"We knew that Ben had been sick for over a year. What we did not know was that he had Bright's Disease and was losing both of his kidneys. We only found this out in January. Today (Tuesday) is the third day for him to be on the machine. " The machine, Mrs. White went on to say, is what purifies the blood. Mrs. White carried her husband to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston one month ago today. He was in intensive care for 14 days before being moved to a ward. His address is John Sealy Hospital, Ward 4A, Galveston, Texas 77550. The transplant will take place from four to six weeks from this date. He will have to remain in Galveston for several months. Mrs. White has a bedroom rented $2\frac{1}{2}$ blocks from the hospital in Galveston. Mr. White's sister, Willie Mae Vandergrift from Deer Park, Texas, is hopefully giving her brother a kidney. 

The mesquite brush is killed when the blade cuts off the root system at a depth of about 14 inches. The area is then reseeded in the seedbed that has been prepared during the rootplowing operation. A heavy roller-chopper is used to firm the seedbed prior to seeding.

Grassland restoration is a problem confronting ranchers over a large area of Texas if they are to continue grazing the state's rangelands. Millions of acres of grazing land in the state are so infested with invading woody brush species that production has been reduced to the point that the rangeland is unprofitable for livestock grazing.

Gordon Cobb of Seminole is in the process of rootplowing and seeding about 140 acres of rangeland on his ranch in Gaines County. The plowing operation will control the mesquite brush by cutting the root off below the bud zone at a depth of about 14 inches. Once the brush has been plowed, a heavy roller chopper is pulled over the land to firm the seedbed and the grass is seeded.

Cobb, a cooperator with the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Comservation District is carrying out the work under the Great Plains Conservation Program. He is using a mixture of blue panic, side oats grama, Lehmann lovegrass and switchgrass to seed the area. Once the seeding operation has been completed, the pasture will be rested from grazing to allow the grasses to become established. This deferment and the management that the pasture receives later will play an important part in the success of the restoration process.

than my aunt had and I didn't like him for that. He talked about the modern evils of women dipping snuff, how bad it was and then talked about the poor peons that had to roll their own.

I have an idea that other people weren't overly fond of him either. Now when he got old, he got contrarier. My ma mama always said that people didn't get contrary when they got old, it just showed up more and his began to show up a lot more. I was a happy young man when I was told the following story. "Son," my sister said, "you know your uncle Otho. You know how cantankerous he's always been, how contrary he's always been. Well, I've just heard a terrible thing. You know how he always whipped your Aunt Ida. I've checked into Ida started whipping Uncle Otho."

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





OATH AND BOND

SECRETARY OF STATE MARTIN DIES, JR. AN-NOUNCED THAT ALL QUAL-IFIED NOTARIES PUBLIC DESIRING APPOINTMENT FOR THE NEW TERM WHICH BEGINS JUNE 1, 1971 AND ENDS JUNE 1, 1973, MUST PAY THE REQUIRED FEE AND FILE A NEW OATH AND BOND WITH THE COUNTY CLERK BETWEEN MAY I, 1971 AND MAY 15, 1971, INCLUSIVE.

SECRETARY OF STATE DIES FURTHER STATED THAT ANY PERSON NOT NOW A NOTARY PUBLIC WHO DESIRES APPOINTMENT FOR THE BEGINNING OF THE NEW TERM ON JUNE 1, 1971, SHOULD APPLY TO THE COUNTY CLERK BEFORE MAY 14, 1971. THE RE-QUIRED APPLICATION FORMS MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE COUNTY CLERK.

MR. DIES EMPHASIZED THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC SHOULD NOT SEND RE-QUESTS FOR APPOINTMENT OR FOR COMMISSIONS DIRECTLY TO THE SECRE-TARY OF STATE INASMUCH AS THE LAW SPECIFICALLY REQUIRES THAT THE COUN-TY CLERK APPROVE NOTARY BONDS AND FORWARD COPIES OF THE APPLICA-TION TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE.





GAINES COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH CENTER

Two years ago this month the ground work was laid for the Mental Health Center in Seminole. A visiting psychiatrist and psychologist had to be arranged for, a location had to be found and a local staff was needed. Dr. Preston Harrison, Superintendent of Big Spring State Hospital, made two trips here to talk to County officials and with their support and aid and some help from interested parties, things started moving.

