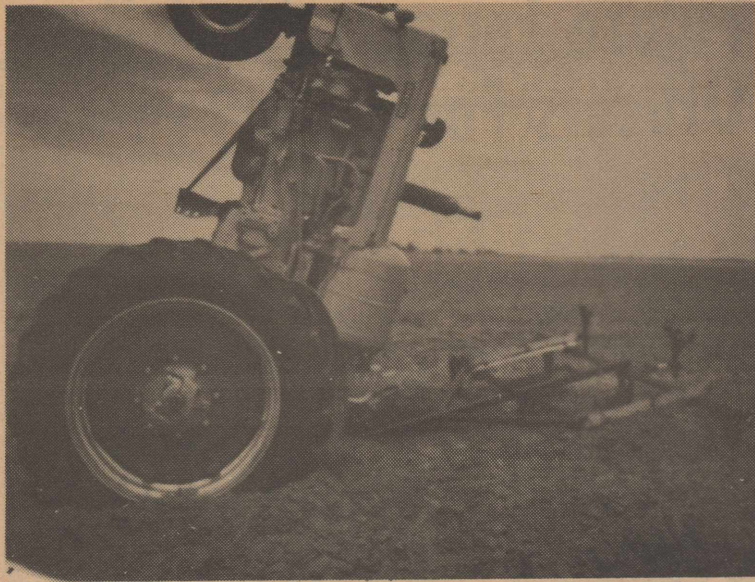


Editorial

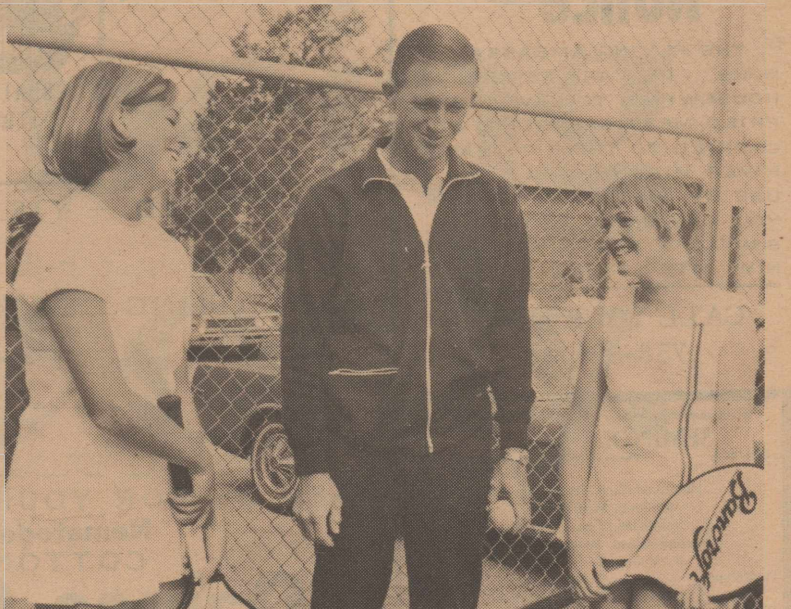

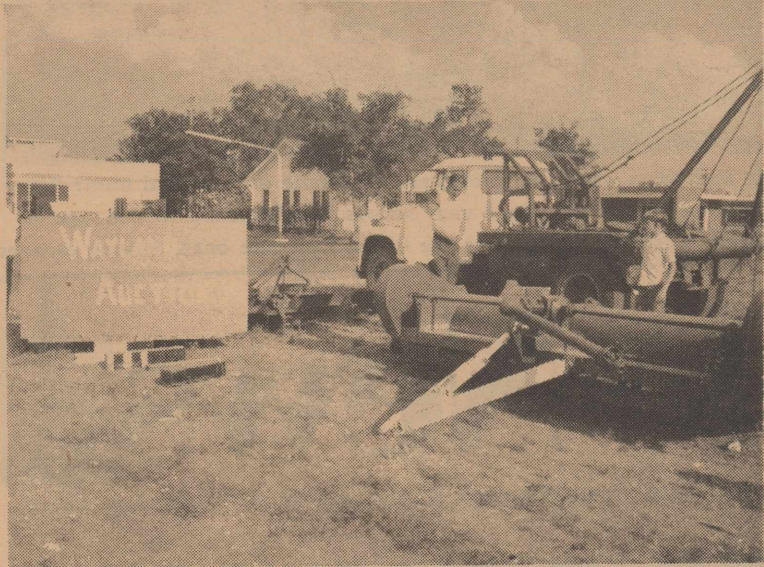
They Won State

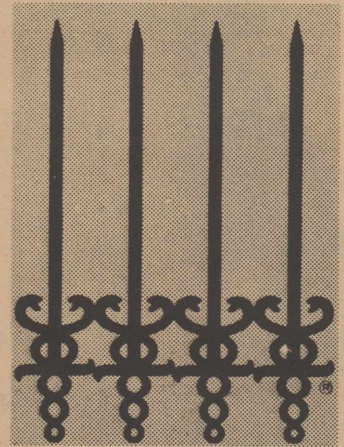
The welcome address was given by David Foote, vice president of the local FFA. Clark Parrott, president, presented the FFA Sweetheart award to Robin Hughes.



