

RAID ALARMS SCREAM IN NEW YORK AND BOSTON AREAS

Raid Alarms On West Coast As Planes Sighted

Japanese warplanes reconnoitering over the San Francisco bay area and reports that other Japanese forces were off the Aleutian islands, in the narrow Bering straits between Alaska and Siberia, stirred new alarms today in the three-day-old battle of the Pacific.

In Tokyo, the Japanese navy's official spokesman asserted triumphantly that "the great initial success scored by the Japanese air and naval arms" had upset the balance of United States and Japanese power in the Pacific.

Intimations that Germany was about to declare war on the United States increased as the list of nations who have rallied to the United States side and declared war on Japan mounted to 16 — England, Holland, Dutch East Indies, Costa Rica, Canada, Haiti, El Salvador, Honduras, Free France, Dominican Republic, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Australia, New Zealand and Panama.

BRITAIN'S NEW 35,000-TON BATTLESHIP Prince of Wales was recently reported to have arrived at Singapore at the head of a strong squadron of British warships.

NO BOMBS DROPPED The planes are heading toward shore, and so far as is known, they are still coming. The all-clear was sounded at 3:37 a. m., however, ending the third alarm of the night.

EXPECT ATTACK ANYTIME In Victoria, B. C., Mayor Andrew McGavin announced tersely: "The Japanese are off the Aleutian islands; we expect them here any time. The situation is very serious."

JAP PLANES SHOT DOWN

Strong Front Against Japs Is Shaping Up

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 9. Diplomatic, military and legislative activities among Pan American republics indicated a progressive alignment with the United States today in the war against Japan.

SEVERAL DECLARE WAR Panama, through which runs the strategic Canal Zone, declared war upon Japan, following the lead of a half-dozen other nations in a movement started by Costa Rica.

PERMIT USE OF PORTS Neutral Argentina announced that a resolution to declare the United States a non-belligerent would be considered by the cabinet today. Approval of this measure would permit use of ports.

NAZI AID FOR JAPAN HINTED WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 — The House military affairs committee today approved legislation repealing restrictions on the use of selectees and national guardsmen outside the western hemisphere and U. S. possessions.

DEMANDS 'TRUTH' WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP) — Sen. Charles W. Tobey, R-N.H., said today it was "reported on the Senate floor that a large part of the Pacific fleet has been wiped out" and demanded that the American people be informed of the true situation.

TO ASK COURT MARTIAL WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP) — Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.) told the House today he proposed to demand that court martial proceedings be instituted against four high-ranking Japanese navy officers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. The House military affairs committee today approved legislation repealing restrictions on the use of selectees and national guardsmen outside the western hemisphere and U. S. possessions.

AGE LIMITS UNCHANGED The legislation also would wipe out the 30-month limitation on the service period of selectees. Chairman Andrew J. May, D-Ky., said the legislation would permit the holding in service of all members of the army for the duration of the war and for six months thereafter. He added that the vote was unanimous.

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Heavy Damage Inflicted On U. S. Forces

MANILA, Dec. 9. United States defense forces were officially reported today to have inflicted "considerable" losses on Japanese air squadrons attacking the Philippines but officials still withheld comment on reported enemy land operations on the island of Lubang and Mindanao.

JAPS INFLECT HEAVY DAMAGES The attacks ranged from Luzon island, on which Manila is situated, to Davao on Mindanao island in the south. Clark field near Manila was reported heavily damaged, while Iba and Taguigbarao were bombed.

LANDINGS REPORTED Reports circulated that Japanese troops had landed on Lubang island, which lies off the entrance to the Manila bay.

HILTON REPORTS \$1,500 BLAZE Insurance adjusters this afternoon were checking into a reported \$1,500 damage by fire early this morning to the Hilton hotel.

EMPLOYEES EVACUATE NAVY YARD Civilian employees also were evacuated from the Boston navy yard.

TEMPERATURE DROP OF 30 DEGREES FORECAST Drop of 30 or more degrees in the temperature on the South Plains by Wednesday afternoon is predicted in the official forecast today.

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School Children Evacuated; All Bases On Alert

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. The great metropolitan area of New York City was put on an air raid alert twice within an hour shortly after noon today amid varying and unconfirmed reports of an imminent attack by hostile planes.

