



It happened yesterday. I love these kind of stories. I went out to see A. F. Howeth out on the job. Charles Shelton went with me. Everybody was having a good time. When two old East Texas pipe liners get together, like Shelton and Howeth, you learn many things like how many miles you walk a pipe line in one day, how much you made per hour 37 years ago and you find out where Turner Town is.

Then there's the funny things about ole "So and So" losing 4,000 barrels of oil and what unusual things can happen around a pump station, a pipe line and fellow employees.

It had been a good visit, the last day on the job, an easy day on the job. Here's two men from East Texas that were transferred where there was not a tree, moved out here fifteen, twenty, twenty-five years ago, got a little sand in their craw and never carried out their threat to move back to East Texas.

But on with the story. The story of 37 years had been told and then it happened. Anybody that's ever worked around explosive gas, oil, gasoline, butane, pressure lines and the danger of fires and explosions is always expecting something unusual to happen. The time was 11:46, the date January 21, the place Atlantic pump station north and west of Seminole.

The heating radiator in the control house or dog house had electric wiring coming to it to power the heat controls. It shorted out. A ball of fire about the size of your fist jumped up and I was the closest to the door. I got to the door first, hesitated, looked back and Charles Shelton said "Get out of the door!" I hesitated only long enough to see a second ball of fire and I ran. Charles Shelton ran and Howeth ran, too. I don't care if he had been on the job 37 years. He moved well for a retiring man. Shelton moved well for a middle-ager and I led the pack.

It popped a third time and Mr. Howeth calmly went back in to see what was the matter and I told Shelton, "Charles, for goodness sakes, hand me my camera out of there." Now, he's no idiot. "Go in there and get your camera yourself if you want it," he said.

I saw one man killed because he wouldn't run but I'll tell you for sure if a man lives just because he's cautious, Shelton, Howeth and Woods will live rich full lives.

Why is it things like this turn out to be so funny when it's over with and everyone is safe? It wasn't a bit funny when I was scrambling out of there. Shelton made an awful big statement. "I'll tell you, Woods," he said, "my company teaches you to run when anything happens." I'll tell you one thing (and I didn't admit it to him) I must have been born scared, my company didn't have to teach me to run. SEE PAGE 2

## VOCATIONAL PROGRAM DISCUSSED

The Seminole School Board met last Monday night in a lengthy meeting and discussion with Will Inkman and Ed Shive from the Texas Education Agency Vocational Division to discuss possibilities of future vocational programs in the Seminole schools. It was pointed out by Superintendent Bramlett that approximately 30 students would be needed in such a program. Students participating in such a program would work part time with on the job training. Such vocational training as welding, auto mechanics, parts, cooking, machine shop and other areas were covered. The board as a whole expressed their willingness to participate. A committee made up of board members and administrators will study the program further and make recommendations to the board.

2. On February 8 at 7 p. m., the board will visit with the industrial arts and vocational agriculture departments.

3. The meeting of February 22 will be cancelled because Mr. Bramlett will be attending the American Association of School Administrators Convention in Atlantic City.

4. A request was granted to install a water softener at the F. J. Young Cafeteria. This was brought about with having a lot of trouble with the dishwashing machine and water heater in the cafeteria. Coils in the heater stopped up with minerals, burst and required replacement. A water softener will be purchased at a cost of approximately \$450.00.

5. The resignation of Mrs. Jean McGehee as bus driver was accepted.

6. Mr. Jim French was employed as the school farm care taker beginning January 16, 1971 at a salary of \$4,612 plus house and utilities.

7. The school board called for a trustee election on April 3, 1971 to elect two trustees. The terms of Leon Foote and Glen Cavitt are expiring.

8. A 1970 Chevrolet pickup was purchased from McAdoo at a cost of \$1998.18 to be used on the school farm. The pickup being used was twelve years old.

9. George Cristy, business manager, pointed out the need of borrowing money to put into the cafeteria fund of \$6500. This shortage came about by free lunches (75 high at one time, now 276 plus 10 partial). Another reason was the board's unwillingness at the beginning of the year to raise the price of school lunches. The government will reimburse part of this, or 30¢ a lunch, to defray a part of the cost of upswing in food prices, the giving of free lunches, higher shipping expense and higher salaries.

