These pills come out of your medicine cabinets. "Parents, check your medicine cabinets, says Sheriff

Ed Welch.

In recent days there has been traffic and the taking of above said "Tell the parents to keep count if they have materials on hand that would lead any kid into taking something stronger."

Go through your medicine chest and discard unbranded, aged, and the accumulation of

prescribed medicines no longer needed. You know whether there's any tranquilizers in your house. You know whether there's any barbiturates in your house. You are being asked to watch over these kind of pills. Tranquilizers are to calm nerves. Too many at one time could be mood elevators. Barbiturates tend to make a person depressed. Amphetamines are usually to

elevate the mood of the recipient, causing one to have a lot of energy and usually talk a lot.



The directors of the bank are Neal Hefner, Chairman; Joe W. Anderson, C.R. Cothes, Alton Freeman, Doyle Hankins, and J.D. Mitchell.

Other bank employees are Dorene Allen, Installment Loans Teller; Doris Able, Teller; Earlene Patterson, Teller; Earlene Benson, Teller; Pearlena Smith, Notes Teller; Norma Pierson, New Accounts; Kathy Williams, Head Bookkeeper; Ann Nichols, Bookkeeper; Juana Marie Fincher, Proof Department; Jerry Aten, Proof Department and Drive-In Window; Shirley Martin, Kay Atwood and Betty Conn, Bookkeepers; and Cruz Villalva, Custodian.



What made the play outstanding to this writer was the fact that it was decent, clean and free of foul language. The News would especially like to thank the directors and other people in the school system that are responsible for having made the choice, "The False Alarm". Why some directors and school officials allow plays to be put on that are suggestive, that have filthy language and are indecent has caused a great deal of concern to parents, teachers and a decent community.

Everyone can enjoy a funny play. I believe that only a few defend and enjoy the other type. Also to be congratulated are members of the Junior Class. Probably outstanding in the play was Jerry Horn's character presentation of Willie Sample and Dixie Mercer as Belva, the maid. But that wasn't the important part as far as the play is concerned. About 100 yards away from the J.F. Wyatt residence (the scene of the first vote in Gaines County) was the water well, probably left by the Indians. In about 1931 to 1933 L.G. "Babe" Howell, with others, cleaned out an Indian well, making it about 35 to 40 feet wide and 130 feet long, probably the biggest well in West Texas. They dug it 6 to 8 feet deep, having problems because it was standing in 3 to 5 feet of water. The well is still being used for a watering place for cattle with only about a foot of water standing in it. This well was used for years and years to irrigate about fifteen acres of land in the draw. A two inch centrifical pump was used, powered by an old Studebaker motor.

Section II Seminole, Gaines County, Texas

Voting, 1903 Style



L. G. "Babe" Howell views a portion of a door of an old cook stove found in the hole in the ground that was left by the old G.F. Wyatt residence.

The above dugout, located three miles from Seminole, was the first home of the J.F. Wyatt family and scene of the first general vote. The building was approximately 12 feet wide and 24 feet long. (Probably a warmer house was never built than a partial dugout nor a cooler house.) In the very back was a built-in fireplace with the door on the south side and the front facing the draw. Early day settlers lived on the draw because water was only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 feet deep. Some of the wells were left by the Indians. (Please note the drive-in theatre on the upper left in the distance, located northwest up the

In 1902 the land rush for Gaines County started. Four sections were allowed to be filed on for homestead purposes. By 1903 families that are still well known to Gaines County and Seminole had moved in. Among those was the family of J. F. Wyatt. He bought 299 acres of land filed on by the Mann family, located on the draw just south of Seminole and 1 to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles south of the Andrews Highway,

or about 3 miles from Seminole.

In November of 1903, it could have been the early part of 1904, families met at the residence of the J.F. Wyatts to discuss some of the following problems - how and where to build a school house, how and where to put a centrally located post office and if possible to get a doctor located in the

Caput, Texas was located adjacent to the graveyard south of Seminole. The W.B. Austins operated a store and the post office there. This was 2 to 3 miles up the draw. The railroad track was just north and east of the Wyatt residence.

Men and their families that gathered for the first general vote in Gaines County were Bill Birdwell, Jack D. Thompson, G. N. O'Neal, John Greenwood, Frank Orsan, Bob (Grandpa) Wright, and Whittingtons. They voted at that time to organize the county which came in 1905. "Oh, I can remember that day very well" said Mrs. S. D. Coker (Eunice Thompson)."Everyone gathered and all the men went down in that dugout and we kids didn't know what was happening. I wanted to go down in there so bad to see what they were doing. We knew something important was happening. This was the first general vote of any sort in the county."

The portion of the land where the half dugout residence was located is still owned by Lema Potter of Truth or Consequences, New Mexico, a daughter of the Wyatts.
