Barry Corbin to Appear at Fort Chadbourne

This year's 8th Annual Fort Chadbourne Fundraiser to be held on September 15, 2007, will feature Mr. Barry Corbin as Charlie Goodnight. Barry is probably best known as Roscoe Brown in Lonesome Dove, and the astronaut, Maurice Minnifield in Northern Exposure. He has starred in hundreds of movies and TV programs. Presently, he co-stars on the weekly series One Tree Hill as Coach Whitey. "Charlie Goodnight's

Last Night" is a one-man play, written by Lubbock native Andy Wilkinson. Andy's award winning play on the life of plainsman Goodnight is a monologue rendered by noted Corbin. The play takes place late into the night of December 11, 1929, the eve of Goodnight's death at the age of 93. As the weathered visionary reflects over his long and difficult life on the frontier, he offers glimpses into a soul tempered by both joy and regret, and a look at what work he will do in the morning at saddle up time.

Mr. Goodnight, a well known pioneer in Texas, traveled through Fort Chadbourne on several occasions along the

Goodnight-Loving Trail, and in 1867 stopped to ask for a military escort because he had encountered Indian troubles along the way. The movie Lonesome Dove is based on his life.

This will be a very special event you don't want to miss. The evening begins with a steak dinner cooked on the parade ground at 5:30 p.m., followed by a live auction. "Charlie Goodnight's Last Night" starring Barry Corbin begins at 7:30 p.m., with a reception following the show with Mr. Corbin.

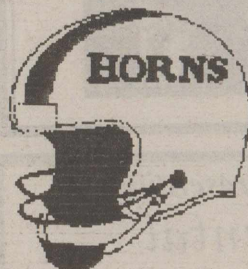

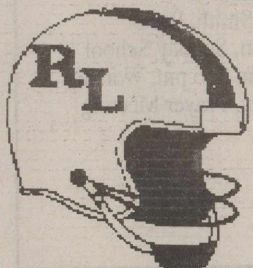

Livestock owners notified of upcoming saltcedar control project

Beginning on or about August 15, 2007, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board will be treating saltcedar stands in riparian areas of the Colorado River and the E.V. Spence Reservoir lake basin (property owned by the Colorado River Municipal Water District). Treatment of saltcedar stands will be conducted by aerial application of the herbicide ARSENAL and may continue until on or about September 15, 2007.

The 24C Supplemental Label for ARSENAL states: "remove livestock from treated areas before treatment and for 30 days after treatment; or, if livestock are not removed, do not sell livestock for slaughter for 30 days following treatment."

Producers are notified of the above restriction and requested to remove your livestock from property owned by CRMWD or not sell livestock for slaughter which have grazed on CRMWD land during this period until after October 15, 2007.

Church to Celebrate 100th Year

In 1907, the Northside Church of Christ began serving the Lord in a building located at what is currently the corner of Chadbourne and 9th Streets in Robert Lee. August 17, 18, and 19, 2007, the church will be celebrating with a weekend meeting of worship and praise to observe their 100th year.

Some of the early members who served as leaders and helped to establish the church were Merritt Stroud and G.C. McCraw. These two men purchased the building that was on the site where the present building now stands. The first building was destroyed by the same tornado that destroyed other churches and properties in Robert Lee in the late 1920's, and immediately, the present building was erected, with many improvements having been made over the years.

During the following years membership fluctuated, with many families contributing to the continuation of the church. At the end of the war, some families returned after having moved elsewhere for wartime jobs, others returned from military, and now families moved to Robert Lee as jobs opened in the oil fields. During these years, teaching and preaching were done by visiting ministers and local brethren.

In 1958, Gene Shelburne, grandson of D.P. Keys, became full time minister for the summer months, and was

followed by Delbert Smith from fall of 1958 to 1961; Douglas Wilks, 1961 to 1966; Leo Copeland, 1966 to 1968. In 1972, Kenneth Green came as full time minister until June 1974. From then until August 1975, Clyde Dukes, a teacher in the Robert Lee school system served as minister. In August 1975, Tommy Williams moved to Robert Lee and worked with the church two years, and then Clyde once again stepped in until August 1983.

