

In recent months Seminole, in its search for better medical facilities and its effort to secure other doctors, has been accused of not only wanting a lion's share of the county taxes but has been made to appear to be selfish and without understanding where the communities of Loop and Seagraves were concerned. The portions of the county that are made up of the Loop School District and the Seagraves School District pay less than 16% of the county taxes. Of this amount, the part made up of Loop pays 10.95% and the portion in Seagraves pays 4.84%. I've never known of a commissioners court that served this county to try to hold them within the percentage they paid. (1) When a community building was built in Seminole, one was built in Seagraves and one was built in Loop, although one paid less than 5% of the taxes and the other paid less than 11% of the taxes. (2) When roads were needed and pavements built, needs were considered and never the cost as far as the amount of taxes were concerned. (3) When county facilities were built for recreation, a location was chosen where the people from Seagraves and Loop could easily reach it (the Gaines County Park, Golf Course and Party House) but far away from the southernmost part, east and west parts of the county. Seminole is almost exactly in the center of the county, east and west and north and south. If this doesn't show the fairness of Seminole residents and court members, maybe Step Number 4 will. (4) In 1939 and '40 a 40¢ per hundred equalization tax was collected specifically to help Seagraves. The first year Seminole received \$8,132.54, Seagraves \$12,895.02 and Loop \$5,125.72, for a total of \$26,153.28. In 1940 and '41 Seminole received \$14,716.12, Seagraves \$17,062.31 and Loop \$5,612.96 for a total of \$37,899.71. As population grew in Seminole this figure rose because it was paid on school census, approximately \$75 per student. In 1947-48 Seminole received \$49,392.66, Seagraves \$30,324.18 and Loop \$12,403.34 for a total of \$90,120.18. Remember, if you will please, that Seagraves paid less than 5% of the taxes and Loop less than 11%. The 40¢ equalization tax in 1956-57 brought in \$226,531.55. Of this amount, Seminole received \$145,464.83, Seagraves \$64,471.54 and Loop \$16,595.18. In 1967-68 the amount had grown to \$267,696.95. Of that, Seminole received \$180,407.72, Seagraves \$69,965.79 and Loop \$17,323.44 for a total of \$267,696.95. From the years 1939-40 the 40¢ county wide equalization tax brought in a total of \$5,494,494.79. Of this amount, Seagraves has received \$1,562,058.65, or 28½% of the total taxes paid in on the equalization tax and somebody, somewhere, every day has accused Seminole of being unfair. This is a donation of nearly 25% of the 40¢ tax paid in that they did not pay and what major oil companies and other property owners have always discussed as not being right. On the other hand, the Loop School District has received only 8.47% of this tax in this structure, while paying almost 11%. So 2½% has been claimed off the Loop School District to support Seagraves School District, while above 20% that they have received of the \$1,562,058.65 has come out of the Seminole School District. This amounts to well over \$300,000.00 and you say Seminole is not fair. You are being furnished school expense, recreation, county wide police protection through the sheriff's department, ambulances and roads that you paid very very little for and then turn around and accuse Seminole of being selfish in trying to build a fifty bed hospital that (1) was recommended, (2) that you're welcome to use and (3) that will not cost you a dollar's worth of tax. WHAT DO YOU WANT OTHER THAN TO TRY TO KEEP SEMINOLE FROM HAVING A NICE HOSPITAL FACILITY?

