Sending you the paper clippings on the Cook girl. You remember I was telling you I had heard on the 10 o'clock news Friday night they had picked up a boy for questioning. Well, this was him. Our son was in a state of shock when we got in yesterday. He went right in to take a bath. The phone rang and it was his brother, wanting me to ask him if he knew this Jerry Simmons at Waltry's, that killed the Cook girl. I didn't even know they had even found the body. I went to the bath and asked my son if he knew him and he said, "Nickname Butch". When I told him what happened he said "No, it couldn't be him." He came right out and got the paper and went to reading. Sat around and read and looked for hours, depressed him so that kids are letting dope ruin their lives. He says he knows him real well and he's a fairly nice boy - only thing, says he has always had an inferiority complex about his size. He says he is short but well built.

Then a friend rings the doorbell and they just stand there and look at each other before they start talking. They can't believe, knew smoking pot and maybe few pills but didn't dream on heroin. He worked with his friend at a grocery store on Ella and Pinemont. Said he worked with him Wednesday night after he had killed the girl and said he didn't act a bit different. They are having the Cook girl's funeral at White Oak Baptist today.

I really wouldn't know which way to turn with kids today - the why of it puzzles me so much - that they have to get on dope to exist and why they think so is beyond me. These kids all saw the Landis boy die from overdose last school term, guess they all think not going to happen to them - but leads to stealing so they can get money. They need to find these pushers and string them up like olden days. Seems everything keeps getting closer and closer to me. Landis boy, Linda by lightning, this boy and so many we know on dope, it surprises me so.

My son went to the grocery store this morning and got that boy's opening. His friend had told him yesterday they hadn't hired anyone yet. He starts to work at four this afternoon. I had to run up and get some white shirts, wear ties - found perm-anene press short sleeve on sale at Sears for 99¢. Hate this way to have found a job but someone

The sale of the Seminole News to the Seminole Sentinel, Inc. was announced today by the publishers of the two newspapers.

Sentinel publisher Roy McQueen announced that the News will be merged with the Sentinel, effective today. The Sentinel will continue publication on a semi-weekly basis--Thursdays and Sundays.

Today's edition of the Seminole News will be the final issue, according to co-publishers Walter Woods and Leon Foote.

In making the announcement, Woods said, "We are pleased to announce the purchase of the News by Roy McQueen and his associates. We feel that the Sentinel will give this community the kind of newspaper which it deserves."

Woods continued that he had always felt that the community deserved a newspaper which would help promote the economic growth and development of the community and Gaines County.

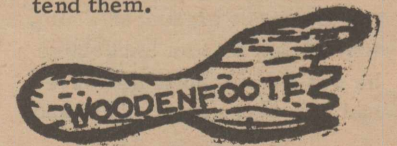
The News began publication almost five years ago. "We feel that this merger is in the best interest of the entire community," Woods said. "Our first concern has always been that of the people of Seminole."

McQueen concurred that the merger is in the best interest of the citizens of Gaines County. "In particular, we feel that the merger will be of great benefit to the business community. We feel that all elements should be pulling together and not pulling apart," McQueen said.

"We believe that the purchase of the News by the Sentinel is another step forward for this area," McQueen added. "We look forward to working with Mr. Foote and Mr. Woods in promoting Seminole."

The Sentinel is in its 64th year of publication. The Sentinel was purchased by its present owners in June of 1968. Publication on a twice weekly basis was begun last December.

The Sentinel will honor all News subscriptions or will extend them.