Returning to Robert Lee in the mid 1980's, Kenneth Green served again until April of 1986, when Tommy Williams returned to Robert Lee and once again began serving as minister. Tommy passed away in June 2005, and at that time, Portis Ribble, who lives in the north part of San Angelo, began working with the congregation. He continues to serve as minister at the current time.

Speakers for the weekend meeting in August will be former full-time ministers. Friday night at 7 pm, Doug Wilks, now living in Corpus Christi will teach, and Saturday night at 7 pm, the speaker will be Leo Copeland of Seminole. At the 10 am Sunday morning services, the sermon will be given by Gene Shelburne of Amarillo, and Sunday afternoon at 1:30 pm, Clyde Dukes of Sonora will be speaking. Leading singing for the weekend services will be Thomas Williams of Granbury, son of former minister, Tommy Williams. Portis Ribble will be acting as "emcee" for all of the planned activities.

Prior to the church services,

a special song service will be held Friday and Saturday evenings at 6 pm and also at 1 pm Sunday.

Following Friday and Saturday night services will be a period of visiting in the fellowship hall at the church building. A meal is planned for Sunday at noon.

This will be a weekend of great rejoicing and festivities, and all family members, friends, and acquaintances of the members of the Northside Church are welcome to any or all of these activities.

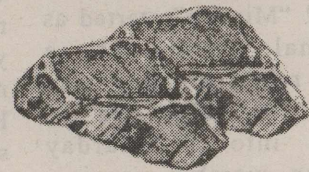

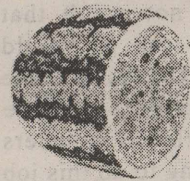

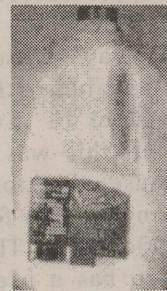

Congratulations, Coke County, you officially have a dive team eleven members strong. The members successfully completed their

qualifying dives on Saturday, Aug. 11 and Sunday, Aug. 12 at Lake Spence. A dive team is not something that most communities think about until after something happens. Coke County and the surrounding areas are lacking for dive teams, so when a problem develops it usually takes several hours or possibly days to get a team to the area. Our community ran into that very problem not so long ago. After that some volunteer members in our CERT team got together and decided to do something about it. That is how the Coke County Dive Team was created.

Community volunteers stepped up when they thought something needed to be done to improve response time and better our community and surrounding areas, and they did it!

Out here in our part of the world we have several lakes, rivers, and stock tanks. Can you imagine losing a family member in one of them? Having a dive team may not save your loved one, but it can help by finding them and giving the family some closure. It's not a job that most people can or would want to do. Thanks to some CERT volunteers, Coke County has eleven members who are willing to do this job for the families of the victims and to better our community and the surrounding areas.

This is where we would like to ask the community to step up and help us make this happen. The volunteers on the dive team have spent several hundred dollars a piece out of their pockets for equipment, but there is still a lot of equipment needed. To make this team successful we need donations or if you would like, you could sponsor one, two, or however many individuals on the team. To suit out one member it will take \$2,200.00. The owner of the Dive Shop in Abilene, TX, Jay Wilson along with Aqualung (the leading distributor of dive equipment), felt this was a worthwhile cause, therefore they are working with us for the best possible prices. The Dive Shop also has a used Air Compressor that they will sell to us for less than half the retail cost. We realize that all this equipment is very

costly but in order to have the dive team, we will have to have it.

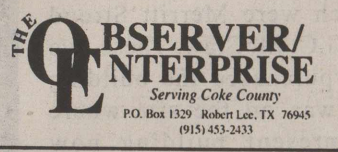

Labor Day Drink, Drive, Go to Jail campaign

As Texans prepare to celebrate the end of summer with Labor Day picnics, barbecues and weekend getaways, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) expects a significant spike in

the number of motorists on Texas roads. With an increase in overall traffic comes an increase in alcohol-related crashes, injuries and fatalities.