Information From Social Security Office

BY DOROTHY FEAZELL

"Can I go back to work even though I am receiving social security checks?" "How much can I earn if I go back to work?" These are only two of such questions that were asked me on my last visit to Gaines County. I thought that this might be a clue to some other unasked questions along the same lines and thought that it might be a good thing to talk about today.

Have YOU retired and now decided you would like to return to work? You may need to notify the social security office immediately. Children and wives or widows who receive benefit checks may need to report their work, too.

Annual earnings of \$1680 or less will not affect social security payments. The \$1680 limit includes gross salary of wages before any deductions are made. The earnings limit is based on the net profit for self-employed people.

If you receive social security benefits and expect to earn over \$1680 in the year, notify the social security office immediately. Regardless of how much you make during the year, you can receive a check for any month you earn less than \$140 in wages or do not perform substantial services in your business.

Anyone who wants more information about reporting work should call or visit the social security office in Odessa, Texas or meet me at the Gaines County Courthouse on one of my regular visits there.

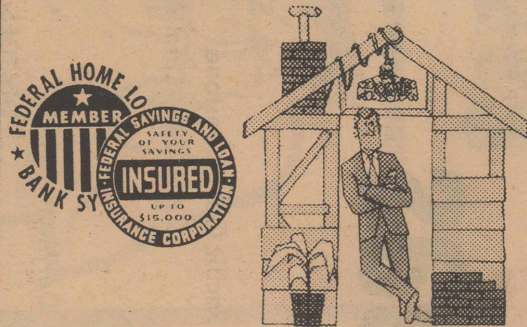

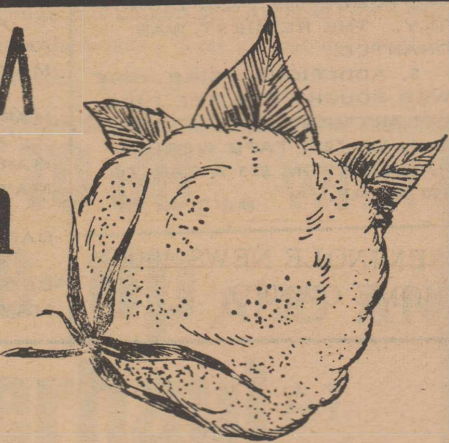
Dear Son, Probably the darkest days that our country has ever known were those days when unlawful elements hanged those on the spot without a trial. Her greatest moments have probably been those when people with a cause have given their lives that I, with a free hand, could write you this letter. It's never been so bad to me when there was rioting in Africa, when there was rioting in Northern Ireland, when there was rioting in Cuba or in South America. So many of those people were not civilized or made the great advancement that Americans have made. It was a different story when lawless elements destroyed parts of Watts, California; Orange, New Jersey; Washington, D. C. and Chicago, Illinois. This was the America that was MY LAND. These were Americans destroying AMERICA. If the war were over in the morning, next week the unreasonables would be rioting for anything else - - segregation, better housing, mistreated Cubar, shorter hours and pollution. The people who do not want to work and who want to disrupt will always find a reason to riot.

I have told you many times in the last few years that the time would come when authorities representing government, courts and law and order would have to leave someone dead on the streets. That time has come! Only 4 dead, 29 injured. My wishes, my hopes and my prayers are that that will be all. I hope that you never help hang anyone without trial. I hope that you never pillage and steal things that do not belong to you in time of storm, unrest or upheaval. The last thing I would want in my lifetime would be for you to be shot and killed in Vietnam, in Cambodia, breaking and entering or taking part in a riot. But, again, if you are, I pray it will be for a cause that will be honorable. If you are ever asked to clear an area, get off the streets, or cease leading or participating in a riot, and refuse, I hope you are shot bad enough to make you realize that some authority has to be respected. Son, the time is approaching, and may be here today, that boys and girls that have refused to respect parental authority, school authority, local and county police authority will be shot.

