WHERE ARE Seminole kids getting narcotic pills that they keep talking about? WHAT are these pills that kids keep showing others? They're not so much dope pills as they are diet pills, tooth ache pills, Bufferin, Contac, aspirins, tranquilizers, barbiturates, Amphetamines. These pills come out of your medicine cabinets. "Parents, check your medicine cabinets!" says Sheriff

Ed Welch.

In recent days there has been traffic and the taking of above mentioned pills by teenagers. County Attorney Joe McGill said "Tell the parents to keep count if they have materials on hand that would lead any kid into taking something stronger."

Go through your medicine chest and discard unbranded, aged, and the accumulation of

prescribed medicines no longer needed. You know whether there's any tranquilizers in your house. You know whether there's any barbiturates in your house. You are being asked to watch over these kind of pills. Tranquilizers are to calm nerves. Too many at one time could be mood elevators. Barbiturates tend to make a person depressed. Amphetamines are usually to

elevate the mood of the recipient, causing one to have a lot of energy and usually talk a lot.

Within the last two weeks types of these pills have been sold, traded and taken by young people OF SEMINOLE. PLEASE HELP!!! If there are temptations within your medicine cabinet and accessible to young people, remove them.

## OPEN HOUSE SATURDAY FOR BANK



Proudly the community, the city, and the county salutes the Seminole State Bank. They have moved into their new quarters on the southeast corner of the square and will have open house Saturday from 2 till 6 p.m. Overheard by an Out-of Stater, "When you Texans do something you really do it up." He was impressed by the new building.

The bank, at present, is handling between 4,000 and 5,000 items per day. Doyle Hankins, president of the Seminole State Bank, is the third to serve in that capacity since November 1, 1940. Mr. L. G. Daugherty served as the executive officer from its inception until 1959. Doyle Hankins assumed executive leadership from Claude Holly July 1, 1961, after Holly's tenure of 2½ years.

The bank employs twenty-two people. Their officers are made up of Neal Hefner, Chairman of the Board; Doyle Hankins, President; John J. Christmann, Vice President; Ruby Lewis, Assistant Cashier; Ulma Rash, Assistant Cashier and Drive-in Window; J. D. Mitchell, Vice President; Dwayne Herman, Vice President and Cashier; and C. V. Shelton, Assistant Vice President and Teller.

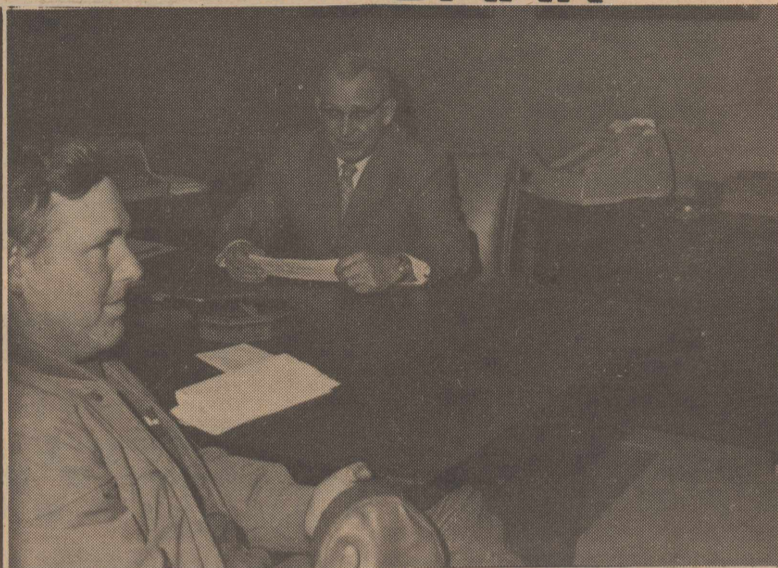
In years of service, J. D. Mitchell has been with the bank the longest. He came in 1946. Following in continuous service is Miss Ruby Lewis who started in 1950.

The directors of the bank are Neal Hefner, Chairman; Joe W. Anderson, C. R. Cothes, Alton Freeman, Doyle Hankins, and J. D. Mitchell.

Doyle Hankins reminded area residents of the safety of the checking accounts and that the bank renders many other valuable services, such as (1) safety deposit boxes, (2) night depositories, (3) 24 hour depositories, (4) drive-in window, (5) bank by mail, (6) commercial, farm and installment loans, (7) travelers' checks, (8) sale of U. S. Government Bonds, (9) clearing house for moneyed items, (10) demand and savings deposits, (11) collection items (titles; car and real estate), certificates of deposits, (12) escrow account, (13) depositories for county, schools, and city funds, (14) five Notaries Public, (15) 'Seminole Gold Room' available to social and business groups.

