



The Fall of the year is evidenced in Gaines County by the clouds of dust going through the field and the countless combines. Picture #1 shows the combine as it augers its load into a truck on the turnrow to be hauled to the elevator. The center picture shows the combines approaching and picture #3 shows the great expanse of 3200 acres of grain in 1-3/4 mile rows. Watching the combines operate are Bill Bond, with Christian Grain, who furnished the seed; Calvin Holcomb, County Agent; J. C. Patton, who did a lot of the planting; and Bill Ward, manager for Tipperary Land and Exploration Corp., whose home office is Midland, Texas. Operating the machines are Elmer Hardy, Bruce Watson and Odis Trull. The DeKalb E57 Variety of milo is cutting between 5500 and 6000 pounds of grain per acre. This particular field was planted June 10 in 32 inch rows. Only 150 pounds of anhydrous (82 units per 100) at a cost of a little over \$6.00 per acre was used to fertilize. The land was deep broken, floated, listed, knifed and planted with six pounds per acre. The crop was watered four times with Valley Sprinkler systems that can be seen in the background of picture #3, putting on nearly two inches each time. The operation covers nine complete sections with 3300 acres being farmed in 1970. Ward states that 1600 more acres are being broken out for next year. The company does not participate in a government program and is contracting the grain this year at \$2.15 per hundred. The company used four circular Valley systems and two Hygro-matic circular systems, each covering one half section. The other portion of the grain crop was on dry land.

To get out of some swimming holes it was most difficult to get out clean because of the mud. We made our arrangements to start getting out. We washed off good and, you guessed it, someone threw a handful of mud

PRIVATE CLUB???

On March 23, 1970 County Attorney Joe McGill wrote a letter to Mr. O. N. Humphreys, Jr. of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission in Austin, for himself, for Ed Welch, the sheriff and Chester Browne, County Judge. The letter in part stated to the commission that the three county officials were all opposed to the sale of alcoholic beverages in Gaines County. Further they believed the great majority of the people to be opposed and asked the commission "if any such application for a private club is made to your office, please let us know at once." Kenneth W. Cook answered for the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission and assured the three officials that the commission would cooperate, along with Mr. Humphreys, the director, and also pledging the cooperation of Granvil H. Lacy, the area man, at 810 East County Road in Odessa.

The original letter was written when people were asked to sign up for a private club to be established in the city of Seminole. That same group of people is now in the process of trying to open up another such club under the auspices of a charitable organization, such as a veteran's organization, non-profit.

Sheriff Ed Welch said, "Yes, I've contacted Moon Mullins and he said they're going to put in a club here. It is to be next to the old folks home. I will try to stop it. I am against any sort of private club that serves alcoholic drinks - Red Man's, Moose or otherwise. It is reported that they have one such club at Andrews."

At 11:15 a.m. last Friday Mayor Wright said, "We do not want it (private club). I'm against it 100%. We will do everything we can to keep any club from opening that intends to serve alcoholic drinks. I feel sure that the city council will be against it."

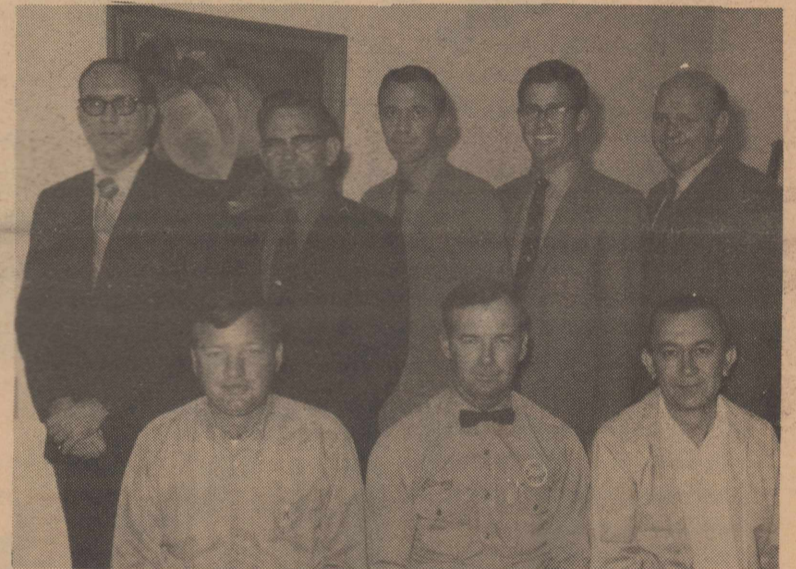
Joe McGill, County Attorney, 1:30 p.m. 10-23-70, "I'm doing all I can about it. It is my understanding that they have a club like this in Brownfield. I talked to Moon for one hour this morning and he said next week they were supposed to have a meeting of the 247 that signed up in the last deal."

