Diego blankets Floyd County

Winter storm Diego passed over Floyd County last Friday night dumping up to 10 inches of snow in the area. The heavy snowfall and icy conditions from the sleet and rain that fell late Friday prompted numerous postponements and cancella-

One of the first casualties was the Whirlwind Classic basketball tournament that had been on-going since Thursday. With the final games in place and scheduled for Saturday, the storm brought with it potentially treacherous driving conditions. Administrators and coaches were forced to cancel those Saturday games.

When asked if the tournament play was finished and how vinners were determined with the championship games still yet to play, FHS Coach Adam Zepeda stated, "We really don't get a winner in these circumstances." Both the Whirlwinds and Lady Winds had defeated all their opponents except for the teams slated to compete in the championship games. The Winds were to face-off against Slaton-a team they had beat just last week. The Lady Winds were slated to play Morton for the championship.

"It's unfortunate," added Coach Zepeda. "This was the first time in a long time that both teams were in the finals in our tournament."

An additional casualty of the storm was the arrival of Santa Claus in the county. Floydada's

Throughout Saturday, record snow-fall amounts were constantly popping up on Facebook and in the news media. According to several individuals within Floyd County, snow amounts ranging from 6 inches north of Lockney to 10.5 inches south of Floydada were reported.

Although the sun only peeked out for a bit, the minimal warming resulted in freez ing ice and frozen tire-tracks as the evening hours approached. Most of the churches in both Floydada and Lockney cancelled or postponed their Sunday morning services, choosing to encourage folks to stay inside and off the treacherous streets.

By mid-day Monday, most of the cities' streets were clearing off and the communities' snowmen were well on their way to slumping down into mushy piles.

Frigid night-time temperatures will continue to freeze the snow melt, rendering roadways and sidewalks dangerous and Thursday's forecasted coldfront will bring day-time temperatures back down below the 40-degree mark.

About town

Thile attending to some recent research, I came across a young student's description of the town in which she lived. The assignment essay was written in 1871. The town Adelaide Breen wrote about was located about 45 miles east of Monterey, California. "There are two hotels, four stables, two halls, one tinshop,

one fruit store, five saloons, two butcher shops, one post office, one express office, five or six stores, one millner shop, one drugstore, three bakeries, one brewery, three blacksmith shops, three restaurants, one private school and one public school, two shoemaker shops, three Chinese washhouses, one physician, and three churches."

DEON From the Business Directory of FINCHER Wyoming County, N.Y, dated 1870-1871, the individual businesses in each of the

towns in the county are listed: Strykersville had "...two churches, a hotel, three stores, a grist mill, two saw mills, three carriage shops, two blacksmith shops, two shoe shops, a cabinet shop, two cooper shops, a harness shop, a brewery, a marble shop, a sash and blind factory, a tin shop, and about 300 inhabitants."

An 1870 account of Hearne, Texas paints a picture of a thriving community with "a population of about 2000." Situated at the junction of two popular railroads, there were "...3 stores of general merchandise, 6 dry-goods stores, 6 grocery stores, 3 drug stores, 1 hardware store, 1 bakery, 1 commission house and warehouse, 1 bank, 1 hide house, 2 hotels, 4 boarding houses, 3 livery stables, 2 meat markets, 3 barber shops, 3 shoe shops, 1 tin shop, 2 blacksmith shops, 2 lumber yards, 1 brick-yard, 1 planing mill, 1 manufactory of mineral water, a cotton compress (Taylor steam hydraulic, valued at \$40,000), 7 churches 2 schools, lodges of Masons and Odd-fellows, and a brick round-house of each railroad... It is believed that a cotton-seed oil mill, a tannery, foundry and machine shop would all do well here."

While combing through these details, I naturally began to compare those "necessary" businesses to any small town in this day and age, and there are definitely some

Our two towns, together, have grocery stores-which would be a combination of the early grocery, fruit, bakery, meat, and dry-goods; drug stores; barber shops; hardware stores; hotels/boarding houses; banks; auto-mechanic shops could loosely equate to blacksmiths; restaurants; schools; churches...the basics are present in our modern-day communities.

