

# WAR VOTE ASKED IN CONGRESS!

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Rep. Hamilton Fish (R-NY), House non-interventionist leader, today introduced a resolution to declare that a state of war exists between the United States and Germany.

Fish's resolution would have Congress direct the president to "employ the entire naval and military forces

of the United States and the resources of the government to carry on the war against the German government."

Fish previously had said he would introduce such a resolution to force a showdown on the issue of United States participation in Europe's affairs.

The text of the resolution: "Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representa-

tives of the United States and the resources of the government to carry on the war against the German government; and to bring the conflict to a successful termination all of the resources and manpower of the country are hereby pledged by the Congress of the United States."

However, parliamentary procedure seems to make it most unlikely that Rep. Fish will succeed in "forcing a

showdown" on the proposition. The resolution may be tabled on a viva voce vote, and left there. It could be sent to a committee, and remain there. Actual consideration of the proposition within the House could be deferred almost indefinitely. Various other parliamentary maneuvers also would be at the disposal of members of the House if they desired to avoid a record vote on the resolution.

Realities of the war in the Atlantic were brought home to Lubbock today. Lee L. Reid, 33, a former part-time resident of Lubbock and the son of J. W. Reid, 422 Avenue D, is listed as one of the victims.

The father has received notification that his son, a first class torpedoman aboard the U. S. destroyer, Reuben James, which was sunk by a torpedo last week, is listed among the dead.

The official notification from the navy department was sent to the widow of young Reid in Dallas and was transmitted by her to the father.

Other survivors include Reid's 4-months' old daughter, whom he had never seen; his mother, a resident of Fort Worth, and a brother, Earl, of Dallas. Mrs. Reid, Lubbock city building inspector, is a cousin.

Parents of the young man have been separated for many years. However, he visited his father on numerous occasions, often for extended periods, in Lubbock.

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## Russia's Chief Sounds Plea For Britain To Open Second Front Against Hitler Stalin Vows Nazis To Be Destroyed To Last Man

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Russia, fighting a war of liberation alone against Germany and her allies, is handicapped by lack of a second European front, but "the assistance given by Great Britain and the United States is of great importance and growing continually," Premier Joseph Stalin declared today in an address over the Moscow radio.

On Bern, Switzerland, listeners heard Stalin say lack of a second front in Europe was one cause of "the temporary retreat" of the Soviet armies and, in an apparent appeal to Britain, "appearance of a second front would greatly facilitate our task."

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# Garbage Waste Turned Into Motor Fuel

## Final Patents Are Obtained

(By The Associated Press)  
PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 6—A building contractor who turned chemist because he became irritated at the size of his gasoline bills has developed a process to convert garbage, waste lumber and farm products into motor fuel.

J. W. Jean has obtained final patents on the method he developed in a machine shop laboratory here. He says tests of his synthetic fuel have shown it has an octane rating of 98.7, comparable to aviation gasoline, and that it has developed 25 per cent more mileage than the petroleum fuel.

# Japan Still Hopes For Slice Of Siberia

## Nazi Pressure On Nipponese

Saburo Kurosu, his American-born wife and their son got out a deck of cards last night before the Japanese envoy left on his flying trip to the United States and the dispatches from Tokyo say, played feverishly to try to foretell the fate of his mission, which the Japanese call a last endeavor to make peace in the Pacific.

Kurosu must have turned up a very hot card. About the time he was dealing them out, a Japanese steamer blew up and was sunk and the Japanese authorities were quick to ascribe it to a Russian mine.

**Siberia "Promised Land"**  
Perhaps this was an omen of the Kurosu mission, which was announced in Japan along with publication of truculent outlines of conditions for Japanese pacification, in which the United States again was called upon to give Japan the green light from the Siberian border to the Dutch East Indies.

The course of Russia's vast enrollment with Germany plays an important part in the desperate decisions of Japan. The common economic measures of the United States, Britain and the Dutch East Indies brought her creeping starvation. British reinforcement of Malaya, strategic American air and naval dispositions and the bolstering of China by the western powers daily made a southward thrust more hazardous. To the Japanese militarists, Russia's trouble offered a way out; Siberia, which long had provided the scenery for the general's dreams of conquest, became more than ever a promised land.

