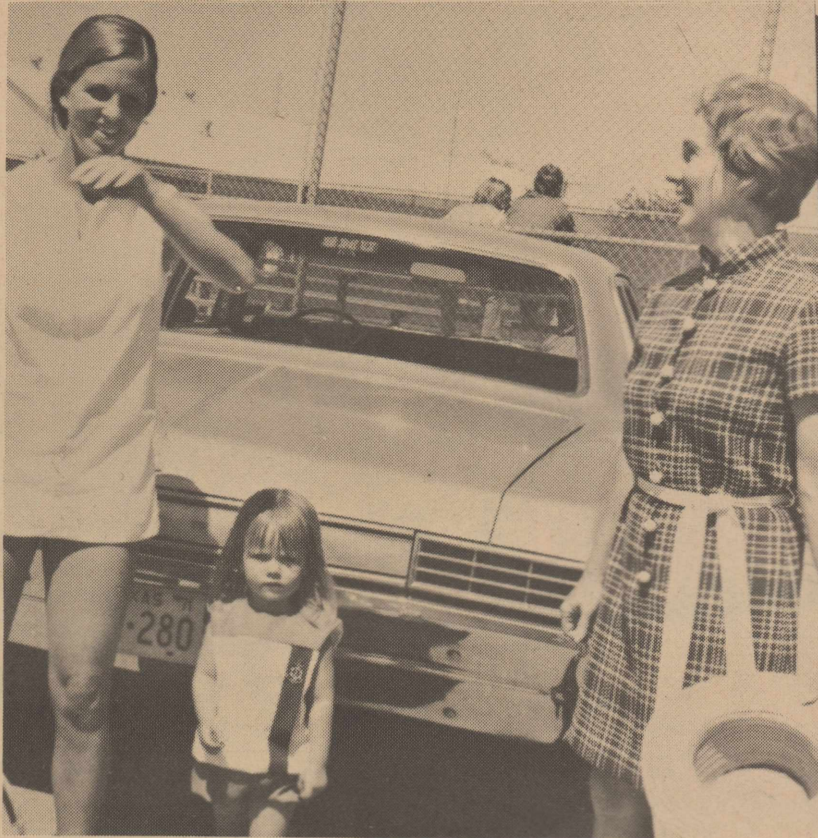


HAPPY PARENTS & WINNING DAUGHTERS

Cindy Bramlett won the state girls AAA singles championship, making her a four time state champion. Cindy defeated Sheri Sharp of Vernon in the opening round last Friday 6-3, 6-0. Her coach said, "The first set was tougher than the score indicated but she came on strong in the 2nd set." In the finals she beat Sharon Hill of Aransas Pass 6-2, 6-0. The doubles team of Cummings and Riley found their first round a tough one, beating Rosa Garza and Ann Lauder of Mercedes 6-2, 10-8. In the second set the Mercedes girls both dropped to the back side of the court to try to upset the young team from Seminole, winning the first 3 games. It turned into a fierce battle of the fierce backhand of Cummings and the smashes of Riley. Saturday was much easier for the girls from Seminole as they did not allow Debbie Stovall and Carolyn Gabbert of Hershey Wichita Falls a single game and beat them 6-0, 6-0, to win state. Nerissa Riley was Seminole's newcomer in the state finals while Joneen Cummings was a second year winner and Cindy Bramlett a champion for four straight years.

AS THE WINNER OF THIS AWARD, WICKER WAS PRESENTED A SILVER BOWL. W.A. (BILL) KING, DIRECTOR OF THE TEXAS CONSERVATION AWARDS PROGRAM, WAS ON HAND TO MAKE THE PRESENTATION ON BEHALF OF THE FORT WORTH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, SPONSOR OF THE ANNUAL AWARDS PROGRAM.

The following Chamber of Commerce members were present at the City Council meeting Monday night - Glen Cavitt, John Shepherd, Dr. E.M. John Shepherd served as spokesman for the group, asking for financial help from the city for chamber work. It was discussed at length. Alton Freeman, City Attorney, explained to the council and the chamber officials how the city could vote 5¢ per hundred evaluation to be used in chamber work.

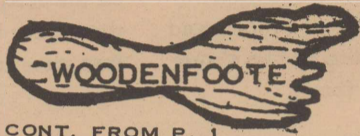
2. Suppliers selling tires to the city were asked to furnish all serial numbers.
3. A report was made on fire department uniforms.
4. A new water well was due completion in the west field on the day the council met. It was voted to pay the final billing and engineering fee on the water well.
5. A bottleneck concerning a 12 inch line going into the supply tanks was discussed, pointing out the necessity of another supply line going into the tank. The council so voted. Approximate cost of labor and materials - \$1500.
6. The Board of Equalization for city property will meet June 4, 1971.

Also, I'd tell about a grandma that was totally deaf and how she used that to her advantage. "Don't your grandchildren bother you?" she was asked, "don't they make too much noise?" She simply answered "I didn't hear a thing." Although a superb lip reader, she just refused to hear bad things about her kin, her neighbors and her grandkids and changed the subject to something she made out like she heard.

Also, my Super Grandma had a super green thumb. I can remember in her 84th year how she cared for her roses and other flowers and her fruit trees, declaring "I'm glad to be home from Oregon and Houston and be in my yard. My yard and flowers have never been so pretty."

Where were the grandchildren that were so fortunate, that heard of the habits of the birds, their family fights, who sat on those eggs for how long, their showing off their offspring, how many eggs were in the nest, how many eggs didn't hatch, their laying habits and on and on? How many grandchildren had a Super Grandma that would kneel on a country path and explain to a grandson about the ant war that was going on, what the tumble bug was doing at his work, watching a bee collecting pollen and a butterfly emerging from a cocoon?