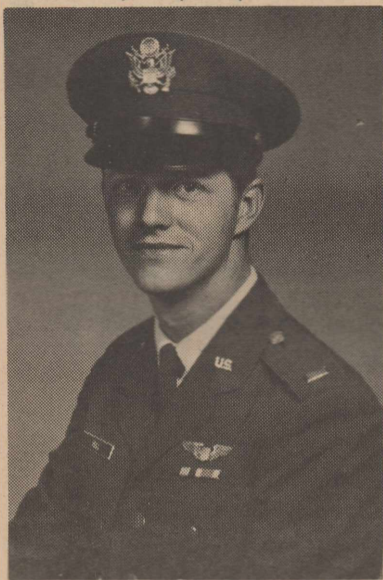

RAY'S MENS WEAR LOOTED



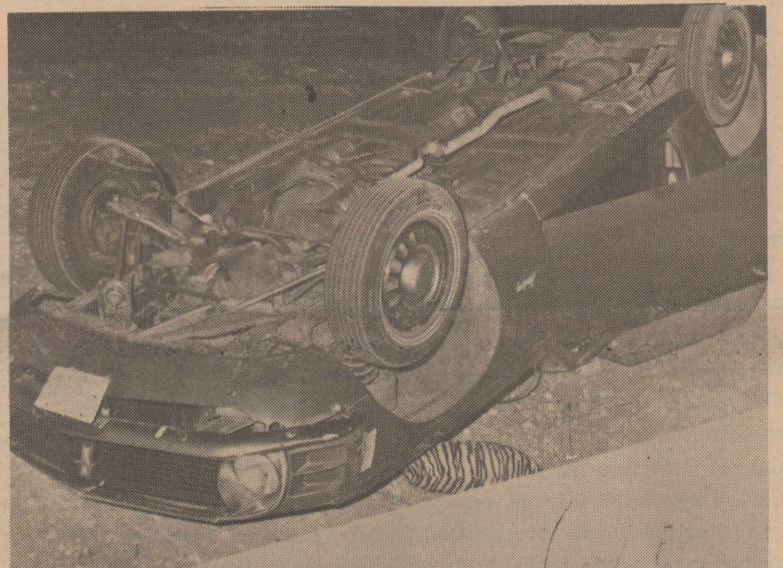
How's this for a load of clothes? \$3749.05 worth from Ray's Mens Wear. The picture was made of clothes stashed in the burglar's car.

2 KILLED 4 INJURED IN MANY WRECKS

91 YEARS YOUNG

W. Earnest Berry III struck the abutment of a small culvert in the 1970 Mustang he was driving last Friday night at approximately 11:45 p.m. and flipped it upside down next to the water underpass. Neither he nor his little brother, Richard, were seriously injured. The accident occurred ½ mile from the city limits on the Denver City Highway while the car was traveling northwest.



Eddie R. Davilla, thought to be the driver, and a passenger, Eddie M. Davilla, thought to be the father, were sent on to Lubbock Sunday morning from Seagraves after the 1968 Ford in which they were riding left an icy road .7 miles south of Seagraves on FM Road 1429 and turned over three times.

The driver, according to TDPS Phil Upton, reported to have a dislocated left hip and deep cuts over his left eye, while Eddie M. Davilla was thought to have a dislocated hip and possibly other injuries. The car came to its final resting place after traveling more than 800 feet, skidding and turning over as it traveled.

WRECKS FROM PAGE 1 Chief of Police Shorty Blackmon was called. He suggested calling the owner. Charles Ray was called and he assured police he did not know the car.

The back door was approached and they saw it move. They retreated and waited for help. Chief Blackmon arrived and as they approached the door (which had been pried open by the burglars) they found the two men lying on the ground next to Kelley's Dress Shop where they had tried to cover themselves with dead weeds. It took five men about fifteen minutes to carry suits and clothing from the car back into the building. \$79.07 in cash was found on the ground where the thieves were lying and in their possession that had been taken from the store. Good work by city patrolmen spoiled probably what is one of the largest break-ins in recent years in Seminole.

nounced dead at the scene of the accident by Justice of the Peace W.E. Cox, Jr. They were killed in a 1969 Ford 3/4 ton pickup driven by Paul Gomez Alvarado, age 19, of 108 N.E. Ave. E.

The accident occurred 30 miles northwest of Seminole on the Whiteside Farm to Market Road 1 mile west and 1/2 mile south of the farm community of Higginbotham. The vehicle apparently skidded out of control off the roadway on the east side, turning over 1 1/2 times and coming to rest on its top. The time was 2:15 a.m. Sunday morning. Clayton Koonce, TDPS, worked the accident.

