FDR Condemns U. S. **Because Youth Not** Fit For Fighting!

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. President Roosevelt today criticized the nation for permitting conditions which have left 50 per cent of its youth unfit mentally or physically for army service. He inaugurated a program to "salvage" 200,000 of the 1,-000,000 youths who have been rejected.

Under the salvage program the federal government will pay medcal costs for treatment by local physicians of approximately 200.poards certify as susceptible to rehabilitation for army service.

Army To Accept Them The army expects to accept vir tually all of these 200,000 after they undergo treatment by family physicians or dentists at federal expense. Mr. Roosevelt said

Describing the salvage program as only the initial objective, Mr. Roosevelt said that existence of conditions which permit so high a ratio of rejections is an indictment of America.

He said he would launch a longrange program calling for cooperation of states, countles, cities, townships and individuals to remedy the conditions which are the underlying cause of the bad sit-







habilitation program will be the 200,000 registrants who can be completely rehabilitated and made available for general military service in the armed forces at a small cost and in a reasonably short

"Certain types of venereal diseases, operable hernias, deficiencies in vision and teeth, and other minor defects, will be corrected in cases where the army determines that the registrant will then be acceptable for general military service.

Use His Own Physician

"The registrant will have the privilege of having the services performed by his family physician or dentist in his own community. "The cost of this rehabilitation rogram will be borne by the federal government as a necessary part of our national defense pro gram and additional funds will be nade available to the selective serice system for this purpose.'

Mr. Roosevelt was asked by what authority registrants could be compelled to undergo medical or dental treatment to prepare themselves physically for military service. He replied that when a registrant appears before an examining board he is under the furisdiction of that board and can be directed to undergo treatment. Conjecturing that a majority of uch persons would be willing and eager to receive free treatment,

Mr. Roosevelt said that in cases of recalcitrancy the registrant could be inducted into the army, and commanded to undergo treat-

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Brave Fight Waged By Russians May Yet Stop Hitler's Invaders

Fury Of Nazi Drive At Peak

Journal War Analyst

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Grim danger still continues to press heavily on the Russian fight-ing lines, but it's significant that here appears to have been little hange in the position since yesterday, excepting possibly in the far south where the Nazis are re-ported to be forging ahead along he shore of the sea of Azov toward the gateway to the Caucasus.

In the crucial central sector opposite Moscow the Reds seem to be resisting strongly and this in itself is a hopeful, though not conclusive sign for the Allies. 



Coloradoans Expect Record Beaver Haul

DENVER, Oct. 10 (U.P) - A for Colorado's beaver trappers modern counter-parts of the hardy men who roamed the rugged west in the same pursuit generations ago and thereby hurried along the vast region's settlement. C. N. Feast, director of the Colo

rado Game and Fish commission believes that this fall's recordbreaking early snowfall in the Rocky Mountain region will make beaver pelts prime earlier than usual. He said that beaver trapping, which last year brought to markets some 12,000 pelts, should be well under way by Oct. 10. "Beaver trapping was nearly a \$150,000 industry in Colorado in 1940," Feast said, "and it promises to be much bigger this year. I think many more pelts will be

For many years beavers were protected in this state. As a result they multiplied and became a nuisance and problem to ranchers and irrigation reservoir operators in some areas. After a state legis lative fight, a new faw was passed by the Colorado General Assembly covering state trapping of beaver on private lands. 





slowly but surely.

All liquor consumed here except native beer and a spirit Ice-landers call "Black Death" comes in by boat. And boats are used for far more important things these days.

A one per cent beer of surpassing flatness is the only alcohol beverage available in the capital's hotels and restaurants. The wine monopoly has sold out its stock and closed for the duration of the war. Soon all liquor except the beer and whisky supplied to British troops and officers' messes will be gone. Even the British supplies

are dwindling. British officers, accustomed to gin and bitters (called gimlet before meals and whisky-and-soda afterwards) are down to a ration of a third of a quart of whisky per week. Of course, there still are "ways and means." As in America's prohibition days, the thirsty may buy a quart of Scotch from a taxt driver—at 200 kronus—or about \$16 a bottle.
