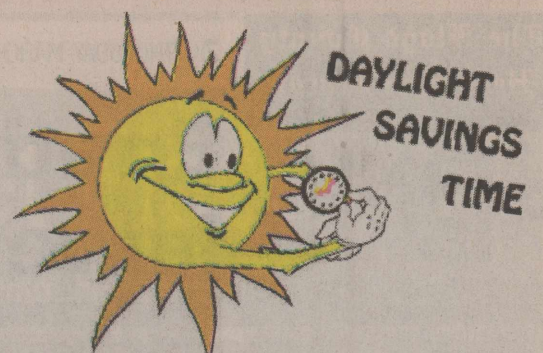

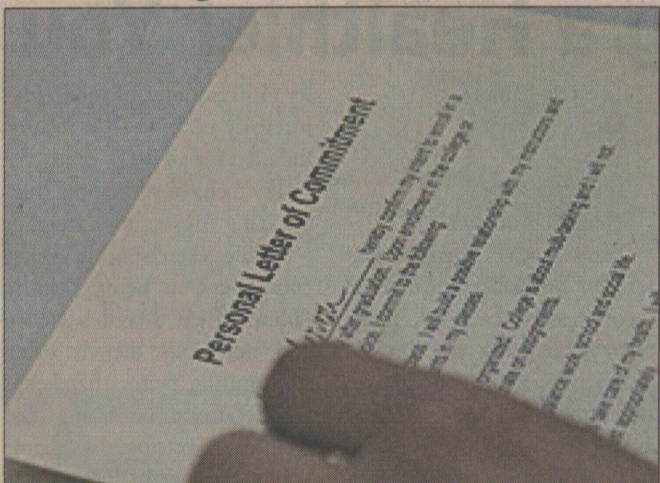

## Signing Day held for Floydada seniors

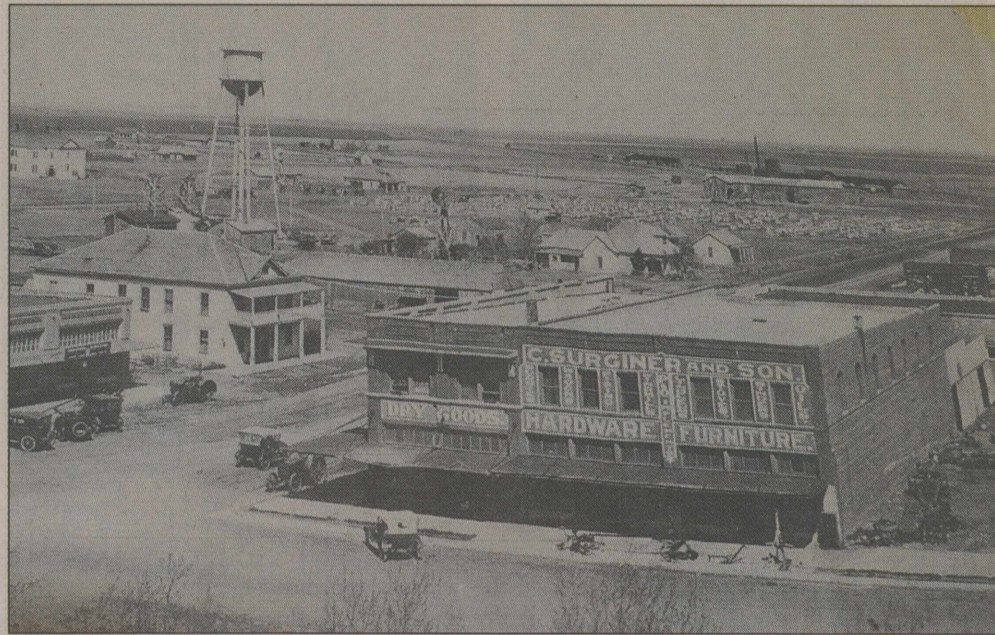

## Barrow Building remodel wrapping up this Month

FLOYDADA-Floydada's downtown square has another building being renovated these days. The Barrow Building, located on the NE corner of the Missouri/Main Street intersection is getting a make-over thanks to the Floyd County Museum Board.

According to found records with the help of Dorothy Turner, the Barrow Building was purchased by the Museum Board in the latter part of 1988. It had been used as a pool hall but had stood empty in recent years. Pictures in the 1930s and 1920s show the building as host to possibly a Department Store, respectively, and a Dry Goods store early on.