The last thing that I wanted for the young people in Ohio was death, but thousands of fathers and mothers had sons and daughters participating in that riot that did not obey the law. I hope you realize that destroying property that is not yours is against the law. I hope that you realize that participating in mob action and violence is against the law. I hope that you realize that keeping others from going to school and disrupting their lives is against the law. I hope that you realize that in breaking the law in these ways you deserve to be shot.

May I close in wishing you a long life and that you can have a son that will bring as much joy and happiness to a father that you have brought to my life and to our home.

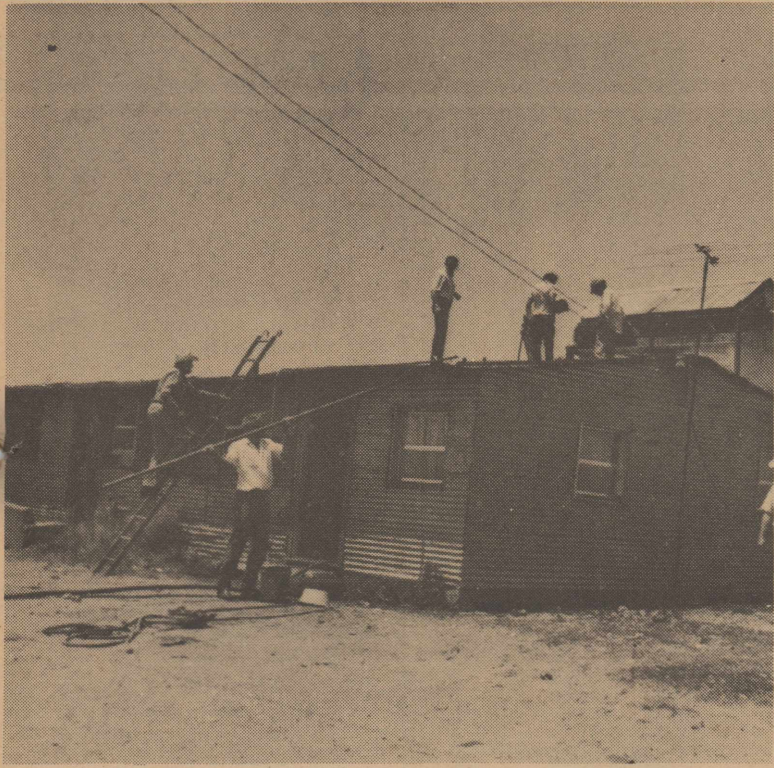

KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM SET UP FOR 1970-71

A KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM FOR EDUCATIONALLY DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN WILL BE OFFERED NEXT YEAR BY THE SEMINOLE SCHOOLS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF A LAW PASSED BY THE LAST LEGISLATURE.

THE LAW STIPULATES THAT SUCH A PROGRAM MUST BE OFFERED FOR CHILDREN WHO WERE BORN BETWEEN SEPTEMBER 2, 1964 AND ON OR BEFORE APRIL 1, 1965 WHO DO NOT SPEAK OR UNDERSTAND THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE, OR WHO COME FROM FAMILIES WITH INCOMES OF \$3000 OR LESS PER YEAR. ONLY CHILDREN WHO ARE OF THE PROPER AGE AND QUALIFY UNDER ONE OR BOTH OF THE TWO STANDARDS ARE ELIGIBLE TO ATTEND.

A MEETING WITH INTERESTED AND ELIGIBLE PARENTS AND CHILDREN WILL BE HELD IN THE PLAYROOM OF THE PRIMARY SCHOOL ON TUESDAY, MAY 19 FROM 9 A.M. UNTIL 12 NOON FOR THE PURPOSE OF INTERVIEWING AND TESTING APPLICANTS. PARENTS MAY BRING THEIR CHILDREN ANY TIME DURING THESE HOURS.

THE KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM, AS OUTLINED BY THE LEGISLATURE, CALLS FOR A GRADUAL LOWERING OF AGE LIMITS AND WIDENING OF ELIGIBILITY. BY THE BEGINNING OF THE 1977-78 YEAR, ALL FIVE YEAR OLD CHILDREN IN TEXAS WILL BE ENTITLED TO ATTEND A FREE PUBLIC KINDERGARTEN AS PART OF THE REGULAR SCHOOL PROGRAM.

