Coyotes, it seems, are plaguing area farmers this year by eating partially matured cotton bolls.

About eight years ago I lost several young calves to the coyotes. I contacted the late Owen Floyd, a government trapper, for help. "Walter", he said, "Do you see as many as one coyote per day?" "Yes, somedays three or four. The cows are having a new calf or two everyday and some days eight or ten coyotes are spotted." "You have got lots of coyotes." He was out early the next morning. "Can you show me their run?" (He went on to explain that coyotes followed the same run to get all the news.) "Yes," I said. We started on the back side and I showed him where they came across the Elvoy Thomason farm; then between us on a turnrow; then across my farm (where some carcasses had been left.); then across Mr. Vaughn's ranch to the water. After examining four places in the run, he stated, "You've got lots of coyotes, eleven have been by since daylight."

Editorial

Gaines County needs a re-districting of the commissioner's voting precincts. The re-districting required is a result of the U. S. Supreme Court's ruling that county commissioner's precincts must be equal in population. This decision was handed down by the U. S. Supreme Court in the case of Avery vs. Midland County.

Drastic changes will have to be made in this county to abide by the new law. The law further states that not just voters are counted, but people in the individual precincts.

In the last County election, when the propositions of new hospitals were voted on last December, 2,073 voted in all boxes or 2,013, leaving out the absentees. Precinct 4 only voted 115 people as compared to over 700 in precinct 1 and 2. It is easily to see this unfairness in representation between the precincts. One commissioner represents over a 100 where two others represent over 700 voters. If we compare the county population it would be a like figure.

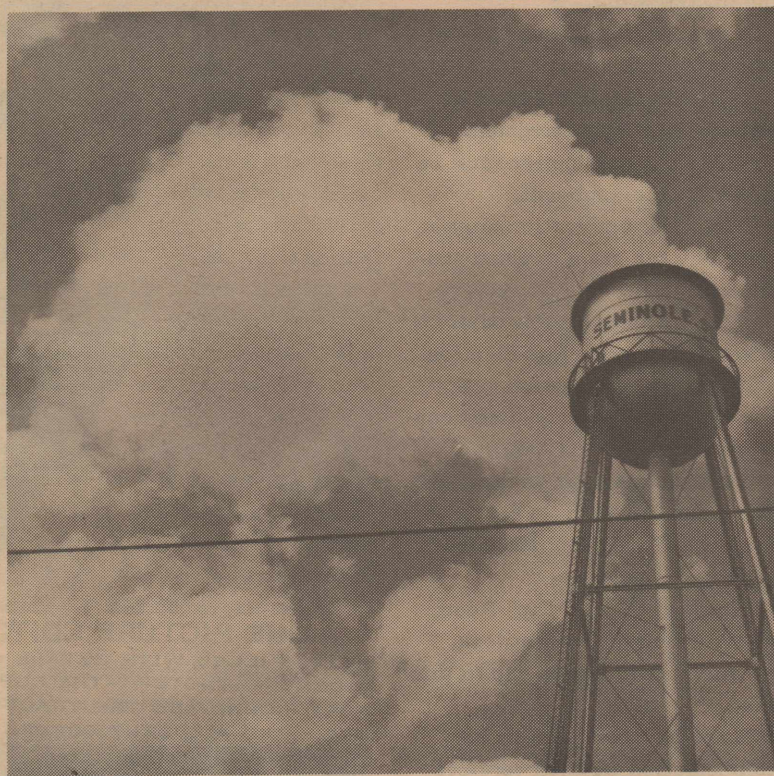
Many counties in the state are already in the process of drawing new lines. We must follow to obey the law.

In the county registered voters, there are 1441 in precinct 1; in precinct 2, 1575; precinct 3, 740 and precinct 4, 274.

Charlie Benson looking through the window that was broken out during the breaking and entering when his Enco Service Station was burglarized Monday morning early.

