No doubt additional facilities are needed, not only for the room, the beds, and other services, but to encourage additional doctors. Much to the surprise of a lot of people Dr. Fred Petmecky moved ten days ago.

We feel very strongly that we have an adequate and an honest commissioners court. We further feel that the hospital board will continue to do an outstanding job (without pay). Both boards met together last night to consider what to do and how to do and to study proper procedure. There is no doubt that these capable men come nearer knowing the needs of Seminole and Gaines County than anyone else. There is no doubt that they will do the very best that they can do with the materials they have to work with.

We encourage you to encourage them, not to criticize and bemean the things they're trying to do. To build new facilities, to add on or build a new hospital, proper steps will have to be taken. It will take some time. Building a public facility with public funds is not the same as building a new house by an individual. The individual makes few arrangements with few people and begins work. A public facility means many arrangements by many individuals and a much longer time.

A WONDERFUL RAIN