"We believe the building is over 100 years old," stated Board Member Hulon Carthel. "Ricky

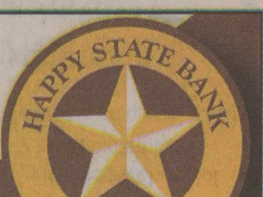

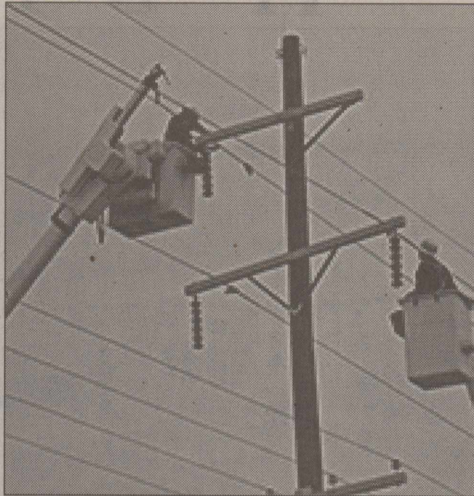

## Floydada County Sheriff Issue Appeal to Citizens in Fight Against Crime

FLOYDADA - Responding to the increasing number of people wanting to assist law enforcement officials and build a stronger partnership in the fight against crime, Sheriff Paul Raissez today announced that Floyd county citizens are being invited to become Associate Members of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas.

Membership appeals go out in the mail shortly. Individuals choosing to join the voluntary program can do so for as little as \$25, while businesses can show their support beginning at a \$100 contribution level. The funding provides critically important technical resources, training, and legislative support on key criminal justice issues.

Contributions are tax-deductible, and unlike other organizations in our state, the Membership Program does not solicit membership by telephone.

"With government funding becoming increasingly difficult to secure, the membership drive has taken on greater importance than ever before," said Sheriff Raissez. "The funding is vital to help-

ing us carry out our mission of making our communities safer places to live, work and play."

The Program is committed to its "No Telemarketing" policy and only sends invitations to citizens to become members by mail. The membership program was formed to provide citizens with an opportunity to lend their support to more effective law enforcement and to help local law enforcement officers protect the lives and property of citizens.

## Becoming a Healthier You

Because we all lead different lifestyles, it is no surprise that dieting is not "one-size-fits-all." Therefore, it is important to follow a healthy eating regimen that is tailored to you and your daily needs. Sticking to a diet that is custom to you will both give you the energy that your body requires and help combat obesity and weight gain.

According to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, carrying too much body fat may have harmful effects on your health. More than ½ of U.S. adults are obese, which is defined as having a body mass index (BMI) of >30. There are many contributing factors that cause obesity, most of which can be prevented or regulated. Some of these factors include:

- Family history and genes
- Medications

- Lifestyle habits
- Eating behaviors
- Stress
- Too little sleep
- Medical problems

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Specialist David Leal recommends creating long-term goals that are broken down into achievable steps — those then become goals that are focused on daily. "We often feel like there's so many things we need to change; eat better, exercise more, lose weight, lower cholesterol. However, this can become overwhelming. Remember that progress, no matter how small or slow, is still progress," Leal said. When approaching weight loss, follow these simple lifestyle changes that can be easily incorporated into your daily routine:

- Eat a calorie-controlled diet
- Participate in physical activ-

ity (150 minutes of moderate-intensity each week is recommended for adults)

Try behavior therapy (recognizing triggers for eating)

While exercising is a key component in being healthy, failure to eat a well-balanced and nutritious diet is often the limiting factor that keeps people from becoming the healthiest version of themselves. For weight loss, or improving any chronic disease, eating 2-3 servings of vegetables a day can make a tremendous impact. Add balance to your meals by making half of your plate fruits and vegetables while decreasing the amount of protein and starches, such as meat and potatoes. To help keep your eating habits on track, follow these simple steps from the Academy of

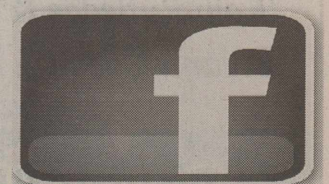

## Breaking News: Lockney house destroyed by fire

### LOCKNEY, TX (KCBD)

- A call to intervene in a fight between a woman and her daughter ends with the daughter airlifted to a Lubbock hospital and the house they shared destroyed.

The Floyd County Sheriff's Office says they were called to a home in the 700

block of Southwest Third street in Lockney just after 11:15 Monday morning. When they arrived, they learned the daughter had locked her mother out of their home.