Cletus Dale Leverett, 27, did approximately \$300 damage to

his 1967 Ford pickup when it skidded on the ice road 5.4 miles west of Seminole Sunday at 1:30 p.m., turning over 1 1/4 times.

William Edgar Woods, a school teacher from Seagraves, ran over a highway sign 14 miles east of Seminole at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, causing about \$100 damage to his auto due to the ice and snow.

Carl Wylie, Jr. of Ft. Worth, along with three other musicians, escaped injury when their 1956 Bel Air turned over 1 1/2 times 21.5 miles west of Seminole Sunday. The station wagon was totally destroyed.

A mother was treated in Lea County Hospital for bruises while the father and four children, ages 3, 4, 6 and 7, escaped injury when the family Dodge automobile turned over one complete time 20.5 miles west of Seminole Sunday.

Why, I did just what you would have done. I got permission to take him to town and buy him some new shoes.

"My name is William Benjamin Jones," he said. (Not his real name, of course.) "I have four brothers and three sisters. I really washed the other night - my hands, my wrists and my feet - that was all that needed it. I sure do like to go to school and especially do I like to eat dinner at school; they serve the best food in the school cafeteria and I clean up my tray every day. Do you know what I had for breakfast - a throat lozenge."

But, on with the story. We arrived at the United Department Store and I asked him what kind of shoes he wanted. "I want some I can run and play in, I can't hardly walk in these and I want some of those pretty white tennis shoes. I won't have to have any socks if they'll just be big enough."

We bought four pair of socks to begin with and Mrs. Womack was so kind to him. She got him some low quarter white tennis shoes, just like he'd always wanted - and I thought of my own little boy - two pair of tennis shoes, shoes and probably a pair of boots if he hasn't outgrown them. We just forget that other people have needs in our rush for things and more things, food and more food, one car, two cars and bigger cars, one suit, two suits, five suits, one house, one bedroom, two bedrooms, four bedrooms, a bath, a bath and a half, two baths, three baths and here's a little boy that all he wants is a pair of white tennis shoes, not even socks.

Both socks were put on, both shoes were put on and he stood up and stretched and right then he was about the proudest person of a possession that I'd ever seen.

On the way back to school he didn't thank me once, he didn't thank me twice, he thanked me three times. He looked at the shoes, he patted the one on the right, he patted the one on the left. "Just what I always wanted. Mr. Woods, I'll bet I'm faster than anybody else in my room now. It just feels like that I don't have a thing in the world on my feet. They feel so cool, my feet are not even burning anymore."

If you think for one moment

that I'm setting this down to prove that I have a heart, you're absolutely wrong. I'm writing this down to remind me and you that we miss our perspective in life, we neglect to rejoice over what we have and be thankful for what we have, but speed on to the next block in hopes that we can find new joys, new pleasures and new possessions when really the things that make us grow are ever around us and we just cannot, we just will not see and enjoy great pleasures because of our near sightedness and our great inability to understand.

Why, a mere \$4.69 was spent. The good done - why, about \$469.00 worth - not to the little boy, but to the big man.

