Gabriel will be attending Texas Tech University in Lubbock with a major in Accounting.



LOCKNEY - The Lockney City Council met in City Hall, Tuesday, May 21 at 7:00 a.m.

Public comments were taken from Joe Sustaita. Mr. Sustaita acknowledged that the city was beginning to take measures that will require residents to clean up properties. He collects scrap metal and junk and sells it to make additional income. He pleaded that the Council take into consideration those individuals that buy/sell junk and that some lenience will be rendered.

Council reviewed minutes from Council Meeting, April 23, 2019. After some discussion a motion was made to accept the minutes. The vote was unanimous.

Consent Items were presented to the council members through their meeting packets prior to the meeting. After consideration, a motion was made to approve the consent items. The vote was unanimous.

Manager Poling stated that CPA Lee Starkey had notified him that the IRS Assessment of \$23,000 had been reviewed, after much effort on Starkey's part, and had been virtually negated. Poling stated that the assessment due was approximately \$52.00—which would fulfill all prior IRS liabilities from years past. Poling recommended that a gift card be purchased and given to Ms. Starkey in appreciation of her persistent work to get the liability reviewed and decreased. Council members agreed. A motion was made and a unanimous vote was placed.

By law, the City Council is required to canvass the votes of the City of Lockney Election held on May 4, 2019. The 13 votes were reviewed and accepted.

Mr. Frank Jimenez requested permission to construct a carport extending to the sidewalk. Mr. Jimenez was present with a diagram of the plan, and to take questions from council

Manager Poling proposed that the city consider taking part in an interlocal agreement with Plainview for Vector Disease control using aerial application. AS only one participant, the City has no say in the schedule of the spraying, and only the spraying on the City's area will be charged. Motion was maid to approve the interlocal agreement. The vote was unanimous.

The Council is required to present a replacement for Ed Marks on the Mackinzie Water Board. Hank Henderson was suggested. Motion was made to appoint Henderson subject to his acceptance, to the Mackinzie Water Board. The motion was approved unanimously.

Mayor Poling introduced a CDBG Program grant application for the Fire, Ambulance and Services Truck Fund that could be filed on behalf of the City with the Texas Department of Agriculture. The grant application would be for up to \$500,000 of grant funds to provide for a Brush Truck and an Ambulance. The truck would replace the 14-year old truck that is currently used by the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department. The match requirement for this grant would amount to \$5,000 from its General Fund as the cash contribution toward the activities of the project. Council members moved that Manager Poling be the authorized representative for the grant and assist the Fire Department in putting together all documents together with SPAG. The vote was in favor of unanimously.

Members attending the meeting were David Cole, Dart Carthel, Donnie McLaughlin and Aaron Wilson. Others present were Mayor Michael DeLeon, Manager Buster Poling, City Secretary Laurie Garcia and City Attorney Lanny Voss.



This month I am going to highlight the office of County Clerk. What is a County Clerk? The main duties of the County Clerk are to serve as the Clerk of the County Court and the Commissioners Court, act as a recorder of deeds and other instruments, issue marriage licenses and take depositions. The Clerk is also responsible for conducting countywide special, primary and general elections and for handling absentee voting. What does a County Clerk do in Texas? The County Clerk in Texas has the following duties and responsibilities: (1) Serves as Clerk and custodian of records for the Commissioners Court, Constitutional County Court and Statutory County Courts, (2) Acts as a recorder and custodian of important public records, including all bonds, deeds, birth and death certificates, assumed names and livestock brands, ensuring that records are maintained in a secure, archival manner, (3) Issues marriage licenses, and (4) Serves as chief elections officer in most counties.

The Floyd County Clerk id Ms. Ginger Morgan. Ms. Morgan has all the duties described above and several more. Ms. Morgan is required to have continuing education in the operation of the County Clerk's office annually. Ms. Morgan also needs continuing education in elections, voter registration, rules of absentee voting and the Probate and Guardian functions of the County Court. Ms. Morgan keeps, organizes and archives the minutes of the Commissioners Court and records all orders, resolutions, contracts, bills and other items of business from the Commissioners Court.

## **Caprock Hospital District**

FLOYDADA - The Caprock Hospital District's May meeting took place at 7 a.m., May 23rd at the EMS building in Floydada. The first order of business was the swearing in of board members: Denice Payne, Matthew Rainwater, and Taylor Sue. Upon completion of the ceremony by County Judge Marty Lucke, President Brianne Glasscock opened the floor to nominations of officers. Glasscock wasnominated as President and voted as such. TK Farris was nominated for Vice President and voted as such. Matthew Rainwater was nominated as Secretary and voted as such.