The enrollment on January 22, 1971 was 2023 compared to 2121 on January 23, 1970; kindergarten 13.

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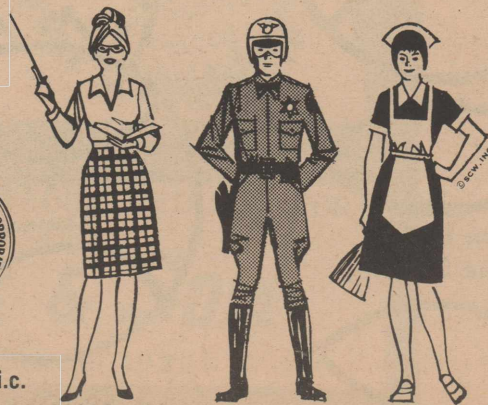
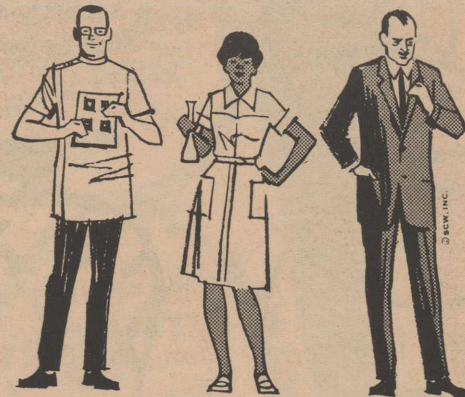
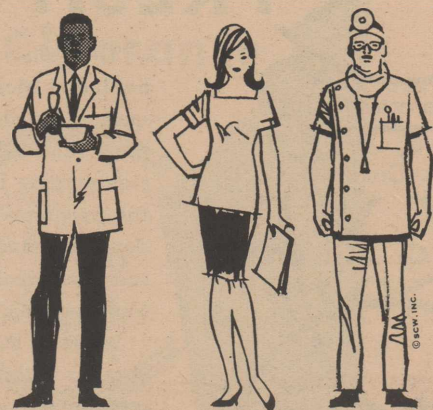
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# SEMINOLE

Davis led the Warriors with 7. Crow and Norton had 6 each, Cavitt 4, Wright 3, Bingham 2 and Jackson 1.

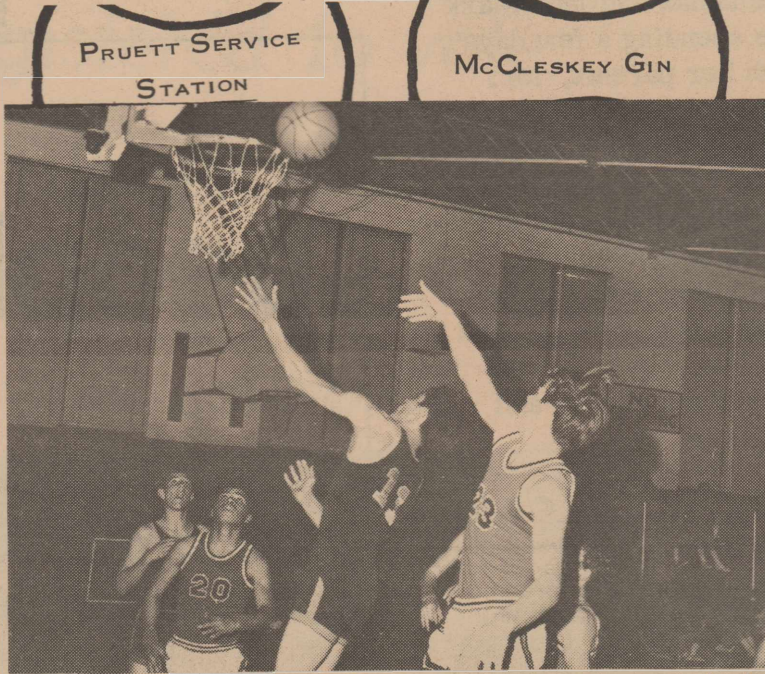

Though officially graduated, the 110 will not receive their degrees until the spring commencement, May 17.