A 1969 Chevrolet driven by Teresa Whitaker, age 19.

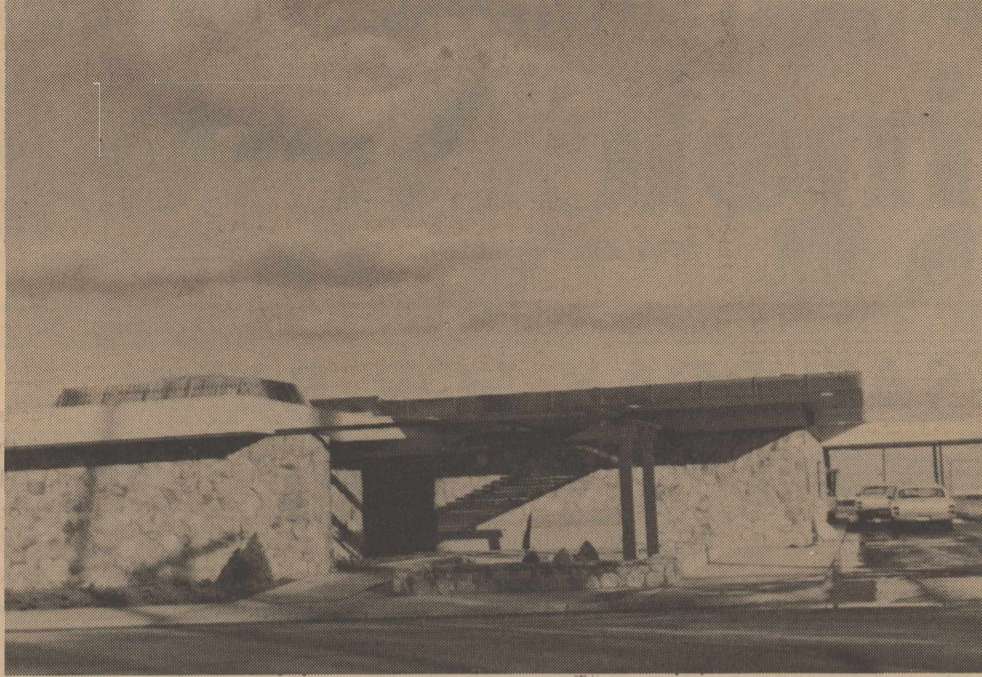

**W. M. S. HOSTS SALAD SUPPER**

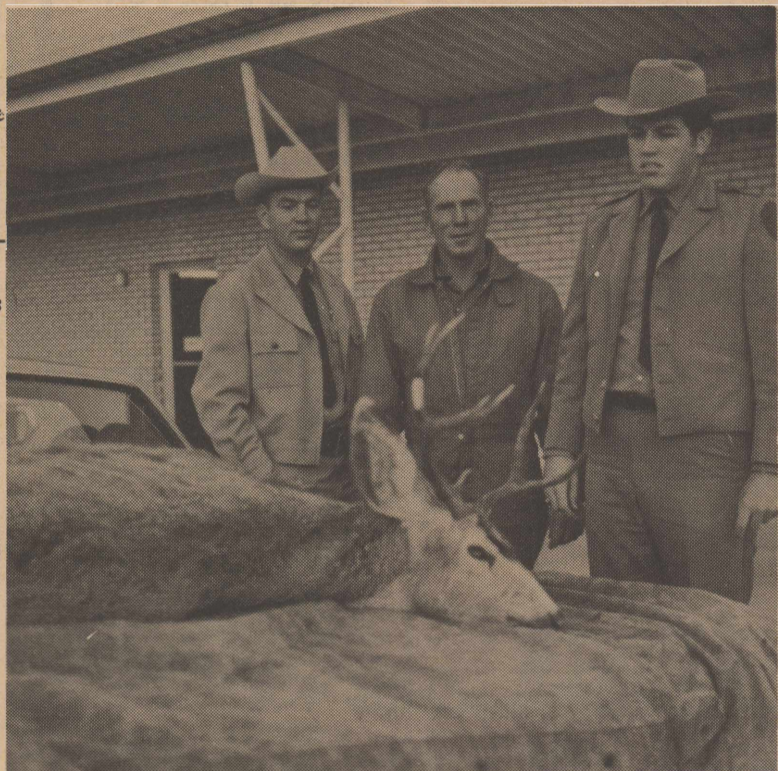

The B-teamers lost to the B-team of Midland High 43-59.

