

"Remarkable" efforts by Lockney Council

The Lockney City Council met for their August meeting on Tuesday, the 21st. Members present were Mayor-Michael DeLeon, David Cole, Tyler Duniven, Donny McLaughlin, Dart Carthel and Aaron Wilson. City Manager-Buster Poling, City Attorney-Lanny Voss, City Secretary-Laurie Garcia.

The twenty-first of August was the first of two Public Hearings seeking input regarding the proposed tax rate of 0.41955 per \$100. This reflects no increase from the 2017-year tax rate. There was no individual input. The second Public Hearing is scheduled for August 28, 7:00 a.m. at

Mr. Sam Moore, representing Cross Development, addressed the council briefly regarding the re-zoning of property for Dollar General. The company has selected the old Fortenberry Auction located on the south side of Hwy 70 on which they would like to begin construction a Dollar General Store. The Council authorized preparation of a preliminary report required for rezoning, wishing to file a final report as quickly as possible.

Manager Poling has expressed a desire to apply for a community development block grant. Gina Barella, South Plains Association of Governments, offered assistance in preparing the grant application. This grant is a two-year, \$275,000 grant from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. Funding is being sought to replace the city's sewer lifts. Poling stated that there is no guarantee that the funds will be granted, however, he pointed out that Lockney is well positioned to receive the grant monies. This grant will require a \$41,250 in-kind match. The council voted unanimously in favor of moving forward with that grantwriting process.

Sheriff Paul Raissez was present to answer any questions regarding the law enforcement agreement with the Floyd County Sheriff's department for law enforcement in Lockney. The 3-year contract provides for a turn-key operation in which the City of Lockney's only expense is the monthly fee for services. The county will absorb all cost associated with personnel, equipment, and vehicles. The effective date of the service is October 1, 2018. Having been working on the agreement terms the past month, the council voted unanimously in favor of the agree-

A report of choices of software for municipal and governmental accounting was presented by Manager Poling. He recommended accepting the Encode proposal. The software is widely used with a local presence in the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas. The council voted unanimously in favor to let Buster let the bids and move forward with the process.

Manager Poling presented a proposal from Plains Internet to place an antenna on top of the water tower. After discussion of the terms proposed, the council voted to decline the proposal; however, if Plains Internet is open to paying a monthly rental fee for the antenna space, permission will be granted.

Manager Poling stated the City is halfway through the audit, and fully expects to be finalized before the fiscal year's end.

City Attorney stated, "In looking at the increase of the City's fund balances, including the increase in the checking account balance, with so many costs absorbed this past year, it is a credit to this Council, Manager Poling, Laurie and the city's staff. In my experience, it is very re-

So here we are. A brand new town and school year and the poor kid is on crutches with a broken foot having to crutch himself around.

So what's the lesson? I haven't a clue.

A couple of years ago he suffered a bad break of his arm in practice and missed the rest of that season and most of basketball. Since that time, I've worked hard on believing that there is a reason for everything and that God has a plan.

That's the difficult thing for me to wrap my head around. Heck, one of the main reasons we are here is that I felt called to be here and everything has gone remarkably easy as I know I'm allowing myself to be led by the Lord and I'm trying to discipline myself to be led instead of trying to force my own will on life.

Again, I wonder what the lesson is to be learned?

But that is the lesson isn't it? Not to question and to fol-

Well, if I'm committed, if we as a family are committed, then we take this as adversity and overcome it. That was the message I delivered to him after practice yesterday and one he had already committed to. He actually was more upbeat than I was when I picked him up from the stadium after practice.

That made me both extremely happy that his walk in his faith is where it should be and a little disappointed in myself because I again questioned why.

Jackson helped me to remember that you can't have it both ways. You can either be willing to let the Lord lead you and you will follow that lead, or you can go it alone and see where that takes you. I'm still opting to be led.

Now, if only I can continue on that path. For me, and probably for many Christians, that's the hardest part.

