SP chief wins Sijan award

A Reese division chief has landed a major Air Force award for 1982, thus being picked as one of the service's top leaders.

Capt. C. Edward Herron, Reese security police chief since December 1979, was chosen as one of four blue-suiters to receive the 1982 Lance P. Sijan award, given annually to recognize the outstanding leaders of the Air Force.

A reserved Captain Herron noted a few days after receiving the notification that "awards are won because of people. I happened to win this one because we—meaning the security police—have the support of the entire installation. We do a good job because we love doing our job."

Originally nominated earlier this year by Col. Monte D. Montgomery, former wing commander, Captain Herron's nomination was pushed forward to Air Force level by the commander of Air Training Command, Gen. Thomas M. Ryan, Jr., who wrote, "The award recognizes the outstanding leadership and professionalism you display in the performance of your duties and the conduct of your life. You are a positive symbol of Air Force people and I am proud to have you represent Air Training Command in the Air Force competition."

Congratulations sent

It was last Friday when the congratulatory note arrived here from Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Charles A. Gabriel. The chief of staff cited Captain Herron's performance, which, he said, "reflects the highest standards of individual integrity."

The Sijan award is named in honor of Air Force Capt. Lance P. Sijan, Medal of Honor winner who died in 1967 while being held as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam. The award is given annually to recognize "the accomplishments of wing-level and below enlisted and officer leaders who have demonstrated the highest qualities of leadership in the performance of their duties and the conduct of their lives," according to the guidance of AFR 900-29. Besides the junior officer

category (second lieutenant through major), in which Captain Herron finished, awards are also given to an officer from lieutenant colonel through brigadier general, and to enlisted personnel from master sergeant through chief master sergeant and from airman through technical sergeant.

Awards cited

Captain Herron, who began his Air Force career in 1967 as an enlisted security policeman, has a long list of personal achievements behind him that were cited in his nomination for the Sijan award.

Last year he was chosen to be Reese's "Boss of the Year" as well as ATC's Security Police Company Grade Officer of the Year. He was the base's Junior officer of the Quarter for October through December 1981 and went on to become the Junior Officer of the Year for 1981.

His division, a marginal performer upon his arrival, was rated superior by the ATC Management Effectiveness Team a year ago. Crimes against property have fallen 24 percent and crimes against persons have fallen 22 percent over the past 5 years, according to his nomination. His people are now recovering 82 percent of lost or stolen property, the highest ever at Reese.

He has been actively involved in community relations work alongside his Air Force duties. He is cubmaster for three Cub Scout dens on base, is the executive advisor to the Law Enforcement Explorer Post here, helps to sponsor youth activities involving his division and local children (Youth Appreciation Day, division-sponsored dances at the Youth Center and presentations to children at the Child Care Center) and serves as a guide and speaker on the twice-yearly "behind the lines" tours for Reese dependents.

He has worked with the Lubbock Special Olympics, arranged a seminar on sexual abuse and child abuse along with the Lubbock Department of Human Resources and the district attorneys' office and sponsored a Halloween party at the base nursery. He has run Christmas projects for the

base, sponsored softball tournaments for charity, lectured civilian groups on crime prevention and sits on numerous military and civilian councils and committees.

Wise choice

His selection as one of the Air Force's top leaders would

seem to draw little criticism from those he leads.

"He personifies the leadership qualities and the statement, 'We take care of our own,'" said MSgt. Chuck Miller, chief of the Administration and Reports Branch of the SP division.

"He's a great boss. He's an

easy fellow to work for; he's understanding," added A1C Kathy Aviles, primary armorer.

Two of his people went a little further in their comments.

"He's one of the best security police officers I've ever worked for," said SSgt.

Colonel Hearne remembers Sijan

There is a piece of irony involved with the awarding of the Lance P. Sijan Leadership award to Capt. C. Edward Herron, Reese security police chief.

