His disposition is such, his smile is so warming and his zest for living so outstanding that he's made many friends, lived a rich full life and enjoyed living.

I don't know of too many men that I'd enjoy giving me a bear hug but when I saw him last Saturday he just lifted me off the ground. A great time was had.

His wife is a good lip reader. To talk to deaf people, you use your hands, your feet, your eyes and especially your lips. I was talking to her 90 miles per hour in a whisper, she was translating on her hands and George and I were carrying on a lively conversation. Someone at the party remarked, "Walter, I didn't know you could talk on your hands and feet." "I can't," I said, "but when you're talking to a good friend, you've just gotta put something into it."

It was in about 1958 when this large hulk of a man walked out through the field where I was working on a tractor. He had pencil and paper in hand and I knew he was deaf or hard of hearing. He wrote "May I ask you something?" "Yes," I said, "if you'll answer me something." He nodded his head yes and I simply wrote, "Do you whip your wife?" The notes flew fast and furious after that. He got down and helped me finish the work on the tractor and it went to work and I went out to his pickup to meet his wife. She was as enthusiastic as he was and wanted to know everything we'd said. When she found out the ease with which I could talk to them a good friendship developed.

You can't help but feel sorry for any person who has lost one of his senses and you can't help but admire those who have and have gone on to greater heights in spite of their limited capabilities.

The telephone rang. "Is this Woodenfoote?" The answer was "Yes mam." "This is Mrs. Kate Whitaker. Would you like to go on a cow drive?"

The story goes on from there. Gaines County is dry. Not only are farmers suffering from lack of moisture to plant on but cattle are suffering also. Ranchers are out of grass, most all of them have fed up what feed they had on hand. New crops of hay and cubes are being fed to cattle being gotten ready for the feed pens.

The Whitaker cattle were being moved by cowboys horseback from the ranch 20 miles east of Seminole to south of Loop on the Earl Layman place, or a drive of 12 to 14 miles. They

watered on the Sherman ranch between the Lamesa Highway and Loop. Two hundred cows with their baby calves made the trip.

The chuckwagon was a little bit different. The homemade bread, the country cured ham and the great supply of red beans were packed in the trunk of a 98 Olds. It was a good feed for the eight cowboys and one cowgirl on the drive. It was slow going because the cows were not in too good of shape and the small calves moved at even a slower pace.

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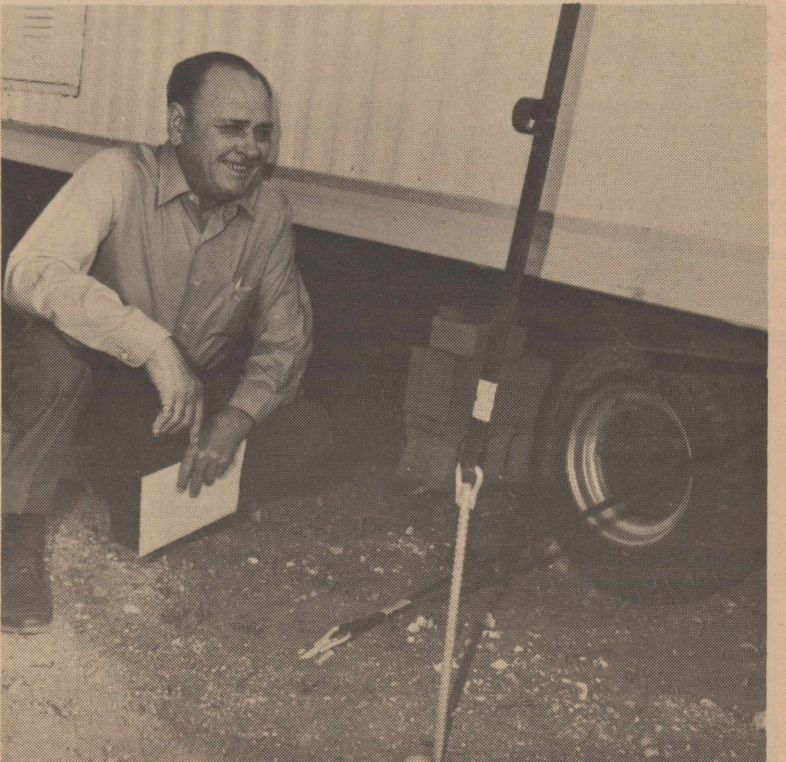


The Seminole Mobile Home Anchor, Inc. shows employees Adam Amager and Julio Villalva as they work on anchors at the building off South Main in Seminole.