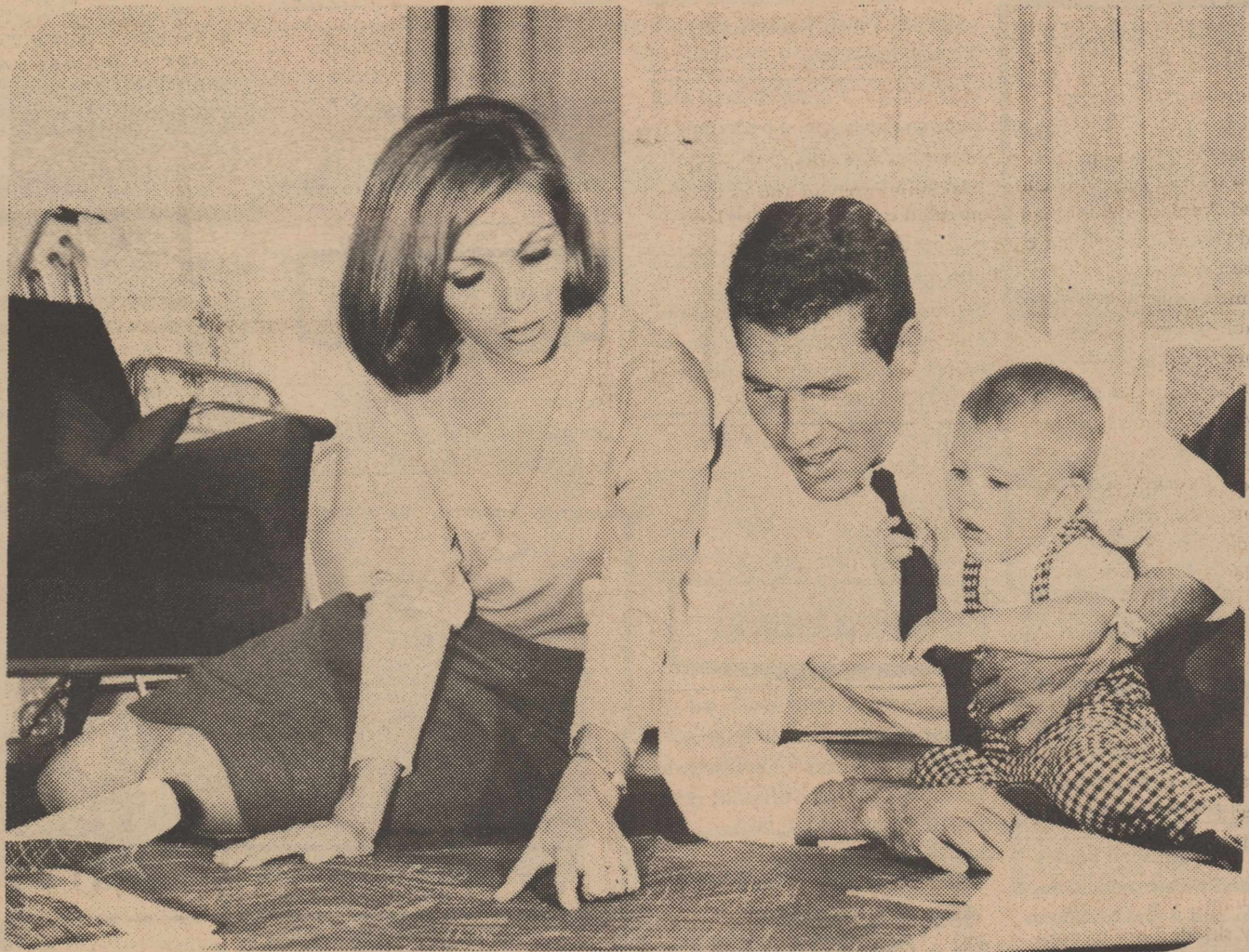

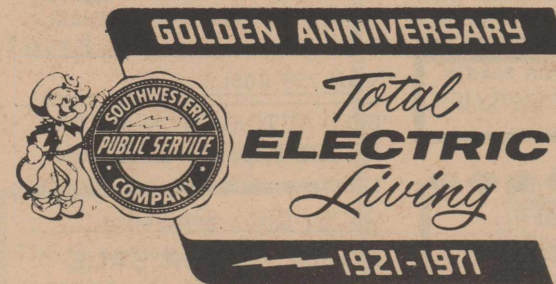

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

LOCAL LEADERS RECEIVE CITATIONS

Fifteen Seminole business and civic leaders received citations today from the Texas Industrial Commission and Governor Preston Smith for having made a "significant contribution to Texas" industrial development". They were Ruby Frost, Harry Sawyer, Glen Cavitt, M. W. Jones, Imogene Jones, Mary Baldwin, James Biggerstaff, Jake Harrell, Bob Whippo, Edna Parker, V.H. Glass, Richard Watts, Finley Moore, Dwayne Herman and John Thompson.