**U. S. Given Last Chance**  
Since the practicability of a Japanese plunge into Siberia has depended in large measure on the progress of the Germans in European Russia, Japanese military hopes and plans have risen with the German victories and fallen with the German reverses. The last Kurosu government, which moved its life in a tortuous dicker with Washington, collapsed at a moment when the Germans seemed ready to push Moscow over. But now that Moscow remains a staunchly resisting fortress, after more than a month of assault, the United States, in the language of the foreign office newspaper, is given "a last opportunity to make amends for aggression."

Undoubtedly, many Japanese militarists would like these American "amends" to come in the shape of a slice of Russia.

**Nazis Pushing Japanese**  
A rude nudge from Germany also has hastened the necessity for a Japanese showdown. An official document, issued last Saturday from Adolf Hitler's headquarters and conveyed meaningfully to governments not at present involved in the European war, stated that Germany had been "attacked" by the United States in the battle of the Atlantic.

To Japan it was noted that Germany would, at the moment of her choosing, call upon the Japanese to implement the Axis pact and give all possible military aid to the Reich.

The course of this aid, naturally, would be dictated by the Reich, and it would probably involve engaging United States naval power in the Pacific.

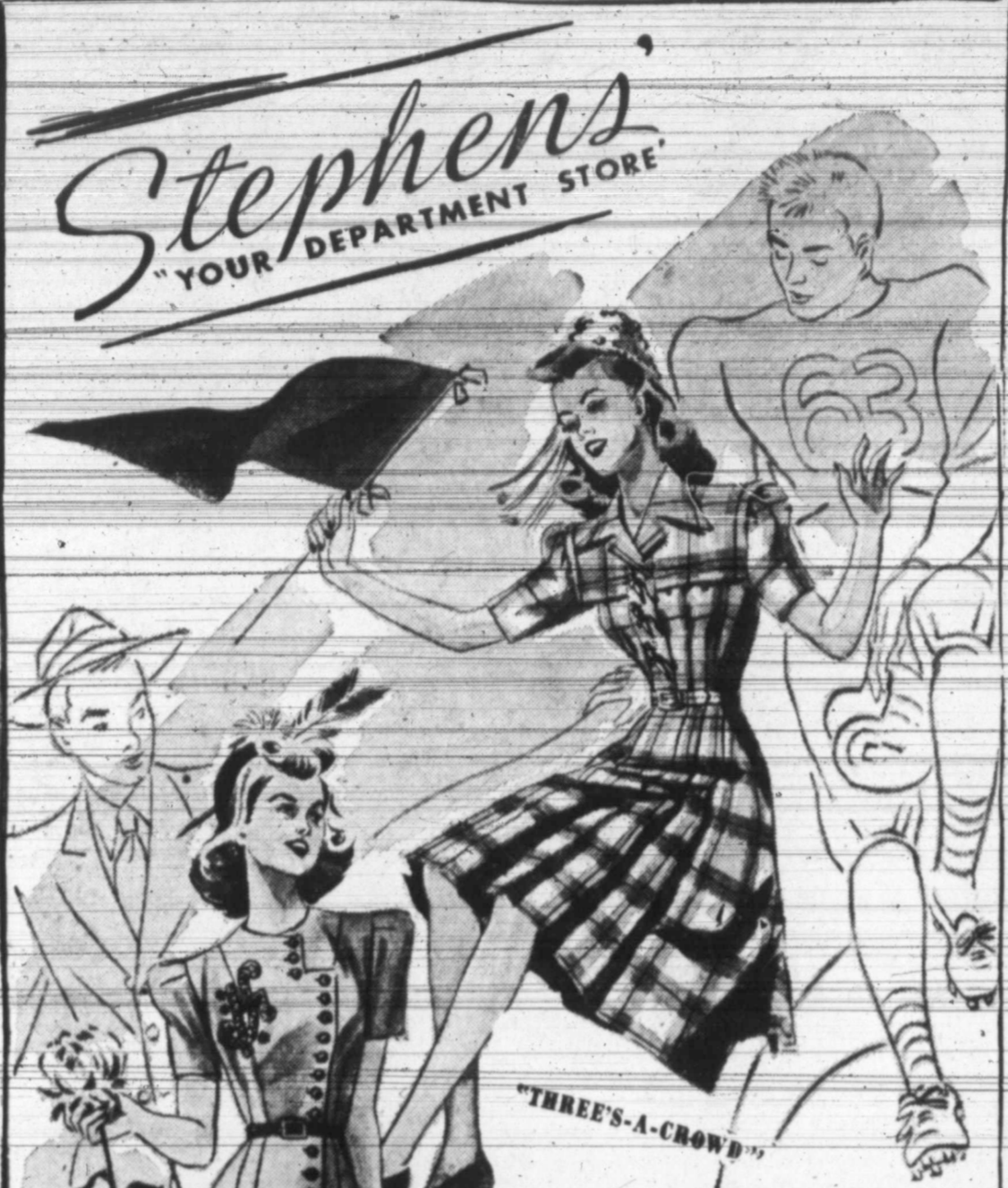

# Does Your November Food Budget Need First Aid? Here Are Suggestions

## Tasty Meat Dishes Given

Is your food budget calling for help these crisp fall days? Then try these recipes planned to help ease the strain of rising prices and growing appetites with meals long on appetite appeal and nutrition and short on costs.

### VEGETABLE LIVER LOAF

Simmer a pound of beef liver 10 minutes in water. Grind liver and reserve the stock. Mix 1 cup of stock (add milk if necessary) with the liver, 1 cup chopped-cooked carrots, 1/4 cup diced celery, 2 tablespoons each minced parsley and onions, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg or 2 yolks, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1/4 teaspoon pepper and 3 tablespoons chili sauce or catsup. Pour into buttered pan and bake an hour in moderate oven (350). Cover with creamed cabbage, tomato or white sauce. Bake potatoes, biscuits and apples along with the loaf.

### HAMBURG CHILI

To serve 4 or 5, simmer a pound of hamburger in 4 tablespoons of bacon fat. Stir in 2 tablespoons chopped onions and 1/4 cup cooked lima beans. Simmer, stirring frequently, until golden brown. Season with 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon each of chili powder, poultry seasoning, celery salt, sugar. Add 1 teaspoon minced parsley, 1/4 teaspoon paprika and 2 cups tomatoes. Boil 5 minutes, simmer 20 minutes until it thickens.