"Let me tell you about Lance Sijan," said Col. Richard E. Hearne, commander of the 64th Flying Training Wing, and friend of the late Medal of Honor winner. The colonel went on to relate the harrowing events that formed the end of Sijan's life in a prison camp in North Vietnam in January 1968.

It seems that in the fall of 1967, then-Captain Hearne

was piloting F-4s out of Danang AB with Lieutenant Sijan as his backseater. Roommates as well, the two flew together for some time until the Colonel rotated back to the states in early November 1967, leaving Sijan without a frontseater. Coincidentally, the squadron commander, Col. Jack Armstrong, lost his backseater, so the pair—Sijan and Armstrong—teamed up. It was a fateful and unfortunate match.

On their first mission together, a night flight over Laos, they were shot down. Armstrong was never heard from again and Sijan found

himself alone in enemy territory. He evaded capture for six weeks, sustaining serious injuries, including a compound fracture to one of his legs. Finally, he was captured by the North Vietnamese.

"When they picked him up," Colonel Hearne recalled, "he was sick, emaciated. He was unrecognizable to his friends. He was a big guy—played football at the Academy. But he'd wasted down to nothing."

Budget constraints can be beat

One of the biggest problems facing us to-

day is limited budget constraints. Not a day goes by that I don't hear someone say, "How am I suppose to do more with less?" This is not a problem limited to just the military. However, there are ways to ease the budgetary constraints.

One way for good managers to overcome this is to motivate their people to insure high productivity. This can be accomplished by the supervisor in the form of job enrichment.

Managers should insure that assigned tasks offer the worker a certain degree of challenge. Low challenge can cause complacency and a lack of professionalism by the worker due to boredom.

Managers should also insure his people are being held responsible for their work. Many a poor performance resulted from the worker knowing he would not be held accountable. Accountability usually instills a feeling of pride in the worker, and naturally pride results in a quality product.

Managers must allow for group participation in the form of planning and decision making. Let your personnel have a say in the planning of work. Allow them the chance to make suggestions on what should be accomplished. Most important with this is your

listening and mature considerations to their suggestions. Since not one individual can accomplish it all, a group or team effort is necessary.

The bottom line to this concept is make your workers believe they are important, that their work is meaningful, and they receive your support. Give your people feedback and not just the negative kind. It is important to know how well one is doing. Another way to overcome today's lower budget constraints is to reduce fraud, waste and abuse.

We have all been taught good supply discipline and resource protection. It is these two important areas that insure we have the necessary tools in which to accomplish the task. These tools can be anything from a ballpoint pen to a major aircraft part. There is nothing worse than not being able to accomplish a task because of parts shortage. Don't hoard supplies, buy and stock only what is needed to accomplish the tasks. Those people with the overstuffed supply cabinets only make it difficult for others. The system doesn't allow for overnight stock replenishment. We must all do our part to insure the job gets done.

A MAN WHOSE WIFE was in the hospital last month complained that while his wife was served a TV dinner, her roommate was served a regular meal cooked in the hospital kitchen. He felt that his wife was receiving unequal treatment and wanted to know why. This incident was the result of a recent change. The hospital has been serving TV lunch and dinner meals to patients for several years; however, Air Training Command recently gave the go-ahead for the hospital to prepare three hot meals a day for each patient. Hospital food services was implementing the change gradually in order to train new kitchen personnel, as well as to use the supply of frozen meals. According to this plan, some patients would get a hot meal each day, while the others would get the frozen dinner. On the date in question, the complaintant's roommate was served the host meal and the complaintant was due

to get her hot meal the following day. She was discharged, however, before her turn came around. The full hot meal service is due to begin early next month. **A FLOODED SOCCER FIELD** was the subject of a recent call from a person who wanted to know why the field was being watered so much after the close of the base soccer season. Although the soccer season is over, we need to get the field in shape for the ATC tournament scheduled to be played here next spring. However, the sprinklers were left on by mistake the night and we've not established a watering schedule to keep this from happening again. **ANOTHER CALLER** wanted to know if the Child Care Center attendants were adhering to the policy governing the ratio of children-to-attendants. It seems this person had heard that