Asking myself what do our towns lack compared to these bustling 1870's towns, the answer lies in manufacturing-production--skills/trades that are becoming lost. Yes, I realize that farming is production, and it is true that it is a skilled trade, but these young communities each have some type of manufacturing enterprise: a sash and blind manufactory, a planing mill, a mineral water manufactory, cabinet shop, a cooper shop, etc. Interestingly, there are a few productive businesses common to all three of these communities: shoemakers, tin shops, blacksmiths, and breweries.

Perhaps, it is time for us as a county, in 2019, to consider and recruit our own skilled-trade manufacturers--it might be well done to take a lesson from the history books.

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

ARBY AND LETHA MULDER

Arby Mulder was born March 24, 1914 to Oscar and Sippie Jane Mulder in Blue Ridge, Collin County, Texas. In 1919, the Oscar Mulders moved to the plains. Arby, his brother, Odell and their mother traveled as far as Childress by passenger train and on to Lockney in a Model T. mail car. Oscar Mulder moved the family's possessions, including a cow, a team of mules, a saddle horse, chickens, and household goods, in a railroad freight car. In January 1920, they moved to the Pete McDonald place at Cedar Hill, where they spent the winter in a army tent warmed by a bachelor heater. From there the Mulder family moved to Rock Creek, and eight years later the move was made to South Plains, where Arby has lived for 49 years.

Arby recalls trapping and skinning skunks for Christmas money when he was a teenager.

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The hides each brought \$1-2 dollars, depending on their quality. Clayton Bond who ran the depot would ship the hides to Dallas. Arby's mother would make him bury his skunk-skinning clothes

for a time to get rid of the odor. In 1934, Arby met Letha Dolly Fitzgerald at Lucy Thornton's old place during a "Swing Party". Letha, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D M. Fitzgerald, was born May 29, 1917 in Atoka, Oklahoma. She moved with her family to the Lone Star Community in 1930. The Fitzgeralds attended Sterley Methodist Church where Letha's daddy occasionally preached. There were seven girls and four boys in the Fitzgerald family.

Arby and Letha were married January 15, 1935, by W. W. Martin, county judge, in the Silverton Court House. Odell Mulder, now of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Mrs. Jake Honea were witnesses. Their first home was at South Plains on the "Goose Ranch," so named by Oscar Mulder because of the geese that stayed in the lake there. Nathan Mulder and his family now live on that place. A year later Arby and Letha moved

Marble place) and about two years after that to the Martin place (west of what is now the Dwight Teeple Farm.)

After nine years of marriage, their son, Nathan Arby, was born January 20, 1944 in the Plainview hospital. The house was filled with friends to welcome home the new arrival. Arby's daddy decided it was time for his son to take over the farm on the Well's place. So, the Oscar Mulders moved from there to the town of South Plains. Arby, Letha, and their six-month old son moved to the Wells' place, where they now live.

About 1946, the Mulders joined the South Plains Baptist Church and are still members there.

On December 28,1948 a daughter, Katherine Ruth, was born weighing 1 ½ pounds. The baby things Letha had prepared were much too large for tiny Kathy, so the ladies of the community worked to create a miniature wardrobe for her. Kathy is now Mrs. Jerry Taylor of Canyon, Texas and has four children.

While still in school, she drove a tractor towing a combine to harvest wheat and carried the crop to the elevator in a family grain truck. After graduation she moved to Amarillo where she was employed in several positions including General Mills.

Bill married Leonard Leon Ferguson on December 11, 1949 at her family home near Claude, Texas. Though the produce of the olive fails, and the fields yield no food; ... yet I will rejoice in the Lord. —Habakkuk 3:17-18 (NRSV)

Final push for 2018 Farm Bill

Lawmakers are poised to consider the 2018 Farm Bill this week, which would provide much-needed certainty for agriculture.

The farm bill conference committee agreement in principle sets the farm bill up for passage by the end of the year.

"Unfortunately, with the passing of President Bush, everything was kind of put on pause for folks to mourn here in Washington, but give a little more time for the committees and the Congressional Budget Office to hopefully wrap this farm bill up and an opportunity for the House and Senate to consider it (this) week," Andrew Walmsley, American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) director of Congressional Relations, said.