NO OFFICIAL CONFIRMATION Navy press officers said they had not received a report on any hostile planes. They rushed the news to the office of Admiral Adolphus Andrews, commander of the third naval district and commander of the North Atlantic coastal frontier which extends from Hatteras to Halifax.

PLANE AT MITCHELL FIELD TOOK TO THE AIR and families were evacuated from the military reservation, although air corps detectors had not confirmed the presence of planes.

EMERGENCY REFUELING DEPOTS were set up in the vicinity of the field to be used in the event that the main refueling plant was knocked out.

Texas Snaps To Alert As War Hits; Patriotic Fervor Rises

AUSTIN, Dec. 9 (AP) — Texas' capital snapped to the alert Sunday afternoon as news of the Japanese attack on America swept the city.

Newspaper extras hit the streets and newsboys screamed the story, first surge of a rising storm of patriotic fervor began to appear.

Gov. Coke R. Stevenson was out of town when the news broke, but "was expected back momentarily, and, meanwhile, attacks began to gather at this office to make ready to marshal full resources of the state as they might be needed."

Rep. Dewitt Kinard of Port Arthur, chairman of a legislative committee coordinating defense activities in a telegram pledged full support to the president.

"We pledge our support and the industrial resources of Texas to repel and defeat the invaders and the Axis powers," the telegram said.

Officials of the multi-branches state police were on duty at headquarters a few minutes after news of the attack reached the capital.

Capt. Fred Hickman, assistant director, said his men were available for work with federal agencies, police or military.

"We are ready for anything that comes up," Hickman declared.

Hickman said he understood the secretary of war's request that all defense manufacturing industries be protected against sabotage was directed toward industry itself, but he added police were available to help when and if help was needed.

No Japs in Austin
The state police force long has been cooperating with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in anti-sabotage work and the two agencies remain closely linked.

Col. Homer Garrison, jr., state police director, was en route to East Texas when news of the attack was received.

Citizens gathered in little knots on famed Congress avenue and in and about the red granite Statehouse, talking of the amazing developments.

The general attitude seemed to be: "Well, they've asked for it, and they'll get it."

Police said that so far as known there were no Japanese in Austin to check up on.

A Key State
Texas is a key state in the national defense program with half a hundred army establishments either in existence, under construction or in the blueprint stage.

Recent figures indicated Texas leads all states in percentage of volunteers in the armed forces, in the number of men in training and in the size and number of its defense establishments.

The Texas Home Defense Guard is the largest in the nation, including 15,000 officers and men under arms.

Initial expenditures for defense program in Texas already approved exceed \$1,000,000,000.

In recent months, the state and federal government have spent tremendous sums improving strategic highways throughout Texas.

Japan's unwarranted ruthlessness

attack demands of our God-fearing, liberty loving citizens unity in purpose and action," Rep. Kinard's telegram said further.

"The Japanese and Axis threat must be smashed by force."

"The industrial facilities and manpower of Texas is being and will be pooled and mobilized to meet the emergency."

"Our courage, our heritage, our resources, our love of God together can and will give us victory."

"We are at your command."

"To guard against the possibility of excitement, approximately 300 air raid warning posts, manned by civilians, have been organized in Texas."

12,000 Assigned
More than 12,000 persons were assigned to stations which are under jurisdiction of the third inspector command of the U. S. Army air force.

The governor's defense committee is continuing to organize observation stations. Each of the state's 254 counties had a council to coordinate organization of the post, which would report the flight of hostile aircraft.

William McGill, in charge of the governor's defense coordination activities, said that plans for civilian participation in defense had been charted and are ready for execution on orders of the national office of civilian defense.

A Minute Plan
State and local police have a minutely detailed plan whereby officers can be rushed to any given locality with equipment necessary to meet an emergency.

The location of all important industries and other operations incident to defense preparation have been charted and are in the hands of officers.

The Colorado River authority responded to the government's call for anti-sabotage protection of facilities serving national defense by doubling its force of guards at all its units.

Twenty-four hour guard patrols already were on duty at each of the series of great dams on the Colorado river located at intervals for 65 miles west of Austin.

Sharp Watch Kept
They were maintaining the sharpest watch over generating plants and switchyards as well as the dams themselves.