TxDOT is sponsoring a paid and earned media campaign to remind Texans: if you drink and drive during the upcoming Labor Day holiday, you are going to jail. TxDOT is partnering with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the Texas Municipal Police Association and local law enforcement organizations statewide to get drunk drivers off the road.

Between August 17 and September 3, thousands of law enforcement officers will be making an extra effort to spot—and stop—drunk drivers on Texas roads and highways.

Here's The Law: 21 Or Older

In Texas the legal limit for intoxication is .08 BAC (blood or breath alcohol concentration). However, drivers can be stopped and cited when impaired regardless of BAC. Drivers and passengers can be fined up to \$500 for having an open alcohol container in a vehicle.

First Offense

- Up to a \$2,000 fine
- Three to 180 days in jail
- Loss of driver's license up to a year

- \$1,000 or \$2,000 annual fee for three years to retain driver's license

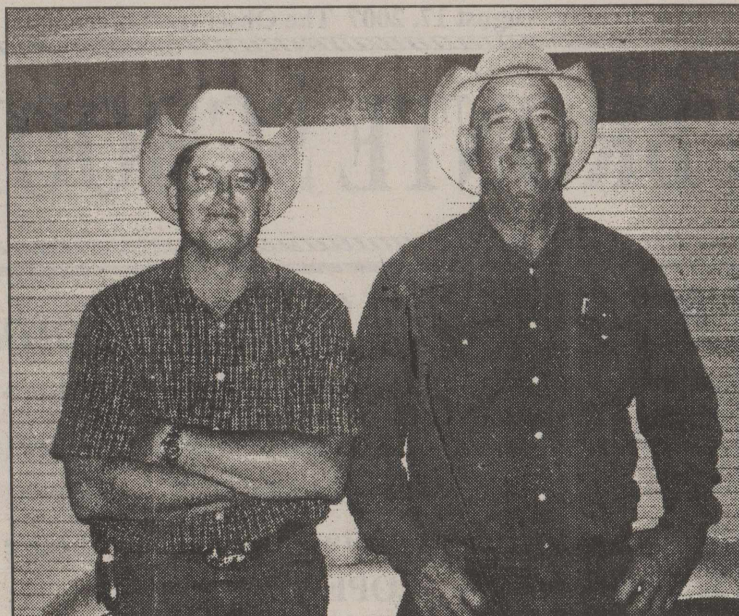
Second Offense

- Up to a \$4,000 fine
- One month to a year in jail

- Loss of driver's license up to two years
- \$1,000, \$1,500, or \$2,000 annual fee for three years to retain driver's license

Third Offense

- Up to a \$10,000 fine
- Two to ten years in prison
- Loss of driver's license

up to two years

- \$1,000, \$1,500, or \$2,000 annual fee for three years to retain driver's license

- After two or more DWI convictions in five years, motorists must install a special ignition switch that prevents their vehicle from being operated if they've been drinking.

DWI With A Child Passenger

Motorists can be charged with child endangerment for driving while intoxicated if they're carrying passengers younger than 15 years old. DWI with a child passenger is a felony and punishable with:

- Up to a \$10,000 fine
- Up to two years in a state jail
- Loss of driver's license for 180 days

Here's The Law: Under 21

It is illegal for minors (under 21) to purchase, attempt to purchase, possess or consume alcohol. It's also against the law for minors to misrepresent their age to obtain alcohol.

Minors in Possession

Here's what happens the first time minors are found in possession of alcohol. Any amount of beer, wine or liquor will trigger the penalties.

- Up to a \$500 fine

- 30-day driver's license suspension
- 8 to 12 hours of community service
- Mandatory alcohol awareness classes

A second or third offense can lead to suspension of the minor's driver's license for 60 to 180 days. Those 17 or older can be fined as much as \$2,000 and go to jail for up to 180 days for a third offense.