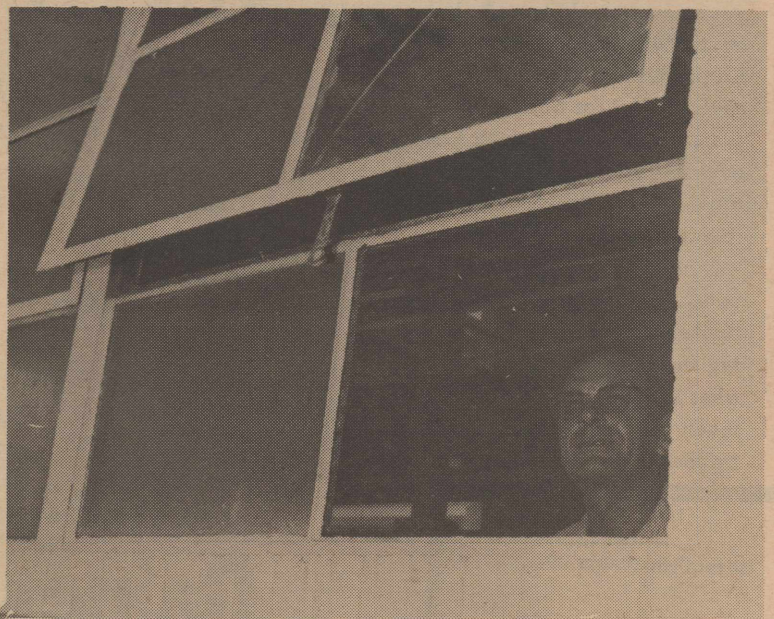

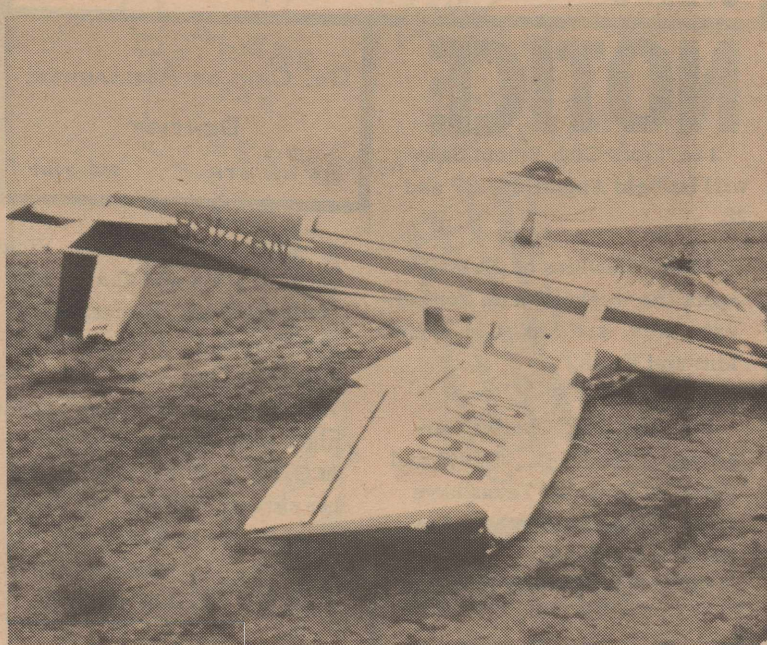
COYOTES EAT COTTON?

The buildup of coyotes is not unusual to the Gaines County farmers, ranchers and old timers. The eating of a new born or stillborn calf is nothing uncommon. Coyotes eat watermelons, cantaloupes and have been known to eat green beans. This is the first time to this writer's knowledge that coyotes have ever eaten cotton. Yes, COTTON. This is no make believe story. In talking to Mrs. Fred (Pauline) Farrar, she said, "Actually they are eating our cotton". Charles Love, who also lives in the Fairview Community, verified the story. Quinn Bacon and Terry Cox, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Earnest Singleton, said "Why, their stomachs are loaded with cottonseeds and we can show you". They proceeded to do just that. They had killed two coyotes and showed me the open stomachs. There was at least a double hand of cottonseeds from the young green bolls they had eaten off the cotton stalks. It is nothing unusual for coyotes to eat watermelons, sheep, young calves or cantaloupes - it is most unusual for them to eat the cotton out of the green bolls from a growing cotton patch. After checking through the Farrar's "cottonpatch" it seems that the coyotes had worked almost every row. It's not enough to be a dry year - another pest has been added, the COYOTE.

