



Dr. Tilden B. Armstrong has moved to Seminole to become the new pastor of First United Methodist Church. He moved from Abilene, Texas where he was pastor of the First United Methodist Church for 3 years.

He has also held pastorates in Follett, Roby, Throckmorton, Floydada, and Andrews. He has been Superintendent of the Pampa and Abilene Districts.

Dr. Armstrong has served in many capacities where he has lived and in churches where he has worked, from teacher to Scoutmaster, preacher, ordained deacon and ordained elder. He received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from McMurry College in 1960.

ONE PUBLIC MEETING ATTENDED DEAD, ONE INJURED

At approximately 3:50 p. m. Monday a 1966 Ford Fordor, driven by David Burnett, went out of control just north of Sea-graves and travelled 925 feet before coming to a final resting place. Both Burnett and James W. Burney were transferred to a hospital in Lubbock in serious condition.

As the car approached the curve at the railroad crossing, it left the highway on the right hand side, travelling south, knocked out three guard posts, came back on the highway, and travelled 463 feet (partially side-

ways) before it left the highway on the east side.

The injured Burney was lying 63 feet from the auto. Burnett was partially outside the car. Both men were in serious condition. Both were reported between the ages of 45 and 50 and from Brownfield.

James Johns, highway patrolman from Brownfield worked the accident.

LATE REPORT -

James W. Burney passed away Tuesday morning. Burnett received a broken neck and is in critical condition.

BOY DROWNS

David Richard Quisenberry, age 4, was pronounced dead late Tuesday afternoon after falling into a swimming pool at the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Quisenberry, 609 SW 17th.

He was born December 25, 1964 at Ft. Dix, New Jersey. His father is manager of the Tower and Chief Theaters in Seminole.

Services will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday in the Ave. B Church of Christ with Mr. Tom Coffee officiating. Burial will be in the Gaines County Memorial Cemetery.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Quisenberry; a brother, Larry Dale, and a sister, Marsha Renee, both of the home; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Pascall; and maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wood, of Cortez, Colo.

Sixteen property owners and citizens met with the city council on Monday night to hear discussion, make complaints and ask for relief in the forthcoming paving program. Such questions as these were asked: V. E. Glass - "I want paving. Can I get my property paved even though some of my neighbors might not want theirs paved?" Answer - "The city council will have to determine what to do in such a case."

Q. "To what extent will the city and council participate in the paving?" A. "Approximately 45%."

Q. By Bob Clark - "How will the city arrive at a decision whether the pavement will enhance the value of the property and to what extent?" A. "Mr. Finley Moore, a real estate man, is here to discuss that problem. Mr. Moore's answer, "I've lived in Seminole approximately 21 years. I am familiar with the paving program and based upon my knowledge of properties, I feel like paving will improve property more than the paving cost."

Q. "If S. W. 11th is not a truck by-pass can we have stop signs put on it?" Mayor Wright's answer - "We will make a survey there and try to do what's necessary to slow up faster moving traffic."

Q. "Can the city levy against homestead property?" A. Edgar Monteith, a lawyer for the paving contractors, said, "No, if it is a homestead."

Q. "Can the city pave skips on homestead property?" A. "Yes, if they choose to."

Q. "If I have a 100 foot lot and the front paving is \$4.10 per foot, do I pay \$410.00?" asked Bill Wauson. A. "Yes."

This part of the public hearing lasted from 7:30 till nearly 9 p. m.

LOCAL BOYS ATTEND FARM ELECTRIFICATION WORKSHOP

Billy Earp and Lynn Dove, Seminole High School Future Farmers of America members, will attend the seventh annual Farm Electrification Workshop at the Episcopal Church Conference Center, north of Amarillo, on June 16, 17 and 18.

100 FFA members from the High Plains area are expected to attend the workshop, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company. 13 hours of training in one of four subjects, farm wiring, electrical controls, motors and heating-lighting, will be offered to the participants.

The five top students at the workshop, two in wiring and one from each of the other subjects, will be awarded trips to the national FFA Convention for their accomplishments. Two alternates will also be selected in each section in the event that the winner is unable to attend the convention.

Each participant who successfully completes the course for which he is enrolled will be given an FFA Farm and Home Electrification Medal.