some attendants seemed to be getting more help with the children than others. The center staff is responsible for making hourly head counts to identify any imbalances in the desired child-attendant ratio. This ratio differs according to age. When there are too many children, more attendants are assigned to deal with the overflow. Consequently, what may seem to be cases of certain attendants getting more help than others, is actually the result of effecting the appropriate child attendant ratios. The staff of the Child Care Center would welcome anyone who wishes to visit their facility at any time to get a look at the operation. I can assure you that everyone involved with the operation of the center is concerned with the safety and well-being of the children under their care.

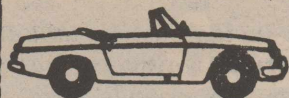

The winners were announced at the Boss' Day Luncheon, Oct. 28. The luncheon and boss recognition program was sponsored by the FWP.

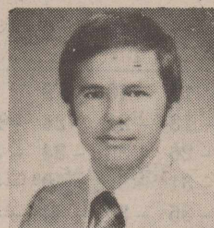

Wayne Brandt.

And, "He's the best chief of security police I've ever worked for," echoed MSgt. Bill States, chief of the Training Branch. "He's concerned about his people, about getting down to their level. If anybody has a problem and they don't take it to him, it's their fault if they don't get it solved."

Commander endorsement

Perhaps some of the highest praise comes from Col. Richard Hearne, 64th Flying Training Wing commander and, in his past role as base commander, Captain Herron's former immediate supervisor.

"He's got his act together, he's very mature," said Colonel Hearne. "He gives superb recommendations, good common sense recommendations."

Colonel Hearne cited Captain Herron's taking the division from marginal performance to superior, noting that "he's just a superb leader."

Captain Herron will leave Reese shortly for a staff assignment at ATC headquarters at Randolph AFB, Texas.

"I'm confident he'll do well there," said Colonel Hearne. "He'll make mistakes, but he'll learn. He'll be sorely missed here. I know I'll miss him."

(Continued from page one) war produced by the Air War College at Maxwell AFB, Ala.)

Finally, around Christmas, he was captured by North Vietnamese soldiers and taken to a holding camp. However, Lance found an opportunity, and despite his crippling injuries, he overpowered a guard, knocked him unconscious and escaped. Again a fugitive, he traveled for two kilometers before being recaptured several hours later and taken to another enroute camp.

After solitary confinement, Captain Sijan was subjected to long interrogations while being tortured for information. Somehow, Lance found the strength to resist, and he continually distracted his captors, refusing to tell them anything except his name, rank and serial number.

On Jan. 6, 1968, the North Vietnamese prepared to move some prisoners, and their commander detailed Lt. Col. Robert Craner to care for Captain Sijan. By then, Lance's physical condition has deteriorated to a point where he could neither stand nor sit erect without help.

The next day, the two Americans boarded a truck for the long, punishing trip to Hanoi. During the jolting ride, Colonel Craner often feared that Lance had died, but each time he regained consciousness and declared that he was doing all right. Unbelievable, Lance never complained about the battering and, in fact, talked about escape several times, saying that he was ready for another try.

Captain Sijan was taken to Hoa Lo Prison, where he was

kept in the section that the American airmen called Vegas. His wounds were not treated, and Lance was able to take only a few spoonfuls of food each day. He grew steadily weaker but requested aid only to put his body in a sitting position so he could exercise his slack muscles in preparation for another escape. Because his broken leg would not support him, Lance had dragged himself backward on his hips during his flight through the jungle. As a result, both hipbones now jutted through his skin and exercise was excruciatingly painful.

His condition aggravated by the poor living conditions, inadequate diet and clothing, Captain Sijan contracted pneumonia on Jan. 18. Because the fluid in his air passages would have strangled him, he could not lie down, and on the night of Jan. 21, the North Vietnamese removed Lance from his cell. The next day, they reported that he had died."