Air Craft Crashes



Yesterday morning at 7:10 a.m. Ralph Gillispie of Midland, Texas lost power and made a forced landing east of Seminole and behind Josie's Cafe in his Cessna 175. He touched down in the forced landing, went through a four barbed wire fence and nosed over finally 165 feet away. Hiway Patrolman Clayton Koonce gave his age as 34 years old. "I saw the highway," he said, "but chose rather to land in the pasture. I saw the fence but there was nothing I could do about it." The pilot was uninjured. The approximate worth of the plane was \$6,000. The fence and the property where the plane ended up belonged to Noble Fox.

Junior Ratliff is seen with a Stiger Tiger tractor, pointing out a great advancement from a one horse drawn rig to a 325 rated horse power rig. The tractor unit weighs 32,000 pounds plus approximately 5,000 pounds of water to be added to the tires. The huge unit swivels in the middle, has front end and rear end drive, three sets of different hydraulic controls and can either have a three point hitch or draw bar. The eight tires are near 6 feet high and it is powered by a 409 Cummings engine. It has ten forward gears and two reverses, with a high and low range. Ratliff of Irrigation Supply, 400 North Main, said the unit comfortably handled a 14 foot bucket on a 70 foot long land plane. The unit lists at \$43,000.00. (Air conditioned? - Yes. TV? - No.)

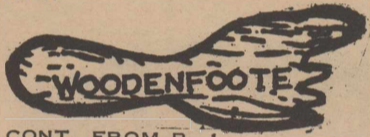
A nominee must meet the following qualifications:

Mr. Floyd put out 125 poison baits. They were gone in three days. He put out 175 more baits, they were all gone within the week. He then put out a final 75 baits up and down this mile and one-half run. Of the 375 baits he put out, he felt like he killed at least 125 to 150 coyotes. We found many dead coyotes plus a raven or two and that ole' yellow tomcat I had been trying to kill. (That tomcat ate many more quail than my family did.)

The most interesting part of the story is what he put his baits in. Mr. Floyd inserted a capsule in a piece of fat from the bag of an expectant young heifer or cow. (I think I paid \$3.00 per pound for this fat.) This fatty piece would be about the size of the end of your thumb. One young cow would have only about 3/4 to 1 pound of fat. Mr. Floyd had several butchers to save this fat for him. He was the smartest coyote man I have ever known. He could read the runs, tell you whether it was a dog or a female; whether she was carrying pups or feeding pups. He could tell you approximately how far she was carrying the food and sometimes what kind of food it was. So much for coyotes and a great trapper.

