UIL realignment: What lies ahead for local school districts

Every two years, the University Interscholastic League reshuffles the deck and deals a new realignment hand for the state to abide by for the next two years. UIL adjusts classifications, divisions and districts for nearly 1400 schools across the state of Texas. UIL takes a look at two main factors during their realignment process: student enrollment and geographic proximity to

decipher classification. The 2020-2022 realignment was released on Monday, Feb. 3, for football, basketball and volleyball while district alignments for other activities will be released in the order of their seasons.

Early Voting for March Primary Begins Feb. 18

FLOYD COUNTY - With the March primary around the corner, Floyd County citizens can exercise their civil duty by taking advantage of early voting February 18 through February 28. Eligible residents wishing to vote by mail must meet the February 21 deadline to apply for an application for the March 3,

Votes can be cast at the Courthouse Annex, 110 S. Wall, in Floydada and First United Church, 102 W. Poplar Street, in Lockney. Early voting and election day hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in Floydada; Lockney polls are open 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 pm.According to the webpage for Texas Secretary of State Ruth R. Hughs, to be eligible to register to vote in Texas, a person must be: a United States citizen; a resident of the Texas county in which application for registration is made; at least 18 years old on Election Day; not

finally convicted of a felony, or, if so convicted must have (1) fully discharged the sentence, including any term of incarceration, parole, or supervision, or completed a period of probation ordered by any court; or (2) been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disability to vote; and not determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be (1) totally mentally incapacitated; or (2) partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote.

The website also states, "a voter who has not been issued a driver's license or social security number may register to vote, but such voter must submit proof of identification when presenting himself/herself for voting or with his/her mail-in ballots, if voting by

Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)

Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by

Texas personal identification card issued by DPS Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS U.S. military identification card that has a photo U.S. citizenship certificate with a photo U.S. passport

Survive Flu, Cold Season

With daily international headlines searing fear into the readers' minds surrounding the novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) that is spreading outside of China, it's good to step back and take stock. Although Floyd County, and the state as a whole, have no reported coronavirus cases, we can reevaluate what we are personally doing to fight an annual common enemy, the flu and cold viruses.

The Facts

"There is no cure for any viral infections—the common cold, the flu, RSVwe treat it supportively, but there is no cure," shared Jennifer Haterius, Family Nurse Practitioner at West Texas Family Medicine in Floydada.

Vaccinations are not where they should be, however, with vaccination coverage in the 2018-2019 flu season among children 6 months through 17 years at 62.6%, an increase of 4.7 percentage points from the 2017-18 flu season, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website. For adults, less than half of the adult population was vaccinated in the 2018-2019 flu season. Only 45.3% of adults 18 years and older were vaccinated, though it did increase 8.2% from the previous flu season.

Haterius states that "this year we're expected to have high flu rates. They (CDC) predicted it a while ago and we've already seen that in Texas we have high flu counts."

How It's Spread

The consensus among experts, according to the CDC, is that flu viruses spread by tiny droplets the human body excretes when coughing, sneezing or talking. When they land on the mouths or noses of another person nearby, the virus can spread. And less commonly, viruses can be transferred onto an object or surface by a sick person and, in the course of the day, a person touches their own mouth, nose or eyes, effectively infecting themselves.

Who's at Risk Those at higher risk are "the very young and the very old, anyone who has a comorbid condition—diabetes, heart disease, cancer, autoimmune—makes you higher risk for catching the flu. If you get the flu, the

symptoms can be more severe."

Also, at risk are pregnant women, those with asthma, and babies under 6 months who cannot get the flu vac-

Anyone can get the flu, the CDC explains, even healthy people, and serious complications can occur at any age. Some people are more susceptible, though, and can develop serious flurelated complications.

A problem Haterius has seen is healthy adults often don't get vaccinated, because they think they have a better change of not getting the virus.

"But, getting the flu shot actually protects the community. We call it herd immunity. Everyone has the flu shot, so we're all protected. So even if you're healthy, get the flu shot so you protect your grandparents, young children," and anyone else who might be vulnerable.

"It's very rare, but occasionally people get pneumonia," Haterius reiterated. "So, if for some reason you're concerned and not getting better, we recommend getting checked out. And then if you have any comorbid conditions like pregnancy, diabetes, heart condition, autoimmune, the very young and the very old, they always need to be seen because they're the vulnerable population."

How to Protect Yourself and Others

The first line of defense is to get a flu vaccine. Even though the flu season is in full swing, Haterius suggests you still come in to be vaccinated.

"I can tell you that this year's flu has been pretty bad with fever, chills, and body aches...and there are medications that we can prescribe. But the main thing is to go to hand washing," she shared. Anti-viral medications like Tamiflu only work within the first 48 hours of onset of symptoms to stop the virus replicating within the body. After that, there is little to no effectiveness.

"If you're running a fever, stay home from work, school, the grocery store, church...and then it's not too late to get your flu shot."

If you are concerned, you're having flu symptoms or want a flu vaccine, see your general practitioner or visit West Texas Family Medicine Clinic in Floydada or Cogdell Clinic in Lockney.

LOCKNEY - The Buffalo Grass Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution met January 28 at the Senior Center in Lockney.

June Moosberg Sherman, Regent, called the meeting to order. The pledges to the American and Texas flags, the American's Creed, and the Preamble to the Constitution of the US were repeated by all. For the "Flag Minute" Nancy Marble reported that many people fly the US flag incorrectly at night. After dusk, the flag must be fully illuminated. For the "Indian Minute" Sherry Heitzenrater discussed the colonists that dressed like Mohawk Indians when they threw all the tea into Boston Harbor on December 16, 1773.

Johnny Appleseed's Hero

was his father, Nathaniel Chapman. Sherry Heitzenrater spoke about Nathaniel Chapman's commitment to the "Minutemen" and his presence at the Battle of Concord and the Battle of Bunker Hill. Later he joined the Continental Army in 1777 and served until 1780. He was made Captain over the wheelwrights and the carpenters and served at Valley Forge with George Washington.

Because Johnny's dad fought for freedom for the colonies, Johnny was able to move freely around the country as an adult. At age 18 he and his half-brother left the home in Massachusetts and traveled the Susquehanna River in Pennsylvania and canoed on the Ohio River. From 1797 until his death in 1845 Johnny planted and raised native apple trees from western Pennsylvania to the center of

Ohio. He became a legend because his father was committed to fighting for a better life for Johnny, his entire family, and this great nation.



FLOYD COUNTY - Producers in Texas Cotton Belt reported lower than expected yields as a result of a tough beginning, middle and end to the 2019 growing season, according to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service experts.