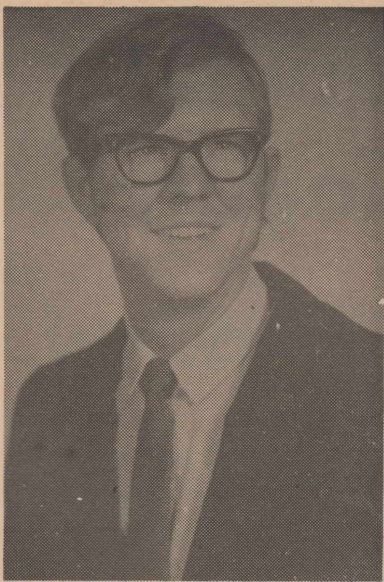

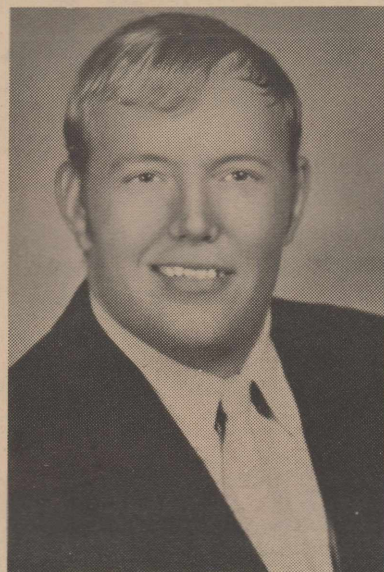

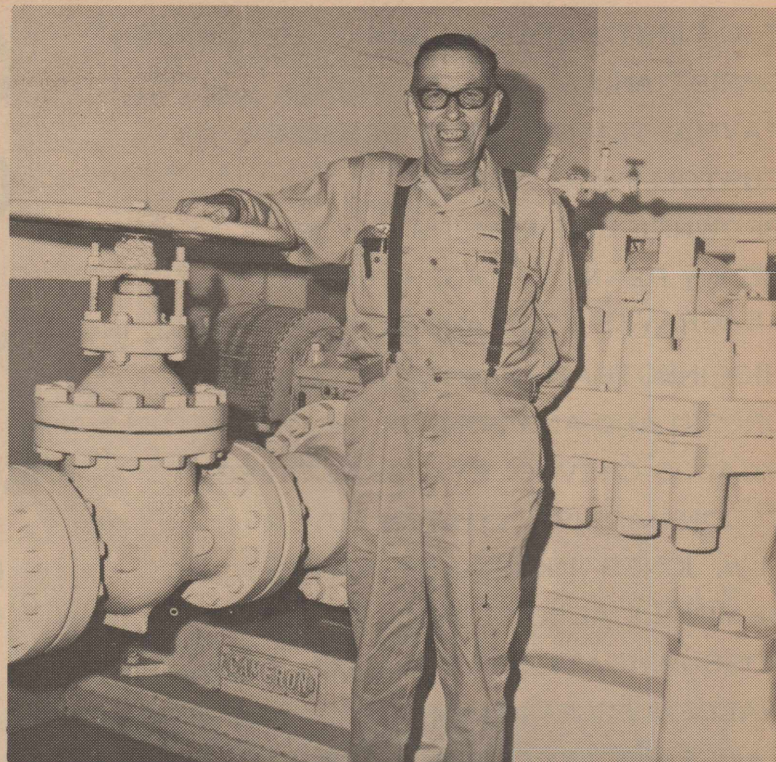

Tynes was employed by Midland Exploration.