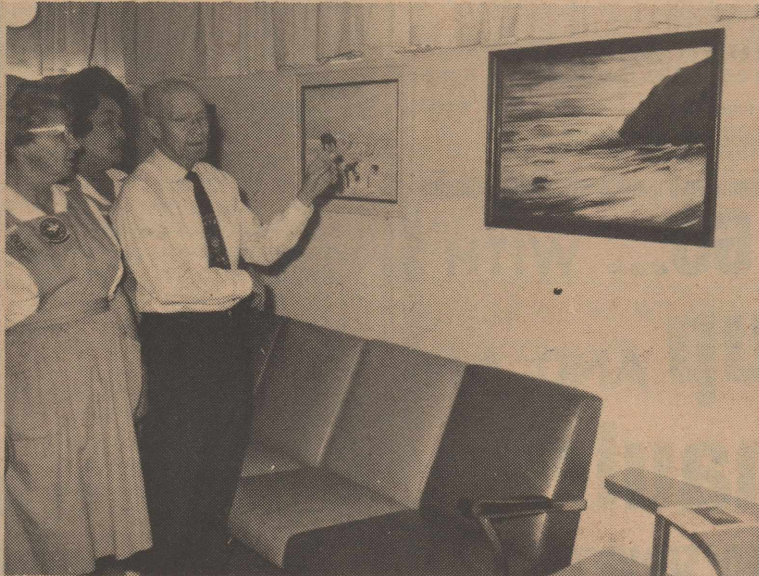

School Board Conducts Meet

The School Board met last Monday night.

1. Gave the bus drivers an \$8.00 per month raise over a 10 month period.
2. Librarians were given a 10½ month contract so they could be on the job before teachers and students arrive in the Fall and after school is out in the summer.
3. The budget was discussed again and passed over until the next meeting.
4. A standard high school senior ring was adopted.
5. Guy Peters was employed as high school custodian.
6. The dress policy was reviewed and continued for the future in its present form for the junior high school and the high school students.
7. Jean Sultemeier, high school English teacher, resigned as her husband has accepted employment with the Renner Research Foundation in Richardson.
8. The swimming pool will open May 30.
9. A summer program was approved for golf, track, tennis, and baseball. The golf under the direction of Coach Leland Caffey, \$250.00 maximum. Summer track for boys directed by Leonard Boyd at a cost of \$1200.00. Summer track for girls, directed by Coach Jimmy Inman, cost \$1125.00. Tennis coached by Jerry Franklin, cost \$2000.00. The baseball program for boys 13, 14 and 15 years of age (as of August 1st) will be made up of two teams affiliated with the Babe Ruth League, and three teams from Denver City, two from Seagraves and probably one from Plains. Rules and cost per boy should be taken up with Coach Robert Bice. The program's cost \$1200.00.
10. In a report from Ross Moore concerning insurance it was pointed out that with a 15% increase due in insurance cost on \$5,711,000.00 worth of buildings that the school could save money by cancelling out the balance of their old policies and renewing for three years before the rates advance, saving the school several thousand dollars.

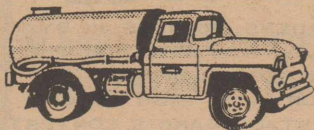

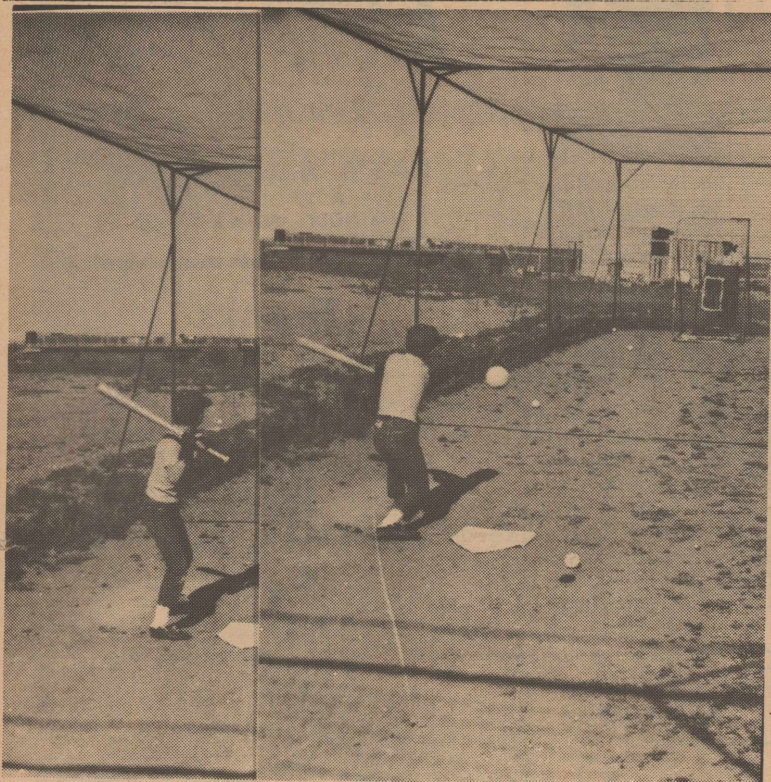
