CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BANQUET CONIT FROM

One night each year the Citizens of the Seminole area come together at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet to review accomplishments, outline projects for the coming year, and to honor by special recognition a few outstanding persons. These few people are honored because they have given more than the rest to make this a better place to live. Last Friday night homage was paid to two very special people. These two, through unselfish dedication, have given to us a very important commodity -- their time. We, as humans, have demanded their time at all hours of the day and night. We expected them to give us their time beyond most of our regular business hours, time when it was convenient only to ourselves, and time most of us would not take to help another. However, these two young men, with no remorsefulness or self pity, did take their time, exert their energies, and provide their knowledge in order that each of us could enjoy better health. Honored were Dr. Harold D. Dow and the late Dr. Frederick J. Koberg.

Some 32 years ago two young men called Rowdy and Fred became good friends and fraternity brothers in medical school at the University of Texas in Galveston. Between classroom time and study periods, these two guys met two gals who just happened to be studying at the University of Texas Nursing School. After graduation, internship, and the usual preliminaries, Fred wed Hildy and Rowdy convinced Dorothy that he was the only one for her.

Both of the doctors did their internship at the Shreveport Charity Hospital in Shreveport, Louisiana, but then their paths parted. In 1941 Dr. Dow moved to Levelland to begin general practice and Dr. Koberg began a tour of duty in the Army Air Force as a Flight Surgeon. Dr. Dow left Levelland in 1946, moved to Lubbock for a short while, and then in October of 1946, moved to Seminole, joining Dr. T.J. Williamson in practice.

Meanwhile Dr. Koberg was discharged from the Army in 1945 and returned to the Charity Hospital for further study. However Dr. Koberg, by some coincidence, learned that Denver City needed a physician and moved to this West Texas town in 1946 for one year. Since Denver City did not have a hospital and Dr. Dow's associate had moved, it seemed only right for them to become partners in the practice of medicine. From then until Dr. Koberg's death in February of 1969, these two men were friends, companions, and brothers while performing their responsibilities to the people who were sick and injured.







It's been hog killing time lately and a person who's never learned to eat hog brains and eggs for breakfast has never killed very many hogs. There was nothing better in all the world than fresh hog meat and back bone after being out of meat for several weeks. It was a good time of the year. Neighbors got together and stood around the sunny side of the barn and talked and built a big fire to be used around the dipping barrell. Now the trick of dipping a fat hog was to get the water just right. If it was too hot it set the hair and if it was too cold you couldn't pull the hair out. I've seen a few shaved hogs and they were the worst kinds.

Uncle Joe Matthis lived in Peacock and he always had big fat hogs. He killed from 15 to 20 a year, all in one day. He invited his sons home and their families, his sons-in-law and their families, and along with another grandson and myself. We killed hogs, scalded hogs, scraped hogs, cut up hogs, made sausage, put a curing mix on the meat and made it ready for the smoke house. Uncle Joe said to me, 'Boy what can you do at hog killing time?" "Why, Uncle Joe, I can do a little of all of it, I guess." "Did you ever shoot a hog?" "Yes, sir," I said. "Did you ever stick a hog?" "Yes sir, " I said. Friday and Saturday were to be the big days. Friday morning came and activity started away before day. Breakfast was on the table before daylight. Uncle Joe got the 22 rifle and we loaded it with extra long steel-jacket bullets. Next, we got 2 sash cord tie ropes about 20 feet long and took off to the hog pen. Uncle Joe really tired me out. He handed me the gun and the ropes and the sticking knifes and said, "Now show me how to bring that hog in. " We went by the scalding barrell that was being made ready and I left the gun. Then, on to the pig pen. I got one ear of corn, crawled over in the pen, broke it half in two and pitched half down to the hogs. While the hogs were eating, I quickly tied one of the ropes on to the back foot of a hog and quickly secured another one. I dropped one rope and Uncle Joe opened the gate and I drove the hog out. (Now generally you can drive a hog anywhere with a stick to prod him on, but a hog cannot be led.) I drove the hog around to the right area and tied the rope to a small tree. One of the older men called out, "You'd better get a man to do a man's job, " and Uncle Joe simply said to me, 'Boy, get on with your hog killing." I asked for the sticking knife and it was ready. The point had been sharpened almost razor sharp. I picked up the rifle. It was just good daylight. I made a clean shot slightly above the eye level. The 275 to 300 pound hog went to his knees. He fell over on his side. I immediately put

down the gun, took the knife in

Did You Hear!

Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal amount of surcharge based on tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) I'm a full-time college student and think I will get a taxpayers will most likely tax refund, if I don't have to count a \$750 scholarship as income. Is it income?

A) Scholarships are generally not taxable and do not have to be reported for tax purposes. Since there are many different types of scholarships, you will want to check with the organization that gave you the scholarship to see if they have information on its tax status.

Q) Why did IRS drop the short form 1040A?

A) One important reason was to make it easier for taxpayers to claim all the credits, deductions and exclusions they were entitled to under the tax laws. In recent years more and more taxpayers have found it to their advantage to itemize deductions as their income increased

The new Form 1040 is one basic page and actually calls for just about the same information that had to be entered on the front and back of the old card form. Over 30 million returns will need just the one-page Form 1040 to be complete, while another 22 only one additional schedule. 1.

Q) Are there any tax benefits for those 65 and over? I'll be able to file that way this

A) Yes, there are several benefits for those 65 years of age and over. For example, there is an extra \$600 exemption for age, and special provisions covering the sale of a personal residence.





Information From Social Security Office

Today I'm going to talk some about the "basics" of social secu-

The social security system is values. Payments under the program are earned through contributions paid while a worker is employed. Protection is bought in this way for the worker's dependents or survivors in the event of his death, disability, or retirement. These payments are made regardless of income from savings, pensions, investments and the like. A worker knows in advance that he will not have to meet a "needs" test to qualify for pay-

The social security program provides an incentive to work and save. Payments are only a partial replacement of lost income due to retirement, disability or death of the wage earner. No intent exists for payments to fully replace income lost due to these events. They are, rather, a floor of protection on which the worker can build through home ownership, investments, savings, insu-

Coverage is compulsory. Financing the program is secure and actually sound for the social program. The young worker can be assured that payments can and will be made to him and his family when eligibility exists because the law specifically provides the conditions of entitlement, while careful financing assures the program of actuarial balance.

TEXAS HAS GOOD TELEPHONE SERVICE AND RATES FOR LOCAL AND LONG DISTANCE

"Texas has good telephone service and the rates for both local and long distance service compare favorably with those in other states, " a spokesman for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company told a Senate Committee hearing recently.

The hearing is on the bill proposed by Senator Charles Wilson of Lufkin to transfer the regulation of public utilities in Texas from the local municipalities to a nine-man commission in Austin which would regulate utilities on a statewide basis.

The speaker was Sam E. Holcomb of Dallas, assistant vice president of Southwestern Bell in Texas.

In response to Senator Wilson's statement that a call from Austin to Texarkana, Texas, costs more than a call to Texarkana, Arkansas, Holcomb pointed out that rates on calls within a state generally are higher than rates on calls of comparable distances between states.

Holcomb pointed out that in Arkansas, which has a State Commission to regulate utilities, a call from Little Rock to Texarkana, Arkansas, costs more than a call from Little Rock to Texarkana,

Similar differences exist in Oklahoma, Louisiana, New Mexico and virtually every other state in the union.

Holcomb cited a number of other examples to prove that rates on interstate calls (within a state) are slightly higher than rates on calls of the same distance between states.

Holcomb also produced charts to prove that rates for local service in Texas are as low or lower than rates in many similar size cities in states which have statewide regulation.

For example, a business telephone in Houston costs \$16.50 a month. Denver pays \$18.50, Atlanta pays \$19.00, and St. Louis pays \$17.95.

A one-party residence telephone in Houston is \$5,90, as compared with \$6.50 in Atlanta, \$6.65 in St. Louis, and \$6.20 in Denver.

The business rate in Austin is \$13,50 which is lower than the business rate in Little Rock, Albuquerque or Topeka, all cities of relatively the same size.

Holcomb also showed that telephone rates in many smaller towns in Texas compare favorably with those of comparable size towns in states which have statewide regulation, indicating local municipalities are doing an effective regulation job.

In response to Senator Wilson's charge that telephone service in Texas is "the sorriest in the nation," Holcomb said this simply is not true. He said his company has many measurements which prove the quality of telephone service in Texas is as good or better than service in other states. He cited statistics to show that phoning difficulties represent a very small per cent of the huge volumes of calls handled in Texas, which totalled more than $9\frac{1}{2}$ billion in 1968.

He said he sees no need for Texas taxpayers to stand the cost of another state commission, since the present system of local regulation has resulted in good service at favorable rates.