The Board members reviewed the minutes from the April meeting. A motion to approve was made. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Two individuals attended to make statements during the Public Forum Agenda item. Eric Smith and Tom Farris. Both made statements in support of the Caprock Hospital District's Board and decisions being made. As past board members, Smith and Farris underlined the continuing goal to provide the area with a "state-of-the-art EMS" that can financially and effectively serve as a local trauma center. As stated, "Way back in the '80s, we had hard decisions to make. We chose to put the money into services that would be utilized by a larger percentage of the taxpayers."

Thanks and appreciation was also given to Katrina Gooch, Director of EMS. "She does an amazing job getting equipment that it out there that others don't know they can claim; Her work to write grants that benefit the ongoing directives of EMS is unsurpassed."

Gooch reported that the EMS crews had ser-

viced 38 calls-10 medical call-outs, 4 trauma calls, 8 critical calls, 2 hospital transfers, 12 no-transports due to motor vehicle collisions with no injuries, blood pressure checks, and lift-assist, and 2 mental health transports.

Gooch also reported that she had obtained two Vision Kings Airway cameras. "They were a part of some lots of equipment where the grant requisites hadn't been met. I just had to do a lot of phone-begging," stated the Director. The board stated that this type of consistent initiative on Gooch's part is one reason the ambulances carry the highest technological medical equipment.

President Glasscock reminded everyone about the May 29th Open House at the EMS Facility.

Glasscock stated that they presently have two bids for the Hospital Asbestos Abatement processes and is expected to have the third bid by June's meeting. At that time, the Asbestos consultant will present the abatement report. Glasscock also reported that she should have the hospital demolition bids at that time as well. Matthew Rainwater added that it is getting increasingly difficult to keep trespassers out of the facility using chains, locks, steel bars, etc. In addition, with rain, the different levels of the building continue to fill with mud and debris. He stated, "It is a hazard that needs to be taken care of soon."

The board reviewed requests made by the Clinic staff. Priority is refitting of new, handicap exterior doors for the entrances. It was moved that bids for doors be obtained. The vote in favor was unanimous. There was no other business.

The Caprock Hospital Board includes President Brianne Glasscock, VP TK Farris, Secretary Matthew Rainwater, Denice Payne and Taylor Sue. Also. present was Director Katrina Gooch, Abby Battey, Marty Lucke, Eric Smith and Tom Farris.






As I watched weather forecasts this week, planning when to dart out to activities and when to cautiously stay home (Ha! Weather doesn't seem to deter West Texans!), I pondered today's detailed weather forecasting. Just think-only two decades ago, we were watching the movie Twister and dreaming of advanced warning systems. Now, forecasts can determine, down to which minute and which streets, a tornado will hit. I am grateful that, although severe wall clouds and rotation came near, our communities were by-passed.

As to the rain showers...I did get out and do some 'covering up/protecting' of my garden plants. From what I have seen, most of those plants that were standing seem to have weathered the intense storms enough to bounce back with some sunshine. Those seeds that I hurriedly got into the soil before the moisture are now poking their heads through the mud, as those empty rows are now little lines of green.

Due to the oncoming storms, I got busy and harvested my kale seeds. Those seed pods are in the garage drying out a bit, but I should have oodles of seed. Not that I really need it, but I really didn't want it to re-seed those beds too heavily. Plus, I have some replacement tomato and chili plants that need some


Although we have gotten a few pickings of brussels sprouts, broccoli mini-heads and cabbage leaves, those are also going to seed now. I'll probably let them stick around for a few more months to provide greens for our bunnies, but they will be removed in August in order to plant for the winter gardens. Until autumn planting, those brassica veggies will be a welcome treat.

The butterflies have certainly taken advantage of our spring flower gardens; summer varieties have sprouted and will be stretching up to the sunshine. I have taken a different approach this year-mixing flowers and vegetables in all my garden beds. It makes sense-the goal is to entice those pollinators so that our plants are more productive. I am looking forward to the beauty that will undoubtedly result-I've already got my chairs positioned for simply 'viewing' as the lush greens intertwine with bright pinks, purples, blues, reds, oranges and yellows produce bright splotches of color!