Steaming fish and vegetable chowders, mushroom or asparagus or tomato cream soup or savory oyster stew with butter swimming over the top, are brimful of nutrition. With the soup serve a basket of crispy warm crackers, cheese wafers, hot buttered toast or hard rolls. A tossed green salad with cold cooked beets, carrots and peas, moistened with French dressing goes with any soup.

### PRUNE CHEESE FRUIT SALAD

Make an interesting soup partner: Remove seeds from 20 cooked prunes. Mix 1/4 cup cottage cheese, 1/4 cup chopped salted peanuts, 1/3 cup diced celery, speck salt and 1 tablespoon salad dressing. Stuff prunes, chill and place prunes on orange or pineapple slices on lettuce. Top with French dressing.

### CASSEROLE POTATOES

The trick with this dish is to use baked potatoes—leftovers are fine. Peel them, season with salt, pepper and butter, pour into shallow, buttered casserole. Cover with milk and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Before serving stir in faint pinch of nutmeg for a distinctive flavor.

# Maxim Litvinov Named New Russian Ambassador To United States

## Soviet Veteran Receives Post

(By The United Press)  
**KUBYSHEV, Russia, Nov. 5.** (Delayed)—Former Soviet Foreign Commissar Maxim Litvinov today was named Russian ambassador to the United States.

Litvinov, veteran Soviet diplomat of the era of "collective security" was named to succeed the present emissary to Washington, Constantin Umansky.

**Was Removed In 1939**  
 Litvinov was removed as Soviet foreign commissar in May 1939 in a move which foreshadowed Russia's signature of the pact with Germany which immediately preceded the outbreak of war. He was replaced by V. M. Molotov who also held the premiership until after start of the Russo-German war when the No. 1 post was taken over by Josef Stalin.

Litvinov remained in comparative obscurity in Moscow until the German attack upon Russia when he emerged from virtual retirement to take a leading part in Soviet rapprochement with the United States and Britain.

**Returned To Spotlight**  
 Two weeks after the German attack on Russia, Litvinov turned to the public spotlight with a radio address from Moscow calling upon Britain to throw her full weight against Germany in the west while the Soviet stood off the attack in the east.

He called on Britain to invade the European continent.  
 He played an important role in the Anglo-American-Russian consultations in Moscow, acting as interpreter in the discussions between Stalin, and the heads of the Anglo-American delegations, Lord Beaverbrook and W. Averell Harriman.