"We've got to increase our facilities here in Seminole where we can manufacture 2,000 a day," so Pat Ballew, owner of Seminole Mobile Home Anchor, Inc., said. The new company at present is employing six men. Because of the great damage sustained to mobile homes from high winds and tornadoes, Ballew has been working on safety anchors for mobile homes for the past ten years. This simply ties down the dwelling. Not only has he come up with a reversible cone device at a minimum expense, but has proven its worth with a new testing device. The new factory with its testing device pulled 5300 pounds in blow sand. Auger type would stand less than a 600 pound pull. These tests have been verified by Southwestern Laboratories in Dallas, Texas. The company plans another factory in the Ft. Worth-Dallas area.

A wind of 70 miles per hour with gusts up to 85 can move a mobile home and take it off its blocks. This velocity is exerting 22 pounds per square inch (on the broad side). The company recommends a band on the mobile home every 10 feet, recommending six holes per side and installing twelve safety anchors, four for the frame and eight for banding the home over the top. There are two anchors for the band. A turn key job is \$99.50.

The device that Ballew has patented pending for will be of great service to insurance companies, especially in the coastal area and the West Texas area where strong winds are commonplace. Also specifications for F.H.A. loans say that anchor rods must not be less than 5/8 O.D. Iron and that the bands tying the trailer down be of the 5000 pound pull test. The new business in Seminole will be adding more employees in the future.

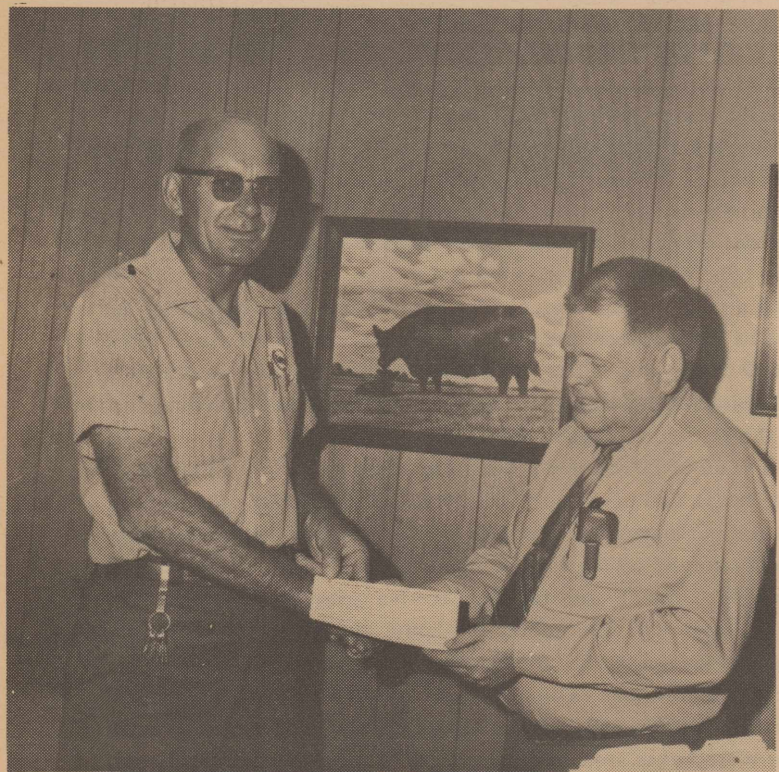


Pat Ballew, major stockholder in Seminole Mobile Home Anchor, Inc., looking at a banding job on a mobile home.

GAINES COUNTY WAS DESIGNATED FOR EMERGENCY LOANS IN JANUARY 1971 AND WE HAVE BEEN ADVISED THAT THE DESIGNATION WILL BE EXTENDED TO JUNE 30TH, 1972.

bilities. George was a good farmer. He was a good neighbor. He had a carefree way that made you want to compete in spite of his deficiency.

During those years we had a "Bracero Program". If I didn't admire him for anything else, I would have to admire him because of his ability to work a man whose language he could not speak. After all, he had more practice at this sort of thing than most of us had had; he was used to working men that he could not talk to. So he knew how to point, grunt and direct when the rest of us did not. One of the things he was interested in always was whether they had plenty to eat. "A man," he said to me, "is just like a mule. He can't work good unless he eats good!" and when he saw to their needs he expected work. He could drive up to a job with 8 or 10 hands and start grunting and pointing and get more work done than about anyone I ever saw. One reason was because he was huge but there was that mysterious something that made them hurry when he made his wishes known.

