area of the district, both geographically and from many political spectrums, about his candidacy,

However, it is too early to announce candidacy because the situation is still fluid, Langston said. Names of possible candidates come up and then drop out, and many names are still emerging.

"There will be a large number of qualified candidates who will eventually throw their hats in the ring and want to be considered,"

## Outside consultant to investigate allegations

Texas Tech has hired an external consultant to investigate allegations

made by a former dean of the university's School of Law that a senior-level administrator made discriminatory comments against women applicants.

In a signed affidavit, former Dean of Law Frank Newton alleges Tech President David Schmidly made a comment that 'disparaged women' while discussing possible candidates to fill the schools interim dean position following Newton's retirement in November

Gen. Walter Huffman, who has since been hired as dean of the School

of Law, said he asked university administrators to initiate an external, unbiased investigation into Newton's allegations.

"What I asked for was a person not connected to Tech and who doesn't know any of the players

involved," he said. "What we owed was a hard look at these allegations." The affidavit has been used in part

## U.N. urges disclosure of banned weapons

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The chief U.N. U.N. weapons inspectors, wrapping up a critical two-day visit, urged Iraqi officials on Tuesday to look again in their nuclear, chemical and biological "stocks and stores" to ensure they have no weapons-making to report.

Iraq's position that it has no weapons of mass destruction "must be convincingly shown by documentation, by evidence," said Hans Blix, head of the U.N. weapons-hunting team.

"We don't think that has yet been meant to develop weapons.

HUNTSVILLE (AP) - A former death chamber Tuesday for killing a Houston police officer 13 years ago.

Craig Ogan, 47, from St. Louis, had been in Houston only a few weeks when he fatally shot officer James Boswell the night of Dec. 9, 1989.

"I killed a cop and this is Texas," Ogan said recently from death row, insisting the shooting was in self-defense but acknowledging he had little hope of avoiding lethal injection in the nation's most active death penalty state.

Ogan interrupted the officers repeatedly, citing his DEA connection, and refused their instructions to wait. When he persisted and Boswell got out of the patrol car to unlock the back door, the officer was shot in the head. Ogan tried shot and wounded in the back by





The mayor of Austin has also proposed a smoking ban for his city. El Paso and Lubbock have passed ordinances that have some exceptions.

Proponents of the Dallas ban, including Mayor Laura Miller, say current regulations on smoking in restaurants are not strong enough. They say only a ban can protect restaurant approval by the Round Rock City patrons and workers from the effects Council and is up for a final vote of secondhand smoke.

Now, restaurants with a seating capacity of at least 50 may have smoking and nonsmoking sections separated by at least four feet. The ordinance was enacted in 1985 and has not been changed.

Among changes considered by the council are banning all smoking in restaurants; requiring restaurants to have separate ventilation systems for smoking and nonsmoking areas; and banning smoking in all public places, including freestanding bars, bingo halls and hotel lobbies.

Restaurateurs warn any ban would drive customers away from Dallas to nearby suburbs, where restaurants abound.

Garcia, who has supported a public smoking ban since he was elected to the Austin City Council in 1991, said Austin's council members might have a proposed ordinance to review by early 2003.


Six years ago, the Austin council voted that restaurants must install ventilation systems — including in bars — if they wanted to designate smoking sections. Stand-alone bars must designate at least 25 percent of their seating as nonsmoking and have separate ventilation systems.







## Cause of school violence rooted in abusive homes

he epidemic of school violence is rearing its ugly head vet again. The beast that once swept across the country leaving behind a swath of tragedy and heartbreak has reappeared, this time in both colleges and grade schools, and the results are equally

On Oct. 28 a flunking nursing student at the University of Arizona killed three professors and then himself. John Lee Malvo, the 17year-old alleged sniper, will possibly face the death penalty for his participation which allegedly included the shooting of a 13-yearold boy outside the boy's school. Everyone remembers the years from 1996 to 1999 that saw another act of school violence seemingly every other day. Included in the 17 shootings that occurred during this time was the Columbine incident on April 20, 1999 where 15 students died, including the two gun-

In fact, the National Education Association, as of September 2001, began offering homicide insurance for the families of teachers slain on the job. All the while, statisticia

Statistics from the justice department show that the number of juveniles serving time in prison after being tried as adults more than doubled between 1985 and 1997. as evidence of an alleged discrimination-fueled interim dean search process in a federal complaint filed by Tech law professor and former Associate Dean of Law Daisy Floyd.

