TRAVELED CATTLE


Some people travel, some people don't. Some cattle travel, some cattle don't. Many cattle live their lives out on the same ranch or the same piece of ground. Not so with the cattle at South Plains Feed and Seed Lot. James Belcher from Seagraves bought sixty head of cattle from Pilot Point, Mississippi. When they arrived in West Texas and Gaines County they weighed 311 pounds each. They were real good 'Okie type' cattle, crosses mostly between Angus and Here- cash account as far as the county is concerned when it is made." fords. They were put on dry pasture for nearly six months and went into the feed pens weighing a little over 400 lbs. This week the cattle were contracted to Hines Brothers Packing Co. in Little Rock, Arkansas. They are all heifers and sold for \$28.75 per hundred, weighing 760 lbs. with a 4% shrink. They stayed in the feed lot 147 days and gained 2.4 lbs. per day.

This article is being run in hopes that other people will become interested in feeding cattle in Gaines County along with Kenneth Newcomb, Monty and Jiggs Williams, Wayne Buzan, James Belcher and others. It's almost unbelievable that this area ships most of their cattle out to be fed and then ships them back in to be bought as steaks and roasts. Also we ship lots of cattle to California then ship feed out there to feed them on. CONTINUED ON PAGE 2

At least two stories are being circulated around the county. (1) There's a shortage in the county judge's office. There's no truth to this. It seems that when Chester Browne was county clerk that the audit of 1969 showed a balance of \$7,427.95 had been charged to oil companies, businessmen, individuals and lawyers. Of this amount, approximately \$1700 is still outstanding. Woodson Jones, County Auditor, said, "This will all be cleared up by March 1, 1971. If not, the cash will have to be dug up. " County Attorney Joe McGill said, "Yes, I know about it. I am concerned and have been told that it would be cleared up during the month of February of this year."

These account charges came about when the clerk's office charged court costs, recording fees and certified copies to aforementioned accounts. This money was always carried as a debt that the clerk owes to the county and is so stated in the year in audit, but must SEE PAGE 2



The other story concerns the \$250,000 bond that was voted to purchase right of way west for the four lane highway. Woodson Jones reports that of this money \$142,812.54 is still in the right of way account, plus interest of \$11,000, making a total of \$153,812.54. In 1969 \$6750 was paid for appriasal service. During the year of 1970 \$4,300 was spent for appraisal service, \$3090.50 to Freeman & Curry, legal service; \$750.00 to special commissioners for condemnation; \$2,000 to Hyle Doss, agent to buy right of way; \$201.50 for fees and recording and \$82,529.00 for right of way. "WE WERE IN THE SAME BRIGADE AT FT. WOLTERS, TEX., WHEN WE FIRST MET,"
SAID CAPTAIN CHARLES O. REED III OF HIS CLOSE ACQUAINTANCE WITH CHIEF WARRANT
OFFICER (W2) PHILLIP EARL COATS. CPT. REED IS COMMANDING OFFICER OF THE 273RD
AND CWO COATS IS THE UNIT'S SAFETY OFFICER. BOTH MEN FLY THE GIANT CH-54A SKY
CRANE HELICOPTER OUT OF SANFORD ARMY AIRFIELD AT LONG BINH, IS MILES NORTHEAST
OF SAIGON.

"IT WAS MY WIFE'S AUNT, BEATRICE UNDERWOOD, WHO TOLD CPT. REED'S MOTHER THAT I WAS STATIONED AT FT. WOLTERS," SAID MR. COATS. THE TWO LADIES AND MR. COATS' WIFE, LEE ANN, ALL WORKED AT THE LOCAL TELEPHONE OFFICE AT THE TIME.

"THAT WAS FOUR YEARS AGO," SAID CPT. REED, "AND EVERY SINCE THEN, WE HAVE BEEN STATIONED IN THE SAME UNIT," BOTH PILOTS WERE STATIONED AT FT. WOLTERS FOR THE NEXT THREE YEARS. THEY THEN MOVED TO FT. RUCKER, ALA., WHERE THEY TOOK A SKY CRANE TRANSITION TRAINING COURSE FOR SIX WEEKS. CPT. REED WAS A CLASS LEADER IN THE SCHOOL AND CWO COATS WAS HIS CLASSMATE.

THE SON OF MR. AND MRS. CHARLES O. REED JR., OF 906 N.W. AVE. I, CPT. REED, 29, IS MARRIED TO THE FORMER HANNELORE F.F. BAUER OF WURZBURG, GERMANY WHERE SHE RESIDES WITH THE COUPLE'S EIGHT-YEAR OLD SON, CHARLES O. IV.

CWO COATS, 34, IS MARRIED TO THE FORMER LEE ANN STONE OF SEMINOLE. SHE RESIDES AT 606 N.W. 4TH STREET WITH THIER INFANT DAUGHTER, ROBIN PATRICE. MRS. COATS IS THE DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. JACK STONE OF 707 N.W. AVE. H. MR. COATS PARENTS, MR. AND MRS. EARL M. COATS, LIVE IN POPLAR BLUFF, MO.