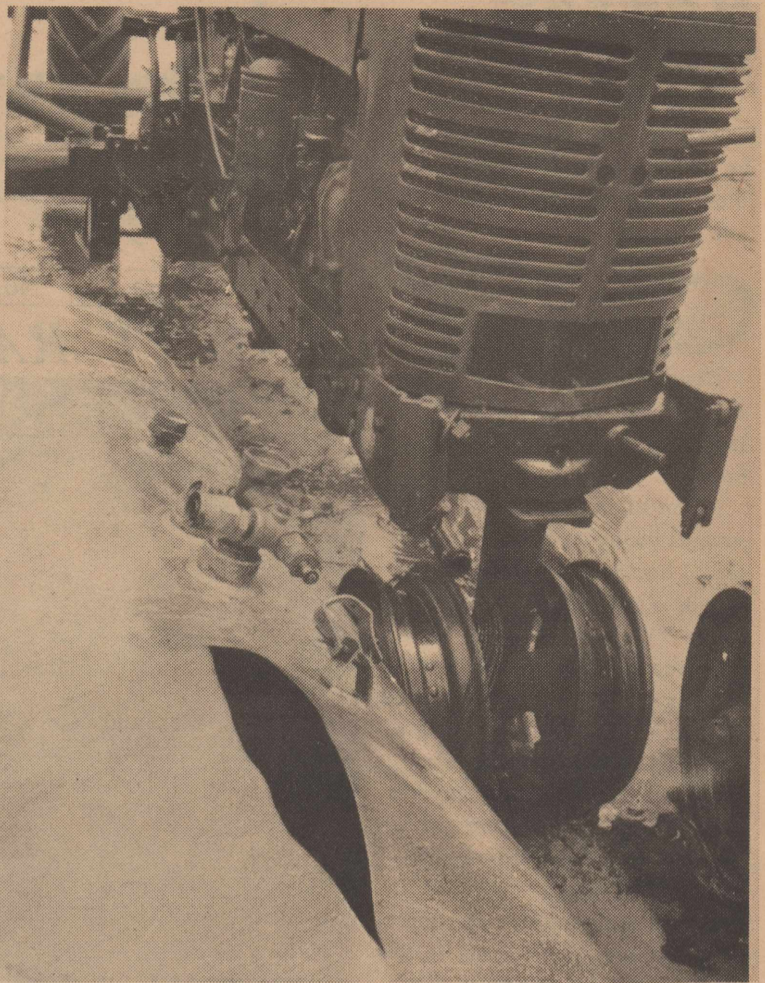

**SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE'S
GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY**

How does a company decide when it is going to celebrate its 50th anniversary year? In the case of Southwestern Public Service Company, the decision was made late last year by the simple expedient of impressing the corporate seal on a piece of plain white paper. When the resulting impression read, "Incorporated, 1921", 1971 became the electric company's golden anniversary year.

Up until that decision making moment, five different years could make some kind of a case for being the birth year, with one of them going all the way back to 1894. The others were 1904, 1925 and 1942, and the winner, 1921. 1921 won the battle because, in addition to being the year that came up on the seal, it was also the year of organization of the company which, 4 years later, took on the name of Southwestern Public Service Company. The 1921 company which became today's Southwestern, was the Roswell Public Service Company. Among its incorporators was Hi Dow, well-known New Mexico pioneer and a director and general counsel for Southwestern Public Service Company until his death in 1969. The name change to Southwestern Public Service Company came in 1925, which was also the year that expansion began with the purchase of electric systems in Artesia and Carlsbad.

1925 was also the year the company first began operations in Texas, with the purchase of the electric systems in Amarillo, Pampa and Panhandle. The 1920's are the most interesting years in the electrical development of this region. The region was then, basically, a cluster of small towns, each of which had its own inadequate, and usually antiquated, electric supplier. There were few, if any interconnections, with other communities or electric systems. Most of the towns were only large enough to be served by a single circuit, and if something happened the whole town was out of power until it was repaired.

This is an era which also brought some communities electric service for the first time. In late 1926, for example, Southwestern built a transmission line from Amarillo to Pampa and brought electric service to White Deer, Texas for the first time - on Christmas Eve. There was still considerable fragmentation insofar as electric service was concerned and parts of seven companies, each of them a subsidiary of at least one holding company - were serving throughout the area. It was apparent, then, that the electric service needs of the area could be met even more efficiently and economically if it were served by a single, independent, operating company, devoid of holding company ties, locally managed and immediately responsive to area needs.

In short, the region, which had fairly common agricultural and business bonds, lent itself to integration, in the electrical sense of that word. The Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1935 and co-operation between government and business made this integration possible. The holding company subsidiaries which had been serving the region were merged into a single entity, Southwestern Public Service Company, an independent, integrated operating company. It was the first such company, incidentally, to result from the application of the Holding Company Act. Thus it was, as the area embarked on the most rapid period of its growth - immediately following World War II, it was served by a single electric supplier prepared to meet the electric service needs that growth brought on.

Southwestern serves a 45,000 square mile area which starts in the Southwest corner of Kansas, crosses the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, moves down onto the South Plains of the Lone Star State and then moves westward to include the Pecos Valley and Clovis-Portales regions of New Mexico. There haven't been any power shortages in this area in the past and the folks at Southwestern don't envision any in the future. To make their visions become reality, the company is adding to its investment at an average annual rate of \$20-million. The total investment will pass the 500-million dollar mark in the early 70's. Incidentally, it was 39-million dollars, the total investment, that is, when the company took its present form in 1942.