A short time later, deputies noticed the house was on fire. The Lockney Volunteer Fire Department was called in, and they pulled the daughter from

the home. She was taken by Floydada EMS to W. J. Mangold Memorial Hospital in Lockney before being taken by air ambulance to a Lubbock hospital. Crews from Floydada Volunteer Fire Department were called in to assist with the fire that ultimately destroyed the home. The fire and the incident remain under investigation.

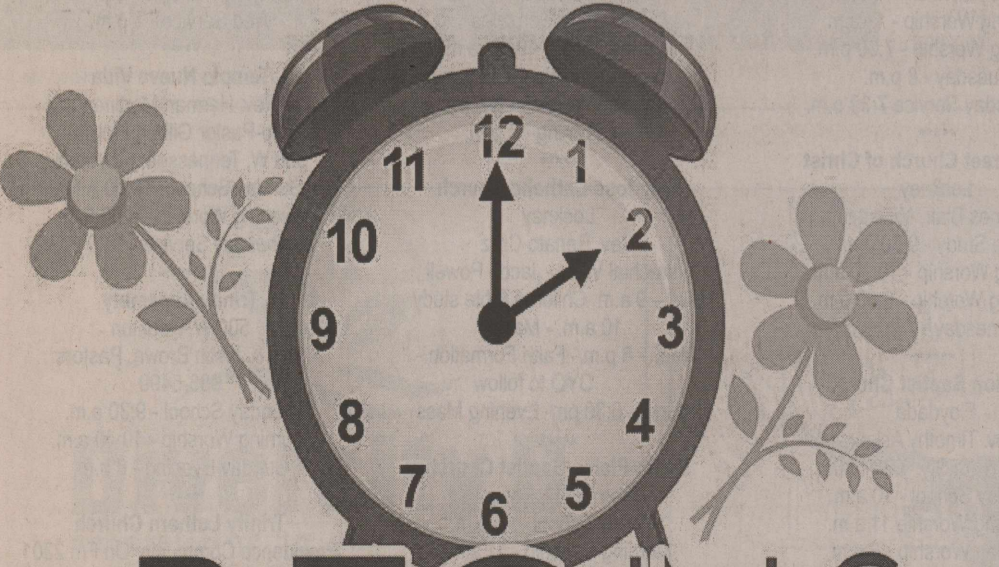

## THE FLOYD COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM MEMORIES 1979

ROBERT AND MABEL

Robert James and Mable McLaughlin came to Floyd County April 1, 1915 from Illinois. The family came by Santa Fe Railroad from Salem, Illinois to Plainview. Their household furnishings were shipped to Aiken where they settled in the Meteor Community.

Mr. McLaughlin was born August 25, 1871 in Sparta, Illinois. His wife Mabel Wyatt was born August 11, 1877 in Marion County, Illinois. They married August 24, 1898 in Marion County. They had one daughter, Kathryn, and two sons, Robert Harold and Wendell Wyatt. R. J. taught school in a one-teacher school in Marion County, Illinois for seventeen years. The family homesteaded near Chattanooga, Oklahoma from 1901 to 1903.

In 1916 they purchased 320 acres for thirty dollars an acre from W. E. Risser in the Providence Community. Their first automobile was bought in January, 1917 - a model T Ford - from Arthur Barker, Sr.

R. G. bought the first combine in Floyd County in February, 1920. The international McCormick had a twelve foot cutter bar. He bought it from Morgan and Company International in Lockney. A 12-20 Rumley tractor was purchased later in the year.

The McLaughlins secured the remaining half section of their homeplace in

1928. Their first irrigation well was put down in the spring of 1938. The pump was purchased from Artie Baker and the motor from Arthur Barker.

Kathryn McLaughlin, a daughter, was born October 27, 1899 in Marion County, Illinois. She married John F. Starkey in 1919 in Floyd County. They had four sons and three daughters. She attended West Texas State Normal College in Canyon for one year. She died in 1972 and is buried in the Plainview Cemetery.

Robert Harold, a son, married Jewell Fay Jones, February 4, 1930 in Pawhuska, Oklahoma. They had one son Harold Don and two daughters - Maebeth and Patsy Fay.

Wyatt, another son, and Zenith Beatrice Nicholas were married in Lockney, August 29, 1940. He completed high school at West Texas Normal College and attended collet ether one year. He was born November 13, 1905 in Marion County, Illinois. Wyatt purchased nine hundred and fifty acres in the Providence Community. They moved to Plainview in 1974.

R. J. and Mabel moved to Plainview in 1943 when he retired from farming. He was an Elder in the First Presbyterian Church where both were active members. R. J. died September 6, 1957. Mabel died July 20, 1961. Both are buried in the Plainview Cemetery.

