February Savings Bonds Total \$7,083.00

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes in Callahan county totaled \$7,083.00, according to a report from Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee. The January-February sales totaled \$18,040.00 and 13 percent of the 1968 goal of \$140,000.00 has been achieved.

Texans purchased \$15,461,584 in Savings Bonds during February which is an achievement of 8.4 per cent over the same period of 1967. Year-to-date sales in Texas totaled \$31,804,412 and this is 17 1/2 percent of the state's goal of 185.4 million.

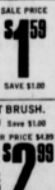