I would tell of a time a grandson said, "Grandmother, pray out loud with me," and you said, with tears flowing, "I've prayed a million prayers but I never had the opportunity nor was I taught to pray like you do. You go ahead and pray out loud, only you and God can hear, then I will pray and only God and I can hear."

Most all grandmothers could read but not like Super Grandma. She threw herself into every character, whether it was the old troll on the bridge or the reverence of God himself. When she read from the Bible you

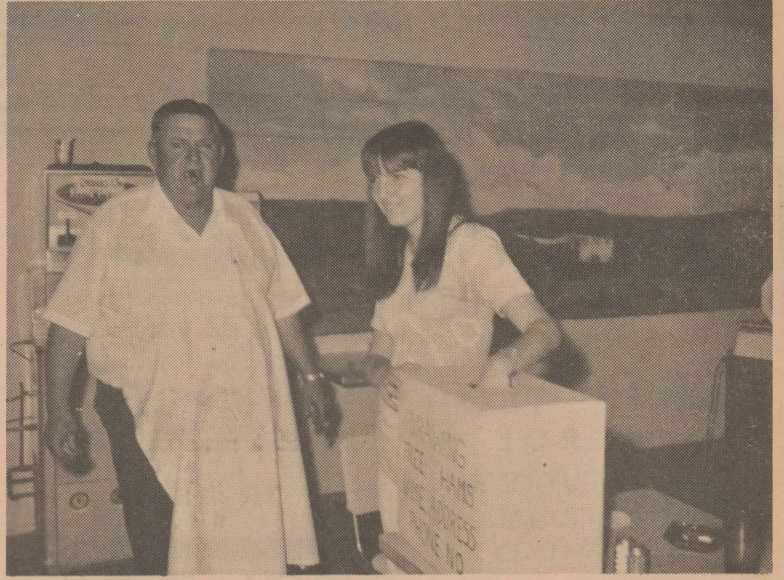

School Board Meets

The Board of Education met Monday night and accepted the resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ray Hicks.

2. The following summer sports programs were accepted as outlined to the board: baseball, track for boys, track for girls, summer golf program, swimming pool program, and the tennis program.

3. The full board sanctioned the action of Melvin Clark, Junior High School teacher, and the administration in the incident of Tuesday, May 4, concerning the accident where one boy was hurt, four boys were punished and the complaints made against the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Garner, and the assault against the teacher.

4. A station wagon was ordered for the use of the school, with its main purpose being for the athletic department. This will be a lease arrangement at a cost of approximately \$800 per year.

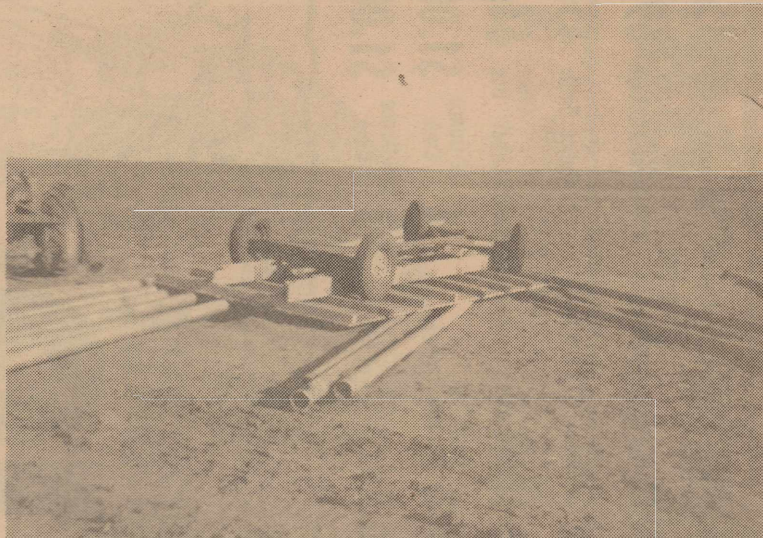

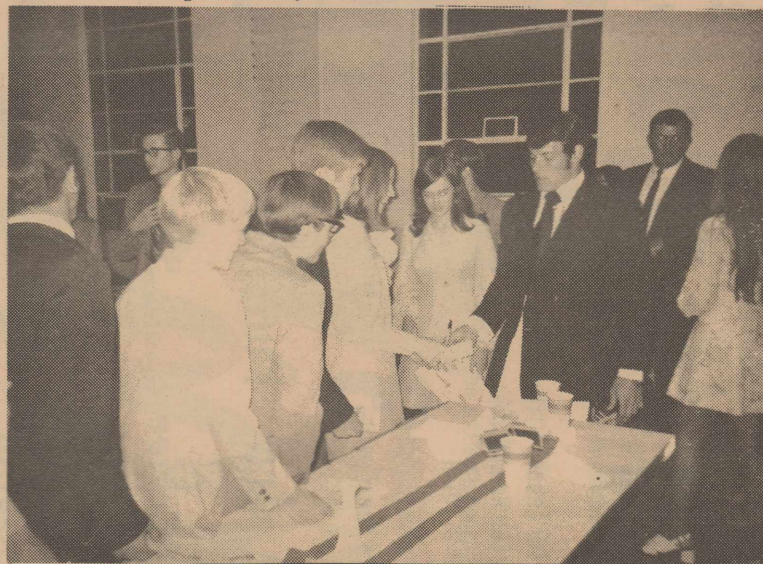
