Dallas woman runs one toll booth too many

DALLAS (AP) — The North Texas Tollway Authority says it has a forgiving attitude for Dallas-area travelers who sometimes pass through their booths without anteing up.

"We recognize that sometimes you get in the wrong lane, or you don't have money," said Clayton Howe, director of the authority's toll programs and services. "We don't punish people for that kind of

But Evangelina Gonzalez apparently pressed her luck with nearly 3,000 violations since February 2004. Gonzalez, 41, owes a record \$76,039, which includes a \$25 administrative fee per violation, The Dallas Morning News reported in Wednesday editions.

A constable was sent to her home last month with an arrest warrant. She was booked into the county jail and later released on the condition she appear in court on the Class C misdemeanors.

She stands accused of failing to pay 2,953 tolls on the Dallas North Tollway and Bush Tumpike.

Court says schools also in charge of sex ed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal appeals court Wednesday dismissed a lawsuit by parents who were outraged that the Palmdale school district had surveyed their elementary school-age children about sex.

The three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rejected the parents' claim that they have the exclusive right to tell their children

In upholding a lower court ruling against the parents, Circuit Judge Steven Reinhardt said "no such specific right can be found in the deep roots of the nation's history and tradition or implied in the concept of ordered liberty."

The appeals court noted that other courts have upheld mandatory health classes, a school system's condom distribution program and compulsory sex ed.

The parents had sought unspecified damages.

Attorneys for the parents had no immediate comment.

Rabbis list bad names for Jewish children

IERUSALEM (AP) — A group of Israeli rabbis has put together a list of names they say should be off-limits to Jewish children - including Ariel and Omri, the given names of Israel's prime minister and his eldest son.

Uttering the name Ariel is problematic because it could beckon an angel namesake instead, drawing down his wrath, they

Omri — the name of an evil biblical king—should be taboo because of the highly

And naming children after dismantled Gaza settlements, like Katif, is another bad idea, they say, because of the controversy involved. Jewish settlers, who are predominantly religious, unsuccessfully opposed the withdrawal.

Rabbis said they compiled the list in response to a flood of requests from parents concerned they may accidentally give their children names that could shame them

Marijuana possession legalized in Denver

With more than 100,000 Denver residents streaming into the polls Tuesday, citizens of the Mile High City voted to put a little more meaning behind the city's nickname.

With a 54 percent majority, Denver citizens voted to legalize the possession of small quantities of marijuana for anyone 21 years of age and older, according to The Associated carries a mandatory \$100 drug-offender sur-



Security heightened after al-Qaida operative escapes

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Prison doors and cells have been fortified at the U.S. military jail in Afghanistan, a U.S. official said Wednesday as details emerged of an unprecothers who picked locks and evaded a mine field.

The Pentagon's belated confirmation of the identity of one of the four who escaped in July, Omar al-Farouq, sparked anger in Southeast Asia where he was one of Osama bin Laden's top lieutenants.

Some officials in Indonesia, where he was captured in 2002 before being handed over to U.S. authorities, accused Washington of failing to inform them of the escape.

U.S. Attorney General Alberto Gonzales described the apparent breakdown in communication as a "serious

problem" and told CNN in an interview that it would be investigated.

Although the escape was widely reported in July, U.S. authorities at the time gave only an alias to identify al-Farouq, who was born in Kuwait to Iraqi parents.

According to a top security consultant in Indonesia, Ken edented breakout by a suspected al-Qaida leader and three Conboy, al-Farouq joined al-Qaida in the early 1990s and trained in Afghanistan for three years before unsuccessfully trying to enroll at a flight school in the Philippines so he could commandeer an airplane on a suicide mission.

He later plotted to stage car and truck bombings at U.S. embassies across Southeast Asia on or near the first anniversary of the Sept. 11 terror attacks on the United States, but the plan was thwarted and he was captured, Conboy said.







The titles will be developed for the next generation of video game consoles, though no information was given on the number of games the deal will include.


Neither the specific content and genre of the games, nor the launch dates were announced.





This song is able to induce apathy in the most effective way possible: It does everything for you. By saying essentially nothing with the lyrics and invoking only raw feelings, this song is possibly the laziest anthem for a generation ever written.

The chorus was admittedly a step above, "A mosquito/my libido," because it actually made a statement about the generation: "I'm a loser baby/so why don't you kill me, getting crazy with the cheese whiz" and so on.

As nonsensical as these lyrics may be, they did exactly what they were population is healthier as hunters supposed to do. Kurt Cobain may have said he never wanted fame, but damned if he didn't write the catchiest song of the decade one year into it. It didn't hurt that it was kind of a Pixies rip-off, too.

So here's the question: Do lyrics in songs really need to mean anything at all? Apparently, not always.