In his affidavit, Newton writes, "I am haunted by the possibility that I misheard or misunderstood" the com-

Floyd said the university's investigation into the alleged comment does little to address her concerns that the university is engaging in a pattern of discriminating conduct against women and minorities.

"I think there is evidence of discrimination absent of the comment," she said. "I would disagree the remark is the real problem here. Even without the remark we have an institutional climate where we don't seem to match our stated commitment to

Floyd said she hopes to see the university address a system wide pattern of biased administrative appoint-"Even without the remark we have

a problem at Texas Tech," she said. "If you look at administrative appointments, the number of women and minorities is very low. An investigation into the comment alone is not going to get at the overall record here."

Schmidly has adamantly denied both Newton and Floyd's allegations.

"The truth is really the only way you can protect your integrity and your character," he said. "If you can look at my record at Texas A&M before I came here, in Galveston, you'll see I hired women and placed them in im-

portant positions. The Strategic Plan, that I lead the development of, talks about the importance of diversity at this university."

Schmidly said his record of promoting diversity contradicts Newton's

'We've had the biggest gains in the history of this university in terms of student diversity and in terms of faculty diversity," he said. "Nowhere does my record show that I discriminate against people."

Bonnie Weisman, a consultant with Houston-based Employment Practices Solution, is conducting the investigation.

Schmidly said his record shows he is a promoter of divertisity at Tech.

'What I did and what I'm going to continue to do is tell the truth," Schmidly said.

The consultant was asked to inves-

tigate only the allegations made by Newton, and not Floyd's allegations of system-wide discriminatory practices, Huffman said.

"That statement casts an aura over a lot of this stuff," he said. "I think it's important to examine that statement and the university thought it was important, also. Chancellor (Dr. David) Smith and Dr. Schmidly also thought it was the right thing to do."

Weisman spent several days on campus interviewing the parties involved in the complaint and examining documents related to the allegations, Huffman said.

"She is a very experienced investigator, and she has the complaints professor Floyd has filed," he said.

Weisman declined to comment. Huffman said the investigation should be completed by the end of this





## Art museum design exhibit

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) -In Bilbao, Spain, shimmering plates of titanium cover enormous curved and bent walls. In Milwaukee, a winglike sunshade spreads over a glass-enclosed reception hall. In Cincinnati, concrete and metal blocks rise up from a ground level of sheets of glass.

Art museums are becoming works of art as communities seek top architects and distinctive looks for their institutions.

"Museums for a New Millennium," a traveling exhibit on view at the Columbus Museum of Art through Nov. 24, features models and designs of 25 museums created by internationally known architects in the last 15 years.

Created by the Art Centre in Basel, Switzerland, the show travels next year to the Miami Art Museum and the Contemporary Art Museum in Monterrey, Mexico.

"If museums are charged with promoting the best, and contemporary museums are charged with promoting the new, it seems to me to make a lot of sense that you commission a work of art as your building and not just a place as a neutral backdrop," said Charles Desmarais, director of the Cincinnati Contemporary Arts Center.

The \$35 million center, designed by architect Zaha Hadid, is

scheduled to open in May.

Museums seeking a distinctive look must not forget the building's basic functions or the cost of maintaining an unusual space, said Ed Able, president and chief executive officer of the Washington, D.C.-based American Association of Museums.

The challenge is finding an architect willing to work with a museum staff and who understands the practical problems museums face. "You can talk to a lot of museums around the country who lost control of the program and ended up with space that was very dysfunctional," Able said.


That issue was on the minds of museum officials in Milwaukee, where the art museum's \$122 million expansion by Santiago Calatrava included the 90-ton steel sunshade stretched atop a 90-foot high, all white glassand-steel reception area.


Museums are complicated buildings fulfilling many requirements, said David Brackbill, who curated the "Millennium" show for the Columbus


### Ski and Snowboard Maintenance