Sijan won the Medal of Honor posthumously for his heroism and for the example he set for his comrades.

Another good reference on wind chill by Arnold Court appeared in the *Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society*, December 1948, pp. 487-493. I particularly like his closing sentence: "No matter how exact an objective formula for body-heat loss becomes, its results will always be attacked subjectively by those whose sensations do not agree with the computed value of wind chill."

A word of thanks to Donald Baker of the PROFS program here in Boulder for generating the wind-chill tables.

Table 2 should satisfy those readers who prefer wind-chill information in English units. Values in this table (also computed from the Siple-Passel equation) match within 1°F those in the table used by the National Weather Service.

Can you quit for 24-hours?

Smokers, take heed. If you've been thinking about quitting or have perhaps given it a shot, a time of help might be near. On the other hand, if you're as tied to your cigarettes as a fish is to water and would last about as long without a smoke as a bluegill would after being yanked from a lake, then be prepared for some ribbing come Thursday.

The Great American Smokeout is upon us again,

that one day of the year when smokers are cajoled, entreated, petitioned and otherwise asked to give up smoking—if only for a little while.

By now, there've been enough annual smokeouts (this makes number six) that many smokers have already decided how they're going to deal with this latest one: "Forget it!" Those people probably passed over this story when they saw the headline and the accompanying pledge cutout. That's okay, because the American Cancer Society,

sponsors of the smokeout, don't hope to reach everyone with their kick-the-habit message. Their goal is more modest: to entice at least one smoker in every five to put down cigarettes for 24 hours—from midnight to midnight, Nov. 18.

