Editorial —— The Tax Story

It is a good feeling to have people tell you something nice. There are probably very few Seminole people who have not been told by someone from another place--"Seminole is where the schools are so good," or, "isn't that the town that's known all over the state for its excellent schools?" People far and near know about our good school system. This reputation did not come about by accident. There were many who cared--dedicated teachers, devoted parents and citizens, conscientious administrators, concerned tax paying institutions and interested school board members.

How lucky we have been to have lived in Gaines County, and to pay taxes in Gaines County. We can take our hats off and say "thanks" to the oil companies and the utility companies. They pay 95 per cent of all school taxes in our County. Be thankful that you live in a County where there is a lot of industry paying taxes. The tax story would be different one if we lived in a majority of Texas counties.

The maximum maintenance tax rate that was allowed by law for a Common School District (such as Seminole) was \$1.50 on each \$100.00 evaluation. With the passage of Bill #1123 that amount was increased to \$2.25. The Seminole rate is still \$1.50. It should be remembered that property is not evaluated at what you paid for it, or what it would sell for, but it is evaluated at about 10 to 15 per cent of its real value. The only way this tax can be raised is by an election by the people--and if a majority of the qualified voters (who are tax payers) approve the increase. The school board has asked the Commissioners Court to call an elec-


MAINTENANCE TAX RATE ELECTION SET FOR JUNE 17th

At the regular Commissioner's Court Meeting, Monday, May 22, the Commissioners set the date, June 17, for the Maintenance Tax Rate Election.

Absentee voting will begin May 29, and end June 13th. The absentee ballots may be secured from Chester Browne at the County Clerk's office. If you should write in for a ballott, it will be necessary to include your registration number.

In order to be a qualified voter, you must be a property owner and a registered voter.

In previous years, an increase in taxes was not necessary because in 1960-1961, assessed valuations climbed to \$63,766,200. 00. Last year it dropped to \$62,057,340.00-this difference resulting from oil production decreases. During this time we have all felt the effects of increased price of goods and general inflation of 3 per cent per year. We have lost 20 per cent of our collected taxes to inflation in the last 6 to 7 years.

The school board has asked for a needed and reasonable tax increase. Let's all do our part in keeping abreast of the times and with other schools in our area. We feel the Board is justified in this request.

Ginner:

The Farmer Programs Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C. has just issued approval to the State ASCS office on the ACP practice for application of cotton burs in all Texas counties. W. Lewis David, executive director of the State ASCS, said counties desiring to use the practice should add it to their county program by sup-. plementation in the regular manner.

Here's the instruction all county ASCS offices have received for supplement 2 to the Texas Handbook for the 1967 Agricultural Conservation Program:

The 1967 Agricultural Conservation Program for Texas is amended as follows:

Section 10. The following practice has been added:

E-4. Application of cotton burs as a mulch to control wind and water erosion and to improve soil structure and permeability. Federal cost-shares will be limited to cotton burs hauled onto and evenly distributed upon the land at the rate of not less than xix tons per acre--heavier applications are recommended. Cotton burs must not be turned under until after March 31 in Wilbarger, Baylor, Haskell, Jones, Taylor, Runnels, Concho, Tom Green, Irion, Reagan, Upton, Crane, Ward, Reeves, and Loving counties and counties north of these counties.

<u>Federal cost-share</u>: 50 per cent of the cost of cotton burs spread on the land, not to exceed 75 cents per ton or \$6.00 per acre.


Make sure your producers check with the county ASCS office for complete details before delivering burs to farms under terms of the practice.

Mass Water Meeting Set

MASS WATER MEETING MAY 24 -- History in the making, literally. 2:00 p.m., KoKo Palace, Lubbock. Don't miss it. If you live is this area, you're invited.

Association called WATER, Inc., will be organized -- the first step toward an ample supply of water on the Plains for irrigation of 18 million acres (compared to 5 1/2 million under irrigation now), for cities, for industry, for recreation.

IT CAN BE DONE! Engineers say so. Economists say so. Government says so. All we've got to do is show the state and the nation WE WANT THE WATER. Show them by organizing and working for it. It's not enough to just "say" we want it and wait for somebody to bring it to us.

Charter and By-Laws for Water, Inc., are drawn. They'll be explained to you at the May 24 meeting and you'll be asked to approve them, then elect directors.

Some engineering studies have already been made. Others are in progress. A representative of al major engineering firm will report on these. An official of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation will tell you what the Bureau has done and plans to do towards importing water to this area. The U.S. Corps of Engineers will send a man to do the same. A member of the Texas Water Development Board will be on hand to explain that group's part in the project, and it's a substantial part. And, so far as possible within the limits of man's imagination, there will be an analysis of the economic impact that can be expected on the area. It's almost impossible not to get excited about the Plains potential when water is imported. Gross annual income from agriculture alone should triple from an average of about \$500,000,000 to at least \$1,500,000,000. That's not allowing for any technical advancements, increased demand for agricultural products or any of the other improvements that are a reasonable certainty. A jump in land values can be expected long before the water gets here-- in fact the minute it becomes known a contract for the water will be signed, and that could be in a very few years if things progress according to plan.