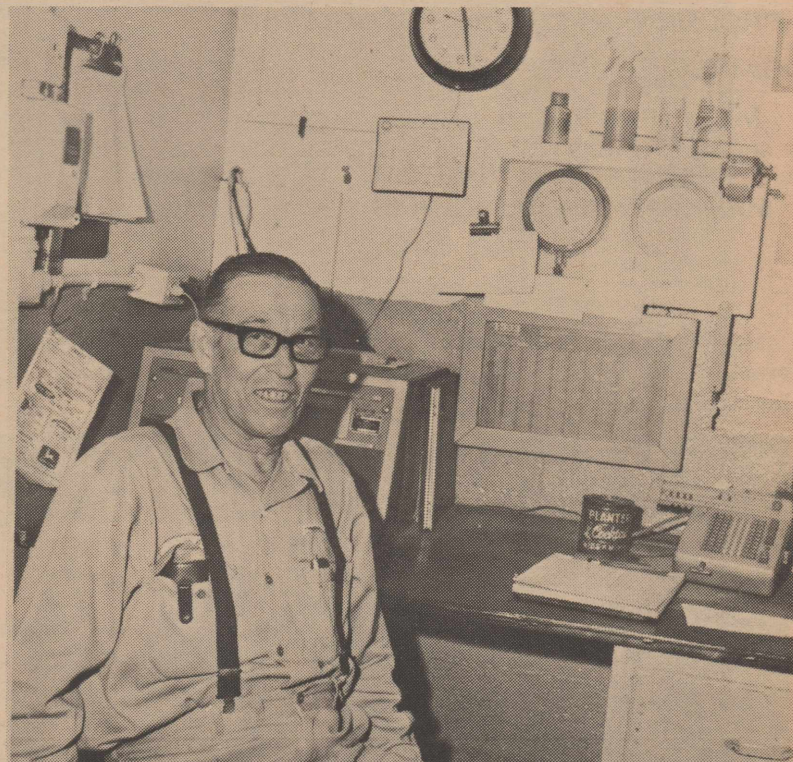


### HOWETH RETIRES AFTER 37 YEARS WITH ATLANTIC

Alonzo F. Howeth began working for Atlantic Pipe Line 37 years ago in Turner Town, Texas. Turner Town is located 18 miles from Kilgore. Howeth started out by checking pipe being laid for a new pipe line. He walked field lines and checked field lines. In May, 1934 he made \$72.00 per month, worked 36 hours per week at 50¢ per hour, nine days on the job and five days off the job. In 1942 he was transferred to Silsbee, Texas and started operating a pump station. "Yes," he said, "we've pumped more barrels but I remember one day when exactly 42,000 barrels went through the lines."

After being transferred back to Turner Town it was back to Silsbee, Texas and in 1943 to Maryville, La. "Oh," he said, "that was a bad place to live in those days." From there he went to Longview, Texas for ten years. "There I stock gauged some."

In 1955 A.F. Howeth and wife, Wyona, moved to Seminole, Texas. "The 15th of next month I will have lived in Seminole 16 years," he said, "Yes, I can remember something happening unusual. It was not my tower, thank goodness, but I remember one tower losing between 3,000 and 4,000 barrels of oil." The 8 inch line running from Atlantic pump station runs from here to Midland, on to Port Arthur and to Harbor Island. The station has one 80,000 barrel storage, one 10,000 and two 5,000. "Oh yes, I wouldn't mind comparing what I make today with what I made then. Today the company pays me \$4.49 per hour, then 50¢ an hour. I remember one time when a group of us had to walk a 150 mile line from Longview to Zavalla. I've seen hard days and easy days. Today is one of those easy ones. What am I going to do when I retire? We own a 3 bedroom house on five acres of land in the edge of Overton, Texas. I'm gonna catch up on some fishing. My wife is a good fisherman." (Editor's note - Just send me a four pound channel cat will be fine.)

## CREDIT UNION OF SEMINOLE SCHOOL MEETING HELD MONDAY NIGHT



The Credit Union of Seminole Schools met Monday night. A committee made up of Opal Griffith, Janelle Sullivan, John Golmon, Hollis Shults and David Shuler, met immediately afterward. Members and guests were given the following information. As of December 31, 1970, loans amounted to \$135,982.68, cash \$9,178.28, equipment \$265.30, prepaid insurance \$74.00 for total assets of \$145,500.26. Notes payable amounted to \$6,000.00, shares - \$124,904.98, regular reserve \$2,762.31, reserve for contingency \$2,320.39, undivided earnings \$291.19, gain \$9,221.39 for a total liabilities and capital of \$145,500.26.

A 6% dividend was declared on all shares which is the maximum that can be paid under the law. Seventy percent of the net gain was paid to share holders in 1969 compared to 69.64 in 1970, in dollars \$6394.92. In 1970 149 loans were made for \$229,468.98. Since 1966 a total of \$562,453.71 has been loaned to 669 borrowers.

George Cristy and Opal Griffith were elected as new directors. Donna Love and Dorothy Decker were elected to the credit committee. A 2% return on interest was made to all borrowers in the fiscal year ending December 31, 1970.