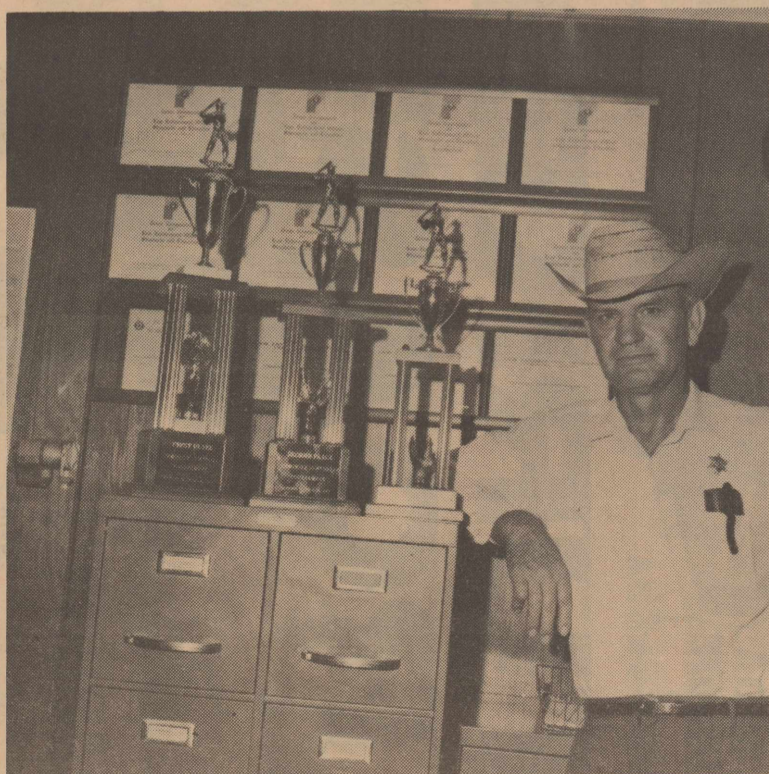

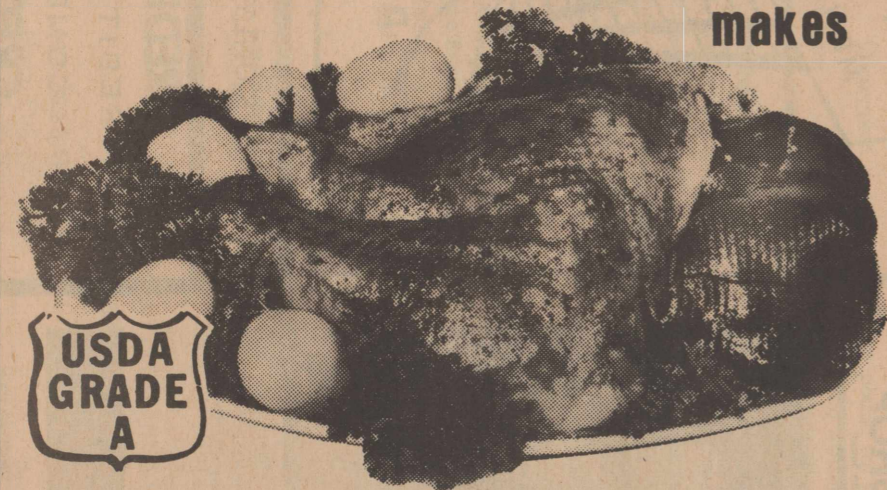

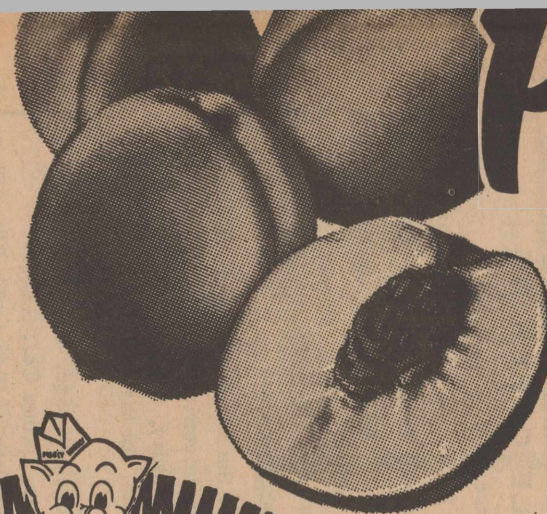

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SEMINOLE, TEXAS, THE DISPENSING OF ANY FLAMMABLE LIQUID USED AS MOTOR FUEL, AS AN ACT OF RETAIL SALE, FROM ANY MOBILE SERVICE UNIT, VEHICLE, TANK TRUCK, OR OTHER MOTOR VEHICLE PARKED ON ANY OFF-STREET PARKING FACILITY OR ON ANY PUBLIC STREET; AND PROVIDING FOR A FINE NOT EXCEEDING TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS FOR EACH VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEMINOLE:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the