Growers in the counties which previously did not approve transfers of cotton acreage allotments will vote from May 15 thourgh May 19 on wheter to permit the transfer of acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two-third of the growers voting favor the transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer their allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within the same State. Where approved, transfer of allotments to other counties for 1968 and 1969 will be permitted.

Counties which have already approved the transfer are not involved in the vote.

The Referendum will be held by mail vote. To be counted, all votes should be in the office of the county ASC committee before the close of business on May 19 or be postmarked by midnight May 19. Experts are saying the possibility is for 3 to 5 million acre feet annually within about 10 years, then 15 to 18 million acre feet (from out of state) in about 20 years. Our guess is that power supply breakthroughs, engineering developments and the cry of the world for food could well set the latter part of that timetable up by several years.

School Board

Your Board of Trustees of the Seminole Common Consolidated School District has voted unani mously to request an election under House Bill #1123 for a school maintenance tax rate not to exceed \$2.00 per one-hundred dollars assessed valuation. Presently, your school district is operating on a local maintenance tax rate of \$1.50 per one-hundred dollars assessed valuation which is the maximum under the present law.

The decision to request the tax election came after the Board tentatively approved a budget for the 1967-68 school year that showed a deficit of \$25,350.00. This figure does not reflect anticipated professional salary increases now being debated in the Texas Legislature, nor does it include proposed salary increases for local auxiliary personnel, or for a few other services which your Board feels that you as patrons want for your children. Salary increases and these services could cost an additional \$125,000.00.

Since the present maximum rate of \$1.50 per one-hundred dollars assessed valuation will not provide sufficient funds for these needs, your Board of Trustees feels that it is necessary to call for an election under House Bill #1123. This Bill grants a common School district, meeting certain qualifications, the authority to call an election to raise a maintenance tax rate to a maximum of \$2.25 per onehundred dollars in assessed valuation. Your Board is asking for an election for a 50¢ increase which will make the maximum tax rate \$2.00 per one-hundred dollars of assessed valuation. We feel this will be sufficient to take care of the district for a three to five year period. It is estimated that an additional 21¢ per one-hundred dollars assessed valuation would be sufficient to meet the requirements of the school budget for 1967-68. This would leave 29¢ of the 50¢ for use in future years.

It will be difficult if not impossible to continue to operate and provide a school of high quality with the financial resources now present for your Board to use. We know that you want quality education for your children and that you are willing to provide the financial support necessary when you are shown the need. Also, your Board will always budget in such a manner that if you were present at these meetings, we feel sure that your decision would be the same.

Another reason why a tax increase is necessary at this time in order to continue to give you a first rate school is that for many years county values had a sizable increase each year; for example, they increased from \$41,-294;230 in 1953 to \$63,766,200 in 1960 for

property within the Seminole District. However, since 1960, these values have actually decreased from the \$63,766,200 for that year to \$62,221,550 for the 1966-67 school year. As a result, the rate has had to be increased each year until the lawful ceiling has been reached. Also, all of us are aware of the inflationary condition in the U.S. and the increase in the cost of living.

The Seminole Common Consolidated School District is very fortunate in that 95 per cent of the school tax roll is paid by the oil and utility companies leaving only 5 per cent for the local citizenry. The assessed value of property in the school district is supposedly 10 per cent of its actual value. As an example, we would like to list below what the requested increase in taxes would cost you depending upon your present school tax bill:



He was killed about 5:10 p.m. on Tuesday, May 16th, eight miles east of Shamrock. Officers reported that apparently he was hit after a car had passed another car and was pulling back in the right lane of traffic, failing to see Johnson.

His goal, when leaving Seminole was the state of Maine, and doing some commercial fishing.

HOUSING STUDIED **BY GROUP**

A group of interested citizens met in the Chamber of Commerce office Tuesday afternoon to discuss farm labor housing. The discussion also included federal loans and grants available for this type housing.

Loans are available to individual farmers or groups, such as a labor association. The housing can be built anywhere as long as it is used for agricultural labor and provided there is a need for such labor.

The purpose of this housing is to provide low rent that people can afford to pay. Payments on the property can be as long as 33 years at 5 per cent, or the useful life of the house, which ever is less. Grants can run as high as 50 per cent. If a grant is involved, the laborers occupying the housing can work anywhere as long as it is in farm labor.

If a house is owned by a farmer and businessman, the laborer can be required to work on a member farm.

The farmers home administrator does not say how much a farm laborer is to be paid. It is necessary for the group to make a survey to determine how many farm laborers are used per month, and how many houses would be needed for labor is important at this time.

The amount of the loan or grants available from the government is based on the need of the committee. It was stated that it would take possibly 7 to 8 months to get a loan and (or) grant. It took 13 months at Dimmit, Texas.. The project at Dimmit for 196 units cost \$960,000.00. Of that amount 1/3 was granted, 2/3 loaned, and the citizens paid approximately one per cent. If you desire futher imformation, contact the Seminole area Chamber of Commerce.