In talking to Buddy Mosshart in Waco, Texas, president of the National Organization of Red Men, he assured the sheriff that if any one of the county officials were against such a club they would not participate. Henry McGee, secretary of the same organization with offices in San Antonio, made the same assurances at 2:15 p.m. last Saturday, "We will not put one in there."

In discussing the club with Mr. Mullins on Tuesday at 9:45 a.m., he said he thought it would help Seminole, also that they were having a meeting in the near future but no officers had been elected as yet, that there would be employment for six or seven and it would take some off the highways that were dangerous drivers and that New Mexico was drawing money out of Gaines County.

on us. Now a little mud doesn't hurt anybody but when you try to get out five or six times and it gets worse each time you've got troubles, especially if it's nearing one o'clock and you've got to ride home.

In desperation Truett finally got on his horse in the nude, wrapped his muddy clothes up and rode for his life with the mud balls pelting him. I was already late and knew I was in for a whipping and immediately joined back in the swimming and the fun. I slipped off after awhile, with my clothes, and left them away from the little lake and went back to see what kind of misery I could cause them. Every opportunity I had I filled their shoes with more mud. I filled their pockets with mud. I muddied them and their horses.

Two o'clock came and some of their time elements started catching up. By then Truett had returned, he decided he couldn't make it anyway, and we bombarded them.

Three o'clock came and it was a battle. Mud balls had caused some of the horses to break loose by this time, but that bunch of boys were muddy from their head to their feet and Brown County mud is black mud. Three thirty came and we finally gave it up. A sorrier looking bunch you've never seen.

My biggest relief when I arrived home was to find out that the family had all gone to town. I cleaned out that chicken house in record time. I fertilized those peach trees to the best of my ability. I got cleaned up about the time the family arrived home. I was watching. My mother got out of the car and immediately checked on the hen house. She came by the orchard. She came in and said, "What made you late?" and I gave her all the details how the boys had mistreated me.

My mother understood boys. She patted me. She forgave me and then asked me "How many mud balls did you throw after you found out you were gonna be late?"