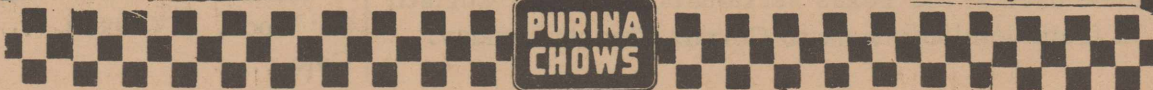

WHAT PRICE PRESTIGE? The Highway Department sold 31, 698 of those personalized license plates (with initials or some cute word on them) in 1968 and 35, 845 for 1969, getting 50 cents of the \$10 extra charge. They actually cost about \$1.25 to produce, counting administrative expense. Under HB 1228 by Rep. Paul Moreno, the prestige plates would go up to \$25 and the THD would get \$1.25. The Department is neutral on the matter but does forecast -- with some logic -- that if the fees are increased to \$25, "there will be a substantial decrease in the number of personalized license plates purchased."

NOTICE TO BIDDERS OF THE CITY'S INTENTION TO LET CONTRACTS FOR THE PURCHASE AND ACQUISITION OF PERMANENT PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS, TO WIT: A BUILDING TO BE USED FOR CITY HALL PURPOSES, AND TO ISSUE TIME WARRANTS THEREFOR IN PAYMENT OF ALL OR A PORTION OF THE COST THEREOF.

SEALED PROPOSALS addressed to the Mayor and City Council of the City of Seminole, Texas, will be received at the office of the City Secretary, City Hall, Seminole, Texas, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. on the 30th day of June, 1969, for permanent public improvements, to wit: a building to be used for City hall purposes, said building to be located in the downtown business area, in the general proximity of the existing City Hall. The building must be generally sound construction throughout, with a minimum square footage of 8,000 square ft, including all walls; roof of leakproof material; floor and foundation of concrete construction; outside walls, fireproof construction; and at such time and place all such proposals will be publicly opened and read.

ALL BIDDERS must submit cashier's or certified check issued by a bank satisfactory to the City Council, or a proposal bond given by a reliable surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, payable without recourse to the City of Seminole, in an amount not less than 5% of the amount of the proposal or bid as a guarantee that the bidder will enter into contract within ten days after notice of awarding of contract to him, or submit a proposal in the form of a binding contract to convey the premises after acceptance of the proposal by the City.

IT IS THE INTENTION of the City Council of the City of Seminole, Texas, to issue time warrants to the contractor or contractors in payment of all or a portion of the cost of purchasing and acquiring the above mentioned improvements, not to exceed the principal sum of FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000), said warrants to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 6% per annum, and to mature serially, the maximum maturity date to be not later than December 31, 1980.

THE CONTRACTOR OR CONTRACTORS will be required to accept interest bearing time warrants up to the aforesaid maximum amount in payment for the building to be acquired by the City. The City has made no arrangements for the assignment of the warrants to others.

THE SPECIAL CONDITIONS and general description of the characteristics of the building which must be met are on file with the City Secretary of the City where copies may be obtained.

THE CITY reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to award the contract to that bidder or bidders who in the opinion of the City Council offers the proposal to the best interest of the City and to waive formalities.

Information From Social Security Office

BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

My, how the Seminole News is growing! Seems to me that I see more new faces added to the staff each time I visit the office. Their growth makes me happy too because it means more readers for this column and that's good because it makes it possible to pass on important information to more people -- who might otherwise find it difficult to get an answer to a burning question, and on and on and on - In other words, isn't this "snowballing" wonderful for everyone?

Today, we are directing the column to one and all but to employees in particular.

Employers, except farm employers, file reports for their employees wages 4 times a year. Farm employers file wage reports for the whole year in January. The wage reports for April, May and June should be filed sometime in July.

All employers should be sure to report the employees name and social security card otherwise the social security records office may be unable to properly identify the worker's record to credit his wages. Valuable benefits can be lost. For instance, if the employee's name is John Jones or Bill Smith or any other popular name, the record office must be able to identify the proper record by the social security number.

If a report is incorrect, it takes 6 to 9 months after the report is made to correct the record. It might never get corrected if the worker has left and the social security office can't locate him.

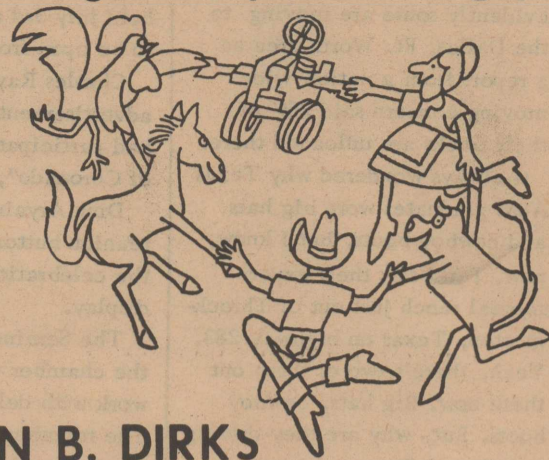
I suggest that the employer who is unable to see his employee's social security card obtain some forms SS-5, "Application for Social Security Number" from his social security office or any post office - then if the employee does not furnish his social security card, the Form SS-5 completed by the employee may be sent along with the quarterly report. With the information on the form, the social security administration records office will look up the correct number and post his wages to the right record.