## TxDOT urges young drivers to plan for sober ride ahead of spring break

AUSTIN - Spring Break is a dangerous time on Texas roads, with hundreds of impaired driving crashes involving young drivers occurring each year. As college students and young adults head to Spring Break destinations in the coming weeks, the Texas Department of Transportation's "Plan While You Can" campaign reminds them to make a plan for a sober ride before the party starts.

"Drinking alcohol and driving can severely impact a young person's future. Many promising lives are cut short due to the poor decision to drink alcohol and drive," said TxDOT Executive Director James

Bass. "We urge young drivers to make responsible choices during the Spring Break holiday. Before heading out, please plan ahead for a sober ride to ensure you get to and from your destination safely."

During last year's Spring Break\* in Texas, there were 444 crashes involving young drivers who were driving under the influence of alcohol. Those crashes killed 11 people and seriously injured another 37.

The "Plan While You Can" campaign includes a statewide tour featuring the new "Plan to Win" virtual reality game where participants are a part of an immersive trivia game which poses questions related to drinking alcohol and driving, and also demonstrates the consequences of drunk driving. Players avoid "jail" by answering questions correctly, and winners progress to a waiting taxi to receive a safe and sober ride. The experience will visit

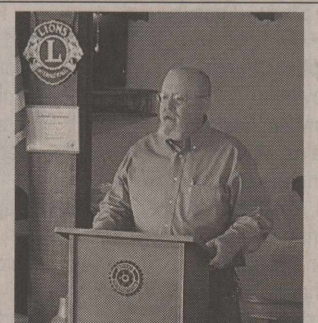

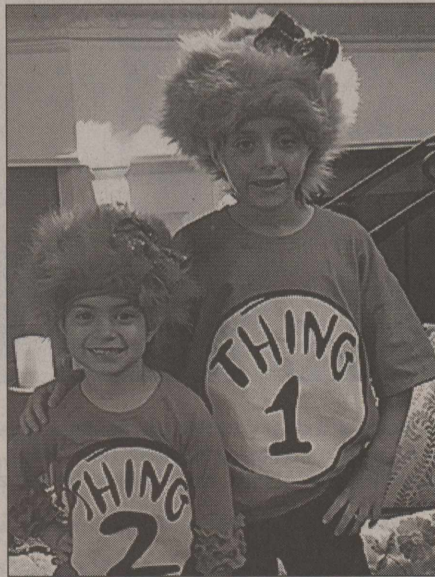
## Lockney Celebrates Dr. Seuss's Birthday

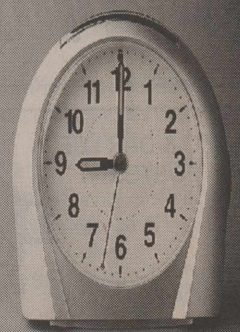

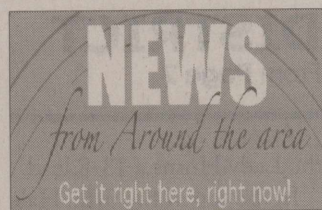

originally built in that time frame; and then again, coins aren't considered a dependable dating process.

The remodel has been quite extensive--plus, a little more than had been originally planned. Ricky Vasquez described some of the work: "The floor was just rotten. We thought that just the back part was affected, but as we pulled it up, the joists--all the way to the front third of the building--were rotten to the point of crumbling. We had to replace all of the joists in order to place the subfloor." Although the original flooring in the front area of the building will be kept in place, additional flooring has been purchased to replace the original wood-slatted floors. "We found a sample that appears as weathered boards," explained Vasquez--it was the closest match and will reflect the ageless beauty of the building.

"The halogen lights were hung from chains from the ceiling and were distracting to the original tiles," stated Vasquez. Those lights have been removed and the intricate tin ceiling tiles repaired and secured. "Back when this building was built, electricity wasn't in use, so the wiring was just pieced together as needed." The crew embraced that knowledge and created wall-columns with lanterns affixed on top, creating a stunningly, antiquated lighting effect that enhances the original architecture of the building's interior.

The Vasquez Crew has been 'in-residence' since November demolishing, re-building, and painting; however, the project is expected to be completed by the end of March. "We do a lot of jobs here in Floydada and are honored to have been selected to work on this historic structure. It is a beautiful, old building," stated Vasquez.

What is planned for the building? The Museum will continue to host the Quilt and Flower Shows during the annual Old Settler's Reunions that take place mid-May, and will continue to host the rope-making demonstrations during the Punkin Days festivals. As exhibits needing additional space become available, the Barrow Building will be positioned to receive the over-flow.