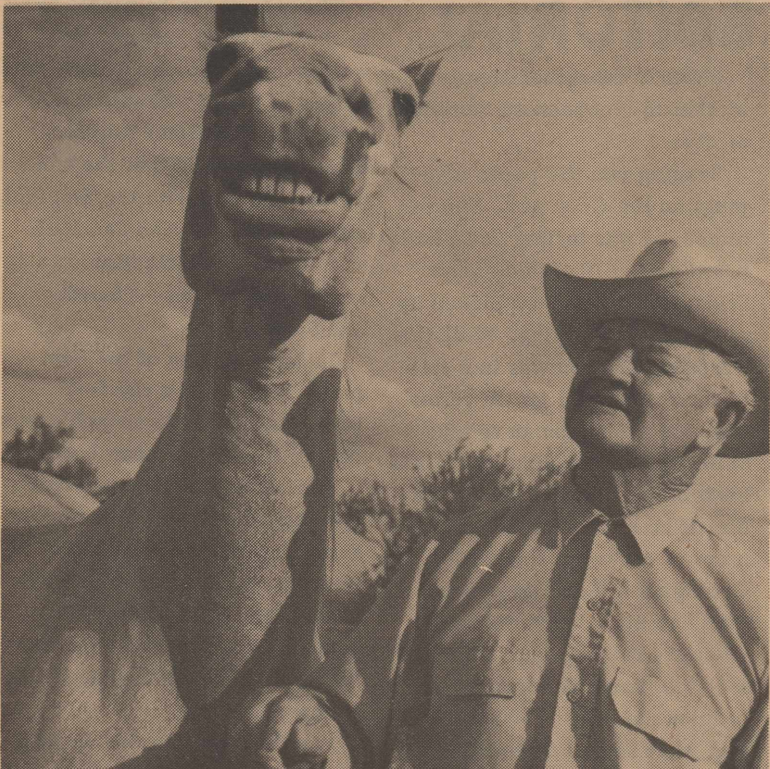


When I was thirteen years old I saw this man and his trained horse. He said, "You've just gotta be smarter than the horse to train him."

The two black horses that Wild Bill Elliott called "Thunder", ridden for many years on the movie screen and TV, were originally named "Hogarth the First" and "Hogarth the Second". They were full brothers to Rio Rita, who was a Palomino.

Different horses received different trainings. Roping horses were taught to be calm. Other horses taught not to rare-up, not to balk and etc.

Peppermint, his current show horse is twelve years old and will count for you. "And the best dancing horse I've ever trained."

Garrett, who earned his barber license in 1933 and his beautician's license in 1934, started on part time bases training horses in Sterling City in his spare time. "Oh, I just got back from Arizona on a two months trip where Peppermint and I put on ten shows." He doesn't care to talk about his age and added, "I'm going to shoe my horse tomorrow. I traded for Peppermint when he was two years old and sold him, then traded for him back cause he was a smart horse and have had him ever since." Levi and

Mrs. Garrett live on a small acreage three miles out of Sterling City on the San Angelo highway. Also he's quite a collector of his early life - Buggies, surreys, hacks and two wheel carts, saddles, bridles and harnesses. On one board he has mounted all of his ole' spurs, bridles and bits - there's barbed wire, a hand wound Victrola, horns by the dozen, dinner bells and on and on - even a five legged sheep. He trained a span of mules for Hardin-Simmons University, a Brahman Bull, but his first love, HORSES. It was a good visit.