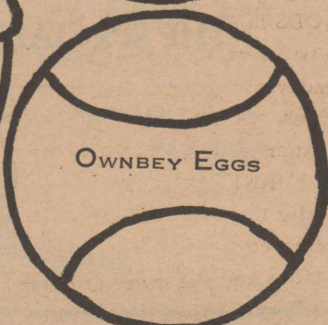
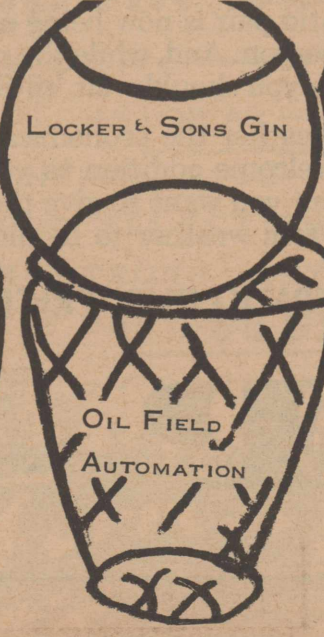
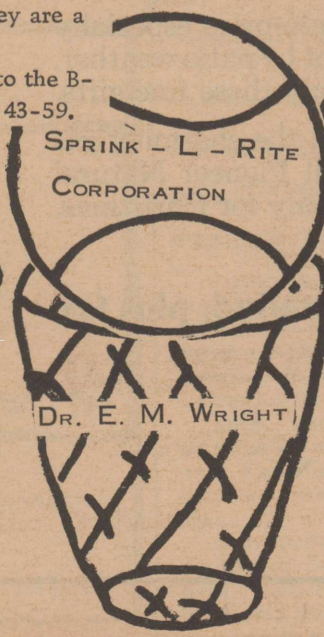
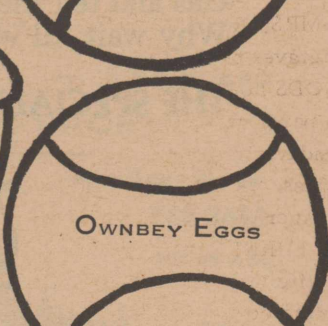
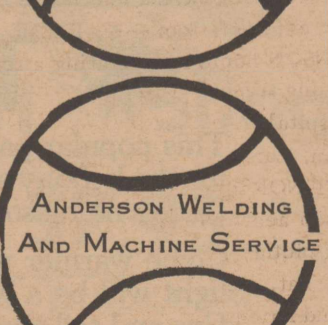
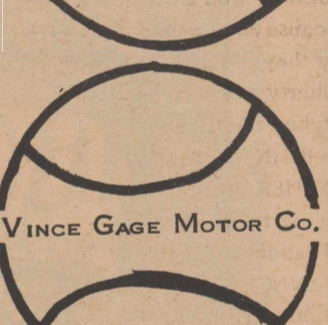
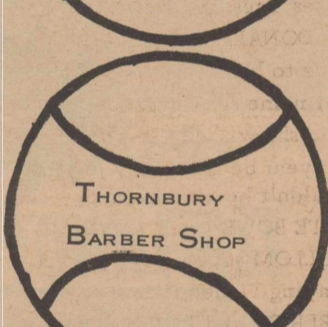
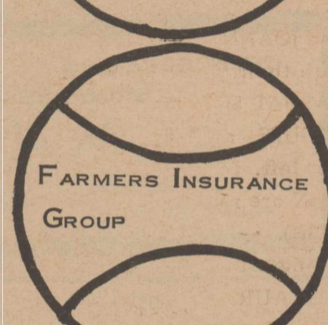
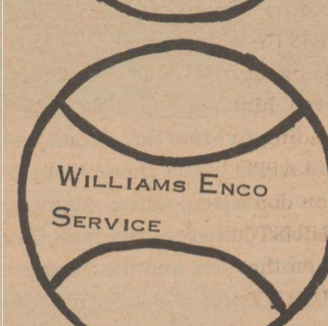
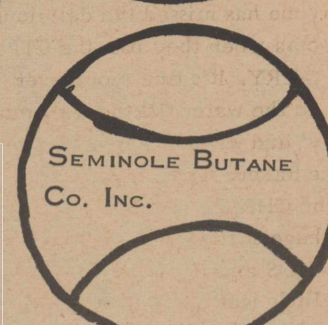
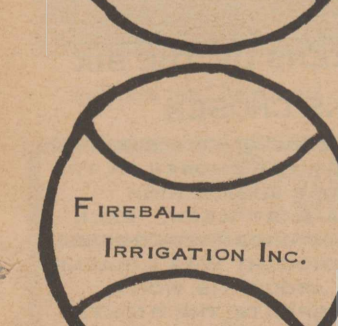
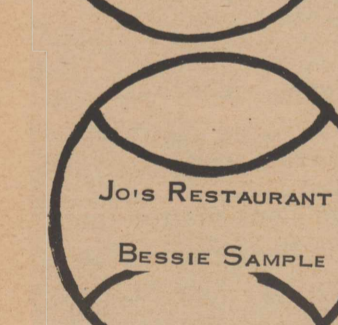
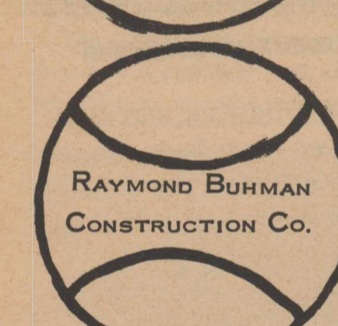
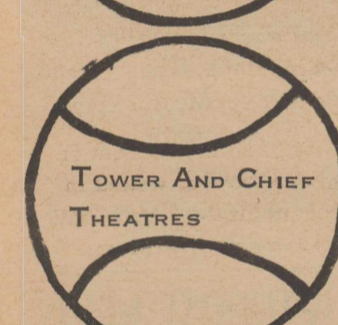
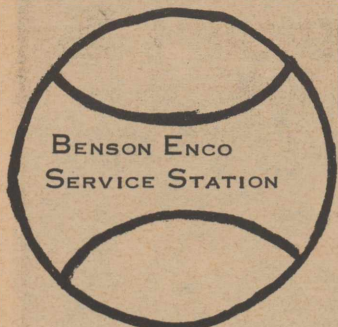

