

WHERE DOES TEXAS
COTTON GO?

The cotton produced in Texas moves from the grower into the cotton merchandising system or into the Commodity Credit Corporation and then into the trade channels enroute to spinners. The merchandising system is composed of mill buyers, brokers and shippers. The shippers, who are the most numerous and handle the largest volume of the cotton going through the merchandising system, are those firms which buy in "odd lots" (Mixed grade and staple) and sell in "even-running lots" (same grade and staple). These shippers sell to spinners all over the world. It is these Texas Cotton shippers that are reporting to Cotton Economic Research where Texas cotton is being sold. Not only is the trade interested in knowing where Texas cotton sells, but also the kind (grade and staple) that was used.

During the 1966-67 season, the shippers were asked to indicate their sales on a quarter ly basis to specific outlets including the grade and staple of the shipment. It was found that during the first quarter, 45 percent of the cotton going to the domestic outlets from Texas shippers was Texas growths, and the remainder was growths from other states. In the second quarter, this percentage of Texas growths shipped to domestic outlets increased to 48 percent. On cottons going to foreign outlets in the first quarter, 64 percent was Texas growths, and this percentage increased to 82 percent in the second quarter of the 1966-67 season.

Since the 1966-67 season runs from August 1, 1966 through July 31, 1967, the final report will not be completed and available until about November 1967 as time will be required to tabulate and correlate the data and prepare the fi-

- (Q) Some of my red sable brushes that I use in oil painting get so fuzzy after I use them for a while. What can I do to stop them from becoming fuzzy?
- (A) Dip the brush in a solution of half glycerin, half water. Wipe it across the palm of your hand carfully and softly to remove the excess and to bring the hairs to a fine edge or point. Stand in a jar overnight (bristle end up, of course). The next morning should find them in perfect shape. It is not necessary to wash out the glycerin before painting.
- (Q) How much does it cost to start oil painting?
- (A) It depends on the size tubes of paint that you buy. In most cases it will cost about \$17.50.
- (Q) Can you tell me a good varnish to use on oil paintings?
- (A) The best varnish that I have found is Damar Varnish. Some of the other varnish will make an oil painting turn a yellow color in time.
- (O) How does one judge the so-called Pop Art?
- (A) To evaluate to socalled Pop Art , one must look at it from a standpoint of Design, Form, and Color.

INSECTS ON ORNAMENTAL PLANTS

Many ornamental plants, particularly roses, in Gaines County are heavily infested with ophids, County Agent Calvin Holcomb reports.

Holcomb adds if large numbers of aphids are feeding on a plar its beauty is greatly marred —it becomes devitalized, and may die.

Aphids, commonly known as plant lice, are small, soft-bodied, pearshaped insects. Cornicle, a pair of small tubes projecting from the back of the body, provide positive identification. Aphids are usually 1/25 to 1/8 inch long and vary in color from light yellow to green or black.

The plant lice are destructive in that they insert their short, stout beak into the plant and suck up vital plant juices. When large numbers are present, the plants are greatly devitalized, and the leaves become curled, cupped or distorted.


When the flower buds of roses fail to develop properly, the aphids are feeding on the growing tips and flower buds of the plant.

Aphids can be controlled by treating the affected plants with Sevin, Diazima Cygon, lindane, malathion nicotine sulfate, or with a new granular systemic, disulfoton. Disulfoton is being marketed under various trade names.

In using any insecticide be sure to read the label carefully and follow directions, Holcomb warns.

For further information the bulletin, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants," L-19 is available in your county agricultural agent's office.







Foreign Markets, he adds, take the output of about 5.5 million harvested acres in Texas, or about one of every four harvested.

HOLCOMB ANNOUNCES FIELD DAY HIGHLIGHTS

The production of this area's major cash crops and the use of herbicides will be highlighted at the annual field day at the South Plains Research and Extension Center to be held Tuesday, September 12 from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m., announces County Agricultural Agent Calvin D. Holcomb.

The event, which is open to the public, traditionally attracts a large crowd of farmers and businessmen. The center is located seven and one-half miles north of Lubbock on U.S. 87.

Information on such crops as cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, castor, rapeseed and guar will be presented, says Holcomb. Adaptability tests of various varieties, breeding research and cultural practices will be discussed.

"Do's and "Don't's" concerning the use of present-day herbicides will receive major emphasis at the field day, points out the agent, since numerous weed control problems have arisen this year.

A greenhouse display is also planned for the event. This is one of the best educational $0 p^{-1}$ portunities of the field day, says Holcomb because it gives producers a chance to learn the symtoms of various plant diseases and other plant disorders. Spotlighted at this year's display will be grain sorghum and cotton diseases.

Another attraction at the field day will be a large machinery exhibit. The latest planting and harvesting equipment developed by researchers at the center will be on display as well as machinery exhibited by commercial companies.

An additional highlight at the field day will be a farm management display with specific reference to the South Plains Development program (SPD). Management has received much emphasis in this program, points out Holcomb and plays a tremendous role in the overall economic growth and development of this area.

In addition to touring test plots and displays, visitors will also be invited to take a look at the newly expanded center which now houses the District 2 Extension Office and nine Extension subject-matter area specialists. Additional laborator space and facilities have also been provided.

Holcomb invites everyone in the county who is interested in agriculture to mark the date, September 12, on his calendar and to make plans now to attend the field day.

SOCIAL SECURITY COVERAGE

NEEDED FOR MEDICARE

IN 1968

Some persons reaching age 65 in 1968 or late will need to have worked under social security in order to be eligible for hospital insurance under the Medicare program, according to H. P. Thomas, District Manager of the Odessa Social Office.

Under the present law there is no work requirement for persons who reach age 65 through 1967. Also, this provision will not apply to beneficiaries entitled to cash benefits on another person's account. This means that a beneficiary receiving cash payments as a wife, widow, or dependent husband or parent will not need to meet this requirement. Those who will not be eligible for cash benefits will need to have worked three calendar quarters for each year that elapsed after 1965 and before the attainment on age 65. Thus, a person who will be 65 in 1968 will need six quarters (1½ years) of work under social security to meet this requirement. Persons reaching 65 in 1969 will need nine quarters (2¼ years) of work to be eligible.

Thomas emphasized that there will continue to be no work requirement connected to the medical insurance program. With few exceptions, anyone attaining 65 may sign up for the doctor bill insurance. Those persons who are over age 65 and who

failed to enroll will have another opportunity during the fourth quarter of 1967.