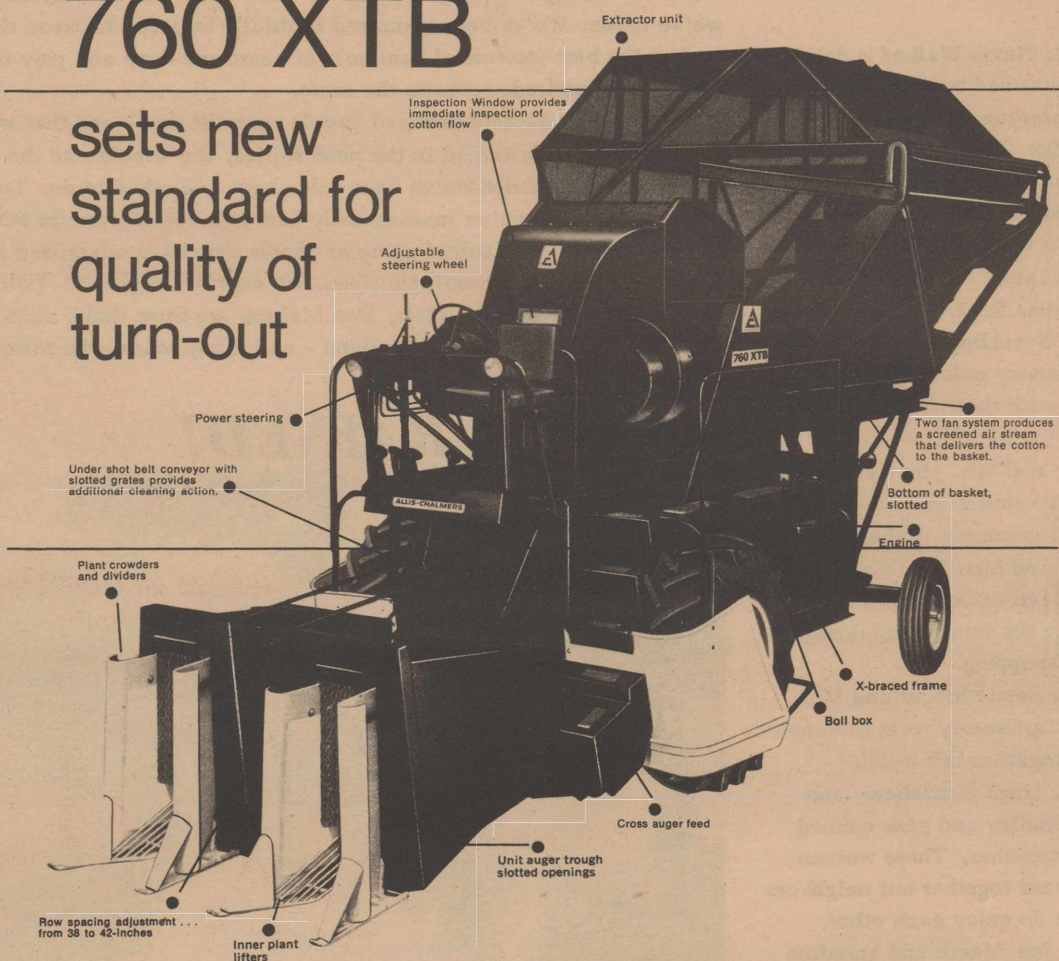

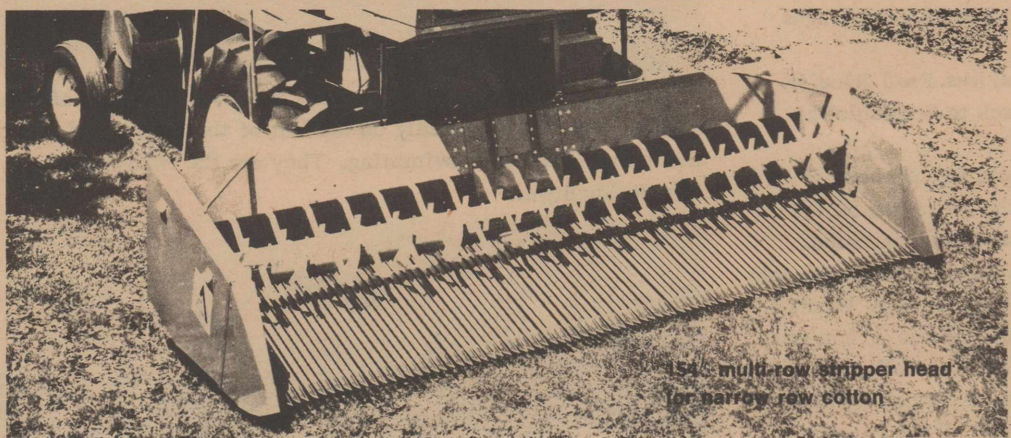

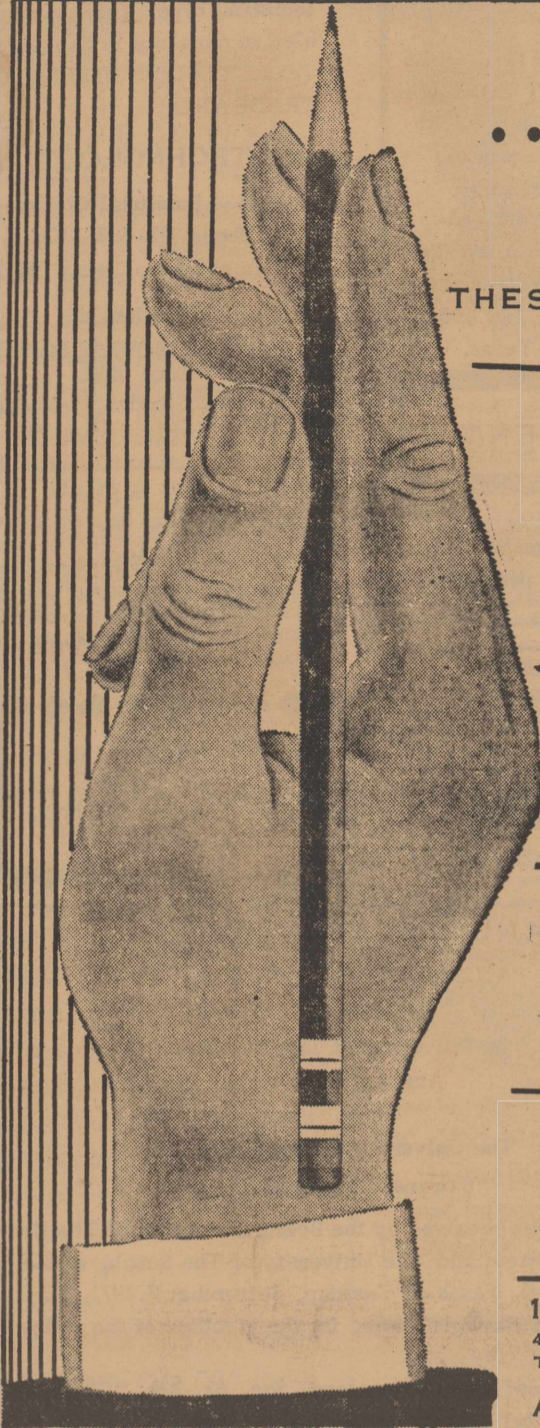

SEMINOLE WINS SECOND IN SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT

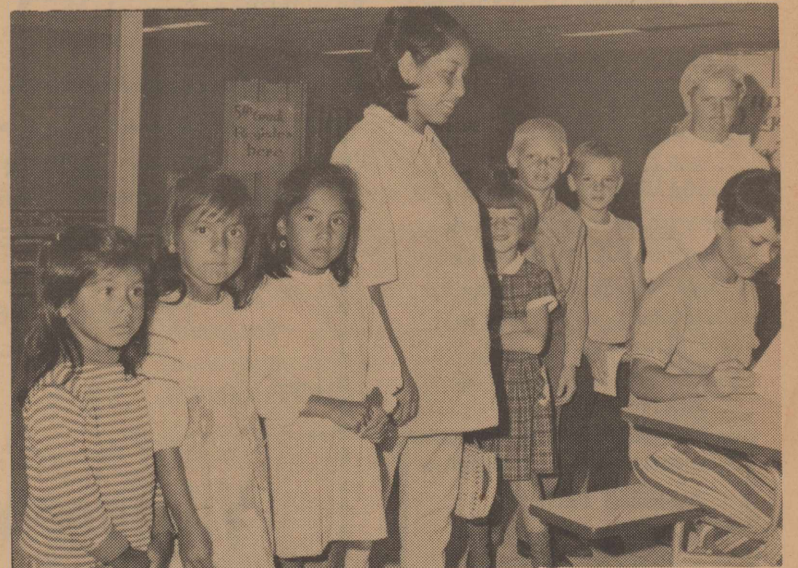
The Seminole Independent Softball team won second place in its own tournament over the weekend, losing the final game Saturday night to the Lamesa Cats 3-2. The Seminole club got started off in a big way on Thursday and won their 1st game 7-6. Friday night they came back strong against Lamesa Optimists and won 4-3. It was the big bat of Jay Anderson that did the work for Seminole. The score was tied 1-1 in the 6th inning when Ray Stephenson got hit by a pitch. There was 1 out when Crossland led off with a single. The next 2 batters were out. Ray Stephenson got hit with the ball, then "big stick" Jay Anderson hit a triple between the center fielder and right fielder. Two runs scored. Jimmy Nelms came to bat, hit a double and Anderson scored what proved to be the winning run. In the top of the 7th Lamesa made a run at Seminole, scoring 2 runs but the rally fell short when winning pitcher Crossland threw out the runner at 1st.

In Saturday's daytime action the Seminole Independent Softball team won over the Lamesa Cats 3-0.

