The hospital district needs a happy blending of thinking people, also we need to stay in line with accustomed principles, what we can afford, what we want and what we need. A unity of effort is needed. First of all, the proposed cost of a new hospital is staggering. The cost of anything this day and time is staggering, especially construction. The cost of automobiles has doubled and tripled in the past 25 years. Education cost keeps spiraling. However, most of us do not have plans to quit driving or to stop sending our children to school simply because prices are jumping. This area cannot afford to depend upon the government to furnish medical facilities.

Mr. George Mahon said on October 13, 1970: "I regret that officials have not, as yet, taken a more realistic approach in meeting the hospital needs of the smaller communities. I am supporting legislation and other steps which would provide certain relief for this whole problem, particularly with regard to toe registered nurse requirement."



If Seminole residents are to enjoy hometown hospital facilities, Seminole and the Seminole area will have to build them. Seminole has tried to do something about the future needs; first of all for the entire county. That failed when Seagraves and Loop boxes block voted against it. In March of this year Senate Bill #443 was passed, creating a new hospital district coinciding with the Seminole Common Consolidated School District. Next Saturday, June 19th, voters of this district will have the opportunity to vote for the hospital district itself and bonds to build a new 49 bed hospital. 



FUNERAL SERVICES FOR WILLIAM REX FOSTER, 73, WILL BE TODAY AT 3 P.M. IN THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH WITH REV. GENE HAWKINS, PASTOR, OFFICIA TING. BURIAL WILL BE IN GAINES COUNTY MEMORIAL CEMETERY UNDER THE DIRECTION OF SEMINOLE MEMORIAL FUNERAL HOME. A SEMINOLE RESIDENT SINCE 1940, MR. FOSTER DIED MONDAY AFTERNOON IN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL SUFFERING FROM A BROKEN HIP. HE HAD BEEN IN ILL HEALTH FOR SOMETIME.

MR. FOSTER WAS A RE-TIRED PUMPER FOR MARA-THON OIL CO. HE WAS BORN IN CANADA FEBRUARY 18, 1898.





Awards presented were: the Silver Star; Distingius hed Flying Cross and First Oak Leaf Cluster; Air Medal and first through eighth Oak Leaf Cluster; the Purple Heart.

Lieutenant Hull was Killed Feb. 19, 1971, while on a search and rescue mission in Thau Thien province, Republic of Vietnam. Earlier that morning, Lieutenant Hull had successfully directed the rescue of a survivor of a helicopter crash near the southern portion of the A Shau Valley, for which action the Silver Star was presented.

The citation accompanying the Silver Star, the Air Force's fifth highest award, noted that Lieutenant Hull, in spite of extremely limited visibility due to haze and early morning light, avoided intense and accurate anti-aircraft fire to find and direct rescuers to the survivor of the crash.








Dick Kephart shows the base calling form that led the Lions Club Tuesday to declare him the official base called for the year.

Information From Social Security Office

Did you know that social security is one of the most valuable possessions a worker has, and may very likely be the largest asset in his estate? Therefore, it is very important that each employed or self-employed person make certain that all his earnings are properly credited to his social security account.

Everyone is urged to check his social security account at least once every three (3) years. To do this easily, the Social Security Administration has available a post card form OAR-7004 called "Request for Statement of Earnings". This form is available from any social security office or you may get one from me when I visit the courthouse. A statement showing total earnings credited to your account, as well as a breakdown of the amounts credited in each of the last three (3) years, will be furnished on receipt of the form. Any error found should be reported to your social security office so that necessary action can be taken to correct it.

COME TO MARLBORO COUNTRY FOR A LOOK AT BURK BURNETT'S 6666 SPREAD The year 1876 brought Texas a new constitution and 54 new counties. It was our biggest crop of that sort of thing. We are still using both the constitution and the counties. There was all this land out in West Texas, occupied mostly by Indians and buffalo. Only a scattering of cowboys and outlaws could have cared much when lawmakers put a pencil to the cattle-country domain and simply marked off 54 new counties, like making a checkerboard. The typical county was square or nearly so, with an area of about 900 square miles. One of these was named King County. It was on the southeast corner of the rolling plains and it had about 175 inhabitants. Today King is the same size, 944 square miles, as it was in 1876. Its population has grown to 464.

It took 48 years to get those 54 counties organized. King made it in 1891. Guthrie won the county seat from Ashville. It was named for W.H. Guthrie, a Kentuckian who owned stock in a land and cattle company. The cattle business was always big in King County. One might guess it was named for the King Ranch family, but it wasn't'; the name honored William P. King of Gonzales and the Alamo.

Samuel Burk Burnett's Four Sixes brand moved onto the Old Eight ranch in King County in 1900; Guthrie became headquarters for the whole spread, and still is. Other famous names therabout are Pitchfork, SMS and Matador. (Fans of cigaret ads would recognize King as "Marlboro Country.") Burk Burnett was riding the Chisholm Trail at 17; ranching on his own at 21; later making a big name in Fort Worth, Wichita and Baylor Counties, the Indian Territory and New Mexico. In 1905 he was host to President Theodore Roosevelt on a gala wolf hunt across the Red River. Later, through Teddy's intercession, the post office town of Nestorville in Wichita County was renamed Burkburnett. Burnett died at Fort Worth June 26, 1922, age 73. Guthrie, one of the smallest county seats, has had three courthouses. The first was destroyed by a tornado in 1905, in 1913 the second burned. The present concrete-and-steel structure was built to last, and it has since 1914. --- Weldon Hart.