City of Seminole, Texas, to dispense from any mobile service unit, vehicle, tank truck, or other mobile device any flammable liquid used as motor fuel, as an act of retail sale, into the fuel tank of any motor vehicle parked on any off-street parking facility or into the fuel tank of any motor vehicle parked on any public street.

Section 2. Every violation of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine of not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

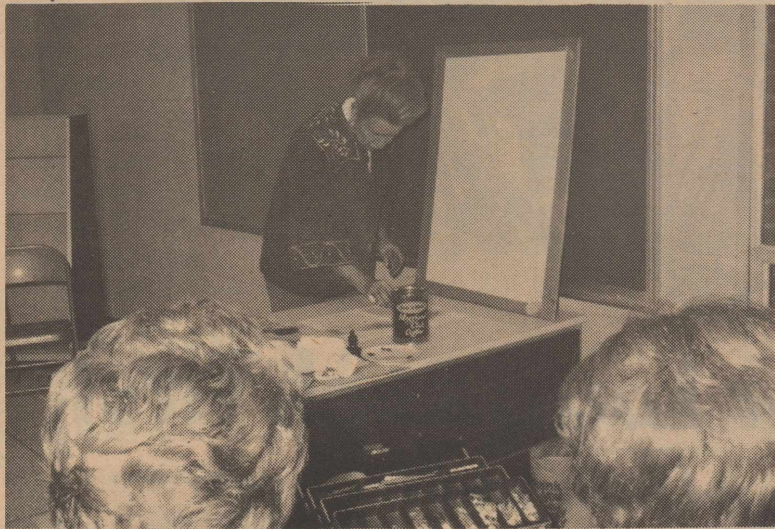

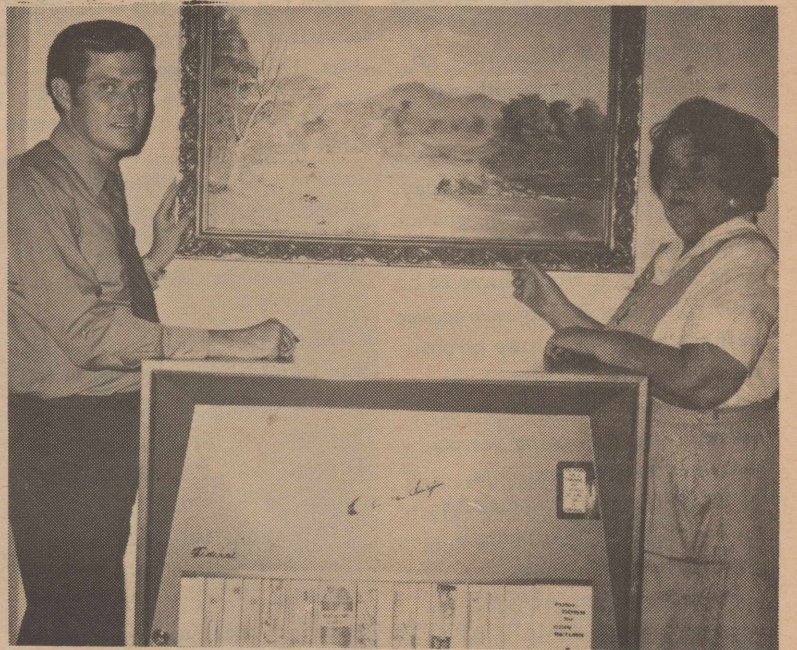

CARROLL HARALSON, LEFT AND ROSS MOORE, RIGHT - OWNERS OF MOORE-HARALSON AGENCY.