The Seminole Independent Softball team fell behind last Saturday afternoon when they played Lamesa Automated Controls. The Lamesa team scored 1 run in the 1st, 1 run in the 2nd and it looked like they were going to run Seminole to death but the Independents finally squeezed home 1 run in the top of the 3rd and the score remained 2-1 in favor of Lamesa through 6 innings. 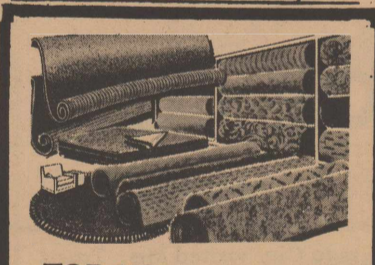

AN ACT

Effective August 30, 1971 relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b). The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c). After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

Section 2. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

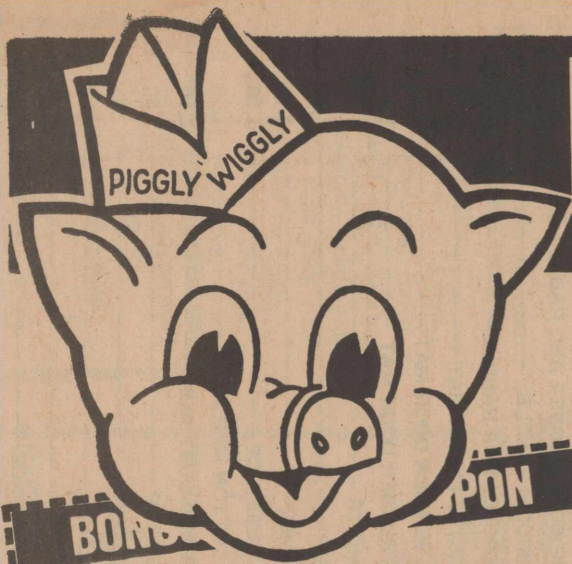

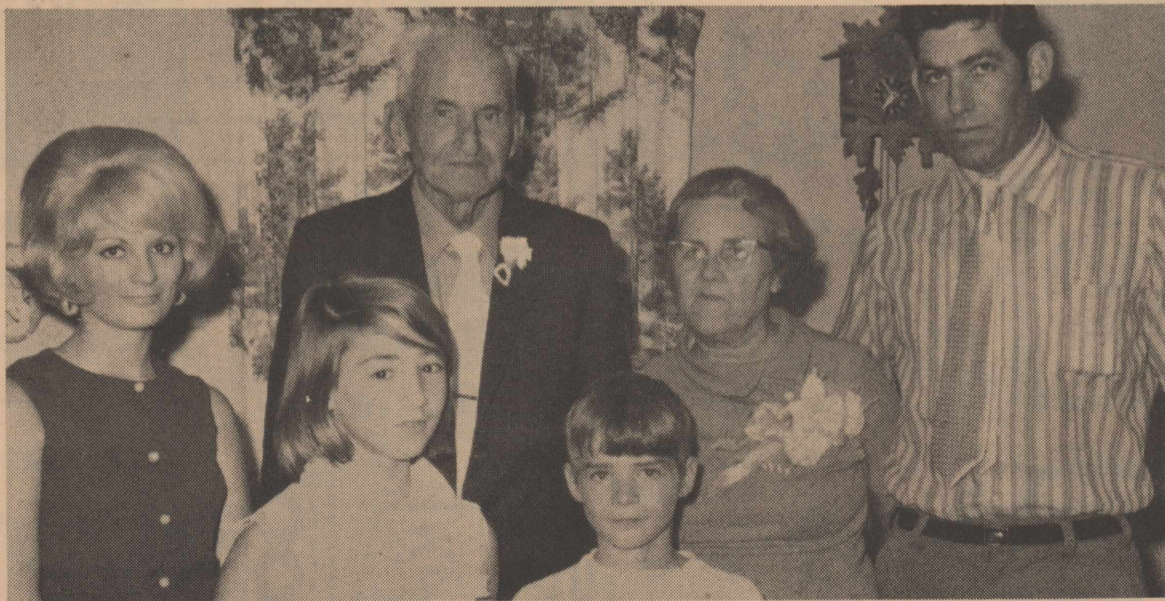
STEPHENSON REUNION UNITES 200 IN YOAKUM COUNTY PARK

SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE CELEBRATES FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