THE MISSION OF THE "SUPERHOOKS" OF THE 273RD AVIATION CO. IS TO PROVIDE COM-BAT SUPPORT AIRLIFT FOR MOVEMENT OF HEAVY SUPPLIES, VEHICLES, AIRCRAFT AND TO PROVIDE COMBAT SUPPORT AIRLIFT OF UNITS ENGAGED IN OPERATIONS.

ALTHOUGH NOT THE PRIME MISSION OF THE 273RD, THE UNIT IS PLAYING A MAJOR ROLE IN THE RECOVERY OF DOWNED AIRCRAFT IN THE THICK JUNGLES OF THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. THE \$2.8 MILLION "TARHE" HELICOPTER HAS A LIFT CAPABILITY WHICH PERMITS IT TO BE USED TO RETRIEVE ANY AIRCRAFT IN THE ARMY INVENTORY PLUS MANY U.S. AIR FORCE PLANES. ON ONE OCCASION THE SKY CRANE WAS USED TO RETRIEVE A SISTER SHIP WHICH HAD BEEN FORCED TO LAND BECAUSE OF TRANSMISSION PROBLEMS.

THE 273RD AVIATION CO. MAINTAINS NUMEROUS SKY CRANES TO CARRY OUT ITS MISSION OF AIRLIFT SUPPORT. THE CH-54A HELICOPTER, WHICH RESEMBLES A GIANT GRASSHOPPER, HAS A LIFTING CAPACITY OF 17,500 POUNDS AND A CREW OF FOUR.

THE LARGEST HELICOPTER IN THE FREE WORLD, THE SKY CRANE HOLDS THE WORLD RE-CORD FOR ALTITUDE AND CLIMB RATE OF ROTARY-WING AIRCRAFT. THE COPTER CAN CLIMB ALMOST A MILE A MINUTE TO A CEILING OF 32,000 FEET.

THE 273RD IS UNDER THE OPERATIONAL CONTROL OF THE IST CAVALRY DIVISION (AIRMOBILE) AND IS THE PRIME MOVER OF THEIR ENGINEER EQUIPMENT, I55MM HOWITZERS, TRUCKS, AND A LARGE PORTION OF THEIR AMMUNITION.

BECAUSE OF THE MOBILITY PROVIDEO BY THE 273RD, THE "FIRST TEAM" HAS CON-CEIVED A NEW MOBIL SUPPLY CONCEPT TO SUPPORT NEW FIRE BASE SITES AND PROVIDE THEM WITH HEAVY GROUND CLEARING EQUIPMENT, VEHICLES FOR USE ON THE FIRE BASE, 155MM AND 175MM HOWITZERS, AMMUNITION AND FOOD SUPPLIES.

tained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amendlaws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or selfcare, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the bound-

have resided within the bound-aries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25)

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation then and in that event the such children."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for indeor retain capability for inde-pendence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes: provided for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matched to of fad that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000)

during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal match. the extent that federal match-

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal ratching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of chiective or subjective shall also include the employ-ment of objective or subjec-tive means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation ment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of


Dear Editor:

No doubt this session of Congress will generate much public debate on the questions of planned deficit spending, revenue-sharing, the full employment budget concept, and many other fiscal and economic mat-

The budget message which was recently submitted estimates the government will go in the red this fiscal year by about \$25 billion and next year by about \$23 billion in federal funds. It is estimated the gov ernment this year will borrow from Social Security, highway, and other trust funds about \$7 billion. The borrowing from the trust funds next year is estimated to be about \$11 billion. These sums must someday be repaid with interest, so the true budget deficits are as indicated above. If we disregard the borrowings, the estimated deficit is about \$19 billion this year and nearly \$12 billion next year.

The junior varsity lost, 49-76.







Holcomb points out that the 1970 survey shows an increase of 74, 200 irrigated acres, or 1.36 percent more than last year for the 42-county area. A total of 5, 516, 400 acres were irrigated this year, about 80 percent by surface methods.

Irrigation water was pumped from 65, 214 wells, 3, 042 playa lakes and 2,079 recirculating pits. The number of wells consistently delivering more than 700 gallons per minute has dwindled to only 28.7 percent of the total. More than 88 percent of the wells lift water more than 125 feet.

According to the survey, the number of irrigation wells increased about one percent during the year to offset the continuing decline in the capacity of incividual wells. The average number of acres irrigated by each well was estimated at 84.

As far as cropland is concerned, 57 percent of the total of 9, 644, 000 acres was irrigated, points out Holcomb. The percentages of irrigated crops included grain sorghum, 38; cotton, 26; wheat, 19; corn, 5; soybeans, 3; vegetables, 1; and other crops, 8.

This survey should be a part of every farmer's records, adds the agent. It can serve as a valuable reference on irrigation, regardless of the type of farming operation.
