Historic Grocery Mkt building taken down

FLOYDADA – Floydada's City Square was forever changed as excavators and loaders descended onto the corner of Missouri and North Main last Thursday, May 30th.

Although a historically interesting part of Floydada's downtown square, the building had been left to deteriorate, attracting destructive insects, vermin and other unwanted pests. In addition, with very little structural integrity, the two-story building had become a hazardous to anyone trying to enter from the ground or the roof. The crumbling sentinel could be taken down in a controlled situation or it would come

down on its own.

According to City Records, the building has been on and off the list for condemnation on several occasions in the past. Last fall, city leaders condemned the property and moved forward with the asbestos inspection and abatement requirements. That being done, the demolition contractors were called to do the job.

The building has a long history in Floydada. In 1921 photos, the corner of the block shows that The Martin Dry Goods Co. took up both the outer corner building and building just to the south. Looking at pictures in the 1930s, The Martin Dry Goods Co. continued to do business on that corner.

It seems that the structure always had See **GROCERY**, Page 8

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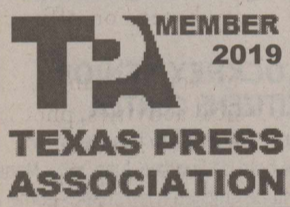

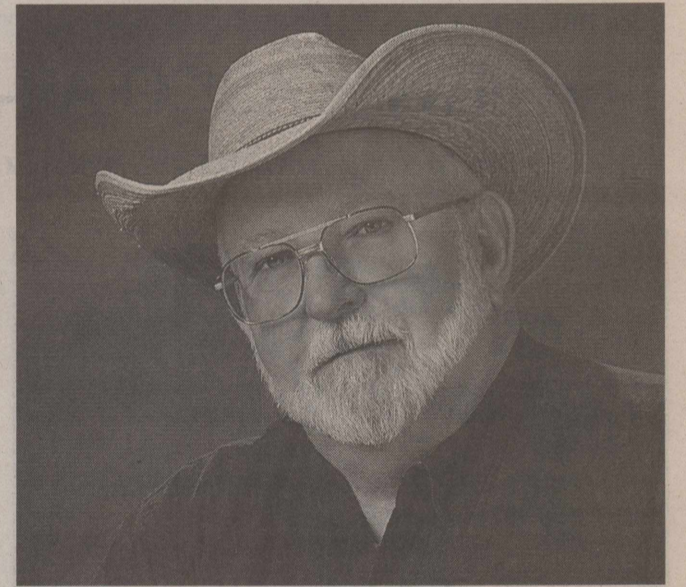

Lockney School Board approves continued facility upgrades

LOCKNEY – Meeting in regular session on Thursday, May 30, members of the Lockney Board of Trustees approved expenditures for continued facility upgrades, transportation and equipment up to \$500,000 at all three campuses, the athletic complex and the vocational facility.

The Board also welcomed new Board Member, Dahlen Mc-

Carter. McCarter replaced Kirk Wilson who chose not to seek re-election.

In other actions, the Board approved the payment of bills and the financial report in the amount of \$4,30,426.49. The Board also approved the proposed budget for 2019-2020 for the Floyd County Appraisal District.

Superintendent Jim Baum informed the Board that he had accepted the resignations of Amy Kitchens, Robert Moreno and Abbey Hicks and the resignation/retirement of Marva Rasco. Baum also informed the Board of the hiring of Brittney Wilson at the Elementary as a kindergarten teacher, Candace Korchenko at the High School for math and Benjaly Foster at the Junior High for English Language Arts.

Baum informed the Board the final student enrollment for May was 439 including 206 at Elementary, 112 at Junior High and 121 at High School. He also talked to the Board about approximate cost for the EPEC Special Services Coop, preliminary property values and, along with Business Manager Naomi Jones, discussed the very preliminary impact from House Bill 3.

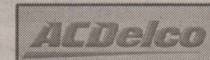

THE FLOYD COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM MEMORIES 1979

THE HUGH NELSON FAMILY

William and Mary (Rardin) Nelson and three children—Oscar N., Lessie Lee, and Hugh J. - Moved from Atwood, Illinois to near Houston, Texas in 1900. They survived the Galveston flood. They soon moved to Johnson County, Texas and later to Rhome, Wise County, Texas.

My father, Hugh J. married Lydia Ann (Lena) Ford in 1906 in Wise County. Six children were born to them there; Opal, Raymond, Carl, Herman, Lloyd, and Deane. William Nelson died in 1909 and was buried in the Fairview Cemetery near Rhome.

The Hugh Nelsons moved to Floydada, Texas in June 1917, and settled one and one-fourth miles northeast of the Lakeview School. Oscar Nelson and mother Mary moved December 1916 to Floydada, near Lakeview. In early 1918 Hugh had the chicken pox followed by the children, then all had whooping cough, measles, and roseola. The latter part of 1918 we had influenza. Alma Ruth was born in 1917 and Lena Mae in 1921 in Floyd County. The day Lena Mae was born I took the smallpox. Eight or ten days later Mother and baby had smallpox. Dr. Andrews had vaccinated us, but the vaccine was no good. Two brothers had already had smallpox, and also several families in the community.

Lakeview had a good school in a nice brick building with four classrooms and a large auditorium above them. Several non-denominational churches used the auditorium for church services by taking turns. It was also used for school programs and funeral services.

Our household things, farm implements, and horses were shipped to Floyd County by train. Cows could not be shipped because of the ticks. On arrival they had to buy cows. The horses were accustomed to eating threshed oats so they had to learn to eat maize heads. We had to learn how to burn coal for heating and cooking instead of wood.

Many covered wagons (prairie schooners) passed by our house—people moving west. They often stopped for water at our place because the windmill was near the road. The mirages on the plains fascinated me.

At present I (Opal Nelson Higgins) live in La Mesa, California, Raymond and Estella in Plainview, Texas, Carl (a World War II veteran) in Dimmitt, Herman and Ethel in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Lloyd And Fannie Ruth in Borger, Texas, Deane and Clovelle in Beliflower, California, Alma Ruth in Floydada, Lena Mae and Klyce Ooley in Plainview, Texas. I am thankful that after seventy years all eight of us are still living.

My parents, Hugh and Lena, grandparents, Jasper and Sonora Ford, grandmother Mary Nelson, Uncle Oscar Nelson, Aunt Jessie and Harvey J. Newberry, their son Paul Newberry, and Great Aunt Ida Reeves are all buried in the Lakeview Cemetery.

The 501: Repurposed Malls

Some urban malls are converting retail spaces to office spaces. LinkedIn said so. They've got the connections to know.

I'm not surprised. Internet-based businesses are retail's new face. Malls are struggling.

If I worked in a real office, I'd like for it to be in a repurposed mall – a nice mall with a mix of office spaces and retail stores plus restaurants. I'd shop during lunch. Dillard's shoes would erode my net worth over time – like in a month.

I'd join all the mall walkers after work and get my exercise. Or maybe not.

Let's push the envelope: As long as malls are being repurposed, why not convert them to living spaces?

GOOGLE PAUSE. Somebody beat me to it. An online article on the subject begins ...

"Malls need to find new uses for their spaces. Affordable, accessible housing is in great ..."

No doubt the next word is "demand." But I'm not reading the article until I've expressed my own thoughts while they're still untainted.

For starters, it's not such a new idea to live in a non-traditional setting. Consider the late Eudora Welty's "Why I Live at the P. O.," a somewhat believable piece of fiction. Before Welty wrote the story, she actually saw a woman ironing in the back of a post office. Glimpsed her from the window of a train back when she was a WPA photographer.

Me, when I worked at the post office, I might have taken a nap on a pile of mailbags, but I never thought about living there. Or ironing there.



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But live in a mall? Why not? All the smaller stores could be cottages, each with a picket fence and mailbox. Residents could have refrigerators and microwaves, but, for safety's sake, major cooking could be done in a common area. Everybody could bake bread on Saturday in a big pizza oven. The rest of the week, it really could be for pizza. Aging hippies might buy into living at the mall if they didn't get to live in a commune back when they wanted to.

OK. Let's see what the real mall dwelling planners are saying.

BACK TO GOOGLE.

They're saying a lot. My remark about "aging hippies" jibes with the idea that Baby Boomers are potential mall dwellers. The other target population group is aging Millennials. Millennials are aging? I feel old.

There's much ado about "town centers" -- mixed-use areas resembling downtowns. What's more, Walmart is testing the trend. Here's a sentence from a November 2018 Forbes article:

"The newly reimagined Walmart will make over their sprawling parking lots into Town Center malls."

Will there be living spaces? Why not? Come to think of it, I read a novel years ago about a girl who surreptitiously lived at an ordinary Walmart (shades of Welty), had her baby there and named her Americus.

Meanwhile, back when Walmart was poised to kill downtown retail, wouldn't it have been better just to have handed over the doomed town centers?

Ah hindsight.

tended Draughan's business college.

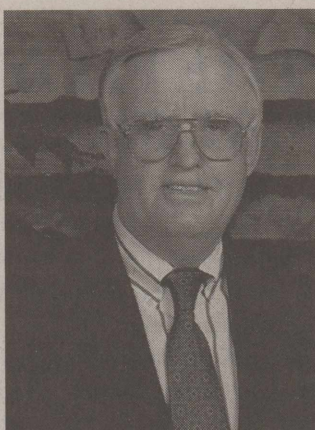
He met Madge Ann West at Linguish Falls and they married on August 8, 1950.

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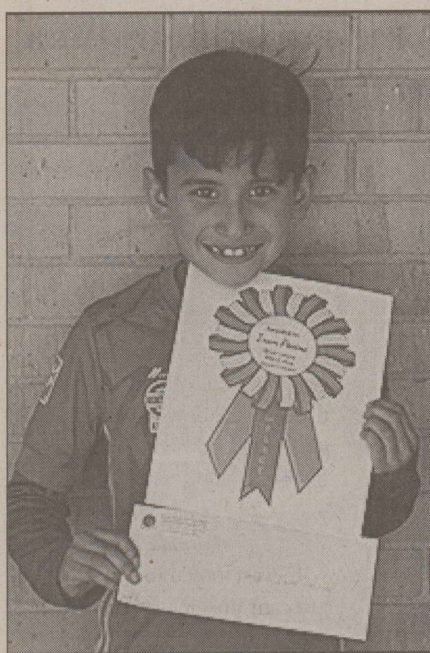

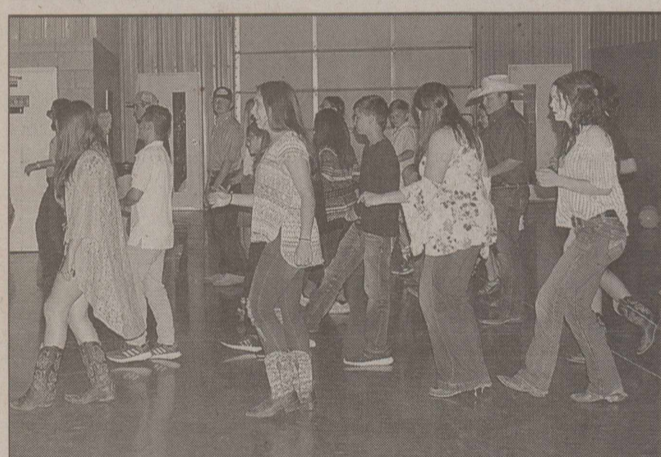

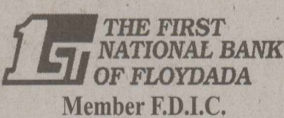
MUNCY - The Floyd County 4-H Club hosted the summer's first Fiesta last Thursday evening at the Unity Center in Muncy. The event was the "pilot" social event planned for the county's young people. According to organizer and 4-H Leader, Teresa Bigham,

"Our kids need things to do that let them socialize with their friends in a safe setting," stated Bigham. Not really a 4-H event, "...because we want anyone to come, whether they are involved in 4-H or not..." the members used their organization as the nucleus group to invite and get other youngsters and young adults to attend.

Whether it was the tunes coming from the speakers, the talents of area music students or the full-fledged taco-bar, families and individual groups from Amarillo to Matador filled the available seating. The youth of our area were

together, socializing, laughing, and having a general "good time." As in generations past, it was the 'group' dance that got everyone on the floor shuffling their boots to the beat. Thank goodness for the Hand-Jive, the Shuffle, Achy Breaky Heart, the Flash Mobs, and this generation's "Cupid Shuffle."

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With the recent rains I have been able to retract into my little world as I pass the time doing one of my most favorite and most relaxing activities: pulling weeds.

I know! What's wrong with me?? But it is true—I love to crouch next to a garden bed and rid it of any and all pesky sprouts. The moisture has helped to spur on all the errant grass seeds that scattered all over my garden last fall, but it also has helped make the 'pulling' process a piece of cake.

So, yesterday I was lounging next to my cucumber bed, pulling baby grass and letting my mind wander... "I need to string the trellis for the peas"... "What is the matter with the tomato in the front?"... "A hoed row in between the okra would help with the watering"... "Good Grief—I think I planted too many potatoes in that trough"... "That mosquito was as big as a lizard!"... "Maybe a dip-cone would be nice this afternoon"... "I need to figure out a drip-system for the herbs in the pallets"... and so on, and so on.

Now, you notice that as I am relaxing I am still working—but not "work" working, "gardening" working, and that is where the relaxation comes in. Looking back on my life, gardening has always been an outlet for me. It is something I can lose myself in during the wintertime planning and completely escape into during the care and harvesting of the productive seasons. I do hope that if you have a backyard garden, you experience some of this kind of peace every time you enter that space.

As to the gardens—I WANT EVERYTHING TO BE GROWN AND PRODUCING RIGHT NOW! And, due to the odd, cool temps that have accompanied the rains and storms, things are just a little slow getting started. Today, however, I believe that things grew inches overnight. My cucumbers are finally reaching out their vining tendrils. The okra all have four to six leaves on them—I have to say this is the first year I haven't had to replant my okra—it must love this consistent moisture. All of the tomatoes that I have now, except two plants, are ones I started from seed, and although they are doing well, its just slow going with them. The two plants that I bought are producing fruit, but their leaves are turning a spotted-yellow so I don't know how much longer they will be with us. Both the Indian corn and the Sweet corn varieties are finally shooting up nicely, and the beans I planted at the corn's roots are beginning to twine around those sturdy cornstalks. Has anyone else noticed that Anaheim Pepper plants were far and few to be found this spring?? We are making do with hot and mild Jalapeño plants. Two got hailed on and beaten down so much that they put on some survival leaves and rested for a month. I just noticed this week that they are sprouting their production leaves and blooms—we can never have too many pepper plants!

The thing about gardening this time of year is that it teaches patience...Perhaps, that is its way of making sure its caretakers visit every day—several times! If you are like me, it's addicting.

a 2nd floor—the windows facing out toward the courthouse.

Many people remember the Masonic Lodge being housed on the second floor, and one reference that the Rainbow Girls met upstairs as well. Harmon Funeral Home was housed in the building as well.

Jess Patterson's Patterson Grocery took up residence in the 1950s. One comment from the "You know you are from Floydada, TX if..." Facebook page recollected entering the back door to buy meat at the butcher counter. Several people remember walking from their houses (parents' houses) to the square to buy groceries. Mrs. Patterson was the Librarian at the High School.

Westers Grocery and Market resided in the building in the 1960s according to advertisements found in high school yearbooks.

In 1975, Sue Williams owned/ ran the Sears Catalog Store in this location. Ac-

ording to her daughter, the Sears store closed in 1987. From comments, many people remembered "...going to see Santa there..." and others recalled different items purchased from the catalog store.

On a personal note, when the Zumwalts got settled in Floydada in the summer of 1980, the Sears Store was one of our first shopping experiences. I remember my dad, Perry, buying all his beehives and bee-keeping supplies from Sears. We would take the brown-paper packages home, carefully take out all the pieces, and then start the process of putting everything together and readying the hive for the bees—which, I believe, came in a little box the size of a book. While in Floydada, he and I worked numerous different hive setups. Once in college, I went on to become the Texas Honey Queen, promoting the honey industry, working with legislators and lobbyist groups to formulate positive

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

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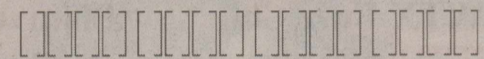