**To Remove Barriers**  
 His designation by Stalin to assume the key post of ambassador to the United States was obviously a move designed to tighten co-operation and to remove, if possible, any lingering suspicion and lack of understanding which might impede full American support in the form of supplies and war materials.

Litvinov has long been known as Russia's leading exponent of collaboration with the western democracies. In the League of Nations deliberations which preceded the outbreak of war he argued time after time for a policy of a common front of Russia and western democratic nations against Fascism and Nazism. He continued to urge this policy until Russia began to prepare for the shift which resulted in the Russo-German pact.

Litvinov is the diplomat who came to Washington immediately after President Roosevelt's accession to office and negotiated with the understanding which led to American recognition of the Soviet.

## Final Blow To Pipeline Plan

(By The United Press)  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.**—The Supply Priorities and Allocations board today handed the final blow to Defense Oil Coordinator Harold Ickes' plan to construct a 300,000,000 pipeline from East Texas fields to the Bayonne, N. J., refining area.

SPAB held that construction of the 1,589-mile pipeline with seamless steel tubing is not essential either to the defense program or the public health and safety.

SPAB earlier had rejected Ickes' proposal that the line be built of steel plates which are needed in the construction of ships, tanks and other defense material.

**Final Disapproval**  
 A SPAB statement said that its action in rejecting the grant of priority ratings for the project, which would have piped crude oil to the east coast, "constituted a final disapproval of the pipeline project."

The increased use of railroad tank cars, possible construction of concrete oil barges and boats of the "Sea Otter" type to transport oil supplies was suggested to Ickes by SPAB. The possibilities of re-converting eastern industrial plants to use coal and the "re-orientation of the use of gasoline for pleasure driving" also were suggested.

### Agreement Sought On Parity Prices

(By The Associated Press)  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.**—Vice President Wallace was reported today to be taking a leading role in attempts to convince farm state legislators that they ought to accept 100 per cent parity as the ceiling for agricultural commodities in pending price control legislation.

Wallace was said to have enlisted the support of some conservative farm-state congressmen for pegging farm prices at the 1909-14 purchasing power level established as parity for major crops.

The pending price control bill, approved by the House banking committee, would ban any farm price ceiling below 110 per cent of parity, the market price on October 1 or the average price in the 1919-29 period, whichever was the highest.

## Texan—After Latin Tour—Claims Climax Fast Approaching For U. S. Amidst Greatest Crisis

(By The United Press)  
**HOUSTON, Nov. 6.**—Dean E. J. Kyle of the agriculture school of Texas A. and M. college said today that his 20,000-mile tour of Central and South America has convinced him that the United States is facing its greatest crisis.

**Climax is fast approaching,** Kyle said. "Either we win this war—or Hitler dominates the world. There is no half-way ground. If Hitler should win, there is no hope of the United States being anything but a third or fourth rate power."

Kyle arrived by airplane last night from visits to Mexico, Costa Rica, Venezuela, Trinidad, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Peru and Panama under sponsorship of Nelson Rockefeller, U. S. commissioner of inter-American relations.

Results of his tour will not be announced until his detailed formal report is transmitted to Rockefeller in Washington, he said.

"Later on," he added, "I hope to be able to transmit to Texas ranchmen and farm operators much of the information I gathered on this trip."

Kyle said that most of the countries he visited were friendly toward the United States.

## Advice For Renewing Drivers Licenses Is Issued In City

Your drivers license expires sometime between now and Nov. 1, 1942.

This is the warning of W. C. Alder, who heads the drivers license division of the Lubbock district of the Texas Highway patrol. Nearly a half-million Texas li-

censes are good only until Dec. 31 and should be renewed before that date. Specifically, those persons holding serial numbers from one to 450,000 should arrange to renew their licenses.

**Renewal Dates Set**  
 Then Nos. 450,001 to 900,000 are good until March 31, 1942 and should be renewed after Jan. 1.

Nos. 900,001 to 1,350,000 are good until next June 30 and should be renewed after April 1.

Nos. 1,350,001 and upward are good until next Nov. 1 and should be renewed after July 1.

If the license is not renewed before it expires, the applicant will be required to make application and take the examination again.

**Other Advice Given**  
 Alder otherwise advised: "If your license is worn or faded or otherwise in bad condition, it may be renewed immediately; however, if the license is still in good condition, it is preferred that it be renewed according to the above stated table."

