





KUIBYSHEV, Russia, Nov. 20 (11 p. m.) - Soviet front dis-patches tonight reported the situation in the Tula sector "most serious" as a result of a Nazi break-through and said the Nazi offensive against Rostov, gateway to the Caucasus, is gathering force. The Russian dispatches said a series of Nazi hammer blows, supported by strong tank concentrations, has cracked Soviet lines in the Tula front at "point D."

Crack Regiment Leading

The break-through was achievd in a coordinated series of attacks on the northern and southern wings of the Moscow front.

The German attack at Tula was directed by the third panzer division, the 112th and 167th infantry divisions and the "great Germany regiment," Russian re-

The Germans, the reports said, attacked south of Tula in a flanking maneuver, designed to drive past the city in a general campaign to encircle Moscow.







Details Of Alleged German Plot Disclosed In Brazil, Argentina

FDR's Charges Given Backing

Roosevelt in his Navy Day address that a German map exists, illustrating a Nazi plan to carve South and part of Central America into vassal states, has received support from two sources.

Juan A. Solari, acting chairman of the Argentine "Dies committee," a congressional body which for several months has been investigating anti-Argentine activities, mostly of a German nature, has reported the existence of a Nazi plan to make a protectorate of the South American continent, under a "gauleiter named by Adolf Hitler."

Almost simultaneously, Coelho Souza, secretary of education of the southern Brazil state of Rio Grande do Sul, charged that Nazi plans have been drawn up to take over Brazil, and that all Nazi activities leading to that end are under the direction of Hans Henning von Cossel, counsellor of the German embassy at Rio de Janeiro.

ican public officials do not clash, Solari said that the headquarters of Nazi infiltration and propaganda in South America were moved from Rio de Janeiro to .Buenos Aires two-years ago, because the Germans found a more

ympathetic attitude in Argentina. Souza stated that a German consular official in Chile is chief of the German "general staff" in South America.

Solari's statement declared thatperson prominent in finance and German community already has been selected as "gauleiter" by Hitler; that he was to be subordinate only to the supreme council of the Nazi party in Germany; that his vice-gauleiter would work in close cooperation with the German foreign office, army general staff and Gestapo; and that a council was to be created including Germans from Bolivia, Chile, Paraguay and Uruguay, to aid in ruling the new South American