Insofar as air pollution is concerned, sulfur dioxide, in particular, the least efficient plant on Southwestern's system is discharging into the atmosphere only one-tenth of the sulfur dioxide that is accepted as o. k. Southwestern doesn't make much of a contribution to thermal pollution of water, either, inasmuch as it uses cooling towers rather than discharging hot water into rivers or streams. There's one exception to that broad statement at the Carlsbad, New Mexico, power plant where the condensing water is discharged into the Pecos River, but the temperature increase is within the limits of the state law. The Carlsbad residents who use the beach or fish close to the plant location seem to feel that the warmer water improves rather than hurts their recreational activities. At the other plants, with their cooling towers, the discharge that you see in the air on a cold day is nothing more than water vapor, and isn't polluting the air one bit.

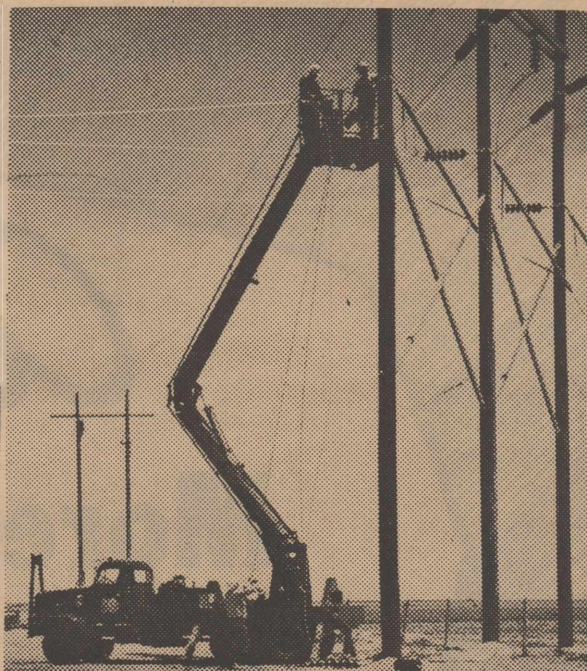
Actually, with a tongue-in-cheek approach, you could say that the air which flows over the cooling towers is better because it gets a little moisture added and also gets washed. But, it's not really a large percentage of the atmosphere in the region. Southwestern is working to retain the fresh water resources of the region, and at two of its power plants, Nichols Station, near Amarillo, and Jones Station, Southeast of Lubbock, uses reclaimed sewage effluent as cooling water. This conservation practice saves 6,000,000 gallons of fresh water a day and that's enough to meet the needs of a city in the 20,000 range population bracket.

The oceans of the world will provide the fuel source for electric generation in the future, if research in which Southwestern is participating comes to fruition. This would be thermonuclear fusion, the fusion of light atoms into heavier elements, and a child's pail of seawater would provide enough fuel to generate the electricity for the average home for a year. There is, incidentally, more energy available from the hydrogen atoms in 7½ square miles of seawater than from all the fossil fuel reserves in the world, and that, in itself, makes the research exciting. But the excitement of thermonuclear research goes far beyond its potential as a source of electric power. The fusion process for making electricity will require ionized gases at temperatures of millions of degrees. These ionized gases - they're known as plasma - may be used as a fusion torch to vaporize waste materials of all kinds, turning them into electrified particles of their constituent elements, and making possible the recovery of basic raw materials for recycle into new products.

In other words, instead of letting our waste materials rust or rot away, we'll reclaim them. What's more, we'll separate the elements. Figuratively speaking, we'll put all the iron in one little neat pile - all the aluminum in another - and so on and so on. We may even be able to make new combinations with the protons and neutrons and electrons and make the old alchemist's dream come true and turn a base metal into gold.

Meanwhile, getting back down to earth and the electric power business - for today and tomorrow. The crystal ball gazers are saying that the American people are going to demand as much electric energy in the next ten years as they have used in the last 90. That would be 18-trillion kilowatt-hours, and it looks like this when you put all the zeros on it - 18,000,000,000,000. Southwestern's share of that load is still an unknown quantity but on their record in the past, we can be confident they'll meet it - with power in reserve.

