Editoria

In a special city council meeting Monday night, the city sales tax was discussed at length. The city council is asking the registered voters of Seminole to vote for the sales tax so that streets can be repaired and additional work done on the water system. It was stated that an engineer had reported our streets need \$45,000 worth of work now. Also water continues to be a problem to Seminole like it is in nearly every other town.

Let's face the reality of the constant rise in prices, salaries, and inflation. On a national scope, inflation will average 2 to 3% admitted. This writer believes more like 4 or 5%. It would be foolhardily for any of us to not admit that it cost more to live today than it did five years ago or three years ago. It takes more money to run the school, the city, the county, etc.

A sales tax will be spread over every segment of the economy. Everyone will pay some. It is reported that a family of four making \$5000 income a year will spend \$15 to \$20 a year in sales taxes, one making \$7500 income a year will spend \$20 to \$25 a year, and one making \$10,000 income a year will spend \$25 to \$30 a year.

The one per cent sales tax will be collected only on the items that the two per cent state sales tax is on today. It will be collected exactly in the same way - - sent to the state and they will send it back to the city. The State Comptroller's office will charge two per cent for collection and handling or two cents out of each dollar.

Of eighteen cities and towns that have voted on the sales tax, Electra is the only one that defeated it. By the first of the year, there will be at least one hundred other towns in Texas that will vote. Included in those towns about the size of Seminole are: Wharton, River Oaks, Lockhart, Lake Worth, Grapevine, Georgetown, Forest Hill, Breckenridge, and Alpine.

Some of the questions that might be asked are: Q. What items are subject to the 1% municipal sales

Visitors Honored





With Cotton

The John Hobbs farm is three miles west of Seminole. The cotton stripper is working in Paymaster III that was watered three times. He fertilized the ground with 70 units of nitrogen and 60 units of phosphorus. It had had shed leaf used on it to drop the leaves. His lint turnout was 25. 5%. He is ginning two 500-pound bales plus per acre. His machine was doing a good job.

Norciso Contreras is running the machine on the John Hobbs farm.

Note the basket on the trailer which has become a necessity in the past two or three years because of shortage of field hands. A two-row machine will pull from ten to twenty bales of cotton a day depending on how early they can get started in the morning and the density of the cotton.

Picture No. 1 shows a trailer loaded with cotton. No. 2 shows a close up of a stripper. No. 3: Note how good a job the stripper is doing.



WACO--(Spl)--Fi nal 1967 membership tabulation shows Texas Farm Bureau now has 105, 653 member families, according to Wayne Little, TFB organization field services director.

Farm Bureau gained 4,727 member families during the past membership year which ended Oct. 31. It has doubled its membership in the last fifteen years, having gained each of the fifteen years.

Nine of every 10 Texas farmers and rancers who belong to a general farm organization are members of Texas Farm Bureau, Little said.

There are 203 organized counties in the Texas Farm Bureau. The organization is supported by voluntary dues-paying members. Dues vary by county; the average is about \$10-\$12.







Named as headhunters were Wendell Miller and Frankie Calderon and all of the defensive team.


We don't know who was happiest over this win, the boys or the coaches!



There are several interesting things about the picture - where No. 4 and No. 5 were - the NEWS has been unable to find out. Notice the oblong cleats on the front and bottom of the football shoes. Note the long stockings on No. 8. Most everyone in those days played barelegged. You can tell by looking at this crew that they did not have a safe turf of grass to fall upon, but were used to sand, grass burs, and hard knocks.

"That was during the time when Seminole did not have too much money. We were lucky to have uniforms much less numbers on them. Our record was about 8 - 2 in 1935. Andrews was the team to beat in our day also. I remember one time when we went to Brownfield for a scrimmage practice. We were to practice against their second team. Their coach asked our coach if it would be all right for their first string to make a few plays against us. (Their coach thought it would be a runaway.) We scrimmaged for about forty-five minutes or an hour. He never put in his second team. Their first team never scored. We scored four or five times."