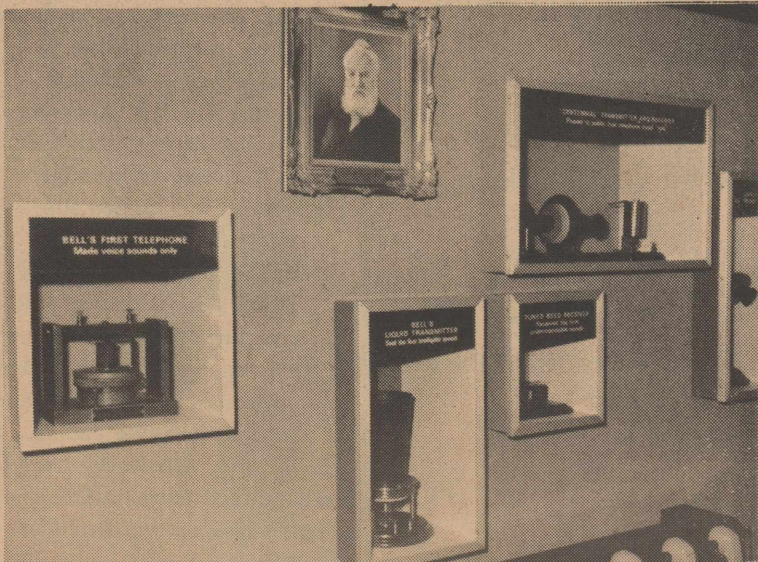

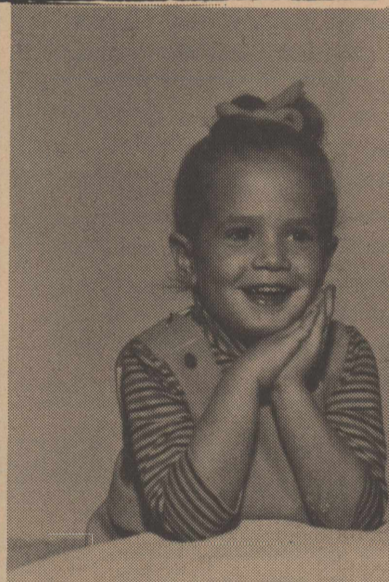
CERTIFICATION OF COMPLIANCE

The farm operator is responsible for the certification of crop and land use acres to the County ASCS Office. This may be done at any time from completion of crop planting until August 15th. The Certification must be done correctly. As you know, a small error in measurements could cause you not only to suffer a payment reduction, but also possibly a marketing quota penalty payment and loss of loan privileges depending on the situation.

If you feel that you need assistance in making these acreage determinations, you may apply for measuring service at the County Office and pay the cost of this service. In return, we will send a trained reporter to your farm to make the measurements. You will be officially notified of the results of the measurements and the acreage of the fields measured will be guaranteed.



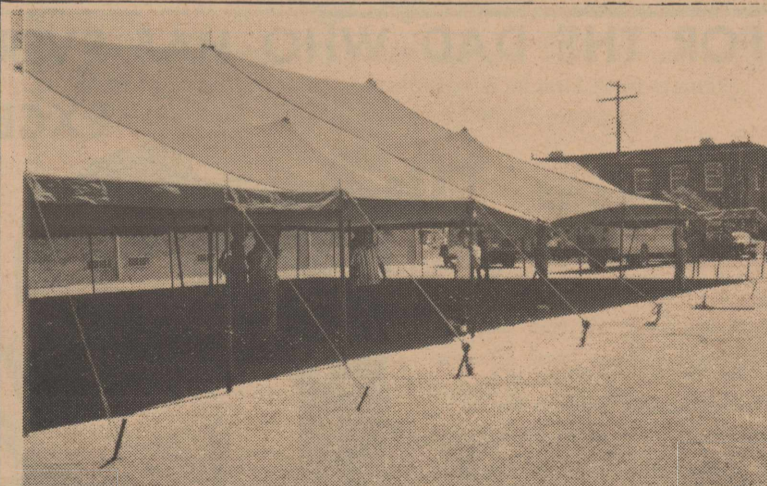