You worked from the ground up on the line construction crew in 1921, as pictured below, but the modern day lineman gets a lift to his work on a mechanized unit dubbed a "cherry picker" and portrayed at the right. FIRST DAY ENROLLMENT LAST YEAR WAS 1944 STU-DENTS. THIS FIGURE US-UALLY RISES RAPIDLY DURING THE FIRST WEEK AND SUPERINTENDENT BRAMLETT ANTICIPATES 2000 STUDENTS ON THE ROLL BY THE END OF THE FIRST WEEK OF SCHOOL, FRIDAY, AUGUST 27.

TRADITIONALLY ENROL-LMENT GAINS DURING THE FALL MONTHS AND USUALLY PEAKS SHORTLY BEFORE CHRISTMAS.

ALL GRADES WILL BEGIN THE SCHOOL DAY AT 8:35 A. M. THIS YEAR. LAST YEAR ONLY THE HIGH SCHOOL BEGAN AT THIS TIME WITH THE OTHERS COMMENCING AT 8:45 A. M.

DISMISSAL TIME WILL REMAIN AT 3:00 P. M. FOR STUDENTS IN THE FIRST THREE GRADES. BUT WILL BE ADVANCED TO 3:45 EACH AFTERNOON FOR PUPILS ABOVE THE THIRD GRADE. ALL GRADES WILL BE DIS-MISSED AT 3:00 O'CLOCK ON AFTERNOONS PRECEDING THANKSGIVING, CHRISTMAS, AND EASTER HOLIDAYS.

PRE-REGISTRATION WAS COMPLETED TUESDAY AND, ACCORDING TO SCHOOL OFFICIALS, HAD ABOUT THE USUAL NUMBER OF PUPILS PARTICIPATE. PUPILS WHO DID NOT PRE-REGISTER MAY ENROLL MONDAY.

MONDAY WILL BE A FULL DAY OF SCHOOL WITH BUSES RUNNING AND BOTH CAFETER-IAS OPEN. IF PARENTS HAVE MOVED INTO AN AREA THE BUS DID NOT TRAVEL LAST YEAR, THEY MAY CON-TACT JOHN D. THOMPSON, DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM AND SPECIAL SERVICES, BY PHONING 758-3662. OTHER-WISE, BUSES WILL FOLLOW THE SAME ROADS AS OF THE END OF SCHOOL LAST MAY.

CAFETERIA LUNCH PRICES WILL REMAIN THE SAME AS LAST YEAR WITH PUPILS IN GRADES 1-3 PAYING 35C; THOSE IN GRADES 4-8, 40C; GRADES 9-12, 45C, AND TEACHERS AND ADULTS, 50C. PUPILS IN GRADES 1-6 ARE REQUIRED TO EITHER BRING THEIR LUNCH, EAT IN THE CAFETERIA, OR GO HOME TO EAT UNLESS SPECIAL PER-MISSION IS GIVEN. PUPILS ABOVE THE SIXTH GRADE MAY EAT WHERE THEY CHOOSE.

