COTTON HARVEST

OVER 1,000,000 BALES

The South Plains cotton harvest passed the million bale mark this week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA. The cotton harvest was 95 per cent complete in the Seminole area and the Brownfield Office closed on Friday, December 22nd, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the Brownfield Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Samples from 1, 005, 000 bales of cotton had been received and classed by the three area classing offices through Friday, December 22nd.

Through Friday the Lubbock Office had classed 769, 000 samples of this year's crop, the Brownfield Office 160, 000 and the Lamesa Office 76, 000. This brought the total classed this season at the three offices to 1,005,000.

The seasonal classing office at Brownfield closed Fricay and samples remaining to be classed from that area will be classed at Lubbock.

Spotted and Tinged cotton continued to increase as the harvest neared completion. Light Spotted, Spotted and Tinged cotton made up 80 per cent of all cotton classed at the Lubbock Office last week.

Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 28 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 17 per cent, Middling Spotted 19 per cent, Strict Low Middling Spotted 8 per cent and all Tinged grades 5 per cent.

Staple length improved slightly and averaged 31/32. Seven per cent of all cotton classed at Lubbock last week was 29/32, 36 per cent 15/16, 25 per cent 31/32 and 32 per cent stapled 1-Inch and longer.

Twenty-one per cent of the cotton had a micronaire miles south of Seminole. of 2.6 and below, 24 per cent "miked" 2.7 through 2.9, 24 per cent was 3.0 through 3.2, 11 per cent 3.3 and 3.4 and 20 per cent was 3.5 and better.


Cotton prices, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, were lower for cotton in all micronaire categories. Cotton with micronaire of 3.2 and below was generally selling at \$2.50 to \$10.00 per bale over the loan.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 19.70, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 22.35, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 -19.85, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 22.60, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 18.90, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 21.55, Middling Spotted 15/16 - 17.75 and Middling Spotted 31/32 -

Cottonseed prices ranged from \$55 to \$73 per ton at the gins. Average price was \$60 per ton.

PROTECTION of SMALL

WATER SUPPLIES

Suitable water for drinking purposes seldom occurs in nature. Rain and snow waters become contaminated quickly by dust, insects, animals and man. Some of the organisms introduced into water by these means cause typhoid fever, paratyphoid fever, bacillary and amoebic dysentery. The organisms causing these diseases are excreted in human discharges and if defective excreta disposal methods or a lack of safeguards around the water source allow the organisms to reach water supplies, human illness will result.

In order that we may free ourselves of these dread diseases, certain safeguards must be provided. We cannot depend on the physical appearance of water as a measure of safety, for it is possible that clear and sparkling waters may be unsafe. For complete satisfaction, the water supply should be safe, pleasant to taste, clear and free of gases and minerals that impart disagreeable odors. Too, a good water supply is one that is adequate for needs, dependable and convenient. A minimum of approximately 50 gallons of water per person per day are required in those homes with complete plumbing facilities. In homes not equipped with plumbing, the water demand may decrease to about 10 gallons per person per day. Of course, if stock or irrigation water is to be provided from the household supply, additional allowances must be made.

In this area particularly all of our water is obtained from wells usually from 100 - 150 feet deep. Water thus obtained is usually more often free from bacteria than from other sources; however, the mineral content on underground water is usually very high. Much of our water approaches the upper limit of 500 parts per million as recommended by the U. S. Public Health Service.

Our water has a very hard content with an excess of calcium, sulphate, and bicarbonates. Our fluoride content is usually over twice the recommended level of 1.5 parts per million. This well causes brown staining on teeth. In addition we have had wells that have been contaminated with salt water, sulfur, water, oil, and gas.

Underground water is usually safer than other sources. Tests show that we are finding more and more wells that are contaminated. Mr. Bruce, the State Water Engineer at Lubbock, said that in making a survey of privately owned wells in Lubbock County, seventy per cent were to be contaminated. Our records show that we test from fifteen to twenty wells a month with about forty-five per cent showing contamination. A great many wells are known to be bad before we test them and often we have to treat them four or five times before we clean them up. As a whole in this county, there are about twenty to thirty per cent contaminated. We can expect a higher per-

1. Select an in-side sampling tap which is in such a condition that leaking of water around the turn key does not occur. The out-let should not have threads for connection of water hoses, etc. The location of the tap should also be relatively free from dustborne contamination. The tap should be selected at a point where a representative water sample can be obtain-

2. Flame tap for 1/2 minute with a torch made of wire and cotton soaked in rubbing alcohol.

3. Flush the sampling faucet throughly to remove stagnant water from the supply line, allowing the water to run for at least one minute.

4. While the bottle is being filled, hold cap through hood wrapper, usually provided by the laboratory. Do not allow the fingers or any other object to come in contact with either the cap or the lip of the bottle.

5. Complete the sample-identification-analysis report card, giving all information requested by the laboratoryperforming the examination.

6. Put bottle in refrigerator until you can send or bring it to the health office.


