

Short, representative from this district. Last Tuesday night the subcommittee, made up of Ike Harris, Dallas, chairman; Joe W. Burnell, San Antonio; and Chet Brooks, Pasadena; recommended that Senate Bill #443, creating a hospital district coinciding with the Seminole School District, be passed on to the Senate floor. "It is now considered an uncontested bill and approval will probably be a formality," Rep. Short told the News.

In approving Senate Bill #443, the subcommittee also recommended that Senate Bill #444 not be approved. This was a hospital district created by Seagraves overlapping a portion of the Seminole School District. The problems arose over a hospital district last year when a county-wide measure for a 50 bed hospital was approved in Seminole but defeated county-wide by Seagraves residents. On the same proposition at that time was a proposal to create one smaller hospital in Seminole and one in Seagraves. That measure failed in both towns. Senator H. J. "Doc" Blanchard of Lubbock who represents Gaines County asked that the committee and subcommittee make recommendations to Seminole and Seagraves, declaring himself to abide by the decision. Seminole was represented by eighteen witnesses for the bill, of

which eleven testified.

Seminole has been receiving pornography mail at an alarming rate in recent days and it is being sent with this warning on the envelope. "READ THIS NOTICE BEFORE OPENING! This envelope contains written and/or photographically illustrated sexually oriented advertisement (s). As defined by Section 3010 (d) of the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970, a sexually oriented advertisement 'means any advertisement that depicts, in actual or simulated form, or explicitly describes, in a predominantly sexual context, human genitalia, any act of natural or unnatural sexual intercourse, any act of sadism or masochism, or any other erotic subject directly related to the foregoing. 'If you do not wish this mail, please return it to sendor or destroy its contents without opening. Thank you."

Evidently the new bill as defined by Section 3010 (d) states that this kind of junk mail can be sent if such a notice appears on the outside of the envelope. The material is being sold, a great deal of it, "The Art of Sex in Marriage" with films costing up to \$50 in color. The film is billed as a complete learn at home course, declaring it to be the findings on great authorities of doctors and others. Also books are available up to sets of \$75 worth, even with a chapter dealing on sex slang, lesbian slang, homosexual slang and Army and Navy slang. The material declares that now finally one can have a sex education without censorship.

Surely man has not sunk so low as to use the brain that was given him to think on such base things as revealed in the literature. I think it would do well for the American public to read again about the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah and read up on the history of why God destroyed these great cities.

If you are of the opinion that you do not want this kind of mail delivered to your business or your house, you may contact V. H. Glass at the post office and send in a form to have such mail discontinued to your box and / or to your address. He will help you fill them out. Form #2201 is sent to Washington which makes a list available to printers of such material not to send to you. Form #2150 is sent back along with the material and the post office department notifies the company or sender not to send anymore. This big question - Why do the law makers of our country, why does the supreme court of our land burden the person receiving such mail and not the sender?