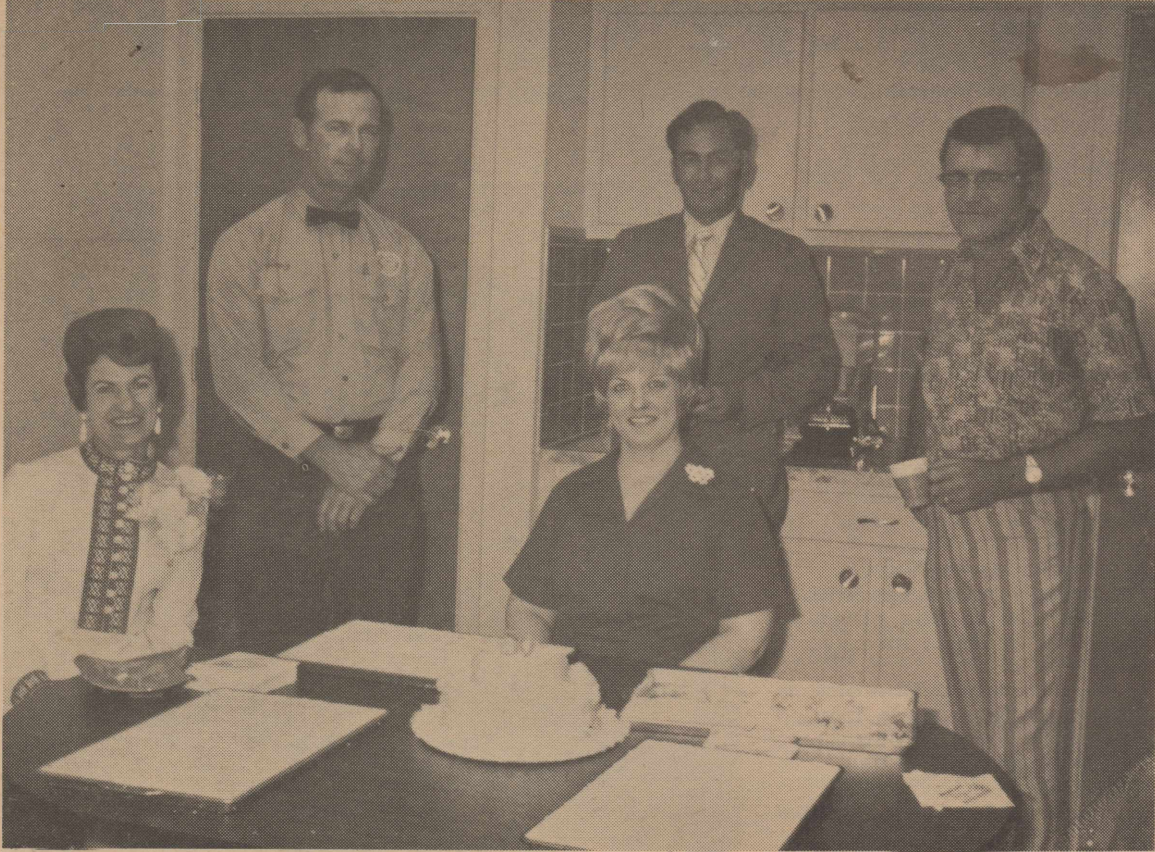

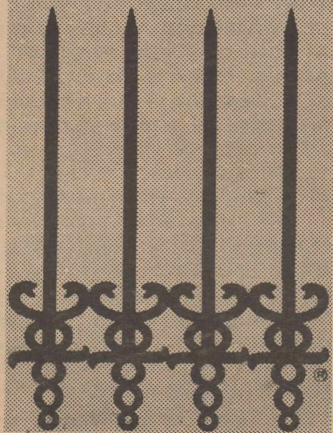

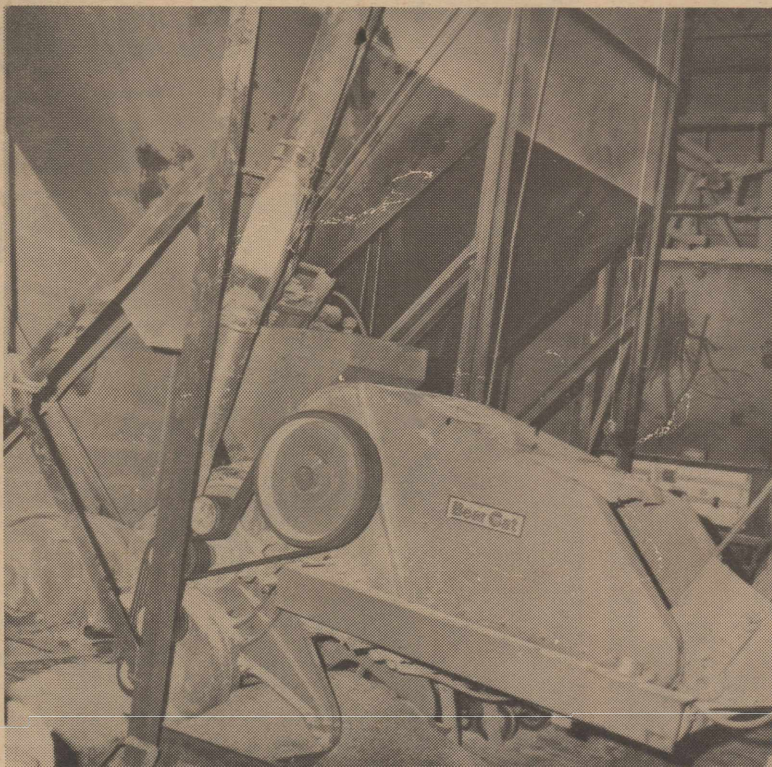