Minors Drinking and Driving

It is illegal for minors to drive with any detectable amount of alcohol in their system.

Here's what happens the first time a minor is stopped for drinking and driving:

- Up to a \$500 fine
- 60-day driver's license suspension
- 20 to 40 hours of community service
- Mandatory alcohol awareness classes

Here's what happens to minors 17 and over who are stopped for drinking and driving with a blood or breath alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or greater:

- Up to a \$2,000 fine
- Three to 180 days in jail
- Driver's license suspension for 90 days to a year

Children need healthy meals to learn. (Bronte I.S.D. offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs free, lunch costs PreK-5th \$1.60, 6th-12th \$1.75. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced price is 0 for breakfast and .40 for lunch.

1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete. Be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: High School Principal Michael Bohensky or Elementary Principal Donna Poehls, P.O. Box 670, Bronte, Texas 76933.
2. Who can get free meals? Children in households getting Food Stamps or TANF and most foster children can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Guidelines.
3. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Yes. If you have not been notified of free status under these categories, please call [school, homeless liaison or migrant coordinator] to see if your child(ren) qualify.
4. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced-price limits on the Federal Income Chart, included in this application packet.
5. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reduced-price meals? In most cases no, however read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 473-2511 if you have questions.
6. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please fill out an application.
7. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.
8. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start getting Food Stamps, TANF or other benefits.
9. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Alan Richey P.O. Box 670, Bronte, Texas 76933.
10. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.
11. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include yourself and all people living in your household, related or not (such as children, grandparents, other relatives or friends).
12. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally get \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime pay, include that amount as income. If you do not normally get overtime pay, do not include it as income.
13. We are in the military, do we include our housing allowance as income? If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. All other allowances must be included in your gross income.

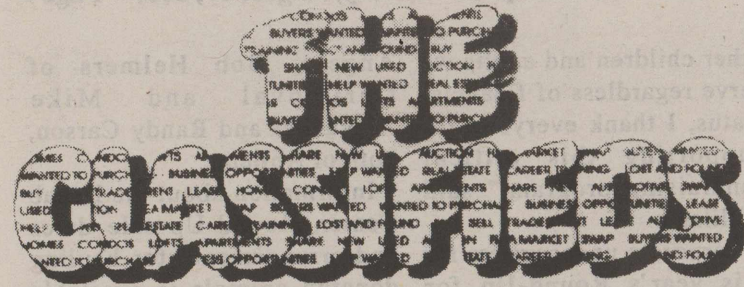

TDA Market Recap August 13, 2007

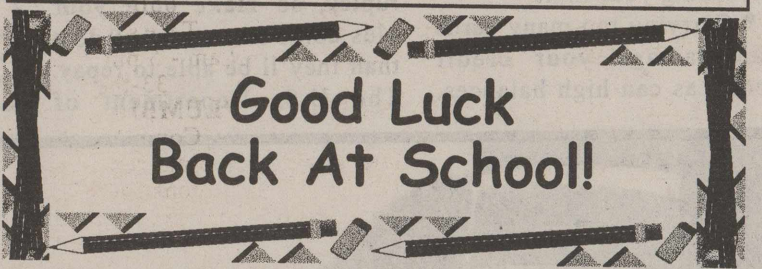
The Texas Department of Agriculture market recap for the week ending August 11, 2007, shows cash feeder cattle prices were up from the previous week with reports of a tighter supply of cattle available for immediate placement in feedlots. Cash fed cattle prices were \$1.00 to \$2.00 lower per hundredweight compared with a week earlier amid declines in beef prices and continued negative packer margins. Texas cash

cotton closed lower than the previous week mostly because of reduced export demand. Grain markets closed the week higher amid increasing demand and expectations for tight global supplies. As for futures markets, feeder cattle, fed cattle and cotton futures closed the week lower while grain futures were higher. Hot, dry weather prevailed over most of the state last week with only widely scattered showers reported in a few areas. The weather helped cotton development and haying operations. Corn and grain sorghum harvest was underway in South and South-Central Texas and beginning in the Blacklands. Corn and peanuts were rated in mostly good to excellent condition while cotton and grain sorghum were rated mostly good to fair. Pastures and ranges remain in good to excellent condition.