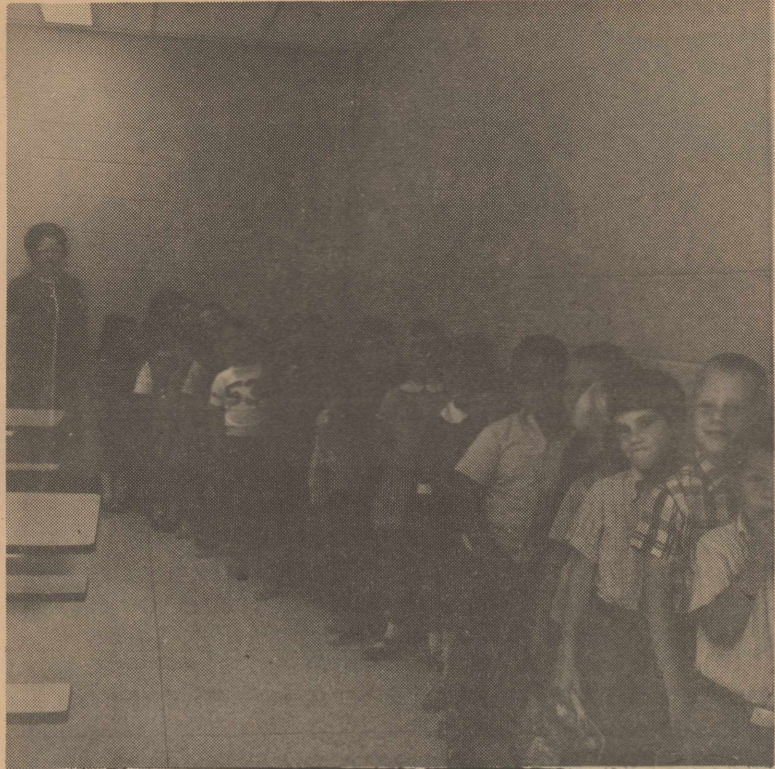

The City Council met last Monday night. Number one on the agenda was the acceptance of the gas rate. At the new proposed rate, a recommendation from 16% plus increase to 13% plus, The average rate would raise 94¢ per month instead of the original proposal of \$1.14.

- Two hundred dollars was paid into the firemen's fund by the council.

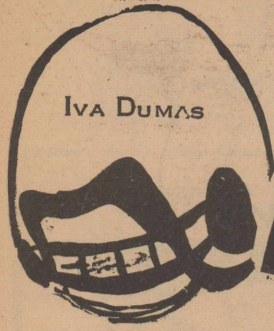

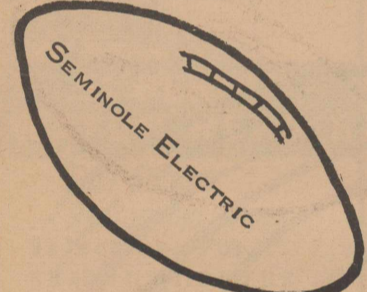

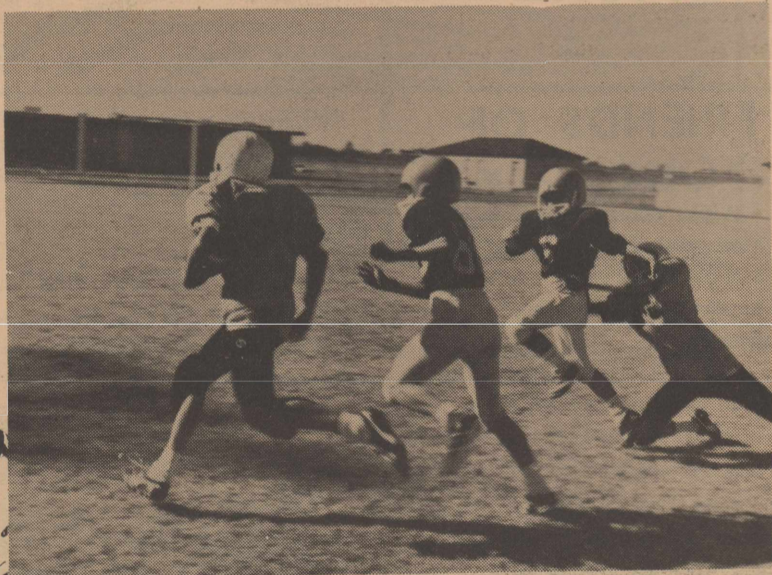
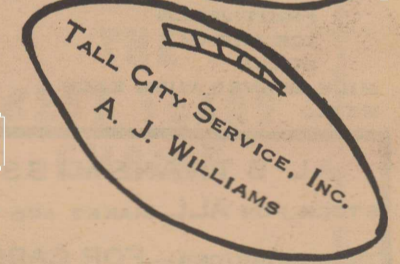
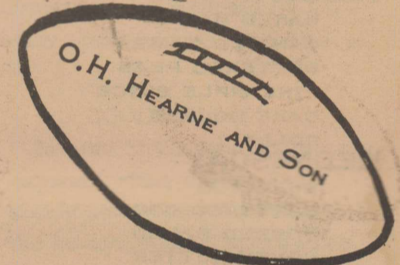
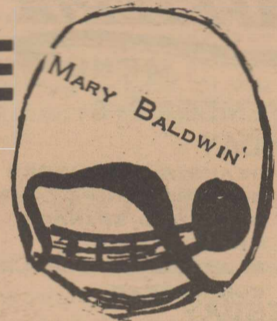
7th GRADE