The force of guards was doubled promptly by overlapping the shifts of watchmen.

Power from the units is supplied to numerous defense and defense production centers in Texas.

The Texas Defense Guard was "on the alert" on receipt of news concerning Japan's attack on American outposts, Col. Neill H. Banister, in charge of manpower, declared.

This is the same function performed by the national Guard when it is not in federal service. The Texas National Guard is now a part of the army of the United States and the defense guard was organized to replace it at home for the duration.

Col. Banister reported the guard numbered 1,022 officers and 14,000 men.

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Russia's Troops Regain Ground

Heavy Losses Face Germans

(By The Associated Press) Russian troops have regained ground in below-zero fighting before Moscow, Russians announced today, and estimated total casualties of Adolf Hitler's troops at 6,000,000 men in the first five months of the German-Russian war.

Temperatures as low as 17 degrees below zero were recorded and Russians commented: "Wait, this is nothing."

Offensive Is Halted—A German military spokesman acknowledged yesterday that bitter winter conditions had forced a halt in major operations including the offensive against Moscow until spring.

Pravda, Communist party organ, said the Germans had been pushed back with heavy losses in the Tula area, 100 miles south of the capital, and reports to Leningrad said the main forces of the German retreat from Rostov had moved even beyond Mariupol, the sea of Azov port where they were expected to form a firm stand.

The report of the retreat however, was modified by an acknowledgment that strong German forces were still at Taganrog, isolated by a potential menace to Russian communications.

Forces Regrouping—Battered forces of Gen. Erwin Rommel were reported to be regrouping in Libya after withdrawing westward to a line extending south from Tobruk through El Adent and Bir El Gobi.

British mechanized forces and infantry worked on pockets of Axis resistance along the Libyan coast in the vicinity of Bardia, Cairo dispatches reported, and estimated 4,000 Italian troops were trapped.

British already have claimed 8,000 prisoners from the drive.

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Small Manufacturers Of Texas Will Discuss Problems At Austin

Efforts Will Be Launched To Obtain Share Of Defense Work

(By The Associated Press)
Threatened with an industrial black-out, Texas' defense-harried small manufacturers will meet today in Austin to organize an advisory council to collaborate with state officials in procuring defense contracts.

The men who run the state's thousands of small businesses will meet with the men named by the Texas legislature to aid small manufacturers injured by the priorities system and the manner of awarding defense contracts.

Summoned by Rep. Dewitt Kinard, chairman of the special House defense co-ordination committee, operators of Texas' small plants will swing into united action for the first time to break down the prevailing system of awarding defense contracts chiefly to large concerns.

The advisory council can work with the committee if it becomes necessary for small Texas factories to pool their facilities to obtain contracts that none could handle individually, Kinard said. The House committee, composed of Kinard and Representatives Magnus Smith of Pleasanton and Leslie Clark of Breckenridge, is conducting a drive to induce major factories having enormous government contracts for defense to subject to small plants contracts for parts, fabrication and other manufacturing.

Shutdowns Increasing
Predicting that 1,000 small shops and factories in Texas will be forced to close early in 1942 unless work is provided for them, Kinard revealed that, shutdowns of small Texas shops and factories because of the defense program "increased alarmingly" during November.

The effects of the priorities program are just beginning to be felt, he added. An unemployment survey conducted by Kinard disclosed that 1,000 Texans lost their jobs through November shutdowns, although many found other work immediately.

Many Adversely Affected
Of an estimated 10,000 small shops and factories in the state, Kinard said it is believed that 90 per cent have been "adversely affected" by the national defense program, under which most concerns have gone to large concerns. About 200,000 employees are affected.

"We have tried to induce Washington authorities to unbend a little in order to keep small Texas plants going, but instead of doing any unbending regulations were made even tighter," Kinard said. "But we have not given up. Citizens over the state are becoming aroused because closing down of hundreds of small plants will be calamitous."

Backs To The Wall
The Texas small plants have good equipment and skilled employees but their backs are now to the wall, for they have no material. It would be a shame and a great hardship if they are forced to close down, for such would be self defense. It would be self destruction.