He was quite a guy. Although several years my senior, we would square off and go through a few fake wrestling holds. He was still a lot of man. No doubt, much more in his younger years.

NEW CORN FUNGICIDE

DEVELOPED

Citcop 4E, a new corn fungicide developed by Cities Service Company, has been approved by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency for use in 1971. Citcop 4E is being marketed to Midwest corn-growers by Cities Service's Custom Farm Service division, it was announced today.

Field tests in Iowa and Indiana in 1970 showed Citcop 4E effectively controlled Southern Leaf Blight infection on the ears. Plots sprayed twice increased yields 23% over unsprayed plots and 10% more than other corn fungicides, Cities Service stated.

Most experts predict that Southern Leaf Blight will again attack in 1971, even though the extent of the attack is debatable. In 1970, Illinois average yield dropped from 98 bushels to acre to 75, it was noted.

This almost certainty of attack is predictable since only 22% of the corn will be fully genetically immune in 1971 and the Southern Corn Blight fungi survived the winter in the Midwest.

Citcop 4E is a protective spray, like most fungicides, and must be applied at the first indication of disease. Repeat treatments are needed every 10 to 15 days until corn reaches the soft dough stage.

Citcop 4E is also effective on numerous other fungi and bacteria diseases. In addition to corn, it is also approved on 12 other crops.

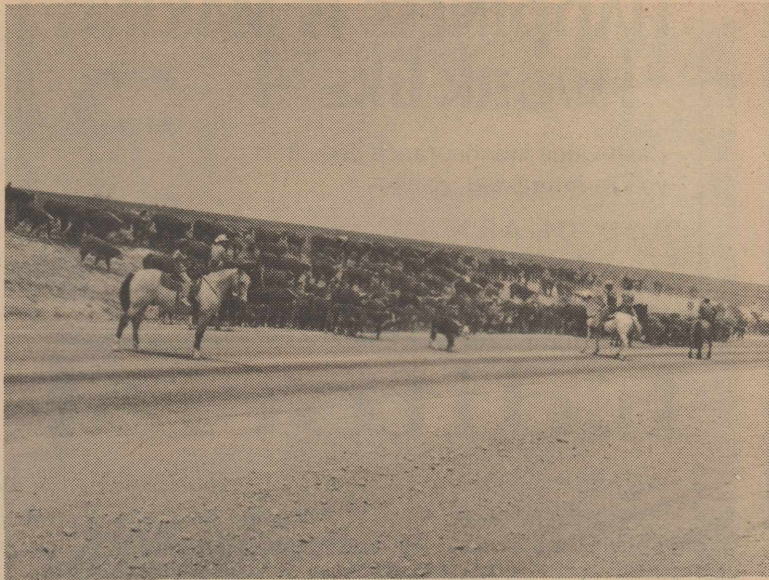

Mr. Keyes went on to say "I cannot resist the temptation to say a few words to this class. Tomorrow, or soon, you will be gone in many directions. You will have the opportunity, many of you, to participate in a protest march, or something of a similar nature in which some demand for certain rights will be made. I will not tell you not to participate in those, but I will say this --- You have no rights that infringe upon the rights of others nor any rights in violation of the law. If you were the only person, you could be a law unto yourself; but you aren't, so you have to consider all people and their rights.

"We are fortunate to live in a land where the people make the laws, where authority comes from the people, where changes are made by the people in an orderly manner as established by the people. We are fortunate to live in a land where those under authority have rights and where those in authority have rights. All of these rights are given by the people. This is true from the very lowest position to President of the United States.

"Let me give you a simple example of what I mean about rights. This program this afternoon is intended to be one conducted with dignity and decorum. Anyone who disrupts that dignity will be infringing upon the rights of those students who want such a program and the rights of those parents, grandparents and friends who came here expecting such a program. When the music for the recessional ends, the program will be over. Then you will have the right to yell and run and whoop and holler to your heart's desire."

HERE ARE A FEW SUGGESTIONS FOR ANYONE WHO WISHES TO FILE A CLAIM FOR BENEFITS BY TELEPHONE. SELECT A TIME WHEN YOU HAVE ABOUT A HALF HOUR TO DISCUSS YOUR CLAIM. BEFORE YOU CALL, BE SURE THAT YOU HAVE YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER, YOUR BIRTH CERTIFICATE AND YOUR MOST RECENT W-2 FORM OR TAX RETURN NEARBY. IF YOU HAVE DEPENDENT CHILDREN IN YOUR FAMILY, HAVE THEIR BIRTH CERTIFICATES AVAILABLE ALSO AND THEIR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS TOO, IF THEY HAVE THEM.