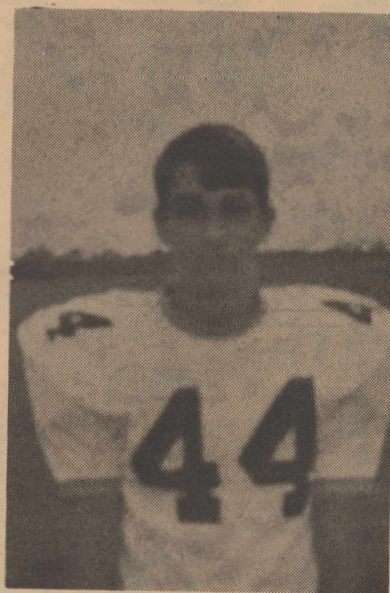
Besides having an outstanding team, the Loboes received outstanding breaks. Big Everett

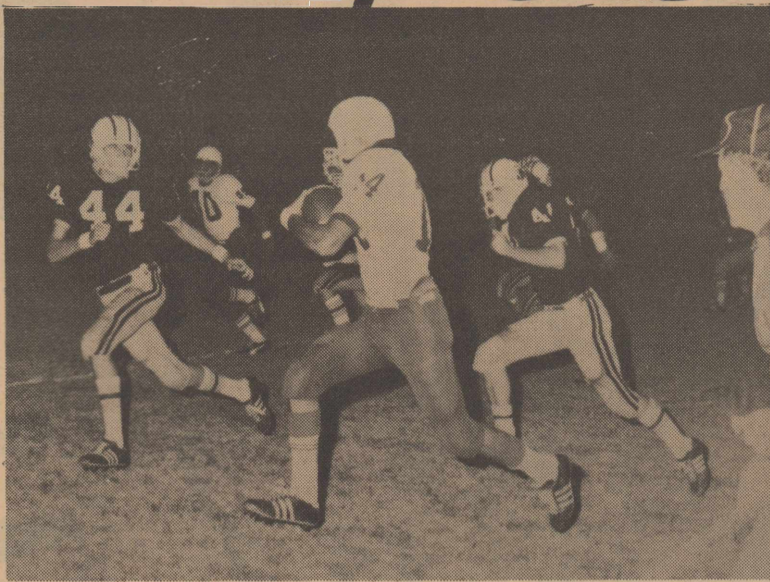

NEWS EDITORIAL

Today one of my neighbors told me about firing into a car that was trying to crowd him off the highway. Two weeks ago a friend from Ft. Stockton said, "I've started carrying my gun again in the car." Last week an acquaintance in Lubbock said, "I've got my gun fixed again by the driver's seat." "Today, I cleaned my 32 automatic."

This article is being written to warn young people and older people to not play pranks, especially at night in an automobile. This article is being written to encourage citizens not to become over-anxious and pull the trigger on an innocent neighbor, a friend or a member of the family.

People of this country are frightened that they may be the next to be mugged or whose home is broken into. Husbands are teaching their wives how to shoot a gun, so they may protect themselves. People are taking liberties that they have never taken before such as destroying property, firing at animals just to see them run, and crowding cars up and down the highway just for the pleasure of seeing someone else get scared.

It seems that the worst thing that has happened to our country is the protection that's given the criminal and to known breakers of the law. High Courts have contributed to delinquency not only of the young but of the older. It may be that people bent on mistreatment of Law Enforcements officers might find their match in a wife and a mother who has just learned to fire the gun. They may find the going much harder when traveling down the highway and trying to force a car off the road to cope with a man that shoots first rather than with an officer that's been trained to be tolerant toward the lawbreaker.

Service Station operators and small store operators will probably do more to correct would be robbers by leaving some dead and maimed, than jail or prison would do where they are fed good, they sleep good and are released after a few months to rob again.