I could give dozens of examples from Sigur Ros to Sonic Youth of amazingly expressive bands whose lyrics are almost completely devoid of meaning.

For their first three albums, Sigur Ros sang in a made-up language that couldn't have meant anything to anyone but the man who created it, but those albums have almost always been near the top of any critical best-

Music like this is of course necessary for the evolution of the art. In fact, this is the direction both the underground and popular circles have been moving toward for years.

The problem we have here is the further music gets away from the lyric, the closer it gets to being a pure gut reaction. Who needs thought when you can have feelings? Look no further than the presidency to see the places your gut can take you.

Unfortunately, our generation's guts aren't taking us anywhere. We're headed in the same direction as the one before us. Generation X was a bunch of kids angry because they had nothing to be angry about. There was

no reason to say anything important. We, on the other hand, have plenty to make us furious. Protest songs should be circulating around file-sharing networks faster than money at a Republican dance party.

Hell, you'd think we maybe would have had a new Bob Dylan by now.

But we don't. Movements flicker and burn away so quickly that it's tough to say if we'll ever have one as big as Nirvana's apathy march ever again.

The last big statement made in music was essentially a call to do nothing. It had the energy, but lacked a message

Music needs heart. If you want your songs to accomplish anything concrete, there's no other ingredient more essential than that. But without thought, without an idea, and most importantly, without damn good lyrics, you're only going to make it halfway there.

Why hard?


"Leaders have a lot of responsibility," he said. "On the floor, each person I have to account for."







biggest warriors in the game. Grant, on the other hand, Sharp said, did not need much tutelage after arriving at Tech and has always been like another


coach on the court. Grant said it has been a great journey, and this will be a special season for her. The things she has gained from being in Lubbock

There are 25 players nominated for the State Farm Wade Trophy this year - which honors the national player of the year—and all of them will be trying to help carry their teams to glory come March.

Wade Trophy nominee Erin Grant, leading the way.

The Lady Raiders are looking forward to their most prominent season in the last few years, in hopes of lassoing a Big 12 title and possible national championship before Grant, LaToya Davis and Chesley Dabbs leave Lubbock.

The senior guard Grant became the leader in assists at Tech last season and will only add to her total of 661, which should stand in the Raider record books for some time and could make her the all-time Big 12 assist leader.

Grant trails Stacey Dales (Oklahoma, 1998-2002) by 103 assists and should be able to pass her this year, after starting all 31 games for Tech last season while averaging more than seven rebounds per game. Grant is the all-time Big 12 leader in assists per game with 6.7.

Last year the Lady Raiders blew through their non-conference schedule, only losing to two teams including No. 10 Stanford whom they will face-off against Nov. 27 in Lubbock to avenge a threepoint loss last year in California.

Junior Alesha Robertson had a breakout game against Miami, scoring 37 points in the Lady Raiders' 109-49 rout of the Lady Hurricanes.

Robertson will help play a key role as a starter this year after starting every game last year en route to honorable mention All-Big 12 honors.

Two major roadblocks in the Big 12 could deter any title hopes for Tech with Texas and the reigning national champion Baylor Bears lurking.

Baylor crawls into 2005 as a heavy favorite to repeat as NCAA champions led



by their Wade Trophy nominee and last scoring a combined 29 points for UT on its year's NCAA Tournament MVP, Sophia way to a 64-43 victory over Tech. Young. The senior forward looks to keep the Bears on top of the food chain in the State, who will be looking to rebuild after Big 12, as well as the national polls.

The 'Horns lost a key game to Tech on a six-game winning streak. Jackson and Nina Norman led a stampede in Austin, Basketball.



Tech kicker gets more chances, respect

Alex Trlica scored as many points as Cody Hodges last Saturday.

Yes, that's right, Texas Tech's kicker had two field goals and two extra points for eight total and the Red Raider quarterback had one touchdown and a two-point conversion

If there was any doubt that the Raiders are a changed team from last season, Tech coach Mike Leach eliminated it when taking the points on Tech's first two entrances into

Trlica kicked a 33-yard field goal in the first quarter and a career-long 47 yarder in the second quarter to make up the only points in the first 45 minutes of football.

After the game, Trlica said he feels more relaxed as a kicker since he's getting more attempts to put the ball through the

"I'm a lot more comfortable this year," he said. "I have a lot more ability to zone everything out."

Trlica is on a streak of six consecutive made field goals and has connected on 10-of-12 this season with his only misses coming from 45 and 49 yards away.

Leach started the season letting Keith Toogood kick off, but when Toogood he was at his high school in Friendswood. knocked two of his seven kickoffs out of bounds, Trlica quickly replaced him. Since his promotion, Trlica has kicked one of his 58 kickoffs (1.7 percent) out