60,000 Cans of Fruits and Vegetables Canned Here at Local Cannery

An estimated 60,000 cans of food stuff were canned at the local cannery which was maintained by the county during its four and one half months of operation and which closed its season only last week. Of this 60,000 cans 36,000 or 60% were used to pay helpers and given to the county to be used in welfare work. 40% or 24,000 cans went to the customers. Around 35 different vegetables and fruits were canned and almost as much produce as was canned was turned away due to the insufficiency of the equipment to take care of the demand. Vegetables and fruits cannon included beans, beets, apples, polk salad, squash, spinach, mustard greens, turnip greens, swiss chard, rhubarb, carrots, chicken, chicken tamales, corn, black-eyed peas, peaches, lima beans, okra, cream peas, crowder peas, tomatoes, tomato juice, dry

mixtures, cherries, hominy, grapes, pears, pumpkin, sweet potatoes, collard, ketchup.

As many as 35 women were used as helpers in one day during the busy season and about 150 individuals received work during the cannery's

emphasizes the long growing season we have here for vegetables is the fact that Mrs. Griffith, manager of the cannery, stated that corn was canned from the first week in July through Hallowe'en (sic) day, Octo-

It has been pointed out that this section due to its long growing season and many irrigation wells has great possibilities for the location of a commercial cannery here. Because of the "Food for Freedom" program now in progress and since every effort to enlist our farmers in



Lubbock District Game Wardens Preparing for Dove Season

The 2018-19 Dove **Hunting Season Officially Begins Saturday September 1st**

Lubbock and surrounding areas- Local hunters and area game wardens are preparing for an increase in activity as local sportsmen will enjoy the official start to dove season. Texas citizens will enjoy an extended dove season for the third year in a row. Hunting season will run from September 1st-November 4th and then later from December 21st-January 14th in the North zone where the panhandle region is located.

Roughly 15 percent of the nation's 300 million mourning dove reside in Texas, along with about 15 million white-winged doves at the beginning of September. Each fall, over 300,000 Texas dove hunters take to the field in pursuit of these acrobatic, fast-flying game birds. "Texas is uniquely situated to catch a lot of migratory birds as they move through the central part of the continent. Couple that with the fact that we are such a big state with diverse habitats, and it makes sense that we have such large numbers of doves," said Owen Fitzsimmons, TPWD Dove Program Leader.

Public information officer Aaron Sims explains that district game wardens eagerly wait for the hunting season to begin. "Game wardens are just as excited as hunters for September 1st to roll around. We've already begun marking locations that will be busiest in hunting activity, as well as speaking with citizens reminding them of the specific species bag limits and restrictions." Sims says that all available wardens will be out in

force throughout the region ensuring hunters are abiding by the laws. "One of the many violations that we might encounter would be hunters not abiding by their daily bag limit."The daily bag limit for dove is 15, which means that a hunter cannot exceed taking 15 dove in a single day. Sims also advises that hunters abide by the legal shooting hours and to double check those official times prior to hitting the fields. Migratory game birds can legally be hunted 30 minutes prior to sunrise until sunset.

There is no closed season or bag limit restrictions for Eurasian collared-doves or common pigeons (rock doves). However, it is recommended that hunters leave plumage on these birds for species identification to verify they are not part of a migratory game bird daily bag or possession limit.

All hunters are reminded that

hunting licenses expire each year on Aug. 31, so a new license for 2018-19 is needed prior to going dove hunting. Licenses may be purchased at local sporting goods retailers, TPWD Law Enforcement offices, and online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.state.tx.us/ buy The online transaction system is available 24/7.

Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can be found in the 2018-2019 Outdoor Annual, available at license retailers and online at www.txoutdoorannual.com. The mobile app available enables hunters to carry the Outdoor Annual with them on their mobile devices. To download the free app, visit http://www.txoutdoorannual.com/ app or search the iTunes App Store, Amazon AppStore or Google Play for Outdoor Annual - Texas Hunting and Fishing Regulations.

New Era Begins in Longhorn Country

LOCKNEY - Stacy Ward ushers in a new era for the Lockney Longhorns as he takes over the reigns as Athletic Director and Head Football Coach. The Longhorns, 3-8 and a bidistrict finalist in 2017, are looking to make some noise in the new realignment that puts them in a district with rivals Crosbyton and Ralls, as well as Smyer and Tahoka and 11-man newcomer New Home.