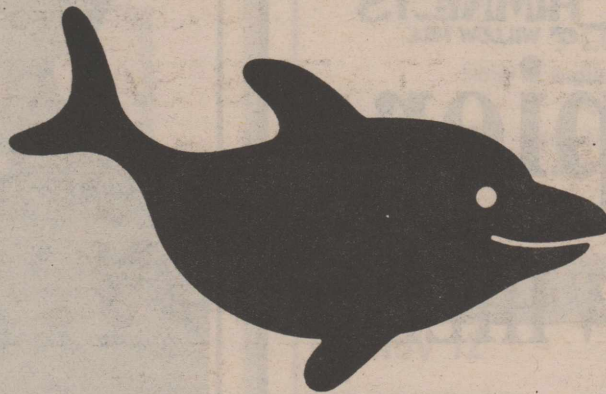

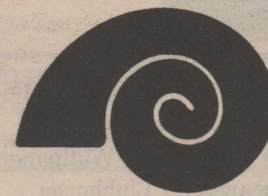

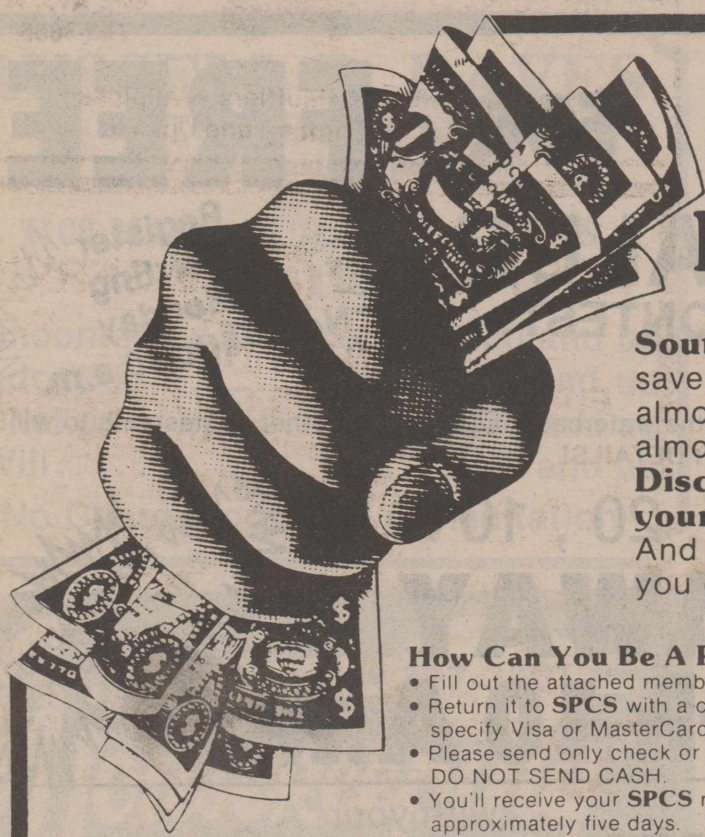

Project Warrior

First MiG-15 downed over North Korea

Korea—Early November 1950 saw a major change in the airpower over Korea and in air warfare in general.

Since the first communist aircraft was shot down June

27, 1950, our Air Force enjoyed overwhelming superiority in the skies over Korea. However, when the Red Chinese entered the conflict later that year the "honeymoon" suddenly ended. The Chinese brought with

them the MiG-15; a swept winged jet fighter that was superior to anything we had in Korea at the time.

Nov. 1 saw the first use of the new fighter against our aircraft. Six MiGs took off from Antung across the Yalu

River and attacked a T-6 spotter aircraft and an accompanying flight of F-51 Mustangs. Our pilots managed to evade the aggressors, but it would not be long until the first meaningful engagement would be met with a MiG.

A week later, Nov. 8, destiny was fulfilled. The opening of a new bomber offensive against the Reds in North Korea sent B-29s out in strength. One of the targets was Siwuiju, just south and across the Yalu River from Antung Airfield—a major MiG base.

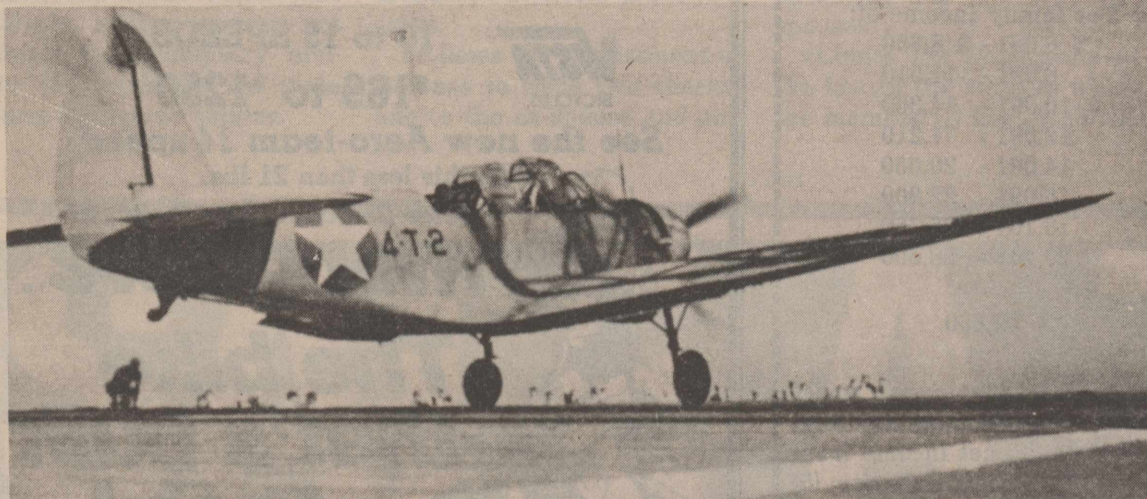
Seventy B-29 Superfortress bombers were assigned that target. Fighter escort was provided by F-80 "Shooting Stars" from the 51st FIW patrolling at 20,000 feet.

As the bombers approached their target, the escorting pilots watched helplessly as six MiGs left Antung. The communist pilots soon reached 30,000 feet and went for the Shooting Stars. The American pilots turned to face the MiGs. Because they

turned to fight, the North Korean forces scattered; five to the heavens and one decided to dive.

