

TOKYO, Nov. 7 - Premier Gen Hideki Tojo, it was revealed to day, has sent a personal message to President Roosevelt declaring that if Japanese-American rapprochement is not achieved speed-ily Japan will be forced "to use other means" to protect her existence against economic and military encirclement.

"What is the cause of the tem-porary lack of success of the Red army?" Stalin asked, in yesterday's broadcast speech. "One of the causes is definitely the lack the German Fascists. The matter is that at the present time on the European continent there are no armies of Great Britain and the United States conducting war against the Fascists."

Coming from Stalin, this is bound to have the most profound effect in England on public pinion, already querulous about to Russia. It will hasten, although not necessarily change, the plan of the imperial general staff for the opening of a second front.

The British do not conceal the fact that such a plan exists and they say it will be put into effect when "the time is opportune." Well grounded informants here and in Washington believe that the first phase of this plan is a large-scale offensive to stamp out the Germans, in Libya, and that the second front on the continent will be opened up from African bases, very possibly in Italy.

Slovakia, Using German-Modeled Curbs, Rules Jews' Every Move

BRATISLAVA, Now 7 - In solving the Jewish problem, Slovakia is closely following Nazi Germany's example.

After more than two years of deliberation and experimentation Dr. Josef Tiso, prelate-president of the protectorate of Slovakia, has abandoned his former program of half-way measures and has invoked a series of laws closely resembling the Nuremberg code and the numerous administrative teeth to this law throughout

Official Positions Banned Like its Nuremberg model, Tiso's code divides the Jews into fullblooded and mixed-blood, according to the number of Jewish grandparents. Marriage is forbidden between half, three-quarter or full-blood Jews and non-Jews or quarter Jews.

All official positions are closed practice of medicine, pharmacy, law and veterinary surgery. On railway trains they can

travel only in third-class coaches and cannot use either sleepers or dining-cars. They cannot possess radios, cameras, field glasses, firearms or fishing licenses

Cannot Drive Auto No Jew is permitted to drive an automobile, motortruck or motor cycle. They can employ as domesservants non-Jewish women

Except by inheritance, they cannot acquire new property of any kind. For houses or businesses now owned by Jews the government can appoint administrative

Those who have acquired land-ed property in the past through forced sales must return this property to the original owner against a refund of the sum paid for it. at will or transfer any Jewish business to an Aryan person or corporation. To date almost 8,000 Jewish enterprises have been

Towns To Be "Purged" whole or any part of any village, town or city and segregated in other centers or special sections thereof. In principle all communities with fewer than 5,000 inhabitants will be purged first. Jewish residents in larger centers must vacate their dwellings in certain specified districts soon.

All clubs or associations of Jews are outlawed; the only organiza-tion to which they may belong is the Jew Central in Bratislava. They can neither conduct nor participate in any public meeting. writer be published anywhere Slovakia. Later a periodical may be permitted to the Jew Central





BEAUTY, VS. MATERIALS OF WAR

Representatives of U.S. beauty supply houses climbed 'way out on the well known limb at a convention recently, when they adopted a resolution asking high priorities ratings for the sort of metals used in containers for such products as lipsticks, face cream

It is the misfortune of the beauty supply people that metals now used in most of those containers, as well as many others of the fixtures in beauty shops, also are essential to the national defense.

Some of the speakers in the convention contended that the use of the metals for cosmetics and beauty apparatus is more important than for many purposes commonly associated more directly with the national defense effort. They argued, doubtless with some truth, that the ability and opportunity of the average American woman to pay occasional visits to the beauty shop, and to make regular use of cosmetics, is an aid to the preservation of high morale.

For our part, we cannot believe that the beauty or the morale of American womanhood is of such flimsy stuff that she would permit-much less demand-that materials needed for guns and airplanes and warships be used instead a continuing abundance

Let the beauty business go on, say we with a rousing cheer for the miracles it works, but let's be sensible about it.

We need guns and tanks and planes and ships much more than metal containers for artificial beauty