Dr. Jerome Smith saw his first patient here in August 1969. And since then the Center has established 174 patients on record and averages 90 patient visits per month - this includes counseling with family members. Many hours of telephone listening and counseling are also rendered to patients and to family members. One out of 8 Texans, at some time in his life, needs Mental Health Services. The Center makes treatment possible in their home communities.

Some of the Center's services are: any person who feels the need can see the psychiatrist and perhaps prevent more serious problems or possible hospitalization.

Follow up care is available to patients discharged from a mental hospital - this provides a certain feeling of security and some one to call on, if help is needed. This cuts down on many re-admissions.

Psychological testing, counseling and group therapy services are available upon recommendation of the psychiatrist.

The local staff assists the patient and family and gives emotional support when needed. Vocational Rehabilitation counseling and guidance, training, indirect and direct job placement and follow-up employment services are available for psychiatric and alcoholic patients. This is provided by a Rahabilitation Counselor who comes from Lubbock on a regular basis. Occupational Therapy for some Senior Citizens and children is also provided by the Center.

Fees are calculated on income, number of dependents and ability to pay. No one is ever turned down. Though most of the patients are from the Seminole area, many come from Andrews, Seagraves and Denver City.

In order to help you plan your buying for next year's school supplies, we are giving you the following information about the supplies that we ask students to furnish. This information is to give you an idea about the kinds of materials that our teachers want, and it is not a required list for every child in a certain grade. Some teachers will require some things and some teachers others. If there is any doubt, the parent should get the list from the child's teacher before purchasing supplies.

- 1. Notebooks Either the zipper type or the regular two-ring type of notebook is acceptable in most cases.
- 2. Crayolas 8, 16, or 24 colors. Some teachers require the non-roll type.
- 3. Scissors Sharp-pointed.
- 4. Ruler Metal or metal-edged.
- 5. Pencils No. 2, or mechanical pencil in higher grades.
- 6. Tablets A. First Grade 8"x 10" single space tablet.
 - B. Second Grade 8"x12" single space tablet.
 - C. Other Grades Most teachers in grades above the second prefer two-ring notebook paper.
- 7. Paste- First grade teachers require white paste with the built-in spreader.
- 8. Rugs First grade children should have a small rug, approximately 27"x36" for rest periods. Rugs are not used above the first grade.
- 9. Handwriting tablets In addition to notebook paper for other work, third grade teachers require an imaginary line tablet for handwriting. This will be a tablet with broken lines between the solid lines. The broken lines are used to regulate the height of small letters.







WHEN A TORNADO APPROACHES-YOUR IMMEDIATE ACTION MAY MEAN LIFE OR DEATH

A TORNADO WATCH means tornadoes are expected to develop. Keep a battery-operated radio or television set nearby, and listen for weather advisories—even if the sky is blue.

A TORNADO WARNING means a tornado has actually been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Seek inside shelter (in a storm cellar or reinforced building) and stay away from windows. Curl up so that your head and eyes are protected. Keep a battery-operated radio or television nearby, and listen for further advisories.

IN SHOPPING CENTERS, go to a designated shelter area (not to your parked car).

IN HOMES, the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them.

IN OFFICE BUILDINGS, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor,

or to the designated shelter area. IN SCHOOLS, follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. If the building is not of reinforced construction, go to a nearby one that is, or take cover outside on low, protected ground. Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other structures with wide, freespan roofs.

IN OPEN COUNTRY, move away from the tornado's path at right angles. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine.

Damage can be minimized by securing trailers with cables anchored in concrete footing. Trailer parks should have a community storm shelter and a warden to monitor broadcasts throughout the severe storm emergency. Displaying the Flag

- DISPLAY the American flag from sunrise to sunset.
- · Raise it briskly, lower it slowly; do not expose it to bad weather; fly no flag above it.
- In hanging it against a wall, keep the blue field uppermost and on the observer's left.
- Never loop or festoon the flag; use red, white and blue bunting instead.
- · On a casket, the blue union should be at the head, over the left shoulder of the honored dead; remove the flag before lowering the casket
- Do not dip the flag in salute to any living person, no matter how exalted; or to any edifice or object, no matter how sacred.
- · Do not sew or paint the flag on clothing, furniture or the like; never use it in advertising.
- · When the flag is worn or faded, do not throw it away-burn it.