He asserted that only 40 per cent of Texas' potential manufacturing capacity is being utilized. The small plants, he added, are ready for any defense work that may be turned over to them. Reflecting increasing official concern over the plight of the small businessman, the Austin meeting is the latest in a series of efforts by federal and state officials to spread out defense contracts and take advantage of a greater number of production facilities.

plants are suited for defense production and how defense contracts may be obtained. Currently pending in the United States Senate is a bill directing the president to allocate raw materials to small firms whose operations have been affected by priorities.

In testimony this week before a subcommittee considering the bill, spokesmen for the war and navy departments and Office of Production Management said that defense must come first and business second.

Military and civil spokesmen clashed on the efficacy of the bill. Chairman Walsh said one committee "was in favor of some legislation that would give due consideration to national defense" and still "give a percentage of materials to small business."

Financing Is Asked
Playd M. Odum, director of the recently organized division of contract distribution of the OPM, has asked that a small percentage of the necessary materials be set aside for allocation to firms employing up to 20 employees or slightly more, and that special financing arrangements be instituted for small concerns to enable them to transform their plants into defense production.

The district office of the OPM this week announced plans to adopt the old "circuit rider" system to help in explaining and simplifying priorities regulations for Texas businessmen. J. B. Joyce, priorities analyst, said two more members are to be added to the priorities division of the Dallas office. These will present members of the staff, will lay out circuits including first the larger and then the smaller towns of the district and will make efforts to meet with businessmen and answer their questions.

Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson wrote regional chamber of commerce presidents that he had received assurances from Odum that OPM business clinics would be established as soon as practicable in Texas, and that allowances for freight differentials would be considered on products manufactured in Texas under defense contracts and shipped to eastern manufacturing centers.

Andrews Test Is Announced
Carrying the search for Ardovician production to the North Permian basin, Phillips Petroleum company announced location Monday for a 8,500 foot test in southwestern Andrews county.

The Red Raiders, who have concentrated on their studies and other interests since the final football game of the season in El Paso, will return to football practice next Monday. Head Coach Dell Morgan announced last night.

Council Gladly Accepts
Texas Tech's athletic council met in special called session late Monday afternoon and accepted an invitation to participate in the classic extended by Dr. Robert Homan, jr., of El Paso, chairman of the Sun Bowl committee. Homan had telephoned Athletic Director Morley Jennings of Tech shortly after learning that Arizona university had declined an invitation extended by the Border conference faculty representatives to participate in the classic.

This will be Tech's second trip to the Sun Bowl. They competed as the Border conference host team in the Jan. 1, 1938, game, losing to West Virginia university, 14-6.

It will be the first meeting between teams representing Tech and Tulsa. The Tulsa team has been beaten twice this season, both times by Southwest conference eleven. It has won seven games, and copped the Missouri Valley title with ease.

Beaten By TCU, Arkansas
Texas Tech, not competing for any conference championship, though it is a member of the Border conference, won nine games and lost one this season. The lonesome defeat was a 6-0 loss to Miami university on that team's heat-ridden home field.

Tulsa was beaten by Texas Christian, which is to play in the Orange Bowl, 6-0, and by Arkansas in an upset, 13-6. The Hurricane won five Missouri Valley conference games and two other intercollegiate tests. The Hurricane and the Red Raiders have played three common opponents. The difference in score margin belongs to the Hurricane on two of those games, and to Tech on the other. The total difference in score on the three games favors Tech by two points.

This is Tech's third time to participate in a post-season bowl engagement. The first was the Sun Bowl appearance of their first Sun Bowl bowler to St. Mary's, 20-13, in the Cotton Bowl. The Crimson this year will be shooting for the initial victory in bowl competition.

Uncle Sam Is Colling The Signals Now! Sports Ready To Do Its Part; Most Major Events Likely To Continue Just As Scheduled

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—It will be business as usual in sports during the war—so long as the government agrees.

That was the unanimous reaction obtained by the United Press today in a nationwide survey of leaders in all sporting circles, although a certain amount of curtailment is regarded as inevitable, and officials and promoters to a man are prepared to carry on for the duration.

While making it plain that all their actions hinge on government approval sponsors of the impending bowl football games, boxing matches and race meetings said that their events will be held as scheduled. Baseball and professional football men, who have concluded their 1941 season, said that adjustments will be made for 1942 but that they remained confident that America, like England and Russia, would retain sports war or not.

