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Nobody's Business

AUSTIN—Thundering down the home-stretch in the great 1938 Texas gubernatorial sweepstakes, as this column is written, were eleven entrants. The zero hour is Saturday, when nearly a million Texas poll-tax and exemption certificate holders were expected to go to the polls and eliminate nine of the horses. The two leaders will then go into the second and final heat, August 27.

As they neared the finish line, three horses were leading the field, running so close together that few dared to predict the final outcome. They were—in alphabetical order—Bill McCraw, the Attorney General; Lee O'Daniel, the Fort Worth flour man; and Ernest O. Thompson, the railroad commissioner. Next in line was Tom Hunter, still in position to get into the money with a last minute spurt.

Which two of these four will qualify for the second heat was the big question puzzling the political experts. They freely admitted the freakish O'Daniel boom has them confused, although the great majority believed O'Daniel was a certainty for the run-off. Thompson and McCraw were battling to a finish for the other place in the run-off with opinion sharply divided as which will be successful. Thompson forces, supremely confident, believed the constructive campaign of their candidate, kept scrupulously clean and without mentioning the other candidates, will bring their man under the wire a winner. McCraw with slashing attacks on O'Daniel in which he has raised the issues of sectionalism, poll-tax payments and hill-billy music, claimed the race is between himself and O'Daniel. But those opposing him asserted his campaign has collapsed, and his sudden switch from wise-cracks to bitter sarcasm is evidence that he feels he must do something to reform his shattered lines, or go down.

The Attorney General has found O'Daniel a worthy foe in the exchange of repartee, and the flour candidate has laughed off McCraw's vicious attacks with little apparent damage to his cause. The big surprise of the campaign may lie in the question of how much O'Daniel talk will resolve itself into votes Saturday. There is still a possibility that the flour man may pull up lame, and find Thompson and McCraw fighting it out for the Governorship.

ALLRED S JUDGE—ffc More than a year ago, this column gave its readers a detailed forecast that Gov. James V. Allred would be judge of the new South Texas Federal District Court. The prediction was unqualified, based upon information from a high Washington source. Later, other Texas newspaper correspondents carried rumors of the event, but weakened from time to time on their stories, and hedged. This column has never weakened, its source repeatedly confirming the original story.

Any political commentator writing from Austin is required to make a good many guesses in a year. Many go wrong, naturally, but to stay in business, the commentator must score more hits than misses. This commentator therefore, takes some pride in the development which this week landed Allred in this judgeship, exactly as forecast in detail.

WILL QUIT ABOUT SEPT 1

The Governor indicated he will resign after the second primary, immediately after President Roosevelt announced his appointment at Wichita Falls. Soon after his return to Austin, he issued a statement hedging on this statement to some extent, and saying he wanted to serve as much as possible of his term as Governor

out. That hedging statement was in response to pressure from friends of Jerry Mann and Ralph Yarborough, candidates for Attorney General against Lt. Gov. Walter Woodul, who will become Governor when Allred steps down. Smart observers here figured the knowledge that Woodul will be Governor nearly five months will be worth 25,000 to 50,000 additional votes to Woodul, and probably put him so far ahead in the Attorney General's race that there will be no runoff. Recognizing this Woodul's opponents put pressure on Allred.

But Allred's hedging statement is obviously just that. The newly created court opens its first term on Monday, Sept. 5. Allred is the new Court's first judge. It is a 10 to 1 bet that he will take his seat on the bench when the new court opens for business, with a crowded docket.

And Senator Tom Connally will sleep sounder during these next two years, knowing that Jimmie Allred will not oppose him for re-election in 1940.

The full name of Gov Jimmie Allred is "James Burr C. Allred" and not James Veto Allred, as one newspaper suggested during the last special session—the Governor told reporters this week. His three names came from three uncles, and the "V" doesn't stand for anything, that being the first name of one of the uncles. Judge Robert Lee Bobbit, chairman of the State Highway Commission, and fearless advocate of what he thinks is right in politics added impetus to the Thompson campaign this week, when he made a half-hour radio campaign speech for Ernest Thompson, giving the Abarilloan his unqualified support. Successor to Capt. L. G. Phares, deposed chief of the highway patrol, is Captain Frew Hickman, veteran of the patrol service since its organization in 1930. Hickman has had 15 years experience in every phase of law enforcement work, and is popular with county peace officers throughout the State. He came originally from Whitesboro, Grayson County. . . . The State tax rate probably will not be fixed by the Automatic Tax board, which includes the Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer, until after the elections. Thirty two county assessors failed to file estimates of taxable valuations by the deadline date, July 15, as required by law. The Board probably will meet by July 20, and postpone action. Two of its three members are candidates for re-election, and would not rather levy taxes until after the voters have spoken. . . . Five million dollars of the new road construction, to keep Texas contractors and their laborers busy during the remained of this calendar year, will be let by August 1. The Highway Department opened bids on over \$2,000,000 of work this week, and called for bids on another \$3,000,00 for July 30.

Comments In Column

From the Gulf Coast to the Panhandle the Governor's race waxed hotter and hotter. Polls of every kind are being taken that one might be able to predict the outcome, but it looks as insoluble as ever. Tom Hunter has unquestionably gained ground the last three weeks. Thompson and McCraw started strong and still look strong, even in the face of the polls and O'Daniel reports each day over the radio. One has yet to hear a poll that does not favor Leo, yet its doubtful if the straw voters are all poll tax payers. Many may be just like O'Daniel, minus the Poll tax. But Leo must be given credit for his salesmanship in this campaign. He has carried his appeal to the people, an appeal backed by nothing that would indicate his fitness for Governor, and has played upon the emotions, first of the ones that have never before given much thought to their government, then upon the emotion of the ones that failed to pay their Poll taxes. These two groups reacted with a rousing support, emotionally stirred that has carried him to a pinnacle in this race that I feel sure he has never dreamed of reaching. From all indications this avalanche of support makes him a possible contender for the runoff, but with his entry into that race, if he reaches it, his fight has just begun. All opposition to him at this time would concentrate against him, and Texas will see one of the most bitter fights that the political stage has been able to set for some time. Anyway Saturday, 23rd, the Governor's sweepstakes passes under the tape and just how they are going to finish nobody knows, and don't let them tell you they do.

Now that Governor Allred has his judgeship under his arm, he can proudly survey a political career that has been truly colorful. His appointment however did not meet with the approval of all, and some observers see, the appointment by the President, as a possible build-up for the younger Texan, Roosevelt for the senate against Connally in 1940 probably, or for the governorship of Texas. This observation however is some what remote because Elliott has been held pretty close on first base, if he got to first base in his brush with the Young Democrats of Texas.

I met a friend on the street in Fort Worth last week and he stumped me during our short conversation with this question, what do they do with a Chinaman when he dies here in Texas.