"Those persons who have lost their licenses and are unable to produce the correct serial number will be required to take the examination the same as persons who never have had a license. All persons, including chauffeurs and commercial operators, who cannot produce a valid license, must be accompanied by a licensed driver when they apply for licenses."

"Vehicles used in taking license examinations must meet all requirements of law."

It is suggested that persons wishing to apply for an original license come to the highway patrol office, in the courthouse basement, and obtain a handbook, which will better qualify the applicants to pass the examinations. "Licenses may be obtained at the patrol office six days a week from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m."

## Paving Work Starts Here

The long awaited favorable break in the weather finally made possible the start this morning of the city's final street paving program for 1941, according to information given at the city hall.

Thirty-three blocks of street are included in the final project for the year.

All have been ready for paving for weeks—in some cases for months. The preparations involved the construction of cement curbs and gutters and the laying of caliche base. But several days of moderately warm weather were necessary, officials explained, before the placing of crushed rock and asphalt topping could be started.

The new work was started on Twenty-seventh street between Avenue X and College Avenue. Within about 10 days, if the weather continues favorable, the project should be completed. Most of the work is in the southwestern part of the city and the new paving official said will help to relieve in some degree the heavy traffic movement on Nineteenth street.

The streets in the project, additional to Twenty-seventh are: Adams from Nineteenth to 22nd; Armet from L to P; College from Twenty-sixth to Twenty-seventh; Jackson from Nineteenth to Twentieth; A from Broadway to Seventeenth; N from Twenty-third to Twenty-fifth; O from Eighth to Ninth; X from Twenty-second to Twenty-seventh; Fourth from M to N; Fifteenth from A to B; Twenty-third from X to College; Twenty-fourth from L to P and from X to College; and Twenty-fifth from N to P.

He has been away from his outfit, in army hospitals recovering from injuries received in maneuvers, and has not been officially ordered to report for duty.

Regimental commander is Col. Thomas A. Bay, Plainview. Besides two batteries from Lubbock, Wichita Falls and Amarillo have units as does Plainview. The regiment was one of the crack units of the Texas National guard. Many former Texas Technological college students are members of the outfit.

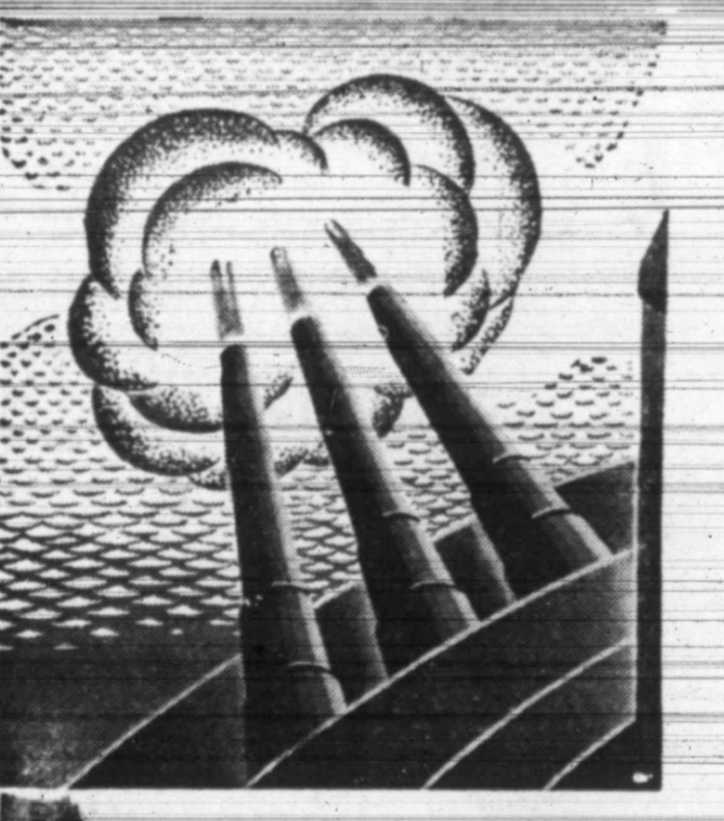

### Wildcat Tests Draw Interest

Several wildcat oil tests are nearing interesting depths in South Plains areas, according to reports here Wednesday.

