Sending A Thanksgiving Box To That Soldier? Here Are Ideas For Tidbits

Pralines Are Old Favorite

favorite tidbits. Since appetites grow as the weather gets colder, more subfoods and a greater variety should be included for the

Boxes of cheeses, like liederkranz and other American varieties with a bite, and assorted crisp crackers make a fine team. Put in small wooden knives to make spreading easy. Sandwich and canape spreads, fins of cold meats and jars of pickles and olives also make delicious cracker toppers. You might even stick in a jar of blackberry jam, Damson plum butter and watermelon pickles.

DATE NUT BREAD makes a sandwith with a zippy or mild-flavored white cream cheese filling. The bread will keep moist a week, so it is suggested for camps far from home. Mix for 10 minutes, 1½ cups chopped dates, 11/2 cups boiling water and 3 tablespoons fat. Add 3 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 beaten eggs and 1 cup bro-ken nuts. Pour into loaf pan fitted with waxed paper and let rise 15 minutes. Bake an hour in a moderately slow oven (325).

MOLASSES COOKIES: Cream 3 cup fat with a cup of sugar. Add 1/2 cup each of molasses and sour milk, 2 beaten eggs, 2 teager, 1/2 teaspoon each of cloves, nutmeg and salt and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat thoroughly, stirring in 4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda and 2 teaspoons baking powder. Chill dough and drop from tip of spoon onto greased baking sheet. Top each cooky with nut meats. dates, figs or raisins and bake 8 to 10 minutes in a moderate oven

For an old favorite, here is PECAN PRALINE: Boil slowly, stirring frequently, a cup each of dark brown and white sugar, 1/2 cup cream, 1/4 teaon salt and 2 tablespoons butter. When soft balls form in cold water, remove and do not cup pecans and beat until creamy. Drop portion from tip of spoon onto waxed paper.





GUATEMALA CITY, Nov. 17 .-The "blacklist" ban on Germancontrolled business in Guatemala has been faded to a dark Oxfordgray in order to avoid wrecking he economy of a country whose friendly cooperation is essential

to American policy. Guatemala, economically speaking, is coffee. The great coffee fincas (plantations) are the financial life-blood of the country. Most of them are German-controlled. Hence a completely rig-orous ban on coffee exports to the United States from sources which to the Nazi cause, would have seriously crippled Guatemalan

There is sufficient coffee available from genuinely Guatemalar sources to more than fill the U. S. quota even as recently extended The new concession made to German growers, was purely one aimed at preventing any disruption in the Guatemalan economy and will be so adjusted as to keep intact the general purpose of the blacklist, which is to prevent the kind of profitable business by Nazi-sympathizing Germans as enables them to do Hitler's work in Central America.







BRITAIN LEARNS AN EXPENSIVE LESSON The fact that the British have lost three aircraft carriers, including the Ark Royal which was considered the finest warship of its kind in the world, is likely to mean major structural changes in such ships.

In the past, aircraft carriers have been designed for speed and for space in which to carry planes. Armor protection and other safeguards have been sacrificed to these accomplishments. The theory has been that the carriers would not participate in the actual fighting, but would be relatively distant from the scene of battle. Thus, it has happened to the British that torpedoes which would not have done major damage to a battleship have sent carriers to

So, the assumption is that aircraft carriers under construction and built in the future will carry more armor than those now afloat.

The meaning of that to the taxpayer is almost sure to be that the individual ship won't be able to carry so many planes, and that more carriers will be required at a cost of something like \$30,000,000 per


