## TRAVELED CATtLE <br> STORIES - NOT TRUE

Some people travel, some people don't. Some cattle travel, some cattle don't. Many cattle live their lives out on the same ranch or the same piece of ground. Not so with the cattle at South Plains Feed and Seed Lot. James Belcher from Seagraves bought sixty head of cattle from Pilot Point, Mississippi. When they arrived in West Texas and Gaines County they weighed 311 pounds each. They were real good 'Okie type' cattle, crosses mostly between Angus and Herefords. They were put on dry pasture for nearly six months and went into the feed pens weighing a little over 40.0 lbs . This week the cattle were contracted to Hines Brothers Packing Co. in Little Rock, Arkansas. They are all heifers and sold for $\$ 28.75$ per hundred, weighing 760 lbs . with a $4 \%$ shrink. They stayed in the feed lot 147 days and gained 2.4 lbs . per day.
This article is being run in hopes that other people will become interested in feeding cattle in Gaines County along with Kenneth Newcomb, Monty and Jiggs Williams, Wayne Buzan, James Belcher and others. It's a lmost unbelievable that this area ships most of their cattle out to be fed and then ships them back in to be bought as steaks and roasts. A lso we ship lots of cattle to California then ship feed out there to feed them on. CONTINUED ON PAGE 2 -
least two stories are being circulated around the county. (1) There's a shortage in the county judge's office. There's no truth to this. "The story came about because of old charge accounts left over that had not been collected from the time that I served in the clerk's office, " said County Judge and one time County Clerk of Gaines County, Chester Browne. "The rules and regulations say that a clerk is responsible for any and all accounts and it becomes a cash account as far as the county is concerned when it is made."

It seems that when Chester Browne was county clerk that the audit of 1969 showed a balance of $\$ 7,427.95$ had been charged to oil companies, businessmen, individuals and lawyers, Of this amount, approximately $\$ 1700$ is still outstanding. Woodson Jones, County Auditor, said, "This will all be cleared upby March 1, 1971. If not, the cash will have to be dug up. " County Attorney Joe McGill said, Yes, I know about it. I am concerned and have been told that it would be cleared up during the month of February of this year." These account charges came about when the clerk's office charged court costs, recording fees and certified copies to aforementioned accounts. This money was always carried as a debt that the clerk owes to the county and is so stated in the year in audit, but must be paid. SEE PAGE 2

## Letter To The Editor

## Dear Editor:

No doubt this session of Congress will generate much public debate on the questions of planned deficit spending, rev-enue-sharing, the full employment budget concept, and many other fiscal and economic matters.
The budget message which was recently submitted estimates the govermment will go in the red this fiscal year by about $\$ 25$ billion and next year by about $\$ 23$ billion in federal funds. It is estimated the gov ermment this year will borrow from Social Security, highway, and other trust funds about $\$ 7$ billion. The borrowing from the trust funds next year is estimated to be about $\$ 11$ billion. These sums must someday be repaid with interest, so the true budget deficits are as indicated above. If we disregard the borrowings, the estimated deficit is about $\$ 19$ billion this year and nearly $\$ 12$ billion next year.

Weather is important to some fish ermen, unimportant to others.
Some anglers will go out only when the temperature is a comfortably cool 58 degrees. Others don't care whether it's 28 or 98 .
Anglers who feel that conditions must be "just right" do catch fish . . . and the "I don't care" fellows do, too So what's the answer?
I don't know the right answer; nor do I think many other anglers do eith er. But I'm inclined to agree that the best time to go fishing is right now. So, if you want to fish, get gone, regardless of rain, sunshine, heat or cold.

Fish, wherever they are, whatever kind they be-fresh water, salt water -perch, bass, stream trout, Gulf trout, king, ling, reds, whites, red snapper-every living one of them has to eat.

And that's when they hit your bait, be the "food" live shrimp or dead squid, live minnows or plastic ones, or artificials-like plastic worms, topwaters, spinners or such hardwares as spoons . . . . large and small.
Get with it, if you want to fish, and just disregard the weather
We've had great success in below-
freezing temperatures. Many times when we went after "whites" below the dam we had to break the ice that formed in the line guides, time and time again as the line froze solid in the rings.

On the other hand, we've had great
success on the hottest days catching black bass in a blazing sun on lakes and on ponds. Also, we've taken salt water fish on the hottest of days in the bays as well as far off shore in the Gulf of Mexico

Furthermore, we've had great success trout fishing in the mid-day heat in summertime Wyoming, Montana and Colorado where it was supposed to be "cool" to be good.
It's not unusual for anglers in the cold climates to cut holes in the ice to do their fishing.
We repeat-fish have to eat!
Your first job is to find the fish, then serve them the "food" of their choice for that day, that hour, maybe even for just that minute.
We've had wonderful success when t was so cold, even with gloves on, that we could hardly hold the rod; and when it was so dogrone hot we ad to mop the brow after every cast
And we're just a common, ordinary isherman who loves the outdoors and likes the challenge of angling.
Nope, we don't have "tremendous success" every day out. No siree! We've had our share of "dry runs" These, too, happen to most everyone But there is fun in fishing! It's relaxing, it's nerve settling. And, when you do land a few of those fliptails it's a great thrill.

Then along comes a lunker and takes your bait-and whether or not there will ever be another day, that day was great

AREAWIDE PICTURE Holcomb points out that the 1970 survey shows an increase of 74,200 irrigated acres, or 1.36 percent more than last year for the 42 -county area. A total of 5, 516, 400 acres were irrigated this year, about 80 percent by surface methods.
Irrigation water was pumped from 65,214 wells, 3,042 playa lakes and 2, 079 recirculating pits. The number of wells consistently delivering more than 700 gallons per minute has dwindled to only 28.7 percent of the total. More than 88 percent of the wells lift water more than 125 feet.
According to the survey, the number of irrigation wells increased about one percent during the year to offset the continuing decline in the capacity of incividual wells. The average number of acres irrigated by each well was estimated at 84.
As far as cropland is concerned, 57 percent of the total of $9,644,000$ acres was irrigated, points out Holcomb. The percentages of irrigated crops included grain sorghum, 38; cotton, 26; wheat, 19; corn, 5; soybeans, 3 ; vegetables, 1 ; and other crops, 8.
This survey should be a part of every farmer's records, adds the agent. It can serve as a valuable reference on irrigation, regardless of the type of farming operation.

Holcomb also invited agribusinessmen and industry representatives to come by the Extension Office for a copy of the survey.