In southwestern Crosby county Callihan and Waggoner No. 1 Ed. M. Wahlensmaier, test 20 miles southwest of Crosbyton, encountered one quarter of a barrel of salt per hour from 3,580-90 feet and is drilling ahead past 3,730 feet in lime. It has been carrying about two barrels of oil a day from upper shows.

Fullerton Oil company No. 1 H. M. Wilson, scheduled 8,000-foot test in northwestern Andrews county, is drilling in anhydrite below 3,975 feet. String of 8 1/2-inch casing was cemented at 3,204 feet with 250 sacks.

**More Producers**  
A wildcat in northeastern Hockley county 15 miles northeast of the Slaughter field, Anderson Prichard Oil corporation and American Drilling corporation No. 1 W. L. Edwood estate, is drilling past 2,770 feet in shale streaked with anhydrite.

Texaco has completed two more producers on the Hockley side of the Slaughter field. The larger, No. 9-B Mallet Land and Cattle company, flowed a rated 1,556.64 barrels per day after acidizing with 12,000 gallons at 5,000 feet. The firm's No. 50 Bob Slaughter was treated with 7,000 gallons at 5,030 feet and flowed at the rate of 1,415.88 barrels a day.

Weiner et al No. 8 Kleen, Swisher county wildcat 10 miles northeast of Tulia, is drilling unchanged at 3,670 feet in lime.

**Coring Is halted**  
American Drilling corporation No. 1 W. T. Hufnall, western Terry county test, halted coring at 5,282 feet and is drilling ahead with rockbit. It was cored practically continuously from 5,187 to 5,282 feet and showed some staining porosity in formation. Last two cores, from 5,248-82 feet, bore a sulphur odor.

Likins and Hall No. 1 Dr. E. H. Jones, northwestern Gaines county wildcat slated to go to 7,000 feet, resumed operations after long period of inactivity while repairing engines and is drilling now at 4,330 feet in anhydrite and gyp. Ray A. Albright and Richmond Drilling company No. 1 J. J. Handley, new production prospect in northwestern Dawson county, swabbed 35 barrels of oil through 5 1/2-inch casing in 24 hours. During the same period it batted 170 gallons of rusty sulphur water off bottom. At last reports oil output had jumped to two barrels hourly while water appeared to be exhausting. The well is bottomed at 4,980 feet in lime.

**Drilling Unchanged**  
A 15-minute drillstem test from 5,329 to 5,400 feet in Sinclair Prairie oil company No. 1 Charles J. Kleiner, central Yoakum county wildcat four miles east of Plains returned 2,700 feet of gas cut drilling mud. No oil or bottom hole water was present. The owner is drilling ahead below 5,400 feet in search of deeper oil zones.

Anderson Prichard and Osage No. 1 Pure Clayton, northwestern Borden county wildcat, is drilling unchanged at 3,960 feet in lime. It has shown nothing in penetrating the solid lime 640 feet.

O'Neal Drilling company No. 1 Dela Slaughter Wright, eastern Cochran county wildcat north of the Slaughter field, pumped nine barrels of fluid, 72 per cent oil and 28 per cent sediment and water, for 16 hours and again has been shut in. Total depth is 4,983 feet in lime.

The accident was first reported, investigators said, when authorities at Payne-Shotwell hospital informed county officials of the death of the child, Wilson Johnson, son of Otis Johnson.

Officials said Roy B. Carnes, superintendent of Whitharral school, was driver of the car that hit the boy. He was driving west.

Negro cottonpickers said the child started from the south side of the road to the north but retraced his steps when warned that a car was approaching. He was on the south side of the road when hit, witnesses said.

The child was buried Wednesday afternoon at Anton.

Billy Johnson and L. W. White of the highway patrol were assisting Hockley county authorities in the investigation, which will be continued today.

# Car Owners Yet To Feel Gas Curbs

## Army To Take Best Grades

**SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.**—Automobile drivers may yet feel the impact of war on their driving habits. Dr. John W. Frey, deputy petroleum coordinator, impressed that possibility upon the American Petroleum Institute today.

Motorists may not merely run into gasoline shortages, Dr. Frey asserted. They may have to press longer on the starter to get the engine going; they may have to shift sooner on hills; they may have to keep oil in the crankcase more than the traditional 1,000 miles.