Lieutenant Russell J. Brown, of the 16th FIS, spotted the diving jet and went after it. With the F-80 being heavier aircraft than the MiG, Lieutenant Brown soon caught his target. The MiG pilot tried to out-manuever the lieutenant and his Shooting Star, but couldn't. Lieutenant Brown hung on and pumped the MiG full of .50 caliber slugs causing it to catch fire and crash. Scratch one MiG!

Lieutenant Brown as the victor in a battle that was to usher in a new dimension in aerial warfare: jet to jet combat. The most important fact, however: Although the MiG 15 was superior in speed, acceleration, climbing capability and general maneuverability as compared to the F-80, Lt. Brown's superior training and airmanship over that of the communist pilots that insured the victory.

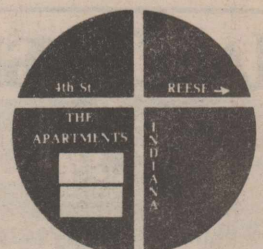

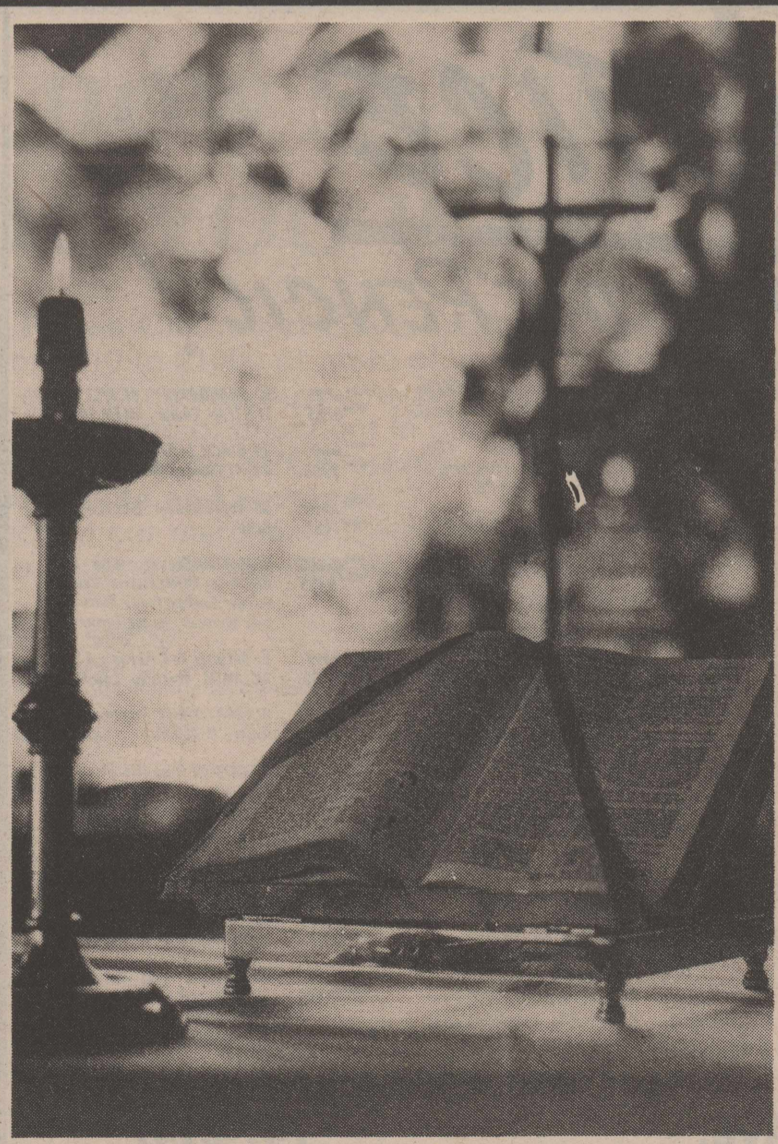

New bill affects military divorces

(ATCNS)—President Reagan recently signed into law a bill which directly affects military members and their spouses who have been or may become involved in divorce actions.