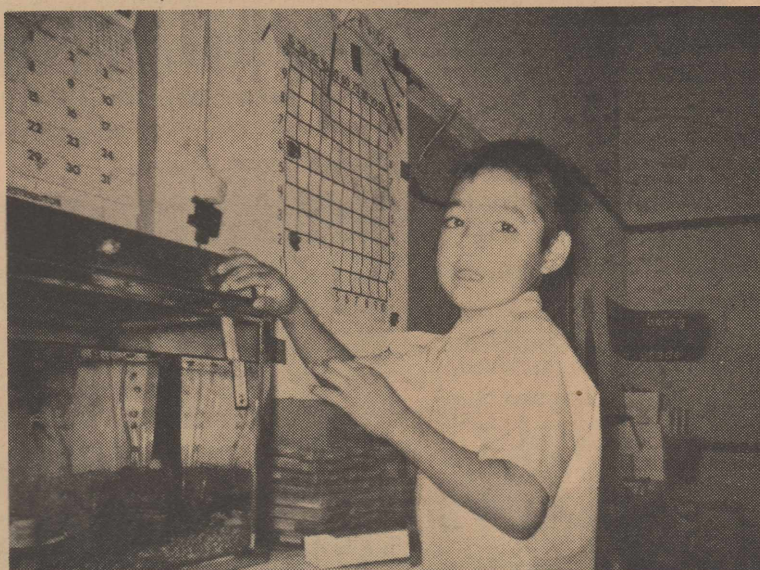

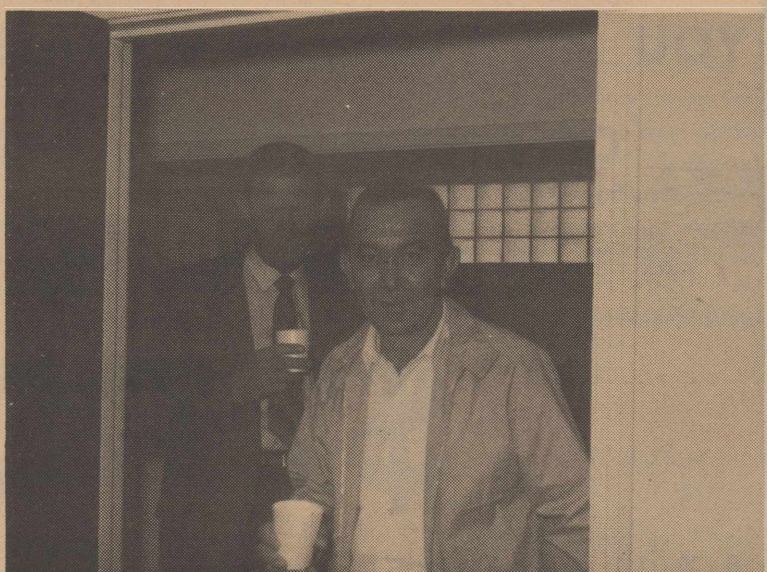
REAL SCARE CROWS

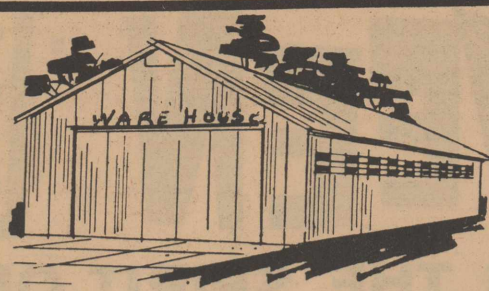
4. Mrs. Jomilee Chappell was hired to fill a third grade position to replace Mrs. Margaret Lain Baird who had resigned.

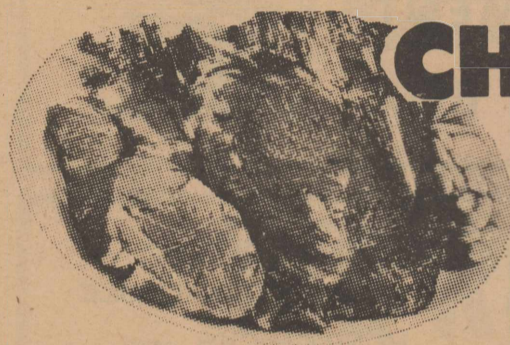
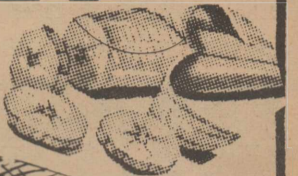
