#### Information From

"Can I go back to work even though I am receiving social security checks?" "How much can I earn if I go back to work?" These are only two of such questions that were asked me on my last visit to Gaines County. I thought that this might be a clue to some other unasked questions along the same lines and thought that it might be a good thing to talk about today.

Have YOU retired and now decided you would like to return to work? You may need to notify the social security office immediately. Children and wives or widows who receive benefit checks may need to report their work, too.

Annual earnings of \$1680 or less will not affect social security payments. The \$1680 limit includes gross salary of wages before any deductions are made. The earnings limit is based on the net profit for self-employed

If you receive social security benefits and expect to earn over \$1680 in the year, notify the social security office immediately. Regardless of how much you make during the year, you can receive a check for any month you earn less than \$140 in wages or do not perform substantial services in your business.

Anyone who wants more imformation about reporting work should call or visit the social security office in Odessa, Texas or meet me at the Gaines County Courthouse on one of my regular visits there.

#### Editoria

A FATHER WRITES HIS SON

Section II Seminole, Gaines County,

Dear Son, Probably the darkest days that our country has ever known were those days when unlawful elements hanged those on the spot without a trial. Her greatest moments have probably been those when people with a cause have given their lives that I, with a free hand, could write you this letter. It's never been so bad to me when there was rioting in Africa, when there was rioting in Northern Ireland, when there was rioting in Cuba or in South America. So many of those people were not civilized or made the great advancement that Americans have made. It was a different story when lawless elements destroyed parts of Watts, California; Orange, New Jersey; Washington, D. C. and Chicago, Illinois. This was the America that was MY LAND. These were Americans destroying AMERICA. If the war were over in the morning, next week the unreasonables would be rioting for anything else - - segregation, better housing, mistreated Cubar, shorter hours and pollution. The people who do not want to work and who want to disrupt will always find a reason to riot.

I have told you many times in the last few years that the time would come when authorities representing government, courts and law and order would have to leave someone dead on the streets. That time has come! Only 4 dead, 29 injured. My wishes, my hopes and my prayers are that that will be all. I hope that you never help hang anyone without trial. I hope that you never pillage and steal things that do not belong to you in time of storm, unrest or upheaval. The last thing I would want in my lifetime would be for you to be shot and killed in Vietnam, in Cambodia, breaking and entering or taking part in a riot. But, again, if you are, I pray it will be for a cause that will be honorable. If you are ever asked to clear an area, get off the streets, or cease leading or participating in a riot, and refuse, I hope you are shot bad enough to make you realize that some authority has to be respected. Son, the time is approaching, and may be here today, that boys and girls that have refused to respect parental authority, school authority, local and county police authority will be shot.

The last thing that I wanted for the young people in Ohio was death, but thousands of fathers and mothers had sons and daughters participating in that riot that did not obey the law. I hope you realize that destroying property that is not yours is against the law. I hope that you realize that participating in mob action and violence is against the law. I hope that you realize that keeping others from going to school and disrupting their lives is against the law. I hope that you realize that in breaking the law in these ways you

May I close in wishing you a long life and that you can have a son that will bring as much joy and happiness to a father that you have brought to my life and to our home.