The bill negates, in part, the U.S. Supreme Court's 1981 McCarty decision, in which the court ruled that military retired pay is not subject to involuntary division as property by state courts in divorce actions.

The new legislation, which goes into effect Feb. 1, 1983, provides the following:

- Permits divorce courts to consider military retired pay when dividing property rights between parties to a divorce. However, the law does not apply to divorces which became final before the McCarty decision (June 26, 1981).

- Allows the Department of Defense to issue two checks, one to the ex-spouse and one

to the retiree, based upon a qualified court order. This provision only applies in cases of marriages that lasted at least 10 years, during which time the member was serving on active duty.

- Puts a 50 percent limit on the amount of disposable retired pay that can be divided among one or several ex-spouses.

- Limits the application of the law to the state in which the member (1) has establish-

ed a domicile, or (2) has established legal residence for reasons other than military orders, or (3) consents to jurisdiction.

- Extends medical benefits and commissary and exchange privileges to all ex-spouses who were married for at least 20 years to a member who had served in the military during that period. Such benefits and privileges would stop upon the ex-

spouse's remarriage. This provision does not apply to persons whose divorces are final before Feb. 1, 1983.

- Prohibits courts from ordering a service member to retire in order to provide payments to a former spouse.

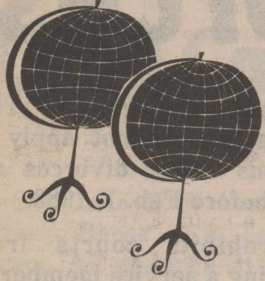

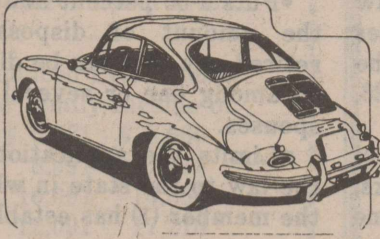

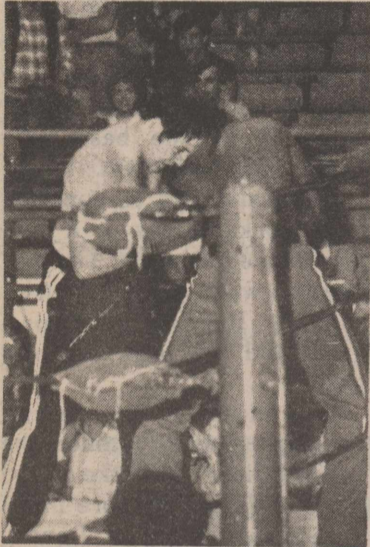

Base kickboxer retains title

It's official, Perry McCall holds the West Texas Light-Heavy Weight amateur kickboxing title. He successfully defended his title in a rematch bout Saturday evening against El Paso, Texas native Darrell Wyatts.

plained that during his first match against Wyatts in El Paso he lost in a split decision. McCall added that he felt fighting in El Paso may have given Wyatts the edge, but even before his Saturday evening rematch McCall seemed confident of retaining his West Texas title.

McCall has been involved with kickboxing for about three years. He first won his title from Johnny Hollums in April 1981 and since then he has lost only one match, and that in the split decision.