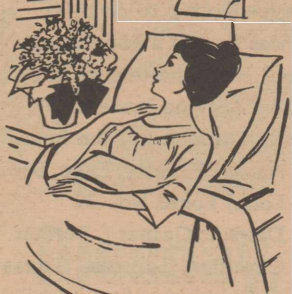

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Attached is a news release that you might want to run in your paper as soon as possible. We are having a lot of calls and letters regarding this.

I did not know how to go about giving this to the public, but I am the only one in this office now and occasionally it is closed while I am on annual or sick leave. I hate to have people drive all the way from your area to talk with me and find the office closed. It might be best that they call before making a trip over here. We had a Reduction In Force effective the first of May and they do not allow us to have an assistant. We regret having to do this, but it was by the authority of National Headquarters for the Selective Service System.

Selective Service System Executive Secretary Mrs. Naomi Petty, who manages Lamesa's local board having jurisdiction over Dawson, Gaines and Borden Counties, says the current Congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among draft-age men.

Mrs. Petty continued, "Selective Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in the Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted."

"Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for preinduction physical examinations those young men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months," Mrs. Petty said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

"Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175--the current processing ceiling--have a very good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored," Mrs. Petty said.

"Many young men," said Mrs. Petty, "seem to think that the Selective Service Act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. Some of them also think that the entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examination."

Mrs. Petty also stressed that local boards are continuing to consider CO, hardship, and student deferments and to take other classification actions. "Young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so," Mrs. Petty said. "The expiration of the induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Petty added.

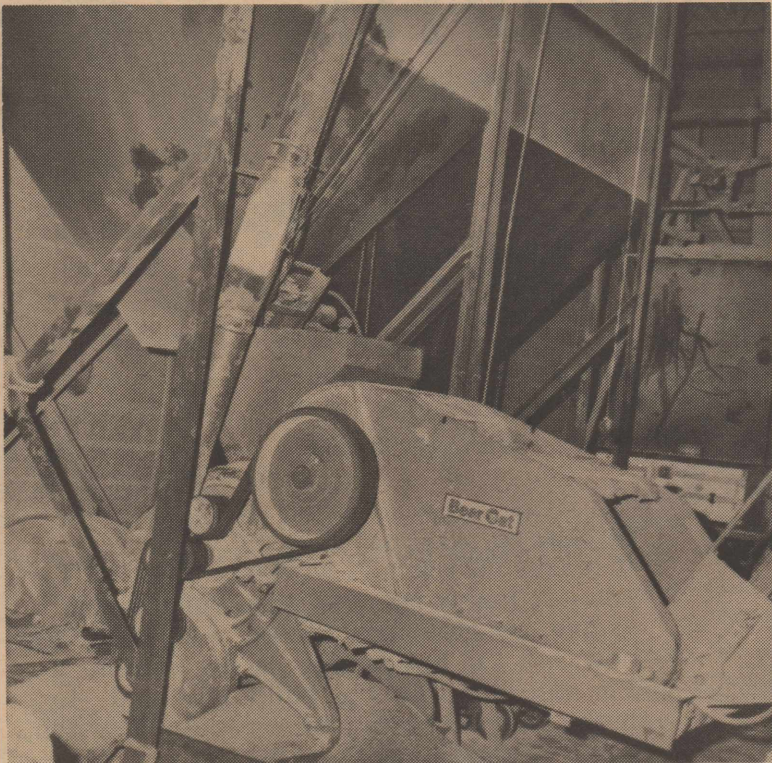