# The Real Reason For Memorial Day

While you celebrated Memorial Day with family and friends this past holiday, what were you celebrating? Was it to mark the beginning of summer? Was it just another long weekend?

Memorial Day is a national holiday that started during the Civil War with "Decoration Day". All through out the states people gathered at cemeteries to decorate the graveside of soldiers that had lost their lives in the Civil War. In 1971 it became Memorial Day and was extended to include all the service members that lost their lives in all American wars. It is a day of remembrance to honor all service members that lost their lives in the pursuit of America's freedom.

Throughout our American history our troops have fought in over 70 wars and lost more than 42 million service members. Fighting for a country that, at times was ungrateful and sometimes against the military, was and is still an honor that only 0.4 percent of Americans experience.

These few brave men and women laced up their boots and started their day at an hour that no one would ever willingly be awake at. They were thousands of miles away from loved ones and at times didn't even know what tomorrow would bring, when they would be home, or if they would ever make it back home. The family and friends that they left back at home waited weeks, months, and even years to hear from their soldier. They listened to the news in hopes that they wouldn't hear a familiar name. They prayed that they wouldn't see their loved one's name among those lost. Their hearts would stop every time a decorated service member would approach their door.

There was also an impact on those that served with those that were lost. Losing a battle buddy was like losing a brother or sister would. They carried their loss around while continuing the fight. These brave soldiers still carry their memories around with them when they came back home. They know what Memorial Day is really about, so please do not thank us for our service on this day. You can thank us veterans every day, except this day. This day is not for us, it is for all those that lost their lives. This day is so much bigger than a day off, it is for those that lost their lives fighting for Americas freedom.



LUBBOCK, TX - The State of Texas is now involved in the ongoing legal chaos surrounding the former Reagor-Dykes Auto Group.

Attorney General Ken Paxton's office, on behalf of multiple municipalities and counties that once housed Reagor-Dykes stores, filed the motion in Travis County District Court to recoup more than \$52,000 in back taxes and interest fees from Bart Reagor and Rick Dykes.

The lawsuit, filed last month, says the money is being sought against the pair as the responsible parties of Reagor Dykes Auto Company, LP. It states that under provisions of current State of Texas and Federal Tax Code, the two are responsible since their names appear as owners of the business in the state's Comptroller of Public Accounts office.

The state is seeking money from previous dealerships on behalf of the cities of Amarillo, Floydada, Lamesa, Lubbock, Plainview and Snyder, as well as for the counties of Dawson, Hale, Lubbock and Scurry.

The \$52,000 is a collective amount from the cities and counties in a two-month period from July to September of last year. The auto group filed bankruptcy on August 1.

Bart Reagor will have to join his former business partner Rick Dykes in paying Ford Motor Credit millions of dollars as the co-guarantor of the Reagor-Dykes Auto Group.

Judge Sam Cummings denied an objection to his earlier ruling that said Reagor and Dykes must repay more than \$110 million in loans and interest to Ford Motor Credit.

Reagor and Dykes agreed to back loans their dealerships used to purchase vehicles, many of them from Ford Motor Credit.

Attorneys for Reagor claim that the actions of former CFO Shane Smith were done in the name of Reagor and Dykes without their knowledge, and that Ford Motor Credit "knew or should have known" that the dealership was accruing that much debt, therefore Reagor was not responsible to repay the loans.

Judge Cummings' order issued Friday states he overruled the objection because contract terms entered in between Ford and Reagor "are clear and unambiguious," and states that there have been multiple defaults on the loans.

Because Dykes has agreed to pay his portion of the money, Cummings said Ford could submit an amended proposed judgement for repayment by June 3. Cummings also allowed Reagor's attorneys 14 days after the amended proposal to submit an additional objection.

International Bank of Commerce Oklahoma filed a petition against several Reagor Dykes companies and personally against Bart Reagor and Rick Dykes on Wednesday, claiming they have defaulted on millions of dollars worth of loans and promissory notes.

The petition lists 10 promissory notes loan agreements, and guaranty agreements totaling more than \$35 million.

The complaint states that the RDAG companies "have failed and refused to fulfill their obligations under the Guaranty Agreements" and are liable for overdrafts on their deposit accounts.

IBC says they foreclosed on multiple Reagor Dykes properties that were pledged as collateral on May 7 but they say the total value of foreclosure pro-