The cash prices to the right are market averages for locations covered by the TDA Market News program and do not reflect any particular sale at any specific location. Feeder cattle prices

Give your freshman a crash course in financial fundamentals

If you've got a freshman heading off to college, you're probably scrambling to teach him or her how to cook macaroni and cheese and do laundry without turning everything pink. But there are other important lessons you can share that will have a much longer-lasting effect on their financial future.

Take credit: College students often get deluged with credit card offers. Although opening and using an account responsibly is a good way to build a solid credit history, inexperienced card users sometimes are tempted to buy things they can't really afford - or worse, to rely on their card for recurring expenses like rent and tuition.

Do your child a favor and have frequent, candid discussions about using credit responsibly and the pitfalls of overindulging. Key points to tell them:

* Try to use your card only when confident you can pay off the balance each month. Paying just the minimum due can add years - and significant interest - to your repayment.

* Don't be tempted by free giveaways or low teaser rates, which often rise dramatically after a few months.

* Look for a card with no annual fee and a lengthy grace period before finance charges begin. A good place to comparison shop is www.bankrate.com.

* Investigate other fees, such as those for cash advances, late payments, balance transfers and exceeding your limit.

* Carrying too many cards can damage your credit score, as can high balances.

Try never to owe more than 25 percent of your credit limit on any card.

Another important consideration is the long-term financial consequence - for you and your children - of paying for college. Often, students will owe \$20,000 or much more in loans by the time they graduate and many parents postpone saving for their own retirement to finance college. Consider these points:

* Have your children first attend community college then transfer to a college or university, especially if they haven't yet decided their major.

* Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form each year to see if your kids qualify for any grants, scholarships or other aid (found at www.fafsa.ed.gov.)

* Federally sponsored loans, such as Perkins, Stafford and PLUS (Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students) loans offer the most favorable interest rates and repayment terms but usually don't cover the full cost.

* Private student and parent loans aren't government guaranteed or subsidized and typically carry higher interest rates than federal loans, but they allow you to borrow more. Fees, interest rates and repayment terms vary widely, so be careful when comparing different loans. A good place to start researching is www.finaid.org.

* Students must begin paying off loans once they graduate. Although most federal loans offer a grace period, many private loans do not, so check the paperwork carefully.

* It's virtually impossible to avoid repaying student loans, even through bankruptcy, so make sure your kids don't take on more debt than they'll be able to repay. The U.S. Department of

Labor provides helpful salary data on various professions (www.bls.gov/oes/home.htm.)

* Consider consulting a financial professional for your family's particular situation.

College is a big step toward independence. Just make sure your kids have all the tools they need to ensure a strong financial future.

Back-to-School Tips for Kids

* Work out a safe route to school with your parents. Choose the quickest way with

the fewest street crossings and use intersections with crossing guards. Stay away from parks, vacant lots, fields, and other places where there aren't many people around.

* Whenever possible walk to and from school with a friend, neighbor, brother, or sister. Don't go by yourself.

* Be sure you know your home phone number (including area code) and address, the numbers of your parents at work and of another trusted adult, and how to use 911 for emergencies.

* Never talk to strangers or

accept rides or gifts from strangers. Remember, a stranger is anyone you or your parents don't know well and trust.

* If you bike or skate to school, wear a helmet. And don't forget to lock up your bike with a sturdy lock wherever you leave it.

* If you're home alone after school, check in with a parent or neighbor as soon as you walk in the door.

* Let parents and friends know if you stay late after school. Get permission first if you want to play with a friend instead of going home.