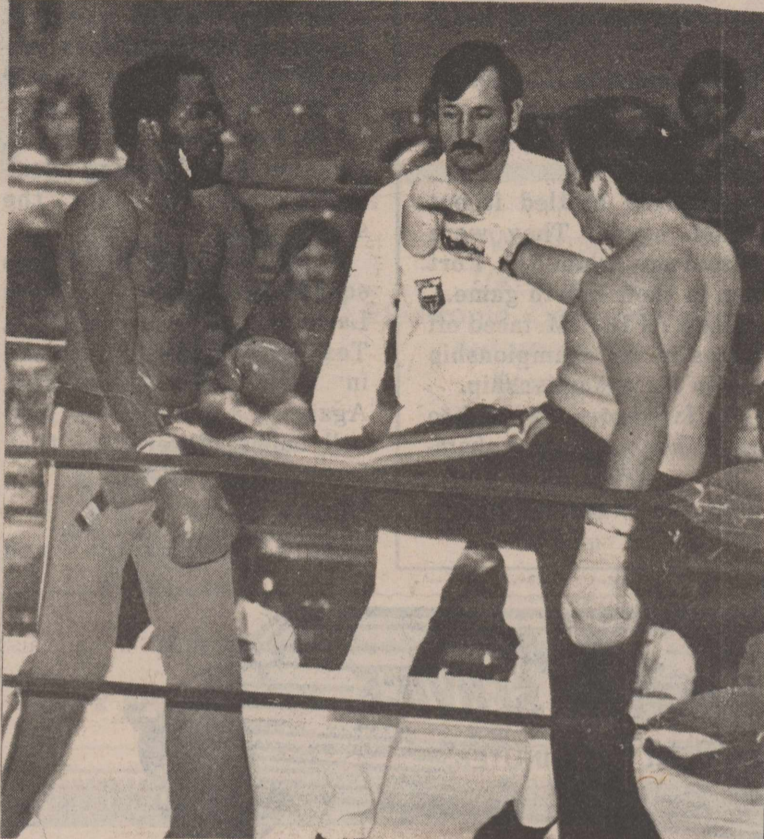
When explaining a little about the sport he pointed out that there are four judges for each match, usually former kickboxers themselves. McCall did advise the would be kickboxer to have at least one and a half to two years of formal karate behind them before starting out in the sport.

As an amateur, McCall enjoys the sport immensely, but says there's not really any hope that he'll go professional. His reasons varied, but like most family men, money was a factor. "There's just too much work for too little pay," he said.

When someone thinks of kickboxing, McCall urged them to think of regular boxing, except each opponent must score eight kicks per round or they will lose the round no matter how good they looked. Kickboxing is

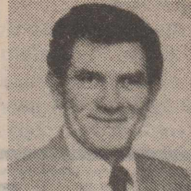
scored similar to boxing, the 10 point "must system" is used.

Home-buying financing methods are many, and include these:

Assumable mortgage—The buyer assumes payments on the original mortgage at the old interest rate.

Second mortgage—The buyer makes one mortgage payment to the bank and one to the old owner (a "wraparound").

Negotiation—Make the bank a compromise offer on the interest rate.

"Buy down"—Someone (such as the seller, builder, or a relative) "buys down" part of the high interest rate to lower buyer's payments.

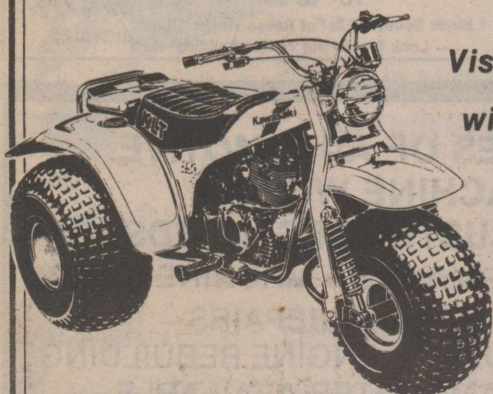

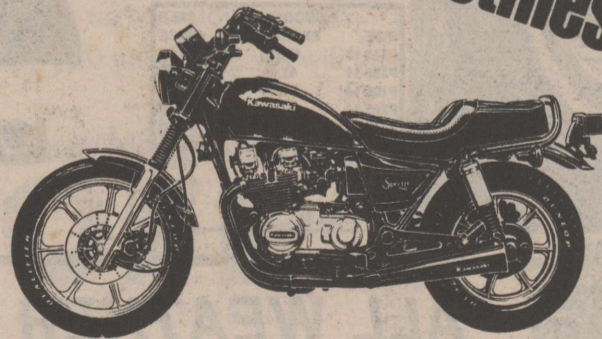