Agricultural groups, including AFBF and Texas Farm Bureau, have been urging Congress to pass the farm bill for the stability it provides.

"You look at where conditions are in farm country, obviously still a lot of uncertainty with challenges with markets, challenges with Mother Nature, maybe a little bit of progress on the trade front over the past few can help push the farm bill days," Walmsley said. Farmers, ranchers discuss farm, food policy

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas —Voting delegates stamped their position on food labeling and regulatory control of imitation meat and dairy products at Texas Farm Bureau's (TFB) 85th Annual Meeting.

Eminent domain and electronic logging devices also topped the list of concerns during the policy session, which concluded yesterday in Corpus Christi.

"Food labels are a trending issue for both consumers and farmers and ranchers," TFB President Russell Boening said. "It's an issue that's going to continue to grow, and accurate labels are essential for consumer decision-making. That's why our delegates felt it was important to establish policy for the organization."

The delegates focused on the topic and agreed on a policy position that defines clear labeling boundaries as the imitation products become more widely available.

Cell-cultured protein should not be labeled as meat, and no mixture of cell-cultured and meat from a live animal—livestock, poultry, fish and wildlifeshould be labeled or marketed as "meat," according to the delegates.

Delegates voted strengthen private property protections when landown-

main. They said property takers should notify and serve in a timely manner all paperwork to a landowner and their legal counsel for any potential eminent domain proceeding.

They also support requiring utility companies or other entities holding an easement to return a landowner's property to the condition it was in prior to installing or replacing infrastructure.

Delegates registered opposition to federally-mandated regulations for electronic logging devices (ELD) for transportation of agricultural commodities, livestock and small fleet operators.


In addition, delegates voted to strengthen border security and support virtual fencing as a means to do so.

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
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If you haven't noticed, I tend to have my hands in a lot of different projects all at the same time. Often, these different activities have to do with gardening, and although most people tend to wind-down their backyard growing efforts, my brain kicks into full gear during the cold months. So, when Terry came home this weekend to find me peering into a plastic tub of moistened, shredded paper and dirt I had to explain that I was preparing the home for our new worm community.

"A worm farm...why?" I excitedly answered. "These worms will work to compost our kitchen scraps, turning all of that into a rich mass of poo which can then be turned into a tea and used as a probiotic fertilizer on our vegetable gardens, flower gardens and our house plants. Plus, I've never done this before and I want to see how it

Terry looked at me with his understanding smile.

"And," I added, "these worms will multiply so we will have plentiful bait for fishing!"

Bingo!! I had him hooked.

(Pun unintended.) So, let me explain the process. You will need one deep, plastic tub and a second shallow tub in which the larger tub sits into the shallow one. Use a drill and place a few 1/8-inch holes into the bottom of the large tub to allow for some seepage--you don't want your worms to drown. While you have the drill out, put several holes up toward the top rim to allow for some air circulation. This box should have a lid that fits tightly. The next step is to place some fabric window screening on the bottom of the tub to keep the

worms from wandering out of their comfy condo.

Now, we create the habitat for our residents. On top, of the screen, place 3-4 inches of shredded paper. We will be adding shredded paper to the condo on a weekly basis. Lightly cover the paper with a shallow layer of dirt, and then sprinkle this base with water until it is soaked, but not flowing out into the shallow tub.

It's time to adopt your worms! Red-Wigglers are the preferred worm-farm variety because they are proven winners for composting. In the middle of winter, the best place to shop for worms is Walmart. Their temporary home is in a refrigerator in the Sports Department. While choosing the worms, open up those containers and choose a bunch that is wriggling around a bit--you don't want to end up buying a bunch of dying worms.


Once you have placed the worms into their warm, moist home, let them alone for a week so they can get acclimated to their larger space.

After a week, kitchen scraps can be introduced to the colony. As the worms do their business, they will get regular inputs of shredded paper, tea bags, potato peels and other biodegradable kitchen waste.

The seepage is the gold, and it can be sucked out of the shallow tub, diluted 50%/50% with water and fed to your thirsty plants. In addition, the newlymade soil can be put into a bundle and seeped in water overnight. With this process, a large amount of 'tea' can be created for use over larger areas.

And that's it! Such an easy process, and your plants will
