40,000 feet of wire has been stolen in this are in the past two months. It was estimated that three to four men spent as much as thirty hours each on this case.

The Sheriff shall be a conservator of the Peace in his county, and shall arrest all offenders against the laws of the State, in his view or hearing, and take them before the proper court for examination or trail. (Art. 2.17 CCP)
The Sheriff's Office is responsible for many phases of law enforcement, and therefore is an investigative branch. This office is regulated by State Law and is charged with the duty of enforcing the state laws.
The Sheriff's Office is responsible for the following duties, as stated in the Statutes of the State of Texas.

1. Investigate violations of the laws of all grades and types, within their jurisdiction, gather facts and cifoumstances so the Prosecuting attorney will have them available for the proper prosecution of the case.
2. Maintain accurate records of the cases investigated and their dispostion, and the prisoners processed by this department. 3. Serve and return all warrants issued from Justice of the Peace Courts, County Courts, and the Grand Jury, and to take each defendant before a magistrate for a hearing as provided in the Constitution.
3. Serve and return all civil processes issued by the Justice of the Peace Courts, County Court, and District Court, both local and out of county.

Let's look for a minute at some average cost to move a quarter mile of pipe, fifty can be moved by pulling it with a tractor. With wheels, the pipe can be rolled across thefield, under its own power, so to speak. Some wheel systems have trail-tubes with additional sprinklers so that the system can be moved as far as two-hundred feet at a time instead of fifty. Another type of wheel system pivots at the center and rotates in a circle. This system leaves the corners of the square farm dry, but is still one of the most economical systems available, since it proceeds around its circle without manual labor of any type and is completely mechanized. A forth, and the most elaborate system is known as the solid-set and is composed of enough hand-move pipe to be laid out one time each year, or crop, and is never moved again. Valves are used to switch water from one line to the other.

The cost of skids, has been estimated at a $\$ 1.45$ to move a quarter mile of pipe fifty feet. The cost of the simple wheel syste, $\$ 0.73$. A wheel system, trailing tubes to cover a greater area, $\$ 2.83$. The rotating circle system, $\$ 1.71$. All these figurestake into consideration the inital cost, depreciation, based upon manufactors estiof life, fuel cost, labor cost, and includs tractor fuel ets. This estimate is based upon each quarter mile of pipe, or equivilent, watering forty acres of land every twelve and one-half days and repeating the process six times each year. The figures can be reduced, or increased, by watering more times, or less timest and can be completely reversed by double cropping, or growing more than one crop on the same land, in any one year. In this process, the most expensive system can become the most economical becasue it is utilized for a great er length of time each year and its cost per move decreased. The old cost of handmove was in the vacinity of $\$ 1.00$. Perhaps, there will come a time when labor is once again available, but it is doubtful.

With the increased cost of mechanization, it is now necessary to vary the types of crops, and plan the entire farming operation around the method of moving irrigation pipe. In diher words, you choose a method of moving pipefirst, and decide what crop to plant second. In Gaines County, every conceivable type of system known to man is being employed. Some are used that have as yet to be conceived. They just happen by accident. The Gaines County Farm $x$ must be a wizard at agromony, finade. meteorology, engineering ingenuity, and work harder than any other proffession. He must be inventive, practical, bold, and far-sighted. He handles more money per capita than ninety-percent of other business ventures, and gambles everything he owns on each crop grown. All of the water systems, feritlizer application, new methods

5. Maintain and operate radio communication for local and surrounding agencies. Tellphone for the Sheriff's Office, The Police Dept., The Texas Highway Patrol, and a direct line for the Seagraves and Loop area, are answered by the radio operators. A radio operator is on duty 24 hours a day, therefore the telephones are answered anytime day or night, and the proper agency and unit dispatched immediately.
6. To keep safely all prisoners committed to Jail by the proper court. Each prisoner commilted to jail becomes the responsibility of the Sheriff's Office no matter what agency picks them up. The fail is the responsibility of the Sheriffts Office.
7. Maintain close cooperation with all other law enforcement agencies, the district attornev, county attorney and the courts so that justice may be obtained. This office works very closely with the FBI and surrounding counties, so that assistance may be available at all times in cases where it is needed. 8. To furnish a bailiff for the courts when they are in session, and the Grand Jury at the time it convenes.
8. To notify all jurors selected by the Jury Commission, and at the direction of the proper court. To notify and serve all subpoenas on all witnesses summoned by the Grand Jury or any of the courts.
9. To constantly study the state laws and the Supreme Court decisions to better propare cases for the protection of the citizens of Gaines County and the State of Texas and to afford a fair trial to each defendant. The traffic control and accidents are investigated by the City Police Depts. within the the city limits, and by the Texas Highway Patrol within the county and state. The sheriff's office is an assisting agency in traffic when needed and requested.
It is the desire of this department to serve the citizens of Gaines County, and therefore the support of each citizen is solicited. Each citizen can aid law enforcement by reporting violations of which they have knowledge, as well as taking an active part as witnesses and jurors, Crime can be held to minimum in Gaines County with the solid support of the local citizens.

Gentleman:
I am Joe Seagler, Manager of the Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce...I would like to thank you for the opportunity to appear before you regarding a joint effort by Semiole, Tezas; Hobbs and Carlsbad, New Mexico to improve Highway 62 and 180 to El Paso, Texas.
The Texas Highway Commission has assured us the twenty nine miles from Seminole to the State Line should be a four lane divided highway and they are working on the proposal now. The engineers are already surveying this route. The Highway Commission has asked the Gaines County Commissioners Court to secure the needed right-of-way. The divided highway is very necessary to our county because of the increased tourist and farm traffic in the spring and fall. Our Texas survey shows the average traffic court for 1966, over a twenty four hour per jod, one mile east of the State Line was 2900 cars. Oil and Gas Production in Gaines County is more than 90 million dollars annually Our agriculture gross for ' 66 was 30 to 35 million dollars. we have approval of ICC for the Permian Basin Railroad, which is another economic boost for our county. With these flgures in mind you can see why we are interested in a four lane divided highway from Seminole to Hobbs, New Mexico our good neighbor on the west. ## 78-Mile W Texas Rail Line Given OK by ICC

 IS THE FAULT OF THE GENERATION BEFORE US AND WILL HAVE TO BE CORRECTED BYWASHINGTON - (P) - An application for construction of a $\$ 10$ million, 78 -mile railroad between Odessa and Seagraves in West Texas gained approval Friday from the Interstate Commerce Commission.
It was the first application for a new line in years.
CONSTRUCTION IS to begin by April 1, 1968, and to be fin-
ished within two yers ished within two years.
The line will connect at Odessa with the Texas \& Pacific and at Seagraves with the Santa Fe .
The intermediate towns of Andrews and Seminole also would be served.
To be named the Permian Basin Railroad, the trackage would be built according to specifications for freight trains only.
THE ICC said the railroad anticipates revenues during the first year of operation of $\$ 1,516,343$, operating expenses of $\$ 981,665$ and railway operating income of $\$ 534,623$. The company estimates 5 per cent increases each year for the first five years.

Interests protesting construc tion of the railroad estimated the line would produce a net loss of $\$ 159,037$ in railway oplosses increasing to 197 by the fifth year $y$ the fifth year.
The company figures the greatest amounts of its freight will consist of iron ore, coarse grain, sugar beets petroleum products. But it figures on carrying everything from peanuts to volcanic cinders and mud. see Notey