'If' Are Included
Most opinions were carefully phrased with "if's"—the biggest of them centering on a probable new draft law which would reclassify many athletes now exempt from service under the selective service act because of age or dependents. Baseball would be hardest hit under such circumstances, with football and boxing also suffering.

Here are thumb-nail summaries by sports:
Baseball—A revised draft law would be the biggest problem, but the sport survived all but a few weeks of world war I—operating through 1917 and until September of 1918. Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis said "it is too early yet to form opinions." But American league President William Harridge stated that "while the nation's welfare is our first consideration, I am sure baseball will carry on as it always has and complete its schedule in 1942 and for years to come."

Boxing—Mike Jacobs, the nation's leading promoter, will retain his present heavy schedule of bouts as long as the fighters remain available. He said "I stand ready to do anything I'm asked, whether it is to promote bouts for the army and navy or to work in any other manner. I believe boxing is good for morale, particularly with so many men in the armed forces, and will continue business as planned as long as we're able."

Announce Decision Tonight
Just to provide one element of suspense at the baseball meeting, he said, he'd announce his decision tonight—by which time any of the 16 major league club owners, managers or other officials hiredlings may be ready to confer with some other kind of press release.

One move that won't be announced, however, is the re-affiliation of Leo (Gabby) Hartnett with the New York Giants, who released the former Cub catcher and manager last fall and then became involved in rumors which said they might invite him back. Gabby already has a place for next summer; his appointment as manager of the Indianapolis club of the American association was announced yesterday.

Feller To Join Armed Forces

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—The big men of baseball, who have a tough time at any normal major league gathering finding time to discuss trades, have been so wrapped up in the Pacific developments the last two days that they haven't been able to produce any noteworthy moves.

But not so Mr. Robert Feller of the Cleveland Indians, who probably has more reason to be concerned about the war than any of the executives. He's a draft material, but rather than submit to the draft machinery, Bobby is enlisting, and he's made up his mind when, where and how.

Choices Are Popular
El Pasoans were pleased with the selection of Tulsa, the rejection of Arizona and the invitation to Tech.

The Lubbock school is unusually popular in the Border town and has been the host choice of El Pasoans for weeks.

Student From India Speaker At Meeting
Abdul Mehta, Texas Technological college student from Pune, India, discussed "India and the New World Order" at a regular meeting of the Texas Tech International Relations club Monday night.

Approximately 25 students attended the meeting at the 1905 Thirteenth street residence of Dr. Benjamin Book, club sponsor.

Mehta reported that India's contribution to the British war effort is far greater than is generally supposed. He told how the Indian army has been built up from a poorly equipped force of 100,000 to a modern mechanized and fully equipped army of a million men within two years.

The talk and the round-table discussion which followed centered around the state of things as they are to be when the present war is concluded, the methods of establishing peace and India's place in the post-war world.

Crisis More Acute Than In Last War

(By The United Press)
CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—Officials of National and American league baseball clubs met in separate sessions today facing a crisis far more acute than in the first World war year of 1918.

What appeared to be one of baseball's greatest seasons became a definite question mark with declaration of war and officials of the two leagues opened their annual winter meetings baseball's part in the emergency was the uppermost thought. Before the three day session is concluded some sort of "war-plan" governing the enlistment or drafting into military service of players under contract was almost certain to be enacted.

Trade Talk Diminished
Such key figures as Commissioner K. M. Landis, President Will Harridge of the American league and President Ford Frick of the National league declined to venture a forecast of baseball's future other than to agree that the national pastime will do "its share."

Trade Talk Flourished But Died Instantly
Forecasts were divided sharply between baseball's old and young generation. Many old timers recalled the game weathered the crisis of 1917, played a 1918 schedule curtailed only on Labor day, and resumed its full duration in 1919.

Out Gives View
Mel Ott, 33 year old outfielder recently appointed manager of the New York Giants, was far less optimistic.

"This year has made us all mad," he said. "None can foresee what will happen. Ball players are like everybody else and they might get out and volunteer regardless of contract."

Others To Do Part

Tennis—Fate of sectional tournaments will rest with the individual clubs. The next U. S. T.