AUSTIN- DRIVERS OF FARM VEHICLES ARE TEM-ORARILY EXEMPT FROM COMPLIANCE WITH NEW SAFETY REGULATIONS EST-ABLISHED BY THE U.S. DEP-ARTMENT OF TRANSPORT-ATION'S BUREAU OF MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY FOR DRIV-ERS INVOLVED IN INTER-STATE COMMERCE, TEXAS COMMISSIONER OF AGRI-CULTURE JOHN C. WHITE SAYS THAT CONSIDERABLE CONFUSION HAS DEVELOPED AMONG FARM VEHICLE DRIV-ERS FOLLOWING ADOPTION OF THE NEW SAFETY STAND-ARDS, BUT THAT AN AMEND-MENT TO THE REGULATIONS ADOPTED JANUARY 1 ST. 1971. EXEMPTS DRIVERS OF FARM VEHICLES FOR A SIX-MONTH PERIOD UNTIL JULY 1, 1971.

COMMISSIONER WHITE SAYS THAT ACCORDING TO THE AMENDMENT, FARM VEHICLE DRIVERS MUST BE 18 YEARS OLD, RATHER THAN 21 AS REQUIRED IN THE GEN-ERAL SAFETY STANDARDS. AND THAT OTHER PROVISIONS OF THE REGULATIONS-INCLUDING WRITTEN EXAM-INATIONS, ROAD TESTS AND PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS --WILL NOT APPLY. WHITE POINTED OUT, HOWEVER, THAT FARM VEHICLE DRIVERS ARE DEFINED AS PERSONS WHO ARE AT LEAST 18 YEARS OLD, ARE DRIVING A VEHICLE CONTROLLED AND OPERATED BY A FARMER AND ARE BE-ING USED TO TRANSPORT PRODUCE FROM THE FARM OR SUPPLIES TO THE FARM. IN ADDITION, THE VEHICLE BEING DRIVEN MUST HAVE A GROSS WEIGHT, INCLUD-ING LOAD OF 10,000 POUNDS OR LESS AND IS NOT USED IN THE OPERATIONS OF A FOR-HIRE CARRIER.

COMMISSIONER WHITE ADVISED ALL FARM VEHICLE DRIVERS TO BE AWARE OF THE EXAMPTION DEADLINE OF JULY 1, 1971, AT WHICH TIME A DETERMINATION WILL BE MADE AS TO THE PERMANENT INTERPRETATION OF THE REGULATIONS AS THEY APPLY TO FARM VEH-ICLE DRIVERS. THE PRE-SENT INTERPRETATION IS BASED ON THE CROSSING OF STATE LINES BY FARM VEHICLES.

BOLL WEEVIL TRAPS TO BE SET UP

COUNTY

BOLL WEEVILS HAVE BEEN MOVING INTO SEVERAL SOUTH PLAINS COUNTIES DURING THE PAST THREE YEARS AND ARE POSING A THREAT TO THE COTTON INDUSTRY IN THIS AREA.

IN GAINES COUNTY, THE WEEVILS HAVE BEEN LOC-ACTED IN SOME SECTORS, REPORTS COUNTY AGRICULT-URAL AGENT CALVIN D. HOLCOMB.

IN ORDER TO DETERMINE IF WEEVILS HAVE OVER-WINTERED IN THE COUNTY AND, IF SO, TO PINPOINT THEIR LOCATION, TRAPS WILL BE SET UP AT VAR-IOUS LOCATIONS DURING APRIL BY PERSONNEL OF THE TEXAS AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE. AC-CORDING TO HOLCOMB, THESE TRAPS WILL BE LOCATED NEAR COTTON FIELDS, ESPECIALLY IN AREAS THAT ARE FAVOR-ABLE BOLL WEEVIL OVER-WINTERING QUARTERS, SUCH AS SHINNERY AND MES-QUITE, PLANS CALL FOR THE TRAPS TO BE CHECKED TWICE A WEEK.

IN DISCRIBING THE TRAPS HOLCOMB EXPLAINS THAT EACH CONTAINS A SYNTHE-TIC BAIT THAT IS SATURATED WITH A HORMONE CALLED "PHEROMONE" WHICH ATTRACTS BOLL WEEVILS. IN THE PAST, LIVE MALE WEEVILS WERE USED AS A PHEROMONE SOURCE. THE TRAPS ARE COATED WITH A STICKY SUBSTANCE. AND WEEVILS WILL BE "STUCK" ON CONTACT. THE TRAPS WILL BE PAINT-ED BRIGHT YELLOW AND WILL SIT ON A POLE ABOUT FOUR FEET HIGH.

HOLCOMB ENCOURAGES