The citations were presented to local recipients by E.H. Sheffield of the commission staff in a meeting culminating nearly a year's work towards incorporating pertinent industrial location information on Seminole into the nation's most sophisticated computerized site location data bank.

Called "Insta-Site", the commission's computer program has already received two distinguished awards itself from the Southern Industrial Development Council, a professional society covering sixteen Southern states.

Participation of local leaders in gathering information for "Insta-Site", means that information on Seminole industrial assets will be instantly available to all industrial firms considering new plant sites in Texas.

Sheffield presented a massive 88 page printout containing 1444 items of information on the Seminole area. Local award recipients collected data for 393 items of information on the printout and the balance were collected for the community by the commission staff.

As soon as the local group has reviewed the information and suggested any changes necessary, a computerized Community Analysis Report will be available that shows how Seminole compares with other cities of similar size on the factors that industrialists look for in locating new plants. Using the Community Analysis Report as a guide, Seminole leaders will be able to plan effective measures to spur local economic growth.

"The next phase in the development of the computer program is to match Seminole plant location resources with a profile of the location requirements of all types of expanding industries", Sheffield said.

"This will enable us at the commission to help you concentrate your industrial development program on companies you have the best chance of attracting to Seminole", Sheffield continued.

Statewide, more than 14,000 business and civic leaders in 390 Texas cities will receive the special citations for their part in making the new program possible.

The citations were signed by Governor Preston Smith and Chester C. Wine, Chairman of the Texas Industrial Committee.

6. A request was denied by the aldermen for keeping livestock in the city limits.

7. Bids were opened from Phillips New & Used Car Lot, LM&H, Bennett Motor Co. and McAdoo Chevrolet for a new pickup. The low bid from LM&H International was accepted with an automatic transmission for \$2123.70.

8. The council discussed possibilities of ridding the city of old automobiles, pointing out the scourge to this city and other towns.

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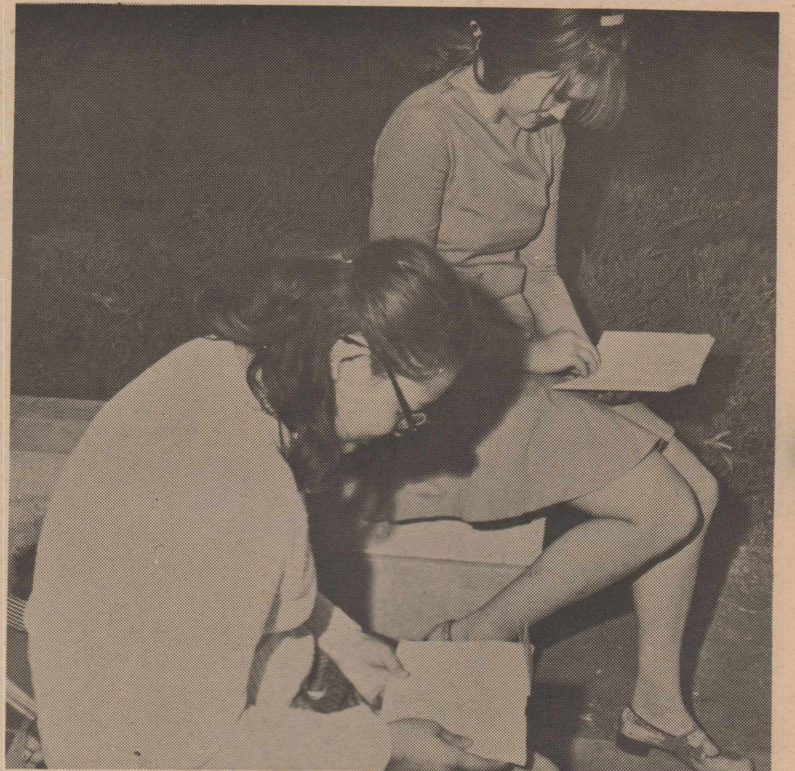
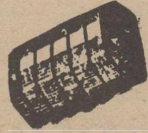