About 100 yards away from the J. F. Wyatt residence (the scene of the first vote in Gaines County) was the water well, probably left by the Indians. In about 1931 to 1933 L. G. "Babe" Howell, with others, cleaned out an Indian well, making it about 35 to 40 feet wide and 130 feet long, probably the biggest well in West Texas. They dug it 6 to 8 feet deep, having problems because it was standing in 3 to 5 feet of water. The well is still being used for a watering place for cattle with only about a foot of water standing in it. This well was used for years and years to irrigate about fifteen acres of land in the draw. A two inch centrifugal pump was used, powered by an old Studebaker motor.

# SEMINOLE NEWS

Section II Seminole, Gaines County, Texas

## Voting, 1903 Style



L. G. "Babe" Howell views a portion of a door of an old cook stove found in the hole in the ground that was left by the old G. F. Wyatt residence.

The above dugout, located three miles from Seminole, was the first home of the J. F. Wyatt family and scene of the first general vote. The building was approximately 12 feet wide and 24 feet long. (Probably a warmer house was never built than a partial dugout nor a cooler house.) In the very back was a built-in fireplace with the door on the south side and the front facing the draw. Early day settlers lived on the draw because water was only 2½ to 3 feet deep. Some of the wells were left by the Indians. (Please note the drive-in theatre on the upper left in the distance, located northwest up the draw.

In 1902 the land rush for Gaines County started. Four sections were allowed to be filed on for homestead purposes. By 1903 families that are still well known to Gaines County and Seminole had moved in. Among those was the family of J. F. Wyatt. He bought 299 acres of land filed on by the Mann family, located on the draw just south of Seminole and 1 to 1½ miles south of the Andrews Highway,

or about 3 miles from Seminole.

In November of 1903, it could have been the early part of 1904, families met at the residence of the J. F. Wyatts to discuss some of the following problems - how and where to build a school house, how and where to put a centrally located post office and if possible to get a doctor located in the area.

Caput, Texas was located adjacent to the graveyard south of Seminole. The W. B. Austins operated a store and the post office there. This was 2 to 3 miles up the draw. The railroad track was just north and east of the Wyatt residence.

Men and their families that gathered for the first general vote in Gaines County were Bill Birdwell, Jack D. Thompson, G. N. O'Neal, John Greenwood,

Frank Orsan, Bob (Grandpa) Wright, and Whittingtons. They voted at that time to organize the county which came in 1905. "Oh, I can remember that day very well" said Mrs. S. D. Coker (Eunice Thompson). "Everyone gathered and all the men went down in that dugout and we kids didn't know what was happening. I wanted to go down in there so bad to see what they were doing. We knew something important was happening. This was the first general vote of any sort in the county."

The portion of the land where the half dugout residence was located is still owned by Lema Potter of Truth or Consequences, New Mexico, a daughter of the Wyatts.

## City Council

(THIS STORY HAS BEEN PUT OUT THAT IT WAS BEING HAULED BY HOBBS OF BY SOMEONE MAKING THE TRASH HAUL IN HOBBS. THIS IS NOT SO.)