**May Affect Butane**  
Looking ahead along the highway Mr. Motorist will travel, this is what he foresees.

Increased production of aviation gasoline will take more butane—the stuff that makes gasoline more volatile, helping quick-starting of motors. The need for butane, he said, is likely to push so-called bottled gas distributors to replace butane with propane, affecting households using the tanked gas for heating and cooking.

Aviation gasoline will take more tetraethyl lead. And army equipment requires premium grade gasoline. When the military needs are met, there will not be enough left to keep up the octane ratings of motor fuels sold to the motorist. So his motor will knock on grades he used to skim over with engine purring.

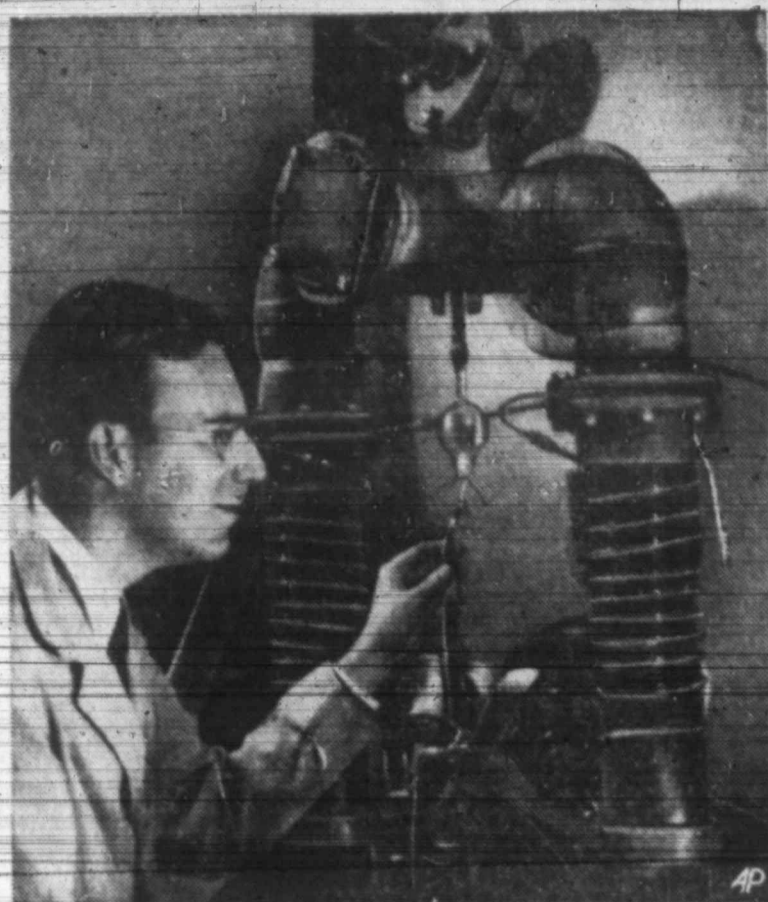
## Farm Meetings Will Be Held In County

## Use Of Albumin Of Cow Blood For Transfusions Is Studied

BOSTON, Nov. 6.—Successful use of a test tube "man" to further medicine's quest for employing the albumin of cow blood as a substitute for human blood in transfusions was reported today to the American College of Surgeons.

The test tube character employed by University of Minnesota medical school investigators was a vial of human blood used to purify cow blood material which previously had caused a high rate of unfavorable reactions in patients to whom it had been administered.

**Was Made Sick**  
In effect, the test tube "man" was made sick, because material in the cow serum that had been causing the trouble in the patients were passed on to the test tube blood.

Into the blood in the tube went elements of the cow material capable of causing chills, fever, backaches and intestinal upsets in a

## Rainfall For 1941 Hiked In October

Rainfall for 1941 was increased to 39.66 inches by 5.22 inches during October, according to report Wednesday by Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state agricultural experiment sub-station here.

Previous to this year the record for any one year in 31 during which records have been kept at the experiment station was 31.83 inches. The unprecedented rainfall this year has put the total at what observers believe is out of range for many years.

The October total was 5.89 inches or 3.51 inches above normal. Normally during the first 10 months of any year precipitation is 17.92 inches, nearly 22 inches below the 1941 aggregate.

High temperature in October was 85 degrees; the low 33. Mean temperature was 62.2 degrees. Maximum and minimum relative humidity readings were 90.5 and 66 per cent, respectively.

Total evaporation was 2.657, Jones said.

The month had four clear days, 10 partly cloudy and 17 cloudy.