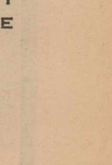

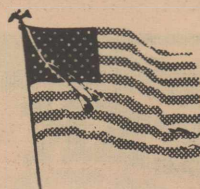

Dear Friend:

Thank you for the nice things you said about me. Thanks for the copy of the Seminole News.

I learned a lot during my 12 day visit to your area. Jackie, I have always wanted a rain-making contract that had as a primary purpose the raising and maintaining of the ground water table at an economical pumping level. I need 9 counties 3 x 3= to 100 miles square, approximately, or more.

Rainmakers are plagued by row cropping like tomato growers who don't want rain at certain times. All tillers of the soil agree on one thing; a High Level Water Table, which can be built up between growing seasons, the same of which will bother nobody.

Jackie, yours is the Hub of all weather control. Seminole is located about the geometric center of the weather control activities for many counties in the drouth area. Seminole lies an equidistance between the north weather of the Panhandle and the south weather of no man's land, weather wise speaking.

Jackie, I will say that \$2,000 per acre should be the price of all land within a 100 mile radius of your post office within five years. The same thing will happen 30 years hence without me.

Jackie, I am 65 years old, would like to be in on Seminole's economic upsurge. Can't wait 30 years so why not us start an underground water replenishment program now.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said District as provided in an ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION duly passed by the Provisional Board of Directors of said District, which Order is substantially as follows:

WHEREAS, in accordance with Senate Bill 443, Acts of 1971, 62nd Legislature, Regular Session, this Provisional Board of Directors deems it advisable to call the election hereinafter ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined: that a case of emergency or urgent public necessity exists which requires the holding of the meeting at which this Order is passed, such emergency or urgent public necessity being that the creation of the Hospital District and the proceeds from the sale of the proposed bonds are required as soon as possible and without delay for necessary and urgently needed public improvements; and that said meeting was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given, all as required by Vernon's Ann.Civ.St. art. 6252-17, as amended.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE PROVISIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF SEMINOLE HOSPITAL DISTRICT OF GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election shall be held on the 19th day of June, 1971, in said District at the following designated polling place:

CITY HALL, SEMINOLE, TEXAS.

Said District shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election:

Presiding Judge: Mrs. Hyle C. Doss,
 Alternate Presiding Judge: Mr. Hyle C. Doss.

2. That the Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than eight qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. That absentee voting shall be conducted at the
 CITY SECRETARY'S OFFICE
 CITY HALL, SEMINOLE, TEXAS,

and during the period absentee voting is required or permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 9:00 A.M., to 5:00 P.M., on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the absentee voting clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting by personal appearance. The absentee voting clerk for said election shall be Mrs. Ruby Frost, and the deputy clerk, Mrs. Elton B. Parker.

4. That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election

at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the District shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically, with respect to a submitted PROPOSITION, (a) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors of the District, and also (b) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. Each elector shall be entitled to vote once, in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

5. That a substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper Notice of said election, and said Notice shall be published once a week for two consecutive weeks, the first publication to appear at least 20 days prior to the date established for the election, in a newspaper or newspapers which individually or collectively provide general circulation in said District.

6. That at said election the following PROPOSITIONS shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

Shall Seminole Hospital District of Gaines County, Texas, be created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75¢ on the \$100 valuation of taxable property situated within the District subject to hospital district taxation, for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, indebtedness assumed by it, and its maintenance and operating expenses, with the boundaries of said Hospital District to be coterminous with the boundaries of the Seminole Common Consolidated School District No. 1, located in Gaines County, as those boundaries were fixed on April 29, 1971?

PROPOSITION NO. 2

Shall the Board of Directors of Seminole Hospital District of Gaines County, Texas, in the event the District is created, be authorized to issue the bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$2,750,000, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair, or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes; with said bonds to mature serially or otherwise within a maximum of not to exceed 40 years from their date, bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed a maximum of 6-1/2% a year, and be issued and sold in accordance with law; and shall the Board of Directors be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient to create and maintain an interest and sinking fund sufficient to pay the interest on and the principal of the bonds as they come due and mature, provided said taxes, together with any other taxes levied for said District, shall not exceed 75¢ on the \$100 valuation of such property?

7. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so that ballots may be cast "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid Propositions, which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:
