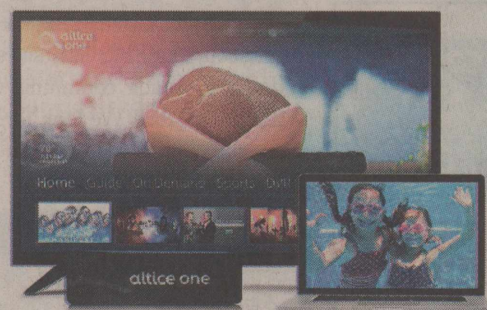

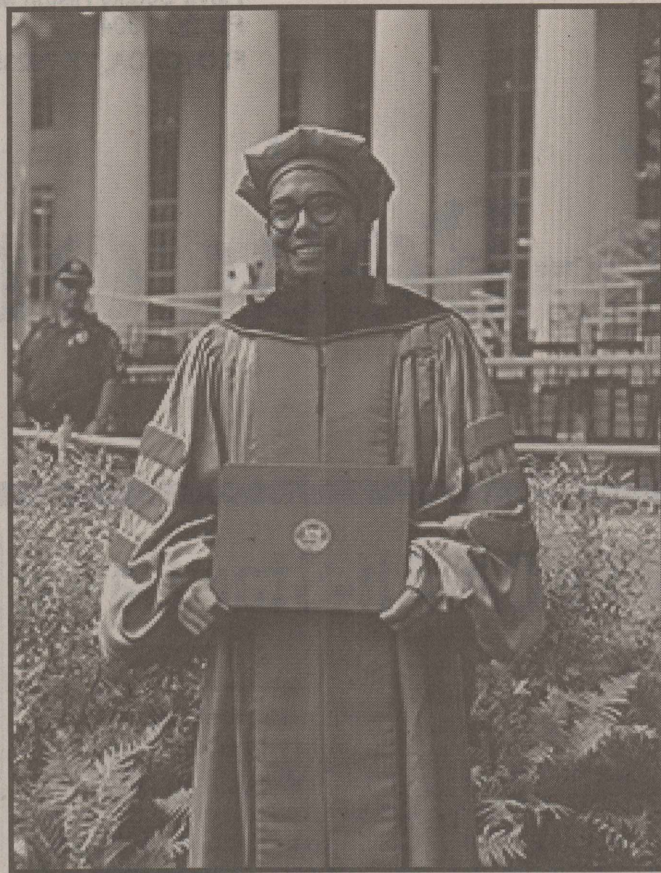

FHS graduate pioneering new Insulin Therapies

Dr. Abel Bryan Cortinas, PhD - Class of 2008

CAMBRIDGE, MA - Next time Abel Bryan Cortinas comes home to Floydada, he will be addressed as "Dr. Cortinas," and respectively so. Cortinas (FHS Class of 2008) recently graduated with a doctorate degree in Biological Engineering from MIT.

Doctorate Candidates have a brief Introduction Page on the MIT website which explains Abel's Engineering beginnings and describes the work his is continuing to develop:

What sparked your interest in your current field, and what do you love about it?

"I had very little background in the field of drug development/delivery when I arrived at MIT. My background was primarily traditionally chemical engineering as it's applied to the energy and chemical industries. However, when I finally came to MIT, I quickly stumbled upon all of the exciting research pioneered by Professors Robert Langer and Daniel Anderson, specifically in the field of Diabetes that involved the prospect of developing new materials for creating an artificial pancreas as well as engi-

neering insulin to create smarter therapies for existing patients. The idea of creating something so new and novel, something that hasn't been made by anyone before, was really enticing and something that I never really considered before. It started off as a brief meeting with these professors, and ended with me being very stubborn about joining their labs to try and contribute to these research efforts, and in the end I joined the lab of Professor Daniel Anderson and have been working on the problem of creating smart insulin therapies ever since."

Personal research summary
"Diabetes mellitus is a global epidemic currently affecting over 380 million individuals worldwide, and the number of affected individuals is projected to increase to more than half a billion by 2035 according to the International Diabetes Federation. Current standards of care for severe forms of diabetes usually involve, in part, repeat injections of insulin, which can be subject to poor patient compliance due in part to the strict monitoring requirements of patient blood sugar levels, as well as the physiological differences from patient to patient. My research involves the rational design of novel insulin conjugates engineered to mimic the functionality of a healthy pancreas, to help alleviate some of this burden. The main focus of this work is to provide the single protein with all of the necessary tools to perform in a responsive manner, similar to the pancreas, without the use of complex polymeric or non-biological systems, thereby creating a lean, all-in-one protein therapy that can regulate a patient's blood sugar without the risk [of] noncompliance."

Abel Cortinas completed his undergraduate work in Chemical Engineering at Texas Tech University. After obtaining his master's degree from MIT in 2014, he began his doctorate's work, being accepted as a Sloan-MIT UCEM (University Center for Exemplary Mentoring) participant in 2016-17.

Ag bills move through Legislature, await governor

AUSTIN - Texas legislators have approved several bills this legislative session that will impact Texas agriculture.

HB 1325 by Rep. Tracy King (R-Laredo) passed unanimously from the House and Senate. It requires participation in the state hemp program in order to cultivate, handle or process hemp in Texas.

"Now that hemp production is legal on the federal level through the 2018 Farm Bill, it's time to move forward in Texas," Billy Howe, Texas Farm Bureau associate Legislative director, said. "Texas farmers deserve the right to grow a crop that is already legally sold in the state."

Texas' climate is suited for growing hemp, and a variety of products can be produced by the crop and used for construction materials, food and beverages, furniture, paper, cosmetics, recycling and textiles.

Veterinarians are in high demand in rural Texas, and state legislators are addressing those needs.

Texas Tech University's

School of Veterinary Medicine is one step closer to reality with the Legislature allocating \$17.4 million of the state's budget to fund building the school in Amarillo.

"Farmers, ranchers and livestock in rural Texas need more access to veterinary care," Howe said. "An additional veterinary school in Texas will help boost that opportunity."

Several transportation bills also moved forward this session.

HB 2837 by Rep. Terry Canales (D-Edinburg) is a multi-purpose transportation bill that relates to the operation of and equipment for vehicles.

The bill contains several small changes that will be helpful to farmers and ranchers, Howe said.

One provision in the bill states that a trailer, semi-trailer or pole trailer that is equipped with air or vacuum brakes or that has a gross weight of 4,500 instead of 3,000 pounds would be required to have breaks. Another provision in the bill, Howe noted, will allow slow-moving vehicles to travel on an improved shoulder.

HB 2290 by Rep. Brad Buckley (R-Killeen) relates to the placement of the slow-moving vehicle emblem.

HB 2386 by Rep. Kyle Kacal (R-Bryan) updates state law with federal for CDL requirements for certain operators.

A CDL would not be required if the vehicle is not being used for compensa-

tion or to further a commercial enterprise; used intrastate; or if the vehicle is a covered farm vehicle under 49 CFR Section 390.5.

Howe noted this would allow the transport of horses and other animals to shows and events.

Another bill that benefits Texas agriculture is HB 191 by Rep. Phil Stephenson (R-Wharton). It seeks to organize a statewide program for the safe disposal of pesticide waste and containers led by TDA, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

It establishes a pesticide disposal fund to be administered by TDA that will consist of fees already being collected for purposes of pesticide disposal activities.

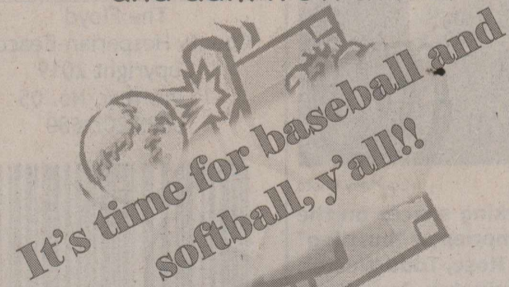
The budgetary tool is included in HB 1, the appropriations bill.

TFB also was successful in defeating legislation introduced by retail public water utilities that would have mandated how groundwater conservation districts should allocate groundwater rights to these utilities.

"They basically wanted to take landowners' water without consent," Howe said. "It is a fundamental private property right that no one can use someone else's property without consent. That's why TFB opposed this unconstitutional water grab and defeated the legislation before it could reach the governor's desk."

The governor had until June 6 to veto any of the bills that had been sent to his desk.

Lockney Pioneers still giving after 65 years

LOCKNEY - According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, longevity is defined as a "long continuance...or a long duration." That's not a very grand definition, nor does it paint a vivid picture of "longevity"—and compared to the real-life definition lived by Rodolfo and Maria Louisa Blanco, the dictionary's definition is simply paltry.

That is because Rodolfo and Maria Louisa have been assisting with Vacation Bible School for the past 65 years—neither of them missing an opportunity to help with the summertime event. At times, Rodolfo drove the church bus, they taught VBS classes, they cleaned up after the kids had waved good-bye for another year, they served snacks—anything that needed to be done, Rodolfo and Maria Louisa could be counted on to unselfishly give of their time.

The year was 1952. Rodolfo Blanco was starting a new job at West Texas Compress in Lockney, Texas. He and his wife of two years, Maria Louisa, were settled into the community and starting a bright future together in the bustling little town. A church family was found in the Alamo Building, a welcoming congregation led by Pastor Pablo Martinez. Pastor Martinez bap-

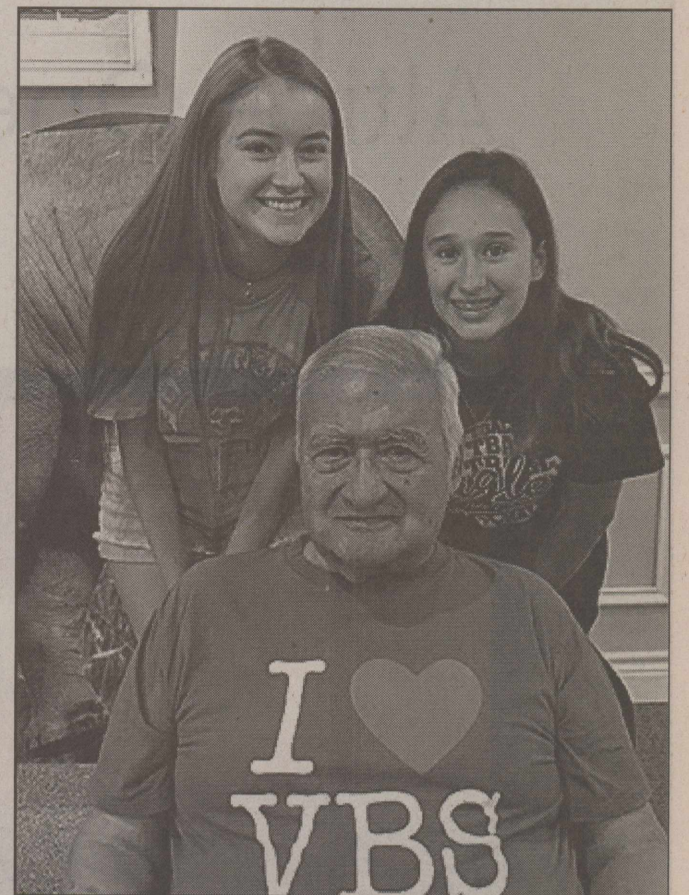
tized both, Rodolfo and Maria Louisa, into the church, and served and mentored them in those early years. It was in 1955 that the young couple began earnestly giving back to the church by volunteering to participate in the annual Vacation Bible School...and 65 years later, they are still showing up and giving as they can.

This year's event was centered around Proverbs 22:6: *Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it.* This was one of Rodolfo's favorite Bible verses and one that, his daughters say, he internalized as he was raising his family.

Rodolfo and Maria Louisa aren't physically able to do much

these days, but they insist on going to VBS. The two sit quietly on the back row and listen to the voices of the children as they sing, shout, and learn the daily lessons. When asked if the raucous activity is bothersome, Rodolfo replies, "Oh, no! I love it."

Rodolfo and Maria Louisa raised ten children in Lockney, all of which graduated from Lock-

ney High School throughout the years of 1971-1992: Maria, Margaret, Carmen, Rodolfo Jr., Ruth, Fidel, Moses, Veronica, Kema and Daisy. Rodolfo gave 40 years to the Compress. During those child-rearing years, once Daisy began school, Maria Louisa took a position in the

cafeteria at Lockney Elementary. She cooked the meals and served the community's children for 23 years. This upcoming August, the couple will celebrate 69 years together. Longevity—the vivid, bright, loving, picturesque definition as provided by Rodolfo and Maria Louisa Blanco.

THE FLOYD COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM MEMORIES 1979

MALCOM J. AND FLORA DAY MCNEILL FAMILY

Mac moved to Mayview Community, Floyd County, in 1927, with his father, Jacob Samuel McNeill and was one of eight children. He was born November 6, 1913, in Denton County where his mother Georgia Farr McNeill was born in 1888 and died in 1915. His father was born August 3, 1877, in Ellis County and both are buried at Chinn's Chapel Cemetery near Lewisville, Texas.

Flora was born in Allman Community, August 30, 1915, to Maud and George Harlan Day, who were married in Vinson, Oklahoma, July 1, 1914, coming to Estacado on their honeymoon and to make their home. Maude Elizabeth Woolsey was born June 6, 1894, at Connerville, Oklahoma, Indian Territory. Harlan Day was born August 1, 1869, also in Indian Territory, at Springer, Oklahoma. They moved from his father's farm to the Henry Robertson place in 1915, then they bought their first farm in 1916 in the McCoy Community as raw land. Much time was spent breaking the farmland, fencing, and establishing roads for the new settlers. Maud Day's parents came

to Floyd County sometime later remaining here until their deaths. Mary Frances Teafattler was born January 14, 1876, in Walker County, Georgia, to Martha Elizabeth Coker, born August 1, 1856 in Georgia and Enoch Teafattler who was born January 18, 1848 also in Georgia. He died in August 1888 in Indian Territory, Oklahoma. Her father Samuel Marshall Woolsey, was born in Benton County, Arkansas, December 16, 1871, to Sarah Elizabeth Boydston, who died in 1912 at Vinson, Oklahoma. Her father, Zephineah Woolsey, died in December 1872, and was buried at Old Alton Cemetery in Denton County.

Harlan's parents pioneered in Crosby County at Estacado where lumber for their home was brought by wagon from Childress or Amarillo (I've forgotten) in 1906 and the house is still in use. Thomas Jefferson Day was born March 23, 1865, in Hopkins County, Texas. Eight children were born to this December 11, 1885 union with Harlan next to the oldest. Mollie and Dollie were twins born to Samuel J. Rowe who was born January 26, 1829 in Alabama and Cathern Fowler, who was born in Tennessee.

Mac and Flora were married May 26, 1935, at her McCoy Home, moving to Campbell Community on S. L. Rushing's farm where they lived until 1943 when they moved 2 and 1/2 miles north of Floydada on a section owned by Harry Willett of Matador.

Their daughter Janice Elizabeth was born October 24, 1948 in Lubbock and moved with her parents to Floydada when they built their home. The McNeills were active members of the Rushing Chapel Methodist Church until about 1944 when they moved to First Methodist in Floydada.

Janice and Roland Adams were married November 25, 1967, after graduation and attended West Texas State University in Canyon. 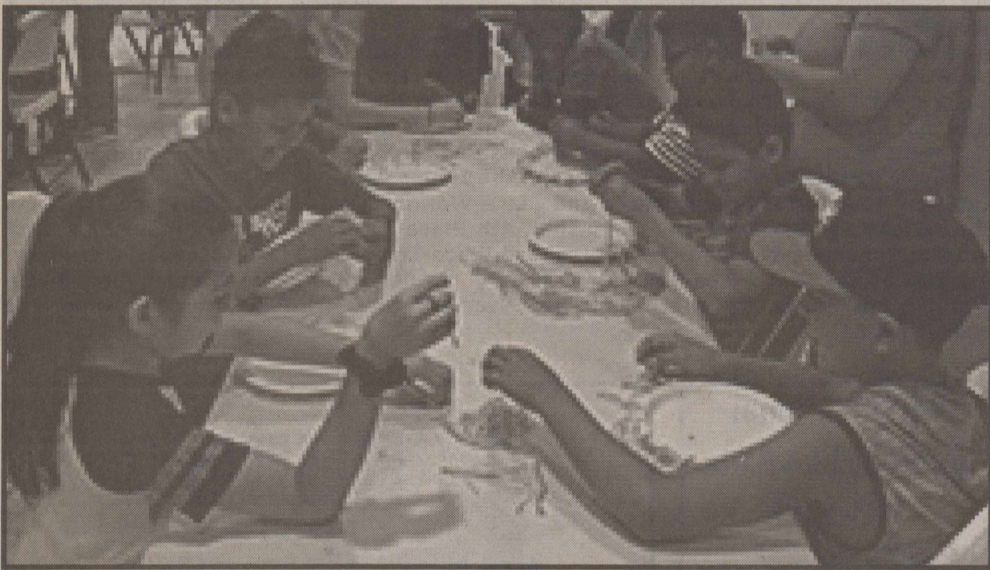

Gov. Abbott signs bill to allow hog hunting without license

AUSTIN - Texas Gov. Gregg Abbott has signed a popular bill that would allow feral hogs to be taken in the Lone Star State without a hunting license.

Sponsored by state Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, SB 317 is designed to cut away layers of red tape when it comes to combating the growing scourge of wild hogs in the Lone Star State. Approved unanimously in the Texas Senate and only garnering two "no" votes in the House, Abbott, a Republican, signed the bill last week.

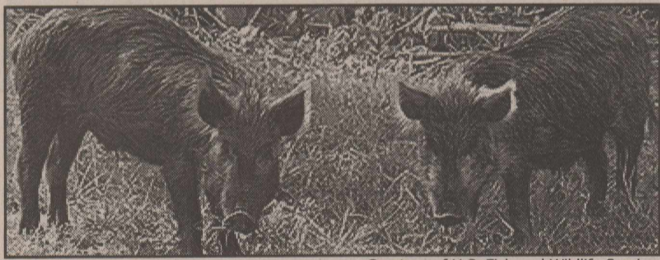
Under current law, feral hogs must cause damage on a landowner's property in order to be hunted without a license. SB 317 amends Texas wildlife code to allow any person, with the consent of the landowner, to take hogs without having a license. Classified as nuisance wildlife by the state, hogs damage crops and upset local ecosystems.

According to a recent study by Texas A&M, nearly 80 percent of the state has habitat suitable for feral hogs and their numbers are exploding, with an average of 2.6 million of the animals believed to

roam the state in 2012. With the population expected to double every five years, the study noted that "Obviously, feral hog harvest needs to increase substantially, and control methods need additional evaluation to increase harvest thereby reducing economic and ecological damage."

During its legislative process, the bill had the support of the state Game Warden Peace Officers Association and the Texas Farm Bureau.

The new law takes effect Sept. 1.