"Laundering in those days was a real problem the school did not have the facilities, the mamas did not like to, and it was difficult to take it home to get it done. I can hear that coach now as he tries to get them to clean up their uniforms."



- A. Reports and remittances will be made to the State Comptroller in Austin.
- Q. Who will enforce the municipal sales tax?

 A. The State Comptroller is authorized by law to administer and enforce the local sales tax.

Long Distance Telephone Rates Go Down

Texas telephone users will share in a nationwide \$100 million interstate long distance rate reduction effective November 1. The new rates were filed with the Federal Communications Commission by the Bell System last month.

Telephone users will benefit three ways under the new rates.:

 Lower charges on many calls.
 Longer "time periods" and added days (Saturdays and certain holidays) when low rates apply.
3. A new "midnight to 7" special dial rate with a 75-cent

maximum charge for a three minute call within the continental

The total package features major reductions but has small increases for some interstate calls under 24 miles. Overall, it provides a savings to customers of \$100 min on.

Intrastate calls (those within the state) are not affected by the

The new rates represent the 22nd major cost reduction since coast-to-coast service began in 1915. That first year, a call between New York and San Francisco cost \$20.70. Reductions followed, and by 1940 the day rate was \$4. The dramatic \$1 night rate came in 1963 for calls "after 9", followed in 1965 by "after 8". In this 52-year period, the consumer price index has tripled, but the lowest rate for a transcontinental call is now less than 1/20 of the 1915 level.

Here is a run-down of the new charges:

The 8 1/2 hour span of the present night rate will be extended to 12 hours. To be named "after 7 and weekend," it will extend from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. each weekday, plus all day both Saturday and Sunday. At the longest distance, the rate is \$1 for a threeminute station-to-station call.

The "after 7 and weekend" rate also will apply all day on Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's Day, July 4th, and Labor Day. The effect in 1968 will be 109 days — Saturdays, Sundays and holidays -when the "after 7 and weekend" rate applies during the

The present evening rate period will begin an hour earlier, becoming 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. each weekday and will be named "after 5." The rate for maximum distance will be lowered from \$1.50 to \$1.25 for the first three minutes of a station-to-station call.

Daytime station rates beyond 468 miles will be lowered and the maximum for a call across the country will drop from \$2.00 to \$1.75 for the first three minutes. The new "weekday" station

rates will apply from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A new "midnight to 7" special dial rate will be introduced across the country (beyond 354 miles). The rate will apply from midnight to 7 a.m., seven days a weei, for three-minute station-to-station Direct Distance Dial calls (dialed by the customer) from non-coin phones, or station-to-station calls where DDD is not available. Credit card, collect, or other calls needing operator essistance will not be included. ator assistance will not be included.

Person-to-person rates will also be lowered. The maximum daytime rate for three minutes will drop from \$3.50 to \$3.30. After 5 p.m., the maximum will be reduced from \$3.00 to \$2.85 for the first three minutes.

Other reduced rates will include lowered WATS (Wide Area Telephone Service) rates, and reductions on some overseas ser-

Included are rate increases for some interstate calls from 0 to 24 miles. None of these increases will be more than 5-cents for the initial period. These increases are needed to improve the relationship between costs and charges for short-distance telephone calls, a problem common to both the Bell System and the independent telephone companies.





Farmers Union

The newly announced program is intended to ducers to divert at least 10 million acres more than in 1967 by giving them the option to divert up to 50 percent of their base acreage. The 20 percent mandatory diversion continues in effect in 1968, but payments at a rate of 45 percent of the total support times the farmers projected yield will be paid for farmers electing to divert up to 50 per cent of their base. The price support at \$1.05 per bushel on corn and \$1.61 a hundred on grain sorghum remains the same as in 1967, and the mandatory 20% diversion continues as during last year.


"With production payments (30 cents per bushel for corn and 53 cents a hundred on grain sorghum) continuing at 1967's higher level along with the restored diver sion payments, farmers income will increase some \$400 million over 1967 if there is sufficient participation in the program. Most Texas farm ers will find it profitable to divert more acres in 1968, which should result in better markets in the coming year.