"I'm not real familiar with the opponents yet," Ward said, "but it will be a battle every Friday night."

The Longhorns lost 10 players to graduation but return 12 lettermen from 2017. Thirty players reported to pre-season workouts including six seniors, four juniors, seven sophomores and 13 freshmen.

"We're young and lack experience," Ward said, "but our strength will be from the leadership of our returning players."

Bryce Reese, Devin De-Noel Ceniceros, Alex Gar-

cia, Cesar Cienfuegos and Anthony Salazar to lead the way as the experienced players for the Longhorns.

Newcomers that have caught the eyes of the coaches are Silas Urrutia, Keanu Villarreal, Miguel Lara, Christian Gonzalez, Kalebh Cook, Josh Cienfuegos, Daniel Palomin, Anson Rendon, Ashton Urrutia and Cole Poole.

"We'll use multiple sets in our offense and run a splitsix defense," Ward said.

The keys to a successful season, according to Ward, will be developing the players into the new system.

"They have to trust the process of what we are building on and working for," Ward said. "Our motto for the year is 1-0, meaning 'Are we better today than we were yesterday' and focus on getting better every day and winning that day.'

Ward, besides head football coach duties, will also coach the offensive and defensive lines. Stephen Young joins the staff as defensive coordinator and Lockney will rely on wide receiver and secondary coach. Todd Korch-Leon, Andrew Sanchez, enko will serve as the offensive coordinator as well

as quarterbacks, ends and outside linebacker coach. Todd Bryant will coach fullbacks and linebackers. Adrian Gutierrez will coach running backs, ends and outside linebackers. Adrian Rosales will coach wide receivers and secondary. Chris Pritchard will coach offensive and defensive lines.

Lockney opens the season by hosting Clarendon at 7:00 P.M. on Aug. 31. On Sept. 7, the Longhorns travel to Seagraves for a 7:30 P.M. game. On Sept. 14, the Longhorns travel to Floydada for the Floyd County Championship at 7:30 P.M. On Sept. 21, Lockney will visit Hale Center for a 7:30 P.M. game. Olton comes to Lockney on Sept. 28 for a 7:30 P.M. game to close out the non-district schedule. The Longhorns have an open date on Oct. 5 before district starts. All district games will kickoff at 7:00 P.M. Ralls comes to town on Oct. 12, then New Home visits on Oct. 19, the Longhorns travel to Smyer on Oct. 26, then host Tahoka on Nov. 2 before closing out regular season play at Crosbyton on Nov. 9.

THE WHIRLWINDS AND LONGHORNS: **A Tradition is Born**

Almost from their inceptions most towns and schools in Floyd County fielded sports teams of some sorts. The Floydada and Lockney schools organized football teams sometime prior to 1920. The natural rivalry of the communities was carried onto the athletic fields and a West Texas tradition was born.

Those first years of high the hearts and enthusiasm school football in Texas were far different than are known today. It might be stated that many schools at that time were often represented by "town" squads. The players were allowed to participate until their twenty-first birthday. A quick glimpse at photographs of the players in the 1920s illustrates this point. The players were more mature than the schoolboys of modern times.

> Floydada's teams of the 1920s regularly played such larger schools as Lubbock, Plainview and Amarillo. In 1924, Floydada played to a 7-7 tie with a team of Lubbock "All-Stars" at the

In 1921 the colors of Floydada were green and white, however, up to that ney's school squads has been time there was no nickname or mascot associated with

Floydada defeated the Lubbock High Westerners and Plainview Bulldogs en-route to a district championship in 1922. Floydada then advanced to a bi-district encounter with the Amarillo High Golden Sandstorm. When asked by an Amarillo sports writer what chance his team had against the powerful "Sandies," Floydada Coach J.C. Wester replied, "We just have 17 boys, and our team will only be a small whirlwind in front of the Amarillo Sandies."

Just as Grantland Rice had made the "Four Horsemen of Notre Dame" a household word, the Amarillo scribe picked the name "Whirlwind" from Coach Wester's remarks. From that time on, the green and white of Floydada's teams have been known as the "Whirlwinds."